These "Skywatch" sessions are not regular Planetarium programs. They are live presentations conducted in an informal atmosphere in which audience participation is encouraged through questions and comments.

"Skywatch" is designed to be a detailed, informative and enjoyable survey of the heavens. It will be offered every other month through June.

YSU's Planetarium, which has had more than 600,000 visitors since it opened in 1967, has undergone renovation in the \$12.7 million program to improve facilities at Ward Beecher Hall, and now has many innovative features.

Planetarium shows are free and open to the public, but reservations are required due to limited seating capacity.
