(Cont. from page 1 ) requirement that the last 45 hours must be taken at the univreceiving his B.S. degree. Yoz wiak said, "Almost every school nationwide states that the last 45 hours must be taken at the school where the student is receiving the degree. These stu
dents at the medical school are now in the last 45 hours of the program at YSU. Therefore a transfer would be difficult." The students leave YSU for the medical school before graduating. The students then return to the University during the sum-
mer to complete the final 45 hours.
However, Yozwiak said there is a possibility that a humanities course to be given at the medical school by various teachers from the three universities will receive credit.' This would be taught during the final year of the medical program.
Also, Yozwiak, said the cur-
riculum is under review conriculum is under review constantly, since this is a new pro gram combining, a medical school with three area universi
ties. "We are trying to introduce more flexibility . into the pro gram to meet the needs of the students...however, trying to get YSU credit for the behavioral science course is a pretty closed matter," concluded 'Yozwiak
