Female sportscasters are still increasingly pressured into wearing revealing clothing on air, according to a new study by **Guy Harrison**, assistant professor of Telecommunication Studies.

The article titled "We Want to See You Sex It Up and Be Slutty: Post-Feminism and Sports Media's Appearance Double Standard," appears in Critical Studies in Media Communication. Harrison interviewed 10 women sportscasters, from radio anchors in their early 20s to Hall of Fame broadcasters in their 60s, and found that the gendered double standard for looks is still very much alive in sportscasting. "Women in the industry are increasingly pressured into wearing revealing clothing - a

trend I refer to as the 'nightclubification' of woman sportscaster dress," said Harrison, who earned a PhD in Journalism and Mass Communication from Arizona State University.

The study stems from Harrison's larger project examining several longstanding assumptions and notions the general public holds about women sportscasters, including the assumption that good looks are a larger priority for being hired as a woman in the industry than it is for a man.







Stephen Chalmers, associate professor of Photography, has received the Individual Excellence Award from the Ohio Arts Council for his project, "Pearl Bryan". The statewide award recognizes artists for exceptional work that advances the discipline and the larger artistic community.

"Pearl Bryan" is a group of Chalmer's photographs that focuses on a brutal 19th century murder in northern Kentucky that at the time was called "the crime of the century." The photos have been featured in a magazine published by Stern in Germany and was one of 25 semifinalists, from a field of 456 international artists, in the Print Center's Annual International Competition in Philadelphia, one of the oldest and most prestigious art competitions in the United States. It also was part of a group exhibition in the Bolivar Art Gallery at the University of Kentucky.

Chalmers, an award-winning photographer whose work has been exhibited from San Diego and Chicago to The Netherlands and China, created "Pearl Bryan" with the support of a YSU University Research Council Grant and a Summer Faculty Innovation Grant from the YSU Cliffe College of Creative Arts and Communication.
