YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Office of Continuing Education at Youngstown State University, in cooperation with the YSU Criminal Justice and Campus Security Departments, will conduct a one-day seminar, "Computer Crime Investigation," from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Friday, March 1.

The seminar, which will be held on campus, is for law enforcement personnel, investigators, prosecutors, and corporate security administrators.

It will define computer-related crime and the methods used to commit these crimes. The program will also include a discussion of legal and evidentiary considerations, including how to handle and treat evidence associated with computer-related crime.

The instructors for the seminar will be Richard E. Cadle, systems engineer for Adaptive Systems of Youngstown; Louis P. Carsone, systems design specialist for Adaptive Systems; and Dr. James A. Conser, assistant professor of Criminal Justice at YSU and the training coordinator for Adaptive Systems. A special guest instructor will be Trumbull County Prosecutor Dennis Watkins.

The fee is \$60, which includes lunch, parking, a certificate of participation, manuals, handout materials, and computer demonstrations.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Office of Continuing Education, in cooperation with the Counseling Department at Youngstown State University, will offer a half-day seminar, "How to Take the NBCC Exam," for counselor certification. The seminar will be held on Saturday, March 9, from 9 a.m. until noon on campus.

More than 13,000 counselors nationally are now certified by the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC), a non-profit corporation established by the American Association for Counseling and Development. Certified counselors are listed in a national register available to the general public, and are identified as having met standards established by NBCC.

The YSU seminar will distinguish and describe accreditation, licensure, and certification for counseling professionals; delineate required certification steps; describe the national examination; and give seminar participants an opportunity to take and score a practice exam.

The instructor for the course will be Dr. Christopher Faiver, assistant professor of Counseling at YSU. The fee for the seminar is \$30.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Mark Russell, comic and political satirist, will speak Feb. 26 at Stambaugh Auditorium, Fifth Avenue, as a Skeggs Lecturer to open Youngstown State University's Winter Quarter Special Lecture Series.

His program, "An Evening with Mark Russell," will be presented at 8 p.m. The performer will address himself to all the headline news of the day using satire, original song parodies, piano accompaniment and caricatures.

Skeggs Lectures are part of the YSU Special Lecture Series and are free and open to the public. Admission is on a first-come, first-served basis.

Russell has been entertaining people as a resident comedian at a leading hotel in Washington, D.C. for 23 years. Although he often jibes at political figures, they make up a large part of his audience. He spends so much time among the politicians on Capitol Hill gathering material for his show, that they sometimes mistake him for one of their peers. The last four presidents have known him well enough to call him by his first name.

"Real People" on NBC-TV often features a Russell performance. He has also hosted specials for the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) which were produced by WNED-TV in Buffalo. He has appeared on many television programs, including "The Tonight Show," "Merv Griffin Show," and "David Frost Specials." His column is syndicated in over 100 newspapers across the nation.

He published a book, Presenting Mark Russell, in 1980, and has produced several recordings including: "Assault With a Deadly Peanut," "The Wild, Weird, Wired World of Watergate," and "The Face on the Senate Floor."

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - WYSU-FM (88.5), Youngstown State University's fine arts radio station, will broadcast Richard Wagner's opera "Lohengrin" live from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera at 1 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 16.

The opera, which opens the Met season, features Anna Tomowa-Sintow as the innocent Elsa; Eva Marton as the evil Ortrud; Placido Domingo, in his first Wagner role at the Met, as the noble knight Lohengrin; Donald McIntyre as the evil conspirator Telramund; John Macurdy as King Henry; and Brent Ellis as the Herald. The conductor is James Levine.

Guests Alison Ames, Tony Caronia and Joseph Dash will conduct a "Recording Executives Roundtable" during the first intermission and "Texaco's Opera Quiz" will be featured in the second intermission.

"Lohengrin," the final and supreme work of his early romantic period, is Wagner's most popular opera and has been performed at the Met more than any of his works.

The announcer for the broadcast will be Peter Allen.

The Metropolitan Opera is broadcast by the Texaco/Metropolitan Opera Radio Network and National Public Radio affiliates.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Youngstown State University's Jazz Ensemble I and its director, Tony Leonardi of Poland, were again selected to perform at the annual Ohio Music Educators Association conference.

The YSU jazz group and one from the University of Cincinnati were chosen to give concerts at the three-day conference in Cleveland, which began Thursday (2/7). The Youngstown State Ensemble played at the 1980 OMEA meeting.

Also, two members of Jazz Ensemble I, Kent Engelhardt of Boardman, who plays lead alto saxophone, and Tom Potjunas of Warren, trombonist, were selected as members of this year's Intercollegiate Jazz Ensemble, which will give a concert. The 19 members of this group were chosen by taped auditions sent in from colleges and universities throughout Ohio. This is the third consecutive year Engelhardt has been picked for the Intercollegiate band.

Leonardi, assistant professor of music in YSU's Dana School of Music, was selected to direct the first Regional All-Star High School Jazz Ensemble, which will also perform. He directed the Intercollegiate Band last year.

Tim Harkar of Boardman High, tenor sax, and Doug Ready of Warren, trombone, were selected from District 5 schools, which include all in Mahoning, Trumbull and Ashtabula counties, for the high school band.

The Dana School of Music is part of the university's College of Fine and Performing Arts.
