serves as council advisor. In his absence, Gratia Murphy, English, was to be the advisor but she
notified the student government offices that because of illness, she would not be able to attend. Bob. Wasko, Council Chairperson, said that McBriarty, in the past, has "taken the respon-
sibility" of replacing advisors sibility" of replacing, advisors
at Countil meetings. Since no advisor was present, Wasko asked Miles to check the constitution, and the meek

scheduled between the strikers and the library adminstration, we are ready to talk."
Lewis emphasized the need for a settlement because "the lack of library services is detrimental to everyone in the community." Michael Anderson, School of Business Representative, was dis missed from Council because he had miss
meetings.
According to Atticle III, Sec tion G, paragraph three of the Student Government Constitution, "Absence from regular meetings in excess of two meethys per session, except for reasons
approved by both faculty approved, by both faculty dismissal from council." Since his dismissal was an result of constitutional guide lines, it will not be affected by the legalities of yesterday's meeting. according to Wasko.
Council business that will be affected by nullifying the meeting are allocations of funds in-
cluding cluding $\$ 173.00$ for a speaker
and travel for Phi Alpha and travel for Phi Alpha Mu,
$\$ 71.00$ for the Italian Club for an "Outdoor Cafe" on May 14, and $\$ 78.50$ for Circle K fraternity for a Leadership Conference in Dayton on May 17.
Requests for funds have to be made fourteen days prior to approval and all three organizat-
ions now stand in danger of not receiving the money.

Wasko, said, There are three ways by which these organizat ions may still receive the funds. He said a special meeting of

rules of business next meeting or allocation can be approved at an Executive Committee meeting before the next regular Student Council meeting. Wasko said that the Executive Committee, comprised of the chairperson, vice-chairperson,

Communists throughout the country joined together yesterday to promote their cause in May Day gatherings throughout the nation, blaming capitalists for the ills of the world and calling upon the "Masses" to unite, revolt and overcome.
In practice, neither communism nor capitalism is ideal. The premises upon which they are based, however, differ significantly, and require th
two separate value systems.
The two are more than mere economic systems - they are systems of thought. Capitalism is based upon the value of the individual, his or her worth, rights, and responsibilities. Communism subjugates the individual to the will and betterment of the "Masses."
While attempting to provide the greatest good for the greatest number is a noble cause, communism does not approach this goal, but rather acts to defeat it." In that production is espoused for use and not for personal profit, communism reduces itself to rewa
petency, mediocrity, and achievement equally
lish is severely lessened, resulting not in a better to accomequitable society, but in increased deterioration of production, academic accomplishments and the standard of living for "the greatest number."
Capitalism, on the otherhand, provides individuals with incentives, ideally motivating them to achieve their greatest potential. It places the value of the individual before all others, and thus, ultimately and secondarily provides for the betterment of the masses and of the "state.
In practice, capitalism is less than ideal. That, however, is not the fault of the system, but rather, the flaws of the individual participants within it
Capitalism, because its basic tenants lie with the rights and responsibilities of the individual, is the greatest and most enduring economic system in existence
