YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Three "how to" courses on computers have been scheduled at Youngstown State University by the University's Office of Continuing Education.

"Computer Literacy" will examine computer terminology and how computers work, as well as their application to both professional and personal use. This course is focused primarily on microcomputers and is recommended for persons with little or no experience with computers. Classes will be held on campus from 1-4 p.m. on four Saturdays, April 12-May 3.

"Programming with Basic I" will emphasize the "basic" language of computers, use of microcomputers, and modeling problems for computer solution. The mathematics will be kept at an introductory level. These classes will meet from 9 a.m.-noon Saturdays, also April 12-May 3.

"Programming with Basic II" is a continuation of the latter and will focus on practical applications of programming techniques. It will include specialized instruction commands. This class will meet from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturdays, May 9-30.

Instructor for these computer courses will be Samuel Skarote of Campbell, YSU professor of electrical engineering.

The fee for each course is \$140, or \$125 for those registering at least 14 days prior to the first class meeting.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Youngstown State University's Office of Continuing Education will offer a three-day seminar for professionals who intervene and investigate child abuse cases.

"Investigation of Child Sex Abuse Crimes" will be held from 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m. on April 7, 8 and 9 on campus.

Topics will include: sex crimes committed against children and the impact of the crime; prevention programs and proposed solutions to child abuse; the child at the hospital; interviewing techniques; child abuse homicides; the offender; pedophilia; child pornography; and incest.

Sergeant Gerald T. McQueen, a police veteran and commanding officer of the 17th Precinct Detective Unit in New York's Manhattan, will lead the seminar.

McQueen, who has lectured in the U.S., Canada and the Virgin Islands, was given a temporary leave of absence from the New York Police Department in 1982 to become chief investigator for the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct of the House of Representatives. In addition, he has headed the investigation into allegations of illicit use of drugs and improper or illegal sexual conduct by members, officers and employees of the House.

The registration fee for the seminar is \$190, which includes materials, refreshments, lunches, parking and a certificate of participation. Individuals registering prior to March 23 receive a \$15 discount.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Dr. Kenneth E. Young, noted educator and director of the Institute for Learning in Retirement of American University, Washington, D.C., will deliver the address at Youngstown State University's Winter Commencement at 10 a.m. Saturday, March 29, at Beeghly Center, Spring Street.

His topic will be "The Changing Face of Higher Education."

The ceremony will honor some 870 graduates, half of whom completed requirements in December, and others who are completing their work for degrees this month.

The commencement exercises will be broadcast live over YSU's fine arts radio station, WYSU-FM (88.5), beginning at 9:55 a.m.

Dr. Young, in addition to his post at American University, is a consultant and senior associate of Diane Eisenberg Associates in Washington.

He earned his master's degree in journalism and social science and a doctoral degree in philosophy from Stanford (Calif.) University. He also received an honorary Doctorate of Law from the University of Nevada.

Dr. Young served as executive director of the National University Continuing Education Association, president of the Council on Postsecondary Accreditation, and vice president and director of the Washington office of the American College Testing Program.

He also was president of State University of New York at Cortland (1964-68), executive vice president at the University of Nevada (1960-64), and before that was dean of faculty at the University of Alaska.

He is the author of more than 40 articles on education published in scholarly journals and has contributed to numerous books on facets of higher education.

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
