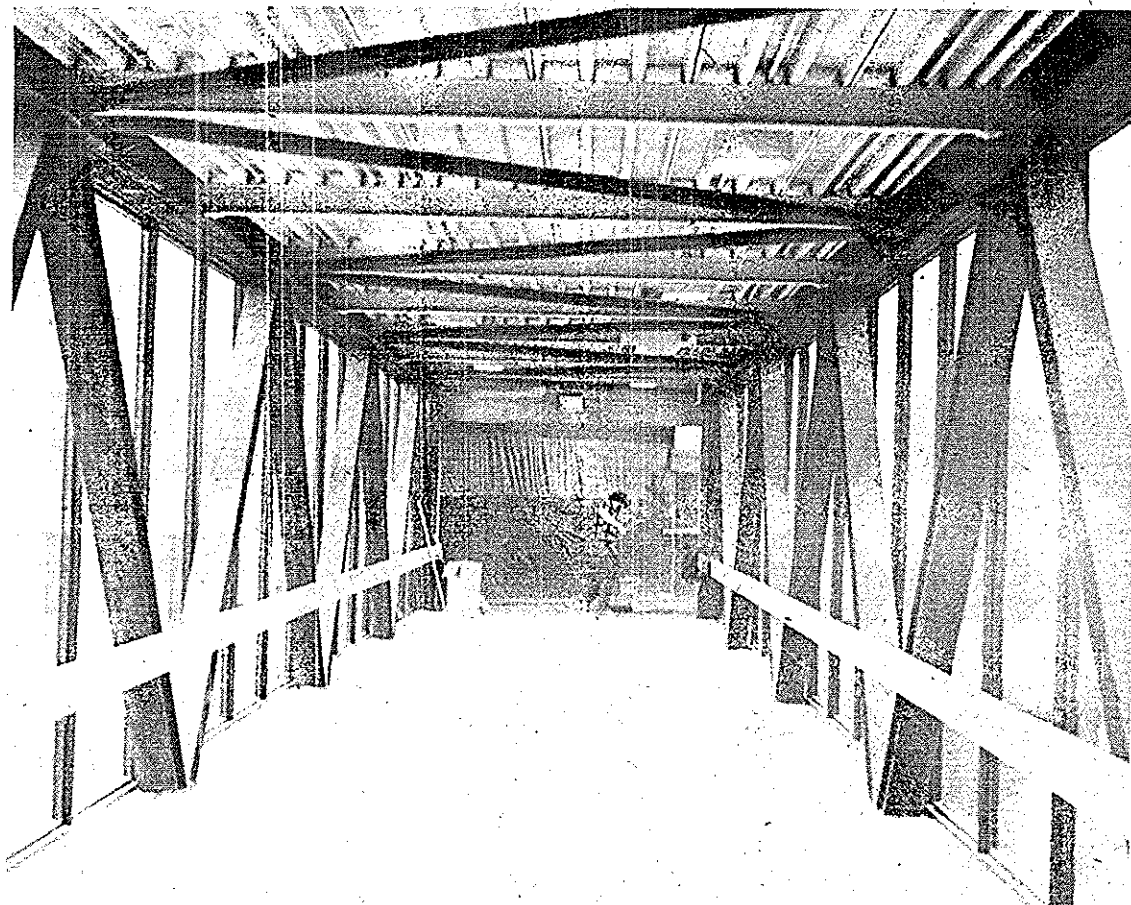

## Bold, creative programming needed

## TV host lambasts Black's image

"Definition of segregation has changed. . . and I think Blacks in television can help the situation," stated Tony Brown, host of *Tony Brown's Journal*, a syndicated television show a guest speaker at YSU during Black History Month.

Brown attended a press conference yesterday at 12:30 p.m., before speaking on "The Future of Black Images

on the Media" last night in the A&S lecture hall.

*Tony Brown's Journal* began its eleventh season this year and is the first syndicated show to go from Public Broadcast System (PBS) to commercial television.

Brown stated at the press conference that most Black shows which are on television are racist. "Racism makes Blacks uneducable, unemployable. We need to bring changes

into the system," said Brown.

He said the TV show *Paris* was an example of a good Black show.

Brown said television builds stereotypes. "I'm not talking about White people or Black people. I'm talking about images." He related that all he knows about Chinese people is what he has learned from television, and for some people in America all they know about Blacks is what they see on TV.

## Black History Month

## Dale Carnegie representative speaks Monday

Effective channelling of one's education or vocational skills into appropriate job related fields, is the theme of one special YSU "Black History Month" event.

On Monday, February 11, a two-session workshop with guest instructor, Marvin Smith, community relations manager, Dale Carnegie Associates Inc., Garden

City, New York, will be offered free to area students and businessmen.

The Dale Carnegie Associates Inc., is a management/training organization for American free enterprise businesses and youth organizations. According to Smith, Dale Carnegie Associates, Inc., is the world's largest, adult training program.

## Budget proposal calls for no fee increase

No increase in the general fee is expected for the academic year 1980-81 if the proposal of the Budget Subcommittee on the General Fee is accepted, according to Dr. Charles McBriarty, chairperson of the committee and associate vice president for student services.

The subcommittee, which has been meeting since the beginning of this quarter, has just sent to YSU President Dr. John Coffelt its recommendations on the allocation of next year's general fee monies. Total money available for allocation from the 1980-81 general fee is expected to be \$1,763,000.

The recommended budget must be reviewed by Coffelt, the University Budget Committee and the Board of Trustees before it is made final, McBriarty said.

Recommended amounts were equal to those requested by all the general fee funded groups, except Intercollegiate Athletics, Intramural/recreation, Kilcawley Center, and Spotlight Theatre.

McBriarty explained, "The athletic department requested, \$933,109 (\$867,109 as a general fee allocation and \$66,000 to be carried forward from an expected remaining balance at the end of the current year), but we could only come up with \$807,481 (general fee). In addition we recommended that the department be allowed to carry forward any money left at the end of this year to next year's budget." This balance forward, however, is not to raise the total athletic budget above \$875,000.

The recommended increase

of \$23,140 for Athletics is to cover inflationary costs of equipment and travel, and to fund five newly proposed scholarships for both male and female athletes, he said.

The Kilcawley Center request of \$508,710 was cut to \$502,500 because the subcommittee believed that a \$6,210 amount requested for a state required energy audit should not be budgeted from student general fee monies, but rather, from administrative services funds.

The intramurals recreation department had requested \$75,427 and the subcommittee recommended they be given \$68,853.

According to McBriarty, the budget proposal was decreased partly because the subcommittee stated that extracurricular and intercollegiate activities should not be funded through the intramurals budget as they are now.

Intramurals has also been absorbing part of the salaries of two assistant coaches who were to help with intramural activities,

but are unable to do so because of scheduling conflicts and other difficulties. The subcommittee felt that intramurals should not be required to pay these salaries.

McBriarty said that the subcommittee suggested that the position of intramurals coordinator be extended from nine to 12 months, to enable the coordinator to more efficiently prepare for the school year's program and "to allow for (the development of) a summer program."




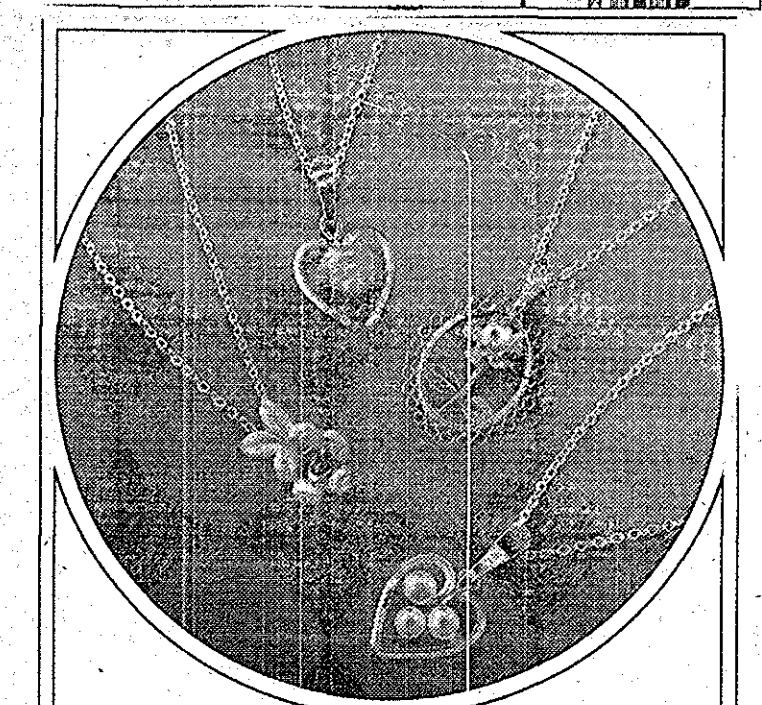

**Peasants simplicity admired**

**Tolstoy questions life's purpose**

"Leo Tolstoy was a very brilliant, although naive person. He wanted to convert the world," said Robert Hawkins, vice-president of the History Club, in remarks made about the Russian writer at the club's Wednesday meeting.

Tolstoy is probably best known for his books *War and Peace* and *Anna Karenina*. He was a true aristocrat, a count who owned a large estate, said Hawkins.

Some of the early years of Tolstoy's life were spent in the army. He was greatly affected by his military experiences which led him to write about them. Later, while in his thirties, Tolstoy spent much of his time in the French literary circles of Paris, continued Hawkins.

Tolstoy's book *Confessions*, a spiritual autobiography, revealed

his strong fear of death. At age 50 Tolstoy faced a moral crisis in his life concerning the purpose of life. Because of his fear of death he cherished life, but this also caused him anxiety because life had to end with death, Hawkins stated.

According to Hawkins, Tolstoy's search in life led him to identify with the peasants who lived on his estate. By questioning them Tolstoy concluded that the secret of happiness was to know the will of God and to carry it out.

This new-found revelation led Tolstoy to develop his own religion based on Christ's Sermon on the Mount. Tolstoy read the Gospels and rejected many of the aspects of Christianity, including the Trinity, life-after-death and the resurrection of Christ, said Hawkins.

What Tolstoy did believe,

stated Hawkins, was that God was inside each individual and that reason and conscience flowed from this indwelling. He even created his own Commandments espousing pacifism and good works.

Tolstoy was influenced by the works of Thoreau and Walt Whitman. He was an anarchist, a pacifist, and an idealist.

Tolstoy was excommunicated by the Russian Orthodox Church in 1901. He turned his estate over to his wife and family and took up the life of a peasant. One day he wandered away and eventually suffered a stroke. He died in 1910.

Tolstoy will always be remembered for his classics, although many of his later works are not read. His influence is still present even today in a large number of colonies of his followers in England, concluded Hawkins.

of \$12,000 was cut to a recommended allocation of \$11,000 by the subcommittee. The concensus was that the Spotlight film series did not warrant the requested \$1000 allocation.

The subcommittee also recommended that students not be charged to attend plays. Student Government gained an

increase of \$11,000 in this year's recommended budget, while Kilcawley Center received an increase of \$14,774.

Forensics, the Graduate Student Advisory Committee and *The Jambar* were the only groups which did not request a budgetary increase.

**Editorial**

**Enlightened allocations**

The increases allotted by the Budget Subcommittee on the General Fee to the groups requesting additional monies from the fund indicate that slowly but surely, we are beginning to recognize that YSU is an institute of higher learning. Now if the members of the Budget Committee will keep this revelation in mind the student body as a whole will profit from it next year.

In permitting a 10 per cent increase over last year's budget for Spotlight Theatre and the Special Lecture Series, along with a 33.3 per cent increase in the funds for the foreign language students' magazine *Polyglot* and an 18.2 per cent increase for the marching band, the committee has demonstrated that it realizes the need for further literary, cultural, and intellectual enlightenment on this campus. Is that not the purpose of a university?

The Budget Committee, which is next in line to review the proposals, has an obligation to adopt a laissez-faire attitude towards the Subcommittee's recommended allocations and not alter them. The General Fee is collected from the students, and the Subcommittee determining the distribution of this fee is predominately composed of students. Of all the finance related committees on campus, this Subcommittee is the *only* one that is made up primarily of students. The Budget Committee, with its eight administrative members, should remember this when they attack the Subcommittee's proposed budget with their sharp, red pencils.

Some might criticize the Subcommittee's allotment of a 3.0 per cent increase in Athletics. However, when one considers that Athletics requested 10.55 per cent, the approved increase is not that difficult to contend with. However, criticism can be leveled justly at the Subcommittee for their approval of a 17.2 increase in Student Government's share of the general fee pie. Perhaps the cost of transmitting a telegram to Tehran has also increased by 17 per cent.

With the exception of the Student Government increase, the Budget Committee should view the subcommittee's proposal as sound and well deliberated, and should approve this predominately student determined request on how to spend student fees.

**Polls student opinion on draft**

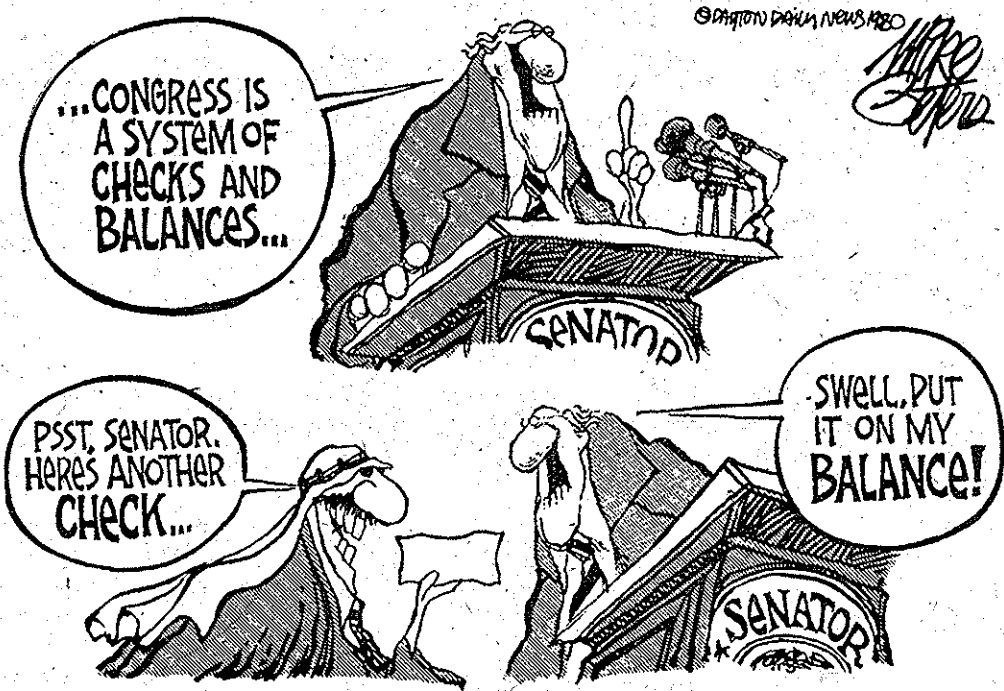
**To the Editor of the Jambar:**  
 "If it goes through, draft the 10 million illegal aliens."  
 "I'd rather go to Canada or have a few kids."  
 "All the way U.S.A."  
 "Everybody should serve their country."  
 "A weak request from a weak individual."  
 "ERA all the way."  
 These are among the comments expressed in the College Republicans poll related to the possible reinstatement of the draft. The people expressed their opinions last Tuesday to three questions as the College Republicans circulated information on Republican candidates in the presidential race.

Question 1 asked, "Do you support President Carter's call to re-instate draft registration?" Question 2 asked, "Do you support the registration of females?" Question 3 asked, "Would you serve if drafted?"  
 Of the 44 females who participated in the survey, only 41 per cent supported Carter's plan to have registration for a possible draft. Of 63 males, 70 per cent supported Carter's plan. Seventy-five per cent of the females felt females should not be drafted, while 63 per cent of the males supported the draft for females. Question 3 saw a vast difference of opinion between females and

males. Only 34 per cent of the females said they would serve if drafted. However, 81 per cent of the males said they would serve if drafted.

The College Republicans wish to serve the University by approaching important current issues. While we realize the results of our poll are not of the accuracy of Gallop or Harris, we feel our attempt reflects our goal to serve the University with important, relative issues.

**Clarifies Shipka's statements**

**To the Editor of the Jambar:**  
 I write to correct an impression given in your recent article on the draft and conscientious objection. Having talked with Dr. Shipka, it appears that the problem arose in translating the interview into an article, and therefore I address my comments to him personally. The article gives the impression that one must be a total pacifist to qualify for conscientious objector status, either the 1-O or the 1-AO category. This is incorrect.

Self-defense or familial defense is of such a different order from total war between nations that this difference is recognized in the law. A conscientious objector need not refuse to use force to defend his well-being or the well-being of others in isolated cases. The logic of war is not the logic of individual force writ large. There is, in addition, a type of conscientious objection based on the totally disproportionate con-

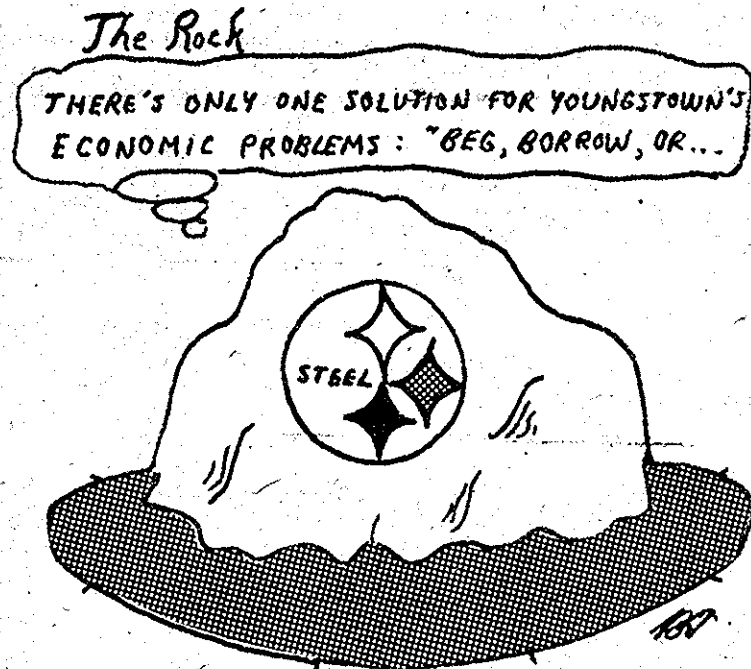
sequence of modern atomic war, and thus nicknamed "nuclear conscientious objection." While all citizens do have the same responsibilities, national responsibilities compete with responsibilities to non-involved but necessarily devastated people and, at perhaps the highest level, to the species itself. No simple formulas for correlating responsibilities and conduct exist.

### Album Review

## 'Kenny' tries country-rock

At certain times we all have to just sit down and unwind. Often many people out their favorite album—whether it's hard rock or just something mellow, to lend a hand in this process. Kenny Rogers' new album, *Kenny*, certainly fits in as a super-mellow album.

If you've ever wanted an album with no wasted material, this is one to buy. The majority of the songs are soft combinations of music and lyric, while two or three are a feeble attempt at easy rock.

The first song, "You Turn The Light On," is one such attempt at a rock beat. Although his country style is emitted through the lyrics, the music is rock oriented in its loud beat. From this, the impression was that this album was easy rock in a country style.

The highlight of the album, and probably Rogers' best work ever is "You Decorated My Life."

This song is put together really well and there is no lean toward rock. It is an easy, mellow sound that is definitely Kenny Rogers.

"You decorated my life, created a world where dreams are apart... by painting your love all over my heart." The song is natural, it is what Rogers does best.

"She's a Mystery" is a fast moving song which lyrics and music blend together very well. With adequate radio play, it could become a hit. Again, there is no attempt to create a rock beat.

The remainder of side one includes "Goodbye Marie," which is definitely country. It is a great sounding piece which surely expels Kenny Rogers' talent. Others include "Tulsa Turnaround" and "I Want To Make You Smile."

Side two begins with "Santiago Midnight Moonlight." The beat leans toward rock but the lyrics are super. This is the best of the rock-country mixture on the album.

His style of a slow and easy sound is exposed in "One Man's Woman." This is the material that brings out the best in Kenny Rogers. Other songs on side two are "In and Out of Your Heart" and "Old Folks."

The final song of the album is "Coward of the County." According to radio play, it will be the best of the album. For those who appreciate mellow and well organized music, "Coward of the County" could wind up toward the bottom of your list of best songs on the album.

It is not to say that "Coward of the County" is not a super ballad, but Kenny Rogers portrays his best talent in the mellow beat and easy lyrics of the material previous to this. "Coward of the County" seems too easy.

The album, as a whole, is put together really well. The music and lyrics blend together and each song emits some type of meaning.

The downfall of the album is the attempt at rock in some of his work. The songs sound great but a performer in the class of Kenny Rogers could create enough material to erase any need for an experiment in rock.

Basically, Kenny Rogers has the unexplainable talent to create an infinite number of mellow hits of which no one gets tired. As reflected in *Kenny*, Rogers' talent is geared toward the mellow sound and the best of his work is ultimately reflected in his latest album.

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## One of the best swimmers in country Bosse ranked as national champion

Okay YSU trivia bluffs, who is the only Division II National champion in the school's history?

Hint: The answer involves water and it's not Pete the Penguin. He's a native swimmer from Cincinnati, who captured the 400-yard individual medley national crown just two years ago. If you haven't got the answer yet, here is one final clue: he has held or shared 12 of YSU's 17 school marks at one time and is a senior member of the swim squad - Tom Bosse, Education.

Already a four-time All-American, Bosse is off to his fastest start in his collegiate career. Bosse has led the Penguins to an even 4-4 log and has qualified for the NCAA Division II championships, which will be staged in the Beechly Center Natatorium in March.

Bosse has met the requirements to compete in both the 100- and 200-yard freestyle events. He also has qualified for the tournament in his best item the 200-yard individual medley, which consists of the butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke and freestyle.

"This is the earliest that Tom has qualified for the nationals," related head coach Tucker DiEdwardo, who is in his seventh campaign at YSU. "Tom has matured as a competitor."

A Mid-Continent/Penn. Ohio Conference champion, Bosse is recognized as one of the best all-around swimmers in the country. He is currently ranked first in the 200-yard freestyle, fifth in the 100-yard freestyle and sixth in the 200-yard individual medley.

"Tom is just an excellent competitor and an unselfish swimmer," said DiEdwardo,

explaining that Bosse has sacrificed his best events in order to compete in others for a team victory. "Tom is a real team fireman."

The 6-4, 185-pound education major's time of 143.8 seconds in the 200-yard freestyle is tops in the country while his clocking in the 100-yard free (47.3) and 200-yard individual medley (156.9) are Penguin records.

Perhaps next month a different question with the same answer can be asked. Who is the only person to win a National Division II Individual Championship twice at YSU?

## YSU gymnasts lose in home debut; Sefcik lone finisher in top three

YSU's gymnastics team lost its first home match of the season to the visitors from Kent State Uni-

versity Tuesday night. Kent State totaled 133.80 points, while YSU could only come up with 115.60. KSU's "B" team had 106.55 total points.

The loss evened the Penguin's record at 3-3. Considered to be the top team in Ohio, Kent bettered its record to 8-1-1.

Mari Anne Sefcik was the only YSU performer to place in the top three. She received an 8.25 scoring in the balance beam for a third place finish.

The next meet for the Lady Penguins is Tuesday, Feb. 12 at home to Slippery Rock.


