YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - A veteran McDonald teacher and former president of the Ohio Education Association received her master's degree in education Saturday (March 28) from Youngstown State University.

For Sally Martin Savage, busy teaching and raising a family, it was 22 years of extra effort. When she received her first degree from YSU in 1959, a bachelor's degree in elementary education, she was honored as the first Rayen family decendent to graduate from what was then Youngstown University.

Her great-great-grandfather, John Rayen, an early leader in the community and education, was a brother of Judge William Rayen, who supported and left funds for Youngstown's first secondary school, the Rayen School on Wick Ave., which opened in 1866. YSU's William Rayen School of Engineering was housed in the old Rayen School for a number of years after the new Rayen High School was constructed on Benita Avenue.

Mrs. Savage is a daughter of William and Cornelia Martin of Girard. Her grandmother, Ida Rayen Morris, was a daughter of Joseph Rayen and granddaughter of John Rayen. Mrs. Morris also taught in Girard schools.

Mrs. Savage is currently doing a study for Youngstown's Arms Museum on the Rayen family.

Mrs. Savage began studies for her master's degree in education in September 1979 and completed them in 18 months while continuing to teach at McDonald's Roosevelt Elementary School, where she's been a teacher for 22 years. Prior to that she taught for three years in Girard schools.

She was born in Youngstown, graduated from Girard High School in 1945, and

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taught in schools there while attending YSU for her BA degree. She and her husband, Thomas J. Savage, a self-employed contractor, had two children when she received that degree in 1959. They now have three, Thomas, 27; Jeff, 25; and Scott, 16, and reside at 358 McDonald Ave. in McDonald.

What's next? Sally Savage is considering applying at the University of Akron to pursue a doctoral degree in education.

Mrs. Savage served two terms as president of McDonald Education Association and currently is its secretary. She was president of the Trumbull County Education Association, recording secretary of the Northeast Ohio Education Association, and served two terms as president of the Ohio Education Association. She is a member of the Board of Directors, National Education Association, and the Board of Directors of the State Teachers Retirement System.

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The commissioning ceremonies were conducted by Lt.-Col. Robert E. Shea, chairman of YSU's Military Science Department.

Now on active duty with the Army as second lieutenants are: Kathy J. Drylie, 1178 Edgewood NE, Warren; Sandy L. Gieseler, 349 Westview Dr., Hubbard; Delores Hudock, RD #1, Pulaski, Pa.; Dimitrios P. Stephanopoulos, 79 Maple Dr., Greenville, Pa.; Terence L. Turnovsky, 90 Marion Dr., Poland; and Esther J. Thurman, 164 N. Roanoke Ave., Austintown.

Drylie majored in home economics and has been assigned to Fort Lee, Va., in the Quartermaster Corps and will later go to Fort Bragg, N.C.

After receiving a degree in speech communication, Gieseler will go to Fort Bliss, Texas, and then to Fort Bragg, to serve in the Air Defense Artillery.

Hudock majored in business management. She has been assigned to Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., and later will go to Fort Carson, Colo., to serve in the Adjutant General Corps.

Stephanopoulos, a hospital administration major, is assigned to Fort Sill, Okla., with the Field Artillery.

Turnovsky majored in electrical engineering and is assigned to the Signal Corps at Fort Gordon, Ga.

Thurman, a finance major, is in the early commissioning program and will not receive her degree until December 1981. She is now working at the Army Reserves' 645th Supply Co in Youngstown.

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Although there has been a dramatic increase in young women combining a college degree and the Army ROTC program, this unusual statement came from two men already in the military during Youngstown State University's commencement exercises today (March 28).

During ceremonies on the YSU campus, Marine Corps Reserve Capt. Russell L. Drylie pinned second lieutenant bars on his wife, Kathy, while Army Staff Sgt. Albert A. Thurman did the honors for his wife, Esther, after both young women completed the university's ROTC program.

Lieutenant Drylie, 1178 Edgewood NE, Warren, a home economics major with a 3.41 grade point average received a regular Army commission in the Quartermaster Corps. She will report next week to Fort Lee, Va., for her initial officer training. Her husband, who works at General Motors Lordstown Plant, is a Marine Reserve F-4 Phantom pilot. The Drylies have a son, Rusty, age 4.

Lieutenant Thurman, 164 N. Roanoke Ave., Austintown, an international finance major with a 3.65 GPA, was commissioned in the Quartermaster Corps of the Army Reserve, and is serving with the Reserves' 645th General Supply Co. in Youngstown. Her husband is the supply sergeant for YSU's ROTC Detachment.

When asked if they anticipated any problems with rank, both couples stated that they foresaw none. Another issue, said Lt. Drylie, could be the inter-service rivalry between the Marines and the Army, but in her words, "I think we can handle it."
