During the wedding the letter is slipped into the Count's pocket. The Countess dresses in Susanna's dress and Susanna dresses like the Countess so that when the Count meets a woman in the garden, he thinks it is Susanna but it is really his wife. In the end, all is revealed, the Count begs for forgiveness, and everyone is content.

Another man, Don Alfonso, says that all women are fickle and that he can get the women to be unfaithful to the men in one day. He men disguise themselves as Albanians and switch places with each other to prove Don Alfonso wrong. Despina, the women's maid, is in on the scam and is trying to help Don Alfonso. She encourages the women to fall for the Albanians. This song takes place at the beginning of Act Two. Despina is instructing Dorabella and Fiordiligi on how to control men.



Stella arrives to find him in a tunken state, and she decides to leave with his rival, Councilor Lindorf. Nicklausse, now the Muse, claims the poet, telling him that the ashes of is heart will rekindle his genius.



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

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

Cathryn Thomas Umble is assistant professor of flute at Youngstown State University and has served on the faculties of Bowling Green State University and Grove City College. Dr. Umble holds degrees from the Iniversity of Michigan, Bowling Green State University, and Michigan State University and was awarded the Prix d'excellence for Outstanding Musicianship from the Fontainebleau School of Music, France, which she ttended on full scholarship.

Umble is principal flute with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra and iccolo with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and has performed principal flute with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. She has presented recitals in Europe and hroughout the United States, including venues such as Alice Tully Hall and ymphony Space, New York. Umble performed for the Milhaud Society at the Cleveland Institute of Music with members of the Cleveland Orchestra, he Bowling Green State University Concert Series, and on recital series at ne Cleveland Museum of Art and the Cleveland Center for Contemporary She performed in recital at the 2006 National Flute Association Art. Convention in Pittsburgh. Dr. Umble has also served as a National Flute ssociation competition judge and flute pedagogy panel member. She conducted the Dana Flute Ensemble in a full concert performance at the 2005 OMEA Conference and the 2006 National Flute Association onvention. Kathryn Umble will perform the Khachaturian Flute Concerto with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra on Sunday, October 14, 2007.





Directors Notes:

As a young boy I was privileged to attend a rehearsal ith Igor Stravinsky conducting the Boston Symphony at he Tanglewood Summer Festival many years ago. I particularly remember Stravinsky talking with Richard urgin, then Concertmaster of the Boston Symphony and dmonishing him for using vibrato in a solo violin passage that specifically called for "non vibrato" again h the second time through the passage. As chance ould have it, I was fortunate to study with Mr. Burgin as my principal teacher at Florida State University upon his tirement from the Boston Symphony. There we had bout the same size violin studio we have here at Dana and we all received more attention from him than we ould at a larger conservatory. His excitement with travinsky's rhythmic works like Jeu de Cartes was an inspiration I've carried with me my whole life. I've waited 8 years now to have a chance to perform this work and fortunately now's the time. Stravinsky's angular rhythms and neo-classic approach requires repetition and study fully appreciate. It is a difficult work to perform and one that tests the intellectual and technical skills of all. Since this is a work about playing and dealing cards,

I've decided to match it with Brandenburg 4, a three violin, two violin and single violin concerto that makes a "musical straight' when you add this "ace" of a piece. These violin concerti are great works to develop our young players and to show off our seasoned veterans as well. I thank you all for coming and hope you enjoy the show.

Program Notes:

Igor Stravinsky

(1882 - 1971)

According to his own comments, Stravinsky had for many years been toying with the idea of composing a ballet whose action centered around the game of cards (a pastime of which he was very fond.) The idea allegedly came to him while traveling in the back of a Paris cab, and as inspiration for some of the music he was to draw on childhood memories of a holiday in a German spa town and the stentorian voices of German coupiers in the casino there. In fact, a considerable portion of Jeu de Cartes, as the work became known, had already been written or at least formulated in Stravinsky's mind so that the commission acted as a timely opportunity for him to realize his plans. Throughout the work, there are a number of musical references including: Rossini overture to Barber of Seville, J. Strauss Die Fledermaus, Ravel la Valse, and Beethoven Symphonies No. 8 and No. 5 including portions of his own works Symphony in Eflat and Concerto for Two Pianos. 1992 Jeremy Barham

Critics have hailed the Ambassador Duo as "intuitive, exciting, and enthralling." "Clifford Leaman is an artist of the first order [and] Derek Parsons is truly his musical natch." (Paul Wagner, The Saxophone Journal) "... they reveal themselves to be artists if technical brilliance and emotional commitment." "The range of colors is impressive..." (Jack Sullivan, American Record Guide) Saxophonist Clifford Leaman and pianist Derek Parsons formed the Ambassador Duo in 1990 after meeting as graduate students at the Iniversity of Michigan, from which they both hold the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in performance.

Prior to his appointment at the University of South Carolina where he is Professor of Saxophone, Learnan served on the faculties of Furman University, Eastern Michigan University, and The University of Michigan. He is in great demand as a soloist and linician, and has appeared widely as an artist-clinician for Selmer saxophones. He appears on recording projects on the Redwood Records, CRS, and University of Arizona Recordings in addition to three previous recordings on the Equilibrium label. An avid upporter of contemporary music, Learnan has commissioned and given the world remiere performances of numerous pieces including concerti by Pulitzer Prize-winning composers Leslie Bassett and Michael Colgrass. His recording of the Bassett Concerto with the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra is available through Equilibrium Recordings (EQ-63).

Parsons, currently Professor of Piano at Furman University in Greenville, South carolina, is a native of Newfoundland, Canada. He began his musical studies at the age of four and gave his orchestral debut at age twelve. He has appeared extensively throughout the United States and abroad as a soloist, collaborative musician, clinician, nd adjudicator, including performances for SCETV, South Carolina Educational Radio, and CBC Radio and Television in Canada. He has performed with such prominent saxophonists as Donald Sinta, Debra Richtmeyer, Steven Mauk, and Joe Lulloff. His iano reduction of Leslie Bassett's Concerto for saxophone and orchestra is published by c. F. Peters.

Since their debut at the 1990 Southwest Contemporary Music Festival and conference in San Marcos, Texas, Learnan and Parsons have been active as a duo performing and giving clinics at numerous colleges, universities, and concert venues irroughout the United States as well as in Canada, Italy, Spain, and China. Their epertoire covers a wide range of musical styles, from Baroque transcriptions to the most recent avant-garde works for saxophone and piano. 

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

About the Artists:

Over the past few years, **John Hollenbeck** has been making waves as one of NYC's most visionary and talented musician-composers. In his singular work, he melds jazz and world rhythms with a wealth of other musical influences and spiritual practices to forge a lyrical new musical language. Hollenbeck moved to the city in the 1990's with degrees in percussion (BM) and jazz composition (MM) from the Eastman School of Music. He has worked with numerous musicians in jazz, ambient rock, and ethnic music, including David Krakauer's Klezmer Madness, Pablo Ziegler, Kenny Wheeler, Village Vanguard Orchestra, Theo Bleckmann, Bob Brookmeyers's New Art Orchestra, Fred Hersch, Meredith Monk, and Tony Malaby. In 2005, Hollenbeck was nominated for a Grammy for A Blessing, his first large ensemble release as a leader on Omnitone Records.

Hollenbeck has received numerous commissions, grants, and awards for compositions. In 2004 and 2006, he was nominated as the "UP and Coming Jazz Musician of the Year" by the Jazz Journalists Association, and in 2006 and 2007, he was nominated for "Composer of the Year." In 2007 he was also nominated for "Jazz Drummer of the Year," and his large ensemble was nominated for "Large Ensemble of the Year." Hollenbeck won the prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship iin 2007 and is currently a professor of drum set and improvisation at Jazz Institute Berlin (Germany) and at the New School in New York City. Glenn Schaft, DMA, is Associate Professor and has served as Director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University since 1996. He teaches applied percussion, group lessons, percussion methods, directs the Percussion Ensemble, advises the Youngstown Percussion Collective- a student organization, and is founder of the SMARTS Drum Circle Outreach Program. He is an educational endorser with Avedis Zildjian, ProMark, Remo, Black Swamp Percussion, and Trick Drums. His professional career includes over 32 years of performance and teaching experience in orchestral percussion, contemporary music, world music, and drumset/improvised music. He has performed and presented clinics and masterclasses throughout the United States and China. Dr. Schaft is an active member of the Percussive Arts Society where he serves on the College Pedagogy Committee and the Drumset Educators Committee. James Umble holds the position of professor of saxophone performance at ungstown State University's Dana School of Music. 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
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

Program Notes

Overture, "Le Corsair", Op. 21

ector Berlioz (1803-1869)

Berlioz probably composed this overture in 1831 and revised it 1844. The first performance was given in Paris on January 19, 1845, when the composer conducted from the manuscript. There was a second performance in Paris on April 1, 1855, the ear in which the score was again revised and first published. The score calls for two flutes, two oboes, two clarinets, two bassoons, four horns, two trumpets and cornets, three ombones and ophicleide (bass tuba), timpani, and strings. The overture is dedicated "To my friend, Davison."

yron was a passion of the young Berlioz and of course the title must refer to that poet's Corsair, the dashing sea-rover and ruthless outlaw, with his proud contempt for men and his ardent allantry towards women. Yet the listener who takes the title too seriously may be brought up short when he learns that Berlioz called this overture at it first performance La Tour de Nice. Only ter did he change the title to Le Corsair Rouge, and finally to Le Corsair. ~ Klaus. G. Roy

Second Suite from the Ballet "Romeo and Juliet", Op. 64

Serge Prokofiev (1891-1953)

rokofiev composed his Romeo and Juliet, ballet in four acts and nine tableaux in 1935 for the Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow, and it was first performed there in the autumn of 1935. The pmposer has prepared three suites of music from the ballet. The first was introduced in Moscow on November 24, 1936, and received its American premiere at a concert of the Chicago ymphony Orchestra on January 21, 1937, Prokofiev conducting. The second suite received its first performance in peningrad on April 15, 1937, and was introduced to the United States by the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the composer directing, on March 25, 1938. The third suite was compiled in 1945.

The score of the second suite calls for two flutes and piccole two oboes and English horn, two clarinets and bass clarine tenor saxophone, two bassoons and contrabassoon, four horns, two trumpets and cornet, three trombones and tuba, tympani bass drum, side drum, triangle, bells, tambourine, cymbal maracas, harp, piano, celesta, and strings. There is a part for viola d'amore in the fifth movement, usually played by the viola

No play, perhaps, has been of such universal appeal to composers as has "Romeo and Juliet". (Only "The Tempest" and "Faust" can approach it.) One thinks, virtually without effort of Berlioz' Dramatic Symphony by that name; of Gounod's opera; of Delius's opera; of stage works by Bellini; even s recent and unlikely a work as Leonard Bernstein's "West Sid Story" bases itself on "Romeo and Juliet." The play, as the saying goes, has everything: conflict, sharply delineated characterization, and transcendent romance. ~Klaus G. Roy

Symphony No. 1 in C Minor, Op. 68

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Brahms completed his First Symphony in 1876. It was first performed on November 4, 1876, at Karlsruhe, with Ot Dessoff conducting, and published in 1877. The symphony is scored for two flutes, two oboes, two clarinets, two bassoons contrabassoon, four horns, two trumpets, three trombone timpani, and strings. The Symphony runs approximately forty – five minutes and contains four movements. Writing a symphony is no laughing matter," Brahms one emarked. He waited until 1876, when he was forty-three, before giving his First Symphony to the public. But sketches for the pening movement date from about 1854. How similar again to eethoven, who carried sketches of the Ninth Symphony with him for 20 years. Why did Brahms, who had already penned a umber of orchestral works – the Serenades, Op. 11 and Op. 6, the Haydn Variations, and the German Requiem. He admitted honestly that he was trying to walk in a great and phored tradition: "You have no idea how it feels to hear behind bu the tramp of a giant like Beethoven!" ~Klaus G. Roy



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
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

Program Notes

Concerto, Aaron Copland

Arranged for Clarinet and Piano by the composer

Aaron Copland's compositions reflected his distinctively American music style. The Clarinet Concerto, commissioned by Benny Goodman, showcases influences of jazz. The Concerto is in a two-movement form connected by a solo cadenza, played without pause. The first movement is lyrical and expressive. Following this, the cadenza introduce fragments of material to be heard in the second movement. A popular Brazilian tune is used in the second movement, along with many jazz elements. Copland stated, "...I did not have a large battery of percussion to achieve jazzy effects, so I used slapping basses and whacking harp sounds to simulate them. The Clarinet Concerto ... finishes off with a clarinet glissando – or a "smear" in jazz lingo."

The first performance of Copland's Clarinet Concerto was November 6, 1950 in New York by the NBC Symphony Orchestra, featuring Benny Goodman on clarinet. The work was also choreographed by Jerome Robbins for the ballet "Pied Piper" in 1951.

Game I For Lila, Surendran Reddy

Game 1 for Lila was written as a reflection of Reddy's daughter playing tennis. The game is represented through a continuous bounce between low and high notes and arpeggiated lines. Throughout the piece, there are challenging leaps of a twelfth interval, which are unique to the clarinet. While other woodwind instruments have an octave key, the clarinet has a register key, which raises the pitch a twelfth instead of an octave. Because of this, Reddy's piece is well suited for the clarinet.

Surendran Reddy is a South African composer and pianist who has incredible talent in the styles of classical, jazz, and rock music. Elements of these styles are evident throughout this piece. Reddy is Head of the Music Department at FUBA Academy in Johannesburg, and he travels as guest lecturer to the University of Namibia. He also actively performs as a soloist and in chamber ensembles.

Sonata in F Minor, Johannes Brahms

As Mozart was inspired to write his Clarinet Concerto by hearing an incredibly talented clarinetist (Anton Städler), Brahms was inspired as well by Richard Mühlfeld. Mozart had written his Clarinet Concerto at the end of his career, and Brahms did the same with this sonata and the Sonata in Eb Major in 1894. In fact, his last performance was playing piano on this very sonata. Brahms was to the point that he thought his composing career was over. However, hearing a performance by Mühlfeld revived his desire to compose. The result was a series of clarinet works: the Clarinet Trio, the Clarinet Quintet, and the two Clarinet Sonatas.

The first sonata in F minor is the more passionate of the two sonatas. It is a highly mature work, showing the composer's lyricism and high level of expression. Brahms first performed these sonatas with Mühlfeld in January of 1895. Both of the Clarinet Sonatas have also been arranged for viola and piano.

Becky DeLorenzo

Becky DeLorenzo is in her ninth semester at the Dana School of Music where she is pursuing a Bachelor degree in Music Education. She has been a member of the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, Dana Symphony Orchestra, chamber orchestra, clarinet choirs, and various other chamber groups. She performed in Carnegie Hall in 2005 with the Symphonic Wind Ensemble. She has served as concertmistress and section leader of the SWE and a student director of the clarinet choirs. In these ensembles, she has not only performed on Bb clarinet, but also Eb, Alto, Bass, and Contra Alto clarinets, as well as Alto and Tenor saxophone. Becky gigs frequently in the area, playing Broadway productions, performing with the Greenville Symphony Orchestra, Packard Band, and the Warren Philharmonic. She has been the Assistant Director at Sharon High School for two years, and Assistant Student Director of the Mercer Community Band in 2006, of which she was also a member for 9 years. She teaches private clarinet lessons. Becky has studied clarinet with Robert Fitzer, Debbie Alexander, Joseph Edwards, Alice Wang, and Tommy Thompson. She has performed in master classes with Daniel Silver, Dennis Nygren, and David Bell. Becky will graduate in Spring 2008 and plans to pursue a Master's degree in Music Performance.

ABOUT YSU's DANA SCHOOL OF MUSIC:

Founded in 1869, the Dana School of Music is one of the oldest music schools in the United States. He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a masters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a achelors degree and the Performer's Certificate at the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and as the Director of Bands at Auburn High School in upstate New York. At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, is assistant onductor of the Dana Symphony Orchestra, and teaches ndergraduate and graduate conducting.

Pr. Gage is in his 15th season as the Edward J. Zacharias Memorial thair Music Director/Conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has numerous publications including articles in the fansas Music Review Journal, in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, RIAD, and in the National Band Association Journal and NBA Newsletter. He was recently elected as to the Board of Directors of the fational Band Association and has been a member of the NBA School eform Committee, the ABA Ostwald Selection Committee and served a four-year term as the NBA North Central Division Chair. His many rofessional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all state, sectional, regional, and district high school concert bands and orchestras across the United States, and in reland and Canada. Gage has guest conducted the U.S. Army Band: reshing's Own and the U.S. Army Field Band.

Inder his direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the YSYO were guest performers at the 1998, 2000, 2004, & 2006 OMEA State Music Conventions and the YSYO appeared again at the 2002 North lentral MENC/OMEA Convention in Cleveland. In April of 2002 the TSU SWE appeared in a feature performance at the Music Educators National Association (MENC) Biennial Convention in Nashville, lennessee and in March 2005 the ensemble made its Carnegie Hall debut on the showcase concert of the New York Wind Band Festival. The SWE also was a guest performer at the 1996 CBDNA Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

The SWE has recorded and released five compact discs: Lions, Jester, and Dragons, Oh My (1998), Star Wars and Other Scores (2000), Carnival (2002), Spin Cycle (2004), and Tipping Points (2006). Spin Cycle was the 2004 Downbeat Award winner for the university symphonic band recording. In winter 2008 NAXOS, an international classical music distributor, will release the ensemble's sixth CD Urban Requiem. Gage's groups have also performed at state music conventions in Kansas and New York. During recent year's Stephen and the SWE have drawn praise from composers, Karel Husa, Joseph Schwantner, Michael Colgrass, Samuel Adler, Eric Ewazen, Frank-Ticheli, David Gillingham, and Anthony Iannacone for interpretation and performances of their music.

In addition to his conducting career, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, and the Jimmy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; and he was a marimba concerto soloist with the Fredonia Symphony Orchestra. He served on the Board of Advisor. for the St. Patrick's Day Festival in Dublin, Ireland, and in May of 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at YSU. Dr. Gage's professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (ABA). He is also a member of the CBDNA, Conductors Guild, NBA, OMEA/MENC Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and Phi Kappa Phi. Stephen lives in Poland, Ohio with his wife, Stephanie, and he has two sons, Matthew and Brendan, and e daughter, Claudia.



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

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

This is the final piece in "Modern Contest Solos," a collection of solos that represent a large portion of the advanced rudimental literature which has been written by the author since 1949. All 26 of the Standard American Drum Rudiments, their variations, and a number of compound rudiments have been used to the best possible advantage in the material, in an effort to establish, as an end, that there are countless possibilities which present themselves within the bounds of the drumming rudiments.

Six Ideas for Snare, Bass, and Cymbals (1990 Dave Hollinden

(b. 1958)

Hollinden's six "ideas" are framed in the context of six brief movements. Within the course of the six movements, Hollinden explores a wide range of possibilities afforded by the instruments at hand, using them in various combinations, in dialogue fashion, manipulating various beating spots, and even in a context reminiscent of their function in a drum-set setting. In all movements, however, an advanced degree of hand-foot coordination is required, as bass the drum functions as a melodic participant in the contrapuntal lines. Multi-metric writing is used throughout the work. Rather than using a large outlay of instruments to present limited musical ideas, he explores the limitless possibilities afforded by a very limited instrumentation.

Frogs (1958)

Keiko Abe (b. 1937)

This charming work by the well-known Japanese marimbist should be enjoyed by performers and audiences alike. Frogs is in a "toccata" style and reminds this writer of miniature-type pianol works by MacDowell and Ravel. The performer will need a rapid four mallet technique (although the piece is quite affective at tempos slower than marked), some mallet and hand independence, and the ability to guickly reach an octave. For the performer who has not developed a one handed independent roll, the octave rolls could be accomplished with a mandolin-type roll or eliminated entirely. Notes by Keiko Abe.

Raga No. 1 (1968)

William Cahn (b. 1946)

Raga No. 1 is a timpani solo in the musical style of North India. It is reminiscent of the techniques and rhythms used on the tabla. This unique composition is divided into the following sections: a brief introduction, section A, section B, section C (with brief quotes of section A) and a short four-measure Presto ending. Throughout the solo one can hear the Indian influence, and in section B one hand plays a tremolo with the fingers while the other hand uses a mallet to play a series of glissandi in a style much like pressing the hand on the tabla to change or bend the pitch. The piece includes, however, some center-of-the-head playing, rim-shots, finger tremolos and a great many technical demand all representing techniques applied to the Tabla. Its musical, technical, and ethnic demands make it a rewarding experience.

Six Elegies Dancing is a six movement work that is a study in contrasting styles. Movement I, "Adamantly, Vigorously," is to be played at guarter note = 60 and its lack of bar lines produces an improvised feeling. Movement II, "Intensely," produces a rhythmic feeling along with some interesting sounds created by hard outer mallets and medium inner mallets. Movement III, "Gingerly, very stable," produces a subtle rhythmic feeling. Movement IV, "Furiously," uses contrasting mallets and produces a perpetualmotion feeling. This movement continues to Movement V without pause. Movement V is primarily a series of visual jesters that help to tie the abstract nature of the piece together. Movement VI, "Elegiac," is choral-like and ends very softly, with an indication to slowly lift mallets off the note and play in the air, as to "Release" the spirit that has been trying to escape the entire piece.

Rumba Clave (1989)

Rumba Clave is a percussion duet combining African and Cuban styles. Player 1 uses claves agudas (high pair), guinto and conga; Player 2 needs claves graves (low pair), tres dos and rebajador. The individual parts are not especially difficult; the challenge comes in playing interlocking parts with the other performer. Each player performs a written solo over an accompanying part and both parts are similar in difficulty. It is an intellectual and entertaining piece of music.

Trilogy for Vibraphone Mvt. 1: Vision in a **Dream** (1981) **Tim Huesgen**

(b. 1957)

The first movement of Trilogy was written in 1981 for the composer's graduate recital at Indiana University, Pennsylvania. At the request of the publisher two additional movements were written and completed in 1985. The composer gives the performer as much freedom as possible. The given tempo markings are only approximate; they may be varied in accordance to interpretation and taste of the performer.

Concert Band Program Notes:

American Overture, Opus 13 (1955)

Joseph Willcox Jenkins

Born in the Philadelphia area, Jenkins began composing music as a child. While pursuing a pre-law degree at near by Saint Joseph College, he studied composition with noted wind band composer Vincent Persichetti at the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music. Jenkins went on to earn both his Bachelor's and Master's degree from the Eastman School of Music and did further compositional studies with Howard Hanson, Bernard Rogers, and Thomas Canning. *American Overture* was composed while serving as staff arranger for the U.S. Army Field Band in Fort Meade, Maryland as a showcase for the horn section. Jenkins served as composer-in-residence at Evanston (IL) Township High School in 1959, and worked as editor for the music publisher Schmitt, Hall and McCreary. From 1961-2000, he taught almost every music academic course as well as composition at Duquesne University.

Cloudburst

Eric Whitacre (b. 1971)

Cloudburst is one of Eric Whitacre's most famous compositions. It was initially written for eight part choir, accompanied by piano and percussion. The text is from Octavio Paz's poem *El Cántaro Roto* (The Broken Water-Jug), adapted by Whitacre.

The first section is a cappella, with strikingly discordant but beautiful tone clusters. The composer notates long, sustained notes with text to be spoken at random by each individual singer. This creates a very disorienting and interesting effect, when executed well. After the initial section, there is a chilling baritone solo, followed by the development of a new a cappella theme. This continues until a speaking solo (unusual in choral music) backgrounded by music. The choir continues, a cappella, building up to a striking section where the choir literally builds chords up from the base (similar to arpeggio on a piano).

A few pages later, a new section, which Whitacre titles "The Cloudburst", begins. It starts with bells (which have been hidden from the audience) being struck as notated for two bars, then at random, and the choir crescendos into an aleatoric section, which is signaled by a loud clap of "thunder." During this time, the choir also claps, snaps, and smacks thighs in order to create a rain-drop effect. This combines with the vocal lines to create an effect similar to a thunderstorm. The percussion used in this section is a thunder sheet, bass drum, the hand bells, a suspended cymbal, and wind chimes. The piano also enters during the portion. The storm gradually builds then fades, and the ending of the piece mirrors the beginning section, with expressive arpeggiated runs and block chords on the piano.

"Cloudburst" was nominated for a 2007 Grammy Award in best Choral Performance and it is dedicated to the composer's friend and mentor, Dr. Jocelyn Kaye Jensen. In describing the concert band version of this piece, Whitacre stated:

Cloudburst was my second classical work, original written for chorus in the fall of 1991; it was inspired by an astonishing thunderstorm I witnessed earlier that Spring while on tour in Northern California. In the fall of 2001 the Indiana All State commissioned me to write an original work for their top festival band, and I convinced them to let me adapt *Cloudburst* for symphonic winds. The way this new orchestration has transformed the piece is simply amazing to me: I distinctly remember being at the first rehearsal and just being completely speechless. Where the choral version is intimate and delicate, the version for winds is strong and assured, and to my ears it sounds like it's suddenly in Technicolor—on a 50 foot screen.

Manhattan Beach (1893)

John Philip Sousa (1854-1932) Edited by Mark Hindsley

Following in the footsteps of Patrick Gilmore, Sousa became a popular figure at Manhattan Beach, the famous New York summer resort. One of his most lavish medals was presented to him in 1894 by the proprietor, Austin Corbin, and other shareholders. The previous season, Sousa had dedicated this march to Corbin. *Manhattan Beach* became a stable of bands all over the world, but the Sousa Band performed it differently by playing the trio and last section as a short descriptive piece. In this interpretation, soft clarinet arpeggios suggest the rolling ocean waves as one strolls along the beach. A band is heard in the distance. It grows louder and then fades away as the stroller continues along the beach.

Galactic Empires (1998)

David Gillingham (b. 1947)

The composer writes the following in the score: My lifelong fascination with the mysteries of the universe has come to fruition in Galactic Empires. Our understanding of distances on Earth, which have clear beginnings and endings, makes it inconceivable that the universe is endless. Galactic Empires is a musical journey through only three of an infinite number of galaxies, two foreign and one that is our own "Milky Way." To gain inspiration for this work, I let my imagination run wild and envisioned each galaxy having its own

particular aura that is reflected in the music. The work is set in three connected movements, each representing a "star" in a particular universe:

Battlestar of the Andromeda Nebula

Within the Andromeda Nebula Galaxy lies a star where hate radiates into its atmosphere creating a smoky, black cloud forming a ring around the angry sphere. Close to the surface, one can hear the incessant drumming rhythms of war, for this is an empire bent on destruction of all other life forms in the galaxy. Across the jagged, dark, cold landscape are thousands of domed bases housing troops and weapons of annihilation. Multitudes of amphibious-like alien creatures clad in silver and black armor move in and out of the domes while hundreds of disk-shaped airships land and take off from the surface. All this occurring against the backdrop of a sky lit with explosions from other starts of the galaxy, as they are one by one destroyed by the empire of the Battlestar.

II. Eveningstar of the Magellanic Cloud

In stark contrast to the Battlestar is the Eveningstar found in the center of the galaxy of the Magellanic Cloud. This is a place of beauty beyond words. Four suns of multiple colors shine upon this star making the sky appear as a huge domed rainbow. Life on the Eveningstar is one of tranquility and peace. The aliens of this star are thin, stick-like beings with oversized heads and large silver and oval slanted eyes reflecting warmth, understanding, and superior knowledge. The inhabitants of this star are the most advanced of the entire universe and exist in a sort of utopic state.

III. Earthstar of the Milky Way

The Earthstar is the most vibrant and eclectic star to be found in any galaxy in the universe. The humans who inhabit this star have a most interesting history that reflects both the most hideous atrocities and the most marvelous achievements of its people. It has the potential to achieve a status equal to the Eveningstar of the Magellanic Cloud but must begin to learn from the mistakes of the past. Still, a sense of joy and celebration radiates from the surface of the Earthstar...an energy field created by unabounding faith and hope for humankind.

Slava! A Concert Overture (1977)

Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990)

Transcribed by Claire Grundman

When Mstislav Rostropovich ("Slava" to his friends) invited Leonard Bernstein to help him launch his inaugural concerts as Music Director of the National Symphony Orchestra, he also asked him to write a rousing new opening piece for the festivities. This Overture is the result, and the world premiere took place on October 11, 1977, (almost exactly 30 years ago!) with Rostropovich conducting his orchestra at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. Near the end of the work, the two tunes which compromise the theme are combined with a quotation by the trombones of the 'Coronation Scene' of Modest Moussorgsky's Boris Goudonov, where the chorus sings the Russian word "*slava*!" meaning "*glory*!" In this way, the composer pays homage to his friend Rostropovich, to whom the overture is dedicated. (From notes in the score.)

Wind Ensemble Program Notes:

Slalom

Carter Pann (b. 1972)

Carter Pann's honors in composition include the K. Serocki Competition and a Grammy nomination for his *Piano Concerto*, first prizes in the Zoltán Kodály and François d'Albert Concours Internationales de Composition, a Charles Ives Scholarship from the Academy of Arts and Letters, and five ASCAP composer awards. His works have been performed by the London Symphony, City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, Vancouver Symphony, National Repertory Orchestra, National Symphony of Ireland, Stockholm Radio Symphony, the Czech State Philharmonic, and the Seattle Symphony. *Slalom* for Wind Ensemble is his first work for band. Carter Pann holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music and the University of Michigan.

Composer's Note:

Statom for Wind Ensemble was commissioned in 2003 by the University of Kansas. It is a taste of the thrill of downhill skiing. The work is performed at a severe tempo throughout showcasing the wind ensemble's volatility and endurance. The idea for a piece like this came directly out of a wonderful discovery I made several years ago at Steamboat Springs, Colorado when I embarked on the mountain-base gondola with a cassette-player and headphones. At the time I was treating myself to large doses of Shostakovich's *Tenth Symphony* and Rachmaninov's *Symphonic Dances*. The exhilaration of barreling down the Rockies with such music pumping into my ears was overwhelming. After a few years of ski-ing with some of the greatest repertoire, it occurred to me that I could customize the experience. The work is presented as a collection of scenes and events one might come by on the slopes. The score is peppered with phrase-headings for the different sections such as "First Run", "Open Meadow, Champagne Powder", "Straight Down, TUCK", and

"On One Ski, Gyrating", among others. In this way *Slalom* shares its programmatic feature with that of Richard Strauss's *Alpine Symphony*. The similarities end there, however, for *Slalom* lasts ten minutes ... precisely the amount of time I needed to get from Storm Peak (the peak of Mt. Werner, Steamboat Springs) to the mountain base.

Lux Arumque

Eric Whitacre (b. 1971)

Eric Whitacre's music—particularly his music for choir—has inspired the creation of a number of national and international music festivals. In July 2004, the Sydney Opera House hosted the first annual Eric Whitacre Wind Symphony Festival. In June 2007, Venice and Florence, Italy hosted the first Venice Whitacre Festival.

Whitacre is a founding member of the consortium BCM International, a quartet of composers consisting of himself, Steven Bryant, Jonathan Newman, and James Bonney, who, according to their mission statement, aspire to "enrich the wind ensemble repertoire with music unbound by traditional thought or idiomatic cliché".

Like Cloudburst, Lux Arumque was transcribed for wind band by the composer who chose to lower the pitch of the choral version (C# minor) a semi-tone to C minor. The text for the work follows:

Edward Esch (Latin by C. A. Silvestri)

Lux, calida gravisque pura velut aurum et canunt angeli molliter modo natum. Light, warm and heavy as pure gold and the angels sing softly to the new-born baby.

Winds of the Chesapeake

Lee Brooks (b. 1942)

Winds of the Chesapeake was commissioned by the Tidewater Winds, who premiered it on July 15, 2007, conducted by the composer. It adheres closely to the characteristic march format established by Sousa, Fillmore, King, and others, employing simple triadic harmony, modest syncopation, and the familiar structure of several strains, each repeated. One departure from the traditional model is the liberating of horns and tubas from their customary "oom-pah" role and focusing instead on their often untapped potential as vehicles for melodic and technically-challenging material. Thematic material from the opening trumpet fanfare is revisited elsewhere in the march: the pickup to the first strain comes from bar three, and the fourth strain recalls the trumpet parts verbatim to form a three-tiered ascending sequence. Woodwind tremolos shimmer above a bass melody in the second strain, enhanced in the repeat by classical trumpet, hom, and timpani figures. A piccolo of considerable agility refreshes the repeat of the lyrical third strain. In the grand finale flutes and clarinets join the piccolo, pitted against soaring brass as four distinct melodic lines bring the march to a triumphant close. Today's performance is conducted by composer/conductor Lee Brooks. Over the years, Lee Brooks' contributions to the recording projects and to the performance repertoire of the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble have been extraordinary.

The Immmovable Do

Percy Aldridge Grainger (1882-1961)

Born in Brighton, Australia, Percy Aldridge Grainger is best remembered as a pianist of great skill and a composer of many memorable tunes for piano. The arrangement and compositional skills shown in his settings of many folk songs collected by him, as well as his original works for wind ensembles, are still considered pinnacles of achievement over half a century later. Many of his works are of consummate difficulty to perform but demonstrate superbly the amazing range of tonal colour and expression that a good wind band can produce.

Percy Grainger was a great admirer of the sounds of wind ensembles. In his own program notes about *Lincolnshire Posy* he wrote:

"Why this cold-shouldering of the wind band by most composers? Is the wind band, with its varied assortments of reeds, so much richer than the reeds of the symphony orchestra, its complete saxophone family that is found nowhere else (to my ears the saxophone is the most expressive of all wind instruments – the o¬ne closest to the human voice. And surely all musical instruments should be rated according to their tonal closeness to man's own voice!), its army of brass, both wide-bore and narrow-bore, – not the equal of any medium ever conceived? As a vehicle of deeply emotional expression it seems to me unrivalled.

Immovable Do is a wonderful example of the clever orchestration and composition techniques of Grainger in that it has a consistent "Do" (C concert pitch) as a thread throughout the work. It joins his other "Chosen Gems," including Molly on the Shore, Shepherd's Hey, Childrens March, et al.

SWE Notes 4:

Russian Christmas Music

Alfred Reed (1921-2005)

Alfred Reed was a 23 year old staff arranger for the 529th Army Air Corps Band when he was called upon to create what has become a masterpiece of the wind literature. It was in 1944, when optimism was running high with the successful invasion of France and Belgium by the Allied forces. A holiday band concert was planned by the city of Denver to further promote Russian-American unity with premiers of new works from both countries. Roy Harris was placed in charge and planned the second movement of his Sixth Symphony (the "Abraham Lincoln Symphony") to be the American work. The Russian work was to have been Prokofiev's March, Op. 99, but Harris discovered that it had already been performed in the United States (by Reed's own organization). With just 16 days until the concert, Harris assigned Reed, already working for Harris as an aid, to compose a new Russian work for the concert. Scouring the Corp's music library, Reed found an authentic 16th-century Russian Christmas Song "Carol of the Little Russian Children" to use for an introductory theme. Drawing on his investigations of Eastern Orthodox liturgical music for other thematic ideas, he completed the score of Russian Christmas Music in 11 days; copyists took another two days to prepare parts for rehearsal. The music was first performed on December 12, 1944, on a nationwide NBC broadcast. A concert performance was given in Denver two days later. In later years, Reed made minor changes to the instrumentation to suit a large ensemble, but today's version is essentially the same as the original.

The liturgical music of the Eastern Orthodox Church is entirely vocal, admitting no instrumental music into the services. Alfred Reed has captured the sonorities, rhythmic inflections, clarity, and flowing phrases of the human voice in his composition. Although the work is in the form of a single movement, four distinct sections can be recognized. The opening "Carol" sets a restrained and gentle mood. The chant from the trombones and trumpets climaxes into the "Antiphonal Chant" carried by the woodwinds. The rhythm picks up for the "Village Song," which is presented in two bar phrases that rise and fall with the liturgy. The church bells herald the final "Cathedral Chorus" that builds in a steady crescendo, pausing for a soft and sonorous chorale, before continuing with the introduction of additional instruments until all of the colors and intensity of the celebration fill the hall.

He has performed with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, Warren Philharmonic, Jekyll Island (GA) Theater Orchestra, and The American Band of Providence (RI). He is a member National Band Association, Ohio Music Educators Association, and The International Trombone Association. sistant Professor of Music **Dr. Christopher P. Heidenreich** began rving at Youngstown State University in the fall of 2006 as Associate Director of Bands and Director of the YSU "Marching Pride." He began teaching public school in Ohio in 1989 and served as Director of Bands at Lancaster High School, Lancaster, hio, from 1992-2003. While at Lancaster, his bands consistently were recognized or their excellence in both the concert hall and on the marching band field. His bands performed for the 1996 Bowling Green State University Reading Clinic and for e 1997 Ohio Music Education Convention held in Toledo, Ohio. In February 2002, was awarded the American School Band Directors Association's "Distinguished Band Director" Award for Ohio and the North Central Region, recognizing young band irectors for their musical achievements.

Heidenreich continues to be in demand as an adjudicator for concert and marching bands throughout Ohio, Kentucky, and Illinois. He was a clinician at the 2005 idwest Clinic, presenting tools for surviving the first years of teaching public school. In addition, he is a continuing contributor to *Teaching Music Through Performing in Band, Vols. 5* & 6, and will soon publish an article based on the Midwest Clinic topic *The Instrumentalist.*

Completing his Doctor of Music in Wind Conducting from Indiana University in the pring of 2006, Heidenreich studied under the mentorship of Ray E. Cramer and rephen W. Pratt. While at IU, he assisted with the Marching Hundred, held various guest conducting responsibilities with each of the wind bands, and continued trumpet study with Professor Joey Tartell. His doctoral project, completed in partial fulfillment the degree, included creating a new edition of Gordon Jacob's *An Original Suite*, composed in 1924. In addition to creating a full score from the published parts, the project attempted to maintain the original orchestration and scoring of the composer hile eliminating numerous errors in both parts and score. He holds a Master of Arts Music Education from The Ohio State University (1998), in which he continued studies in conducting and trumpet, and a Bachelor of Music degree from Bowling Freen State University (1989) where he graduated *cum laude*.

Heidenreich is a member of the Ohio Music Education Association, the College Band Directors National Association, state chair for the National Band Association National agle Scout Association, and Pi Kappa Lambda. He and his wife Beth have two hildren, Jillian and Daniel, and the family currently resides in Boardman, Ohio. Amy Sabol Amy Sabol is currently a graduate conducting assistant in bands YSU. She also is serving as Assistant Director of Bands at Girard High School w Donald Opsitnik.

A native of Brookfield, Ohio, Amy received her BM in Music Education, basso applied, from YSU in December 2006. After graduation, Amy served as a long-term substitute music teacher at Brookfield Middle School.

Amy has been a very active performer playing in the Cleveland Philharmonic Orchestra, the New Castle Playhouse Orchestra, and the W.D. Packard Concert Band in Warren. She is a member of the Ohio Music Education Association and is active alumna of the YSU chapter of Sigma Alpha lota Sorority.


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



Program Notes

Concertino for Clarinet and Orchestra, Op. 26 by Carl Maria von Weber Written by Carl Ann Smolka

Carl Maria von Weber was born to parents Franz Anton and Genofeva in 1786 in Eutin, Germany. Weber had several different teachers along the way and composed his first opera at age thirteen. Weber is most widely acclaimed for his operas; although much praise is given for his clarinet works as well. The Weber "Concertino" for clarinet is one of the most widely performed pieces of clarinet literature.

The most famous of Weber's Opera's include: "Der Freischutz", "Abu Hassan", "Euryanthe", "Oberon," and "Turandot." The piece that made Weber most popular during his lifetime was the Opera, "Der Freischutz." Weber died in 1826 while staying with Sir Georg Smart. His remains were placed in Moorfields Chapel.

Concerto No. 1 in C Minor for Clarinet and Orchestra, Op. 26 by Louis Spohr Written by Giovanna Pinto

Born Ludewig Spohr in 1784, Louis, the more fashionable French version of his name, Spohr was the son of Carl Heinrich Spohr, a doctor, and Juliane Ernestine Luise Henke. Louis began playing the violin in 1789 and in 1792 he moved to Brunswick to study music. Throughout his adolescence he studied with several prestigious violin players of the period.

Spohr was appointed the Konzertmeister in Gotha in 1805. While living in Gotha he a married Dorthea Scheilder, an accomplished harpist, and the couple had two daughters. He began composing his first work for clarinet, *Concerto in C Minor*, during this period. Spohr also completed his first three operas while serving in Gotha.

Originally written for Simon Hermstedt, the *Concerto in C Minor* showcases the full range and the flexibility of the clarinet. Spohr's operatic writing style makes the *Concerto in C Minor* a trial for even seasoned musicians. With a dramatic first movement, a serene middle movement, and a playful finishing rondo, Spohr's first concerto for clarinet is truly a great work for clarinet that should not be forgotten by time.

Concerto No. 1 in F minor, Op. 73 by Carl Maria von Weber Written by Derek Emch

Born in 1786, Carl Maria Von Weber was already primed to hit the world musical stage running. He was the cousin of Constanze Weber, the wife of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, and was trained to be a musician from an early age. Weber is credited with helping to champion a truly German national operatic identity, although his non-operatic works also are quite popular.

Weber's *Clarinet Concerto No. 1* was one of three solo pieces written in 1811 for Heinrich Baermann. Baermann was one of the premiere clarinetists of the time, and also a good and of Weber's. Written in F minor, it is an excellent representation of the Romantic le. This work differs from Weber's first work of 1811 for Baermann, *Concertino*, in that the clear structuring of *Clarinet Concerto No. 1* takes precedence over the forward leaning elodic flow.

Concertino by Giuseppe Tartini

Selected and Arranged for Clarinet and Piano by Gordon Jacob itten by Cody Williamson

Giuseppe Tartini was born April 8, 1692 in Pirano, Istria, south of Triest. Tartini started out dying violin at a young age and went to the Capo d'Istria when he was seventeen to her his skills. Tartini studied with a few very well known voilinists such as Bohuslav Ceznohorsky and Gasparo Visconti. Tartini never stopped in his pursuit to become a hetter musician.

Anter studying and moving around a lot, Tartini returned home in 1721. Upon his return he took up a job as the first violin and maestro de cappella at the Cappella del Santo which is a posting he held for the rest of his life. Although Tartini was a violinist many of his so works have been transposed for other instruments, such is the case with *Concertino*. After living what is considered to be a long life for a person during this time period, Tartini ed February 26, 1770 after a long illness and an elaborate funeral ensued at the church St. Catherine put on by the city of Padua.

Concerto fin E-Flat Major for Clarinet and Orchestra, Op. 36 by Franz Krommer itten by Katie Ferrall

Franz Krommer (1759-1831), composer of the Clarinet Concerto in Eb, was influenced at roung age to instrumental playing and theory; which through time lead to the path of temposition. Krommer's works exceed 300 pieces, and during the time of the 18th century was considered "along with Haydn, as the leading composer of string quartets, and a pieces rival of Beethoven" according to Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians.

The music of the 18th and 19th century is of the Classical period, where the tunes are lighter and less complicated then the baroque style, typically consisting of melodies above brdal accompaniment. The music usually expresses an elegant character with more variety of keys and contrast within the pieces themselves. More famously known composers of this era whom are better recognizable include, Joseph Hayden, and Ludwig h Beethoven (which are also noted above), and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Seven Variations for Clarinet by Carl Maria von Weber Written by David Amos

Carl Maria von Weber was born in the year 1786 to Franz Anton von Weber, a musician in Eutin and Genovefa Brenner. Weber spent his childhood traveling with his father's theatre troupe- the Weber Theatre Company. He had a sporadic and constant changing education in music as well as in other subjects. Despite his frequer interrupted education, he took piano, singing, and compositional lessons in the various cities the troupe performed in. As a result of the traveling theatre troupe, Weber was exposed to many German *Singspiels* and French operas, which gave him the theatre and dramatic flare for composing opera.

Weber's Seven Variations for Clarinet is based on a theme from his opera Silvana. The variations were composed in 1811after the completion of the opera. Silvana, one Weber's first very successful operas, help him to develop his style and romantic maturity present in his most well known opera Der Freischütz. The role of the orchestra, or in the arrangement, the piano, is much greater than preceding operas.

Sonata for Clarinet and Piano, Op. 167 by Camille Saint-Saëns Written by Franklin Stout

Charles Camille Saint-Saens was born in Paris, France on the 9th of October, 1835 and died in Algiers, Algeria the 16th of December, 1921. Saint-Saëns musical aptitude as child pianist and composer was almost as great as that of Mozart. He studied we stamaty and Boely before entering the conservatoire in 1848 where he continued his studies with Halevy. Liszt admired Saint-Saëns and hailed him as the world's great organist. He was organist at the Madeleine 1857-1875. He also taught at the Ec Niedermeyer 1861-5.

Saint-Saëns works were substantial and included thirteen operas (including *Sampson Dalila*), seven symphonies, numerous choral works, over a hundred songs, symphonies, poems, piano compositions and chamber sonatas for violin, cello, clarinet, oboe and bassoon. He also transcribed and arranged many works by Bach, Gluck, Schuma Mendelssohn, Berlioz, Mozart and others. One of his most famous works, The Carnival the Animals (1886) was first performed on March 9, 1886. Although very popular today, Saint-Saëns forbade complete performances of this musical work, only allowing operations.

The Sonata Opus 167 was composed at the end of Saint-Saens life in 1921, he also wrote sonatas for obce and bassoon at the same time. The clarinet sonate we dedicated to Auguste Perier, a professor at the Paris Conservatoire. This piece is traditional sonata in form with the opening Allegretto theme framing the work by returning

ar the end of the fourth movement. Saint-Saëns Opus 167 requires dexterity within the moving passages and careful evenness of tone while exploiting the full range of the rinet.

Sonata for Clarinet and Piano in E-Flat Major, Op.120, No. 2 by Johannes Brahms itten by Patrick Fulton

German composer, Johannes Brahms was born in Hamburg on May 7, 1833. While he is nest noted for his incredible compositional career, Brahms is also noted as an incredible neert pianist, editor, conductor, and critic. The compositions of Brahms, as noted by close friends Robert and Clara Schumann, were each "so different from the others that [each] seemed to stream from its own individual source". Many late-Romantic composers, th as Liszt and Wagner, explored music as a vehicle for storytelling; Brahms' compositions, however, convey a deeply personal story without the programmatic encumbrances of his peers' works.

e works of Brahms span several distinct periods of his compositional lifetime. His Sonata No. 2 in Eb for Clarinet and Piano is representative of Brahms' later years. After a long period of compositional retirement, Brahms was spurred back to writing through the pirational playing by Richard Mühlfeld, solo clarinetist in the court at Meiningen. This period of great creativity spurred the composition of his Sonata No. 1 in F Minor Op. 120 for clarinet and piano, his Sonata No. 2 in Eb Op. 120 for clarinet and piano, his Trio for wrinet Op. 114, and his Quintet for Clarinet Op. 115, thus creating one of the most mificant collections of clarinet chamber music of the 19th century.

The Sonata No. 2 in Eb as a work is perfectly representative of compositions by Johannes hms. The flowing lyrical ease of the clarinet paired with the beautiful piano accompaniment tells a strongly emotional story to the listener. The piece's melodic lines combine a strong sense of fluid motion with a passionate, omnipresent rubato. This work y is a test of musicianship for any prospective performer.

nata for Clarinet and Piano by Francis Poulenc ten by Tracey Schultz

Funcis Poulenc was born in 1899 into a wealthy bourgeois family with Aveyronais roots. If father was the director of a family pharmaceutical business and his mother was from a family of artist-craftsmen. His family had a deep Catholic faith. He was encouraged by his mother to learn to play the piano at the age of five. Honoring his father's wishes, he inpleted a conventional classical education at the Lycée Condorcet on the condition that he would then be allowed to enter the Conservatoire. Due to his parents' premature deaths (Poulenc was 16 and 18 when they passed away) and the war, his plans were changed. From 1914-1917 Poulenc was the pupil of Ricardo Vines, who was a teacher, a spiritual mentor, and the first performer of his earliest works. Poulenc became a member of 'Les Six,' a group of young French composers. He composed music in all magenres, including art song, ballet music, chamber music, oratorio, opera, and orches and music. Poulenc passed away from heart failure in 1963.

Poulenc's Sonata for Clarinet and Piano was composed as part of his plan to writ sonata for each woodwind instrument. Unfortunately, he was only able to compose sonatas for four of the woodwinds – flute, horn, clarinet, and oboe, before his death. The clarinet Sonata was the second to last piece he ever composed. This piece was published until after Poulenc's death, so editors have guessed at some missing notes and dynamics. There are three movements: Allegro tristamente, Romanza, and Allegro con fuoco. Poulenc dedicated this piece to Arthur Honegger, a Swiss Composer who life most of his life in France. The premier of the piece was at New York City's Carnegie Life by Benny Goodman (clarinet) and Leonard Bernstein (piano) on April 10, 1963.

Sonata, Op. 17

Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827)

Beethoven wrote his horn sonata for Giovanni Punto, a virtuoso horn player who was well known throughout Europe. How famous was he? When Punto premiered Beethoven's Horn Sonata, Op. 18, in 1800, a music critic put the two men in perspective: "Who is this Beethovener? His name is not well known in musical circles. Of course Punto is very well known." The horn makes a bold, confident statement in the first movement, while the piano floats along trying to keep pace.

The second movement opens with a soft call to action, almost as if the horn is revealing a secret. The energy level is high in the finale, as the instruments jump on top of one another, both trying to get a word in edgewise.

oncerto No. 1 in D Major, K. 412

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791)

Allegro

Rondo: Allegro

W. A. Mozart's Concerto No. 1 in D Major, K. 412, traditionally held as Mozart's earliest work for horn, was actually one of his latest. The piece was most certainly begun in 1791, the year of Mozart's death, and never completed. The work, which was also written for the composer's friend, Ignaz Leutgeb, has reduced ranges and technical excerpts due to Leutgeb's declining abilities as was in his sixties when the piece was being composed. The mistakes and revisions of the Rondo of K. 412 support the theory that the work was later completed by Mozart's pupil, Sussmayr for a performance by Leutgeb in April of 1792, after Mozart's death.

Vincent Persichetti (1915-1987)

Vincent Ludwig Persichetti was an American composer, teacher, and pianist. An important music educator and writer, Persichetti, a native of Philadelphia, was known for his integration of various new ideas in musical composition into his own work and teaching. His students at the Juilliard School included Philip Glass, Hall Overton, Karl Korte, Larry Thomas Bell, Richard Danielpour, Jing Jing Luo, and Ronald Caltabiano. He also taught composition to conductor James dePreist at the Philadelphia Conservatory.
