Join us for an evening of tribute in remembrance of our friend, colleague, professor, and fellow musician.





YSU ALL-STAR ALUMNI JAZZ ENSEMBLE

Masters' of Ceremonies Bill Bodine and Bob DiPiero

Tony Leonardi's musical life had many facets. He was an outstanding jazz bass player who performed with many notable musicians including Woody Herman, Chuck Mangione, Sal Nistico, Harold Danko, Stan Kenton, Buddy Rich, Marvin Stamm, and many other too numerous to mention. Leonardi was also a great visionary and leader. He organized the first Jazz Ensemble at YSU in 1969 and built it into the YSU Jazz Studies program with three large jazz ensembles, four jazz combos, and a full complement of jazz studies class offerings. Under his leadership, the YSU Jazz Ensemble earned numerous honors including "Most Outstanding Band" at the Wichita Jazz Festival in

1976 and at the Central Ohio Jazz Festival in 1980, 1982 and 1984. The YSU Jazz Ensemble was the first to win both the Big Band and Small Group competitions during the same year in the history of the Wichita Jazz Festival. They also performed at such prestigious events as the International Association of Jazz Educators Convention, the Notre Dame Jazz Festival, the TRI-C Jazz Fest in Cleveland, Ohio, and the Central New York Jazz Festival in Syracuse, New York. In June of 2000, the YSU Jazz Ensemble won the "College Outstanding Performance" Award in the 23rd Annual Student Music Awards in Down Beat magazine for their latest recording entitled *Biddle de Bop*.

During his time at YSU, Leonardi produced nine recordings: *Reunion '82, Just Friends, When Tomorrow Comes, Live at Peabody's, Things To Come, 25th Anniversary, Celebration: The YSU All-Star Jazz Ensemble, Burnin' with the YSU Jazz Ensembles, and Biddle de Bop. In addition, the YSU Jazz Ensembles performed with numerous artists including Michael Abene, Louis Bellson, Joanne Brackeen, Kenny Burrell, Eddie Daniels, Jon Faddis, Benny Golson, Conrad Herwig, Duffy Jackson, Thad Jones, Mel Lewis, Chuck Mangione, Bob Mintzer, James Moody, Sal Nistico, Jimmy Owens, Bill Pierce, Maria Schneider, Bobby Shew, Marvin Stamm, Clark Terry, Bill Watrous, Jiggs Whigham, and Phil Woods.*

Leonardi's greatest gift was his passion was for teaching and mentoring young musicians. His effectiveness is clearly indicated through the number of successful graduates. You will experience first hand, his success in this evening's performance.

Alumni

Eddie Allen ('82), the son of a blues and jazz singer, was born in Chicago and started playing drum set at seven years old. He began his academic musical studies in Kansas where he earned a degree in Fine Arts (Music and Art). He studied at YSU from 1977-82 where he was awarded the Bachelor of Music degree. He studied marimba and percussion with Joseph Parlink and jazz with Tony Leonardi. Eddie earned a Master of Music degree in 1986 from the Brooklyn Conservatory of Music where he studied with Morris Lang. While living in New York, Eddie met Max Roach and became his personal and musical assistant participating in national and international tours and cultural events, as well as recording with Roach's percussion ensemble M'BOOM.

Eddie settled in Paris in 1989 after a tour with Max Roach and Dizzy Gillespie. Since that time, he has been teaching and performing in Paris and European jazz community. Living in France has given Eddie the opportunity to meet and perform with musicians playing indigenous music from Africa, India, the Middle East, and Europe. Since 1993, he has been directing, composing for, and performing with the transcultural group The Young Planet Percussion Ensemble. In 1996, Eddie began a career as a marimba soloist developing a new style and technique of jazz marimba performance.

Inspired by his band leader father, Don Ambrose, the popular Dallas jazz pianist and the leader of the Don Ambrose Trio, began playing professionally at age fifteen. Ambrose started his musical career as a drummer and vibraphone player in Youngstown. He studied privately and performed in New York City. During his college career, he was a member of the award winning YSU Jazz Ensemble at the prestigious Wichita Jazz Festival, where he was recognized as one of the outstanding players. In 1992, the Don Ambrose Trio recorded their debut album entitled, 'The Art Of Conversation'. Their latest recording, 'The Gift', was recorded in 2000. In addition to having performed at the Jazz Under The Stars concert series and Thursday Night Jazz at the Dallas Museum of Art, Ambrose has appeared with Mel Torme, Ramsey Lewis, and at The Sammons Center for the Arts Jazz series, The Meyerson Symphony Hall and the Dallas Shakespeare Festival's Jazz In The Park. The trio has also performed in support of World Cup Soccer, The America's Cup Kickoff, The NFL Eastern division championship reception, Mary Kay Cosmetic's annual convention, The GTE Byron Nelson Golf Tournament and the USA Film Festival. Ambrose has also performed for dignitaries such as President and Mrs. George W. Bush, Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, Ross Perot, Bill Blass, Lezza Gibbons, Ungaro, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson, Lady Bird Johnson and Lord Callahan, former prime Minister of the United Kingdom.

After enlisting in the Navy, **Jerry Ascione ('75)** was assigned to the United States Naval Academy Band in Annapolis, Maryland from 1977 to 1980 as assistant principal french horn in the Academy Concert Band and pianist with

the jazz ensemble. During this time, he was a featured soloist with both groups. In January 1980, he was selected as pianist with the Navy's premier jazz ensemble, 'The Commodores,' in Washington, D.C. With the Commodores, he has performed at jazz festivals nationwide and with such artists as Dave Liebman, Marvin Stamm, Eddie Daniels, Snooky Young, Milt Hinton, and Pete Christlieb. In 1989, after graduating from the Navy's Senior Enlisted Academy in Newport, Rhode Island, Jerry was appointed leader of the Commodores. He is active as a soloist, composer, arranger, and clinician. Jerry is married and has two children.

Bill Bodine, producer/composer/arranger/bassist, has been a fixture in the Los Angeles music community for 25 years touring and recording with such notables as Van Morrison, Leo Sayer, The Funky Kings, Olivia Newton-John, Melissa Manchester, Joan Armatrading, Laura Branigan, Cher, Hampton Hawkes and Sergio Mendez. Television gigs include 8 years in the "Star Search" House Band and 2 seasons on the "New Gong Show." As a Grammy winning composer he's enjoyed writing for Glen Fry of the Eagles, Manhattan Transfer, and television series and specials for ABC's "Second Noah", "Judge Judy", FOX's Michael Jackson special "Black or White", Martin Mull and Harry Shearer. Bill Bodine Music has composed scores for over 300 television commercials for Honda cars, McDonald's, Nike, Toyota, Harley Davidson, Gillette, HBO, Fox Network, and NBC to name but a few.

Bill has been credited as a "Founding Father" of the YSU Jazz program along with Tony Leonardi and Phil Wilson while attending YSU in the years 1968-1971. He continues his involvement with the University by organizing and participating in seminars designed to bring active music pros back to YSU to inform and inspire the current students. In 1994 Bill founded the YSU JAZZ ENSEMBLE SCHOLARSHIP FUND along with Phil Wilson and Ron DiTullio as a 25th anniversary gift to the program. That fund has now been proudly renamed the TONY LEONARDI MEMORIAL JAZZ SCHOLARSHIP FUND. Bill is married to singer/writer Beth Andersen and has a 15 year old composer/bassist/singer/pianist son Billy.

Apollo, Pennsylvania native **Jeff Bush ('98)** is a promising young gun in the trombone world. Bush has toured and performed with The Glenn Miller Orchestra, The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra conducted by Buddy Morrow, The RIAS Big Band of Berlin, Germany, and The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. He has backed jazz artists such as James Moody, Rob McConnell, and Eliane Elias, and backed headliners such as The Four Freshmen, The Temptations, and John Tesche.

In 1999, Bush was the recipient of the prestigious Frank Rosolino Memorial Scholarship. The award featured Bush at the 1999 International Trombone

Festival and allowed him to study abroad with internationally renowned trombonist Jiggs Whigham. He is currently freelancing in New York City and is a candidate for the MM in Jazz Studies at the Manhattan School of Music.

Mike Crist ('83) has been a member of the Dana School of Music faculty since 1983. His responsibilities at Dana include applied trombone, assistant band director and numerous classes. Prior to Youngstown State, Mike taught public school in upstate New York. His degrees include a Bachelor of Musis and Bachelor of Music Education from Ithaca College, New York and Master of Music in trombone performance from YSU. Mike received the Doctor of Philosophy degree in music education from Kent State University in 1998. Mike is principal trombone with the Youngstown Symphony and Warren Chamber Orchestra. He has also performed with the Tri- Cities Opera, Binghamton Symphony, Broome County (NY) Pops Orchestra, Cleveland Opera Orchestra, and the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. Mike is a member of the Dana Faculty Brass Quintet, which recently released the Quintet's first CD, "Apocalypse." He recently released his own solo CD, "What to Do."

Bob DiPiero ('78) graduated from YSU's Dana School of Music before uprooting to the Nashville over 20 years ago. Bob acquired a writer's deal with Combine Music whose writers included Kris Kristofferson, Tony Joe White and Larry Gaitlin. Although DiPiero's first cut with Combine, Reba McEntire's 'I Can See Forever In Your Eyes,' successfully climbed into the country Top Twenty, the Oak Ridge Boy's 'American Made' put DiPiero's name on the map in country music. This hit song achieved numerous awards and was used as a major ad campaign for Miller Beer. In 1987, Bob established Little Big Town Music Group. His influence enabled Little Big Town to be a success in the country music publishing industry for the next ten years. In 1998, DiPiero founded Love Monkey Music through Sony/ATV Tree Publishing Company after Little Big Town was purchased by Sony. Artists such as Brooks and Dunn, Reba McEntire, Jo Dee Messina, Tim McGraw, Faith Hill, Lonestar and Martina McBride have recorded songs through DiPiero's Love Monkey Music.

As a performer, Bob was a member of the Warner Reprise band, Billy Hill, from 1989-1991. The group was best known for the hit single, 'Too Much Month At The End Of The Money.' Billy Hill toured with Garth Brooks, Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and Hank Williams, Jr. among others. In recent days, DiPiero has entertained at Nashville's Bluebird Cafe. A live rendition of several DiPiero performances 'Laugh.' He has also performed with Sarah Mclachlan, Cindy Lauper and Kim Carnes.

DiPiero has received several awards for his talented contributions to country music including CMA's Triple Play Award in 1995 for 'Wink' (Neal McCoy), 'Take Me As I Am' (Faith Hill) and 'Till You Love Me' (Reba McEntire). In 1995, he also received BMI's Robert J. Burton Award for Neal McCoy's 'Wink' for

most performed country song of the year. In 1996, DiPiero's hits, 'Blue Clear Sky' (George Strait), 'Daddy's Money' (Ricochet) and 'World's Apart' (Vince Gill) garnered him a second CMA Triple Play Award. DiPiero was awarded 'Song of the Year' for 'Worlds Apart' (Vince Gill) at the Country Radio Music Awards in 1997. In January 1998, he was named 'Songwriter of the Year' at the Nashville Music Awards. DiPiero has also written with several well known pop artists and writers such as Carole King, Rick Astley, Diane Warren, Randy Bachman of The Guess Who and BTO, and Johnny Van Zant of Lynard Skynard. Neil Diamond, Dusty Springfield, Wild Orchid, Feargal Sharkey, DORO and Jason and the Scorchers have all recorded songs written by DiPiero. DiPiero has written with Christian recording artists Kevin Max of dc Talk and Margaret Becker, and with Latin writers Omar Alfanno, Pablo Manavello and Tommy Anthony, and Chein Garcia.

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Dr. Kent Engelhardt ('86, '93), a Youngstown native, makes his home in the city of Youngstown with his wife Dr. Beth Hargreaves. Kent graduated from YSU in 1986 with a Bachelor of Music degree (summa cum laude) in Performance (jazz studies/clarinet). After graduation, he toured internationally with the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra conducted by Buddy Morrow, where he was a featured soloist. While he was a member of the orchestra, Kent appeared in the PBS television special 'Tommy Dorsey - Sentimental Gentleman of Swing." The special featured Mel Torme, Buddy Rich, Maureen McGovern, Jack Jones, the LA. Voices, and the 'Tommy Dorsey Orchestra.' In the Fall of 1991, Kent began teaching at YSU in the Jazz Studies Program as a member of its part-time faculty. He completed a Master of Music degree in Performance (clarinet) at YSU in the Fall of 1993. In 1994, Kent was hired at YSU as a full-time faculty member. He received a Master of Arts degree in Ethnomusicology in 1999 from the University of Pittsburgh. In 2001, he was awarded the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Ethnomusicology from the University of Pittsburgh. In the Fall of 2001, Kent became only the second Coordinator of Jazz Studies at YSU.

Kent is the saxophone section leader in the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra and can be heard on their recordings 'Swingin' Together: The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra with Sammy Nestico,' 'Traditions,' and "Night and Day" with vocalist Barbara Knight. He can also be heard with the Paul Ferguson Jazz Orchestra on 'Friends' and on the YSU Jazz Ensemble CD 'Burnin'' as a featured soloist. He was a member of the YSU All-Star Alumni Jazz Ensemble, the Arts Midwest All-Star Band, and the Northeast Ohio Jazz Society Dream Band. Kent has been a research presenter at the IAJE annual convention, and his research has been published by the IAJE. He has performed with some of the most wellknown names in jazz including: Clark Terry, Louie Bellson, Buddy Rich, Jimmy Owens, Geri Allen, Duffy Jackson, Mel Torme, Tommy Flanagan, Maria Schneider, Billy Byers, Bob Brookmeyer, and Jiggs Whigham. Kent has also

performed with some of the most well-known names in entertainment. His most recent performances were with Barry Manilow, Sheena Easton, Michael McDonald, Marylin McCoo, Bill Medley, Melissa Manchester, Peabo Bryson, and Roberta Flack. Kent can also be seen performing with the Blossom Festival Band and The Cleveland Orchestra.

Matt Ferraro ('00, '01) holds a Bachelor of Music in saxophone performance and has performed extensively since the early 1980's. He has performed with numerous broadway shows and name acts including Manhatten Transfer, Smokey Robinson, The Four Tops, The Temptations, and Johnny Mathis as well as a host of musical organizations including the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. From 1995-99, Matt served as Musical Director for Princess Cruise Lines in Los Angeles. His performance schedule included cruises to Europe, Scandanavia, Asia, the Mediterranian, and the South Pacific.

After leaving Princess Cruise Lines, he returned to YSU to obtain his teaching certification, which he completed in 2001. He is currently Director of Bands at Springfield Local High School in New Middletown Ohio. He continues to perform with various shows and groups in the Youngstown, Cleveland, and Pittsburgh areas and is a member of the Pittsburgh based Rhythm-and-Blues group, The Billy Price Band.

Comfortable in both jazz and orchestral styles, **Jeff Grubbs ('86)** is making an interesting career for himself as a bassist. A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Jeff pursued his love for music at the Dana School of Music in Youngstown, Ohio where he received a Bachelor of Music degree. While studying there, he won Downbeat Magazine's Dee Bee Award for Best Collegiate Bass Soloist. During this time, Grubbs was also a very active free-lance musician playing in three of Northeastern Ohio's regional symphony orchestras, as well as in the Cleveland/Akron jazz scene. He then continued his classical education at the Cleveland Institute of Music, while at the same time gaining recognition in the jazz world, performing with many internationally known jazz greats such as Mel Lewis, Joe Lovano, Kenny Burrell and Diane Schur.

Jeff's orchestral playing led him to Atlanta, where he played in the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra under the MAF Orchestral Fellowship. From there Jeff joined the Florida Philharmonic Orchestra. This location gave Grubbs access to the jazz scene in Miami, where he performed and recorded with Ira Sullivan, Gary Campbell, Eric Allison, Eddie Higgins, Melton Mustafa, Dr. Lonnie Smith and Duffy Jackson, with whom he frequently performed and recorded.

When not performing with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, Jeff is involved in the local Jazz scene (the introduction to which was being on the last known recording of the legendary Joe Williams at the Manchester Craftsmans Guild). Grubbs is now in his sixth season as a member of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and resides in Highland Park with his wife Tania and their three children. Jeff is proud to live in a city with such a rich jazz tradition and heritage as well as a world-class symphony orchestra, and believes that performing in both realms contributes greatly to his musical growth and personal development.

Rich Hahn ('70) played trumpet in YSU's first jazz ensemble under the direction of Tony Leonardi in 1969. Upon graduation, Rich worked with a number of popular bands that toured the Midwest playing both clubs and colleges. After teaching music in the public school, he formed Keynote Productions in 1978. In addition to operating a recording studio, the company became the leading audio, video and music production company in Northeast Ohio and Western Pennsylvania. Since its inception, the company has produced over 1,000 music jingle campaigns, as well as scores for video and film. Today, Rich is the Director of the Keynote Media Group, providing complete marketing and advertising services to businesses and organizations nationwide. Rich recorded and produced "Reunion '82," the first YSU Jazz Ensemble album. In the ensuing years, he recorded a number of CD's for Tony's ensembles including the '25th Anniversary' and "Celebration" CDs.

Sean Jones ('00) is a 1996 graduate of Warren G. Harding High School. He earned his bachelor of Music in trumpet performance from Youngstown State University in 2000. He is currently pursuing a Master of Music degree in Jazz Studies at Rutgers University where he is the recipient of the prestigious Ralph Bunch Fellowship.

Sean has performed numerous musical organizations including the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, the Jazz Heritage Orchestra, the Bobby Sellvagio octet, The Cleveland Orchestra, and international tours of Duke Ellington's "Sophisticated Ladies." Since relocating to the New York City area, he has performed with the Charles Fambrough Quintet, the Frank Foster Big Band, the Ralph Peterson Quintet, Gerald Wilson, Ralph Bowen, James Spaulding, Curtis Fuller, Lenny White, Joe Ford, and the International Jazz Quintet.

Sean can be heard as a soloist on several recordings including "Traditions" with the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, "Friends" with the Paul Ferguson Jazz Orchestra, "Live at Zanzibar Blue" with Charles Fambrough, "Live at the North Star" with the Prizm Quintet, and "Confined Freedom" with the International Jazz Quintet. In addition, Sean was a member of the Down Beat Award-Winning YSU Jazz Ensemble and can be heard on their recordings "Burnin" and "Biddle de Bop."

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Mike Kamuf ('91) is an educator, free-lance trumpeter, composer and arranger who holds Bachelor of Music degrees in both Jazz Performance and Music Education from YSU and a Master of Music degree in Instrumental Conducting from George Mason University in Fairfax,VA. Mike served as assistant principal trumpet with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and has performed and toured with the Tommy Dorsey and Woody Herman Orchestras. Mike is listed in "The Upper Register", an anthology of lead trumpet players throughout the United States and Europe. Mike's compositions and arrangements have been commissioned and performed by several bands and artists including the Airmen of Note, the Navy Commodores, the Woody Herman Orchestra, the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Terrel Stafford, Jon Faddis, Bill Watrous, Eddie Daniels and several others. He presently has compositions published by the University of Northern Colorado Jazz Press.

In his tenth year with Montgomery County Public Schools, he directed the MCPS Senior Honors Jazz Band for six years which included performances with Phil Woods, Bobby McFerrin, and DIVA among others. Mike is currently at John T. Baker Middle School (Damascus, MD) where he is Director of Bands, Music Department Chairperson and Gifted and Talented Coordinator. He is treasurer for the Maryland Chapter of IAJE. He and his wife Debbie ('92) reside in Damascus, Maryland where he performs his most important job - Dad to Evan and Carina.

Dr. David Lalama ('76) is currently Professor of Music and Associate Chair of the Music Department at Hofstra University and on the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music. He received his doctorate in music composition from New York University and is active as a clinician and performer throughout the United States.

Dave has performed and recorded with Woody Herman, Buddy Rich, Anita O'Day and numerous other jazz artists and continues to actively compose, arrange and perform in the New York City metropolitan area. He is the director of the new Long Island Jazz Orchestra and has been featured in Hofstra University's Frank Sinatra Conference as a performer and conductor and recently served as co-director of the Louis Armstrong Symposium. He also performs and lectures for numerous jazz education programs for Carnegie Hall (JazzEd) and Friends Of The Arts (JazzLink). His most recent CD is on the Arbors Record Label as a member of the Joe Ascione Trio entitled Post No Bills. He has also been a featured guest on Marian McPartland's Piano Jazz series on National Public Radio.

Along with performing, Dave has also published big band jazz arrangements and articles about MIDI techniques and software. He has received

composition grants from the Society of Composers, Meet-the-Composers, New York State Council of the Arts, and several American universities and has recently been cited in The Biographical Encyclopedia Of Jazz, published by Oxford University Press.

Raiph Lalama ('75) grew up in West Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, graduated from YSU (Ohio) and was recognized there for his remarkable talent by the legendary Thad Jones, who encouraged him to come to New York. Since that time, Ralph has reached a dignified status as a widely respected master of the tenor through his achievements in the big bands of Woody Herman, Buddy Rich and the Thad Jones/Mel Lewis Orchestra (now the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra) with whom he is a featured soloist on Monday nights at New York's Village Vanguard. His experience is vast and varied and includes appearances with Barry Harris, Harold Danko, Mel Torme, Carmen McRae, Tom Harrell and Joe Morello. He has recorded with Joe Morello, the Mel Lewis Jazz Orchestra, the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra, the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band and the Greg Hatza Organization. Ralph appears on the 2001 Grammy Award-winning Blue Note release of Joe Lovano's nonet, "52nd Street Themes."

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With a prolific discography and in addition to numerous recordings as a sideman, Ralph leads his own projects for Criss-Cross Records. 1999 saw his fifth release with the Dutch jazz label. Entitled "Ralph Lalama: Music For Grown-Ups," it features notables Richard Wyands at the piano, Peter Washington on bass and Kenny Washington on drums. His 1997 recording, "Circle Line" garnered 4 stars from Down Beat magazine and secured him a spot in the magazine's "Top CDs of the Decade." "You Know What I Mean" received wide acclaim and his "Momentum" CD, with Kenny Barron, placed him at No. 2 on New York's WBGO playlist for that year, just behind tenor giant Joe Henderson. He is a member of the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band under the direction of Jon Faddis, with whom he appears not only at Carnegie Hall, but also in touring the U.S. and abroad. In addition to his busy performing schedule, Ralph dedicates a fair portion of his time to teaching younger players as an adjunct professor at New York University and SUNY Purchase, and for several years instructed an international collective of students through Manhattan School of Music's Marca Jazz Camp in Venice, Italy.

Tim Leahey ('91) began studying the trumpet at the age of 6 and has been performing professionally since the age of nine. He is originally from Altoona, Pennsylvania, where he studied with Ray Detwiler and Ron Dekker. He attended YSU from 1986-1991 and studied with Esotto Pellegrini, Susan Sexton and Tony Leonardi. In 1991, Tim was named Intercollegiate Musician of the Year, as well as winning first place in the International Trumpet Guild jazz improvisation competition. Since that time, Tim has performed with such artists as Rosemary Clooney, Cecil Payne, James Williams, the Brecker Brothers,

and many others, as well as performing on occasion with such noted big bands as the Tonight Show Orchestra under the direction of Doc Severinson , the Glenn Miller Orchestra and the Guy Lombardo Orchestra.

Since 1994, Tim has been a member/jazz soloist with the premier jazz ensemble of the U.S. Air Force, The Airmen of Note. He continues to freelance around the D.C. area and has had opportunity to perform with such local names as Ron Holloway, Keter Betts, Larry Willis, and Tommy Cecil to name a few. Tim has been featured as a soloist on over a dozen compact disc recordings as well as performing on the Warner Brothers Publications jazz improvisation series "Approaching the Standards."

Jim Masters brings a depth of experience as a trombonist, singer, performer and educator. As an Alumnus of YSU he received outstanding soloist awards at the Wichita and Elmhurst Jazz festivals. He actively pursued a career in Ohio before moving to New York City where he worked until 1990 before returning to Ohio. Jim toured the U.S. and Japan with the Buddy Rich Band and the Widespread Jazz Orchestra. He has performed with the bands of Tito Puente, Mel Lewis, Clem DeRosa, Larry Elgart, Roy Gerson, Lew Anderson, John Fedchock/Maria Schneider, and currently performs as a member of the Columbus Jazz Orchestra. Jim has been a featured vocalist and soloist at NYC's Blue Note with Jorge Anders Latin/Jazz Band. Each year you may see him appearing in Bob Kindred and Anne Phillips' "Bending Towards The Light: A Jazz Nativity." He has sung and played on numerous commercials and performed in many venues, stages, orchestra pits, and clubs. As a composer and songwriter Jim has numerous compositions recorded. Jim has written many songs for and about children. His children's choir piece 'We The Children' was premiered by the Columbus Girl's Choir, and the Colonial Hills choir in Worthington.

Masters created The American Jazz Experience which he has presented to over 110,000 students in Central Ohio. He and the ensemble are deeply committed to sharing this American classic music with today's children. Jim currently serves on the faculty of The Ohio State University as Jazz trombone instructor and lecturer and has also taught at Capital University as Jazz vocal instructor. He appears on the faculty of numerous music camps and arts festivals throughout the country.

Alton Merrell, Jr. ('00), pianist, educator, producer, songwriter and composer, is a Warren native. He received the Bachelor of Music Education (cum laude) with an emphasis in Jazz and Classical Piano in the winter of 2000. Presently, Alton is pursuing a Master of Music in Jazz Piano Performance at YSU and is serving as a teaching assistant. His duties include applied jazz piano, jazz keyboard, and jazz combo. Alton also serves as the Music Director at The New Jerusalem Fellowship Church in Warren, Ohio. Alton is the producer, arranger, and principle songwriter of the CD "He Can Do It" featuring The New Jerusalem Fellowship Gospel Choir. He has performed with gospel artists Donnie McKlurkin, LaShunn Pace, Rev. Timothy Wright, and David Ivy. He has also appeared several times on the nationally televised Bobby Jones Gospel show in Nashville, Tennessee. Alton has also performed with jazz artists James Moody, Maria Schneider, Kenny Burrell, Billy Pierrce, Conrad Herwig, Leslie Lewis, Frank Foster, and Jim Rupp. He has also been a member and soloist with The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, and the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra.

John Olsson ('84), trombone, is the instructor of artist-in-residence instructor of Low Brass at Kent State University-Stark Campus, trombone/euphonium at Malone College, Mt. Union College, and West Liberty State College. He holds a BS in Music Education from YSU's Dana School of Music and a Master of Fine Arts Degree in Orchestral Trombone Performance from Carnegie-Mellon University.

John is Bass Trombonist with the Wheeling (WV) Symphony Orchestra and also with the Canton (OH) Symphony Orchestra as well as with the Jazz Heritage Orchestra. He is a featured soloist with the Sounds of Sousa Band and is currently a member of the Woodlands Brass Quintet. Mr. Olsson has performed with the Akron Symphony, Cleveland Opera, Cleveland Ballet, the Pittsburgh Opera, River City Brass Band, YSU-Dana School of Music Alumni Jazz Ensemble, the Allegheny Summer Music Festival Jazz Ensemble, the Tuscarawas Philharmonic, the Canton Players Guild and Lyric Opera and the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra. He has performed with such notables as Slide Hampton, Tommy Harrell, Jerry Lewis, Keith Lockhart, Maureen McGovern, Doc Severenson, Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg, The Temptations, Toni Tennille, Frankie Valli, Allen Vizutti, Andre Watts, and Bill Watrous. He can be heard on CD's by the Wheeling Symphony Orchestra, as soloist with the Kent State University-Stark Campus Concert Band, and with the Jazz Heritage Orchestra. John was a two-time winner of the Carnegie-Mellon Concerto Competition, and a member of the Vanguard Trombone Quartet which was an ensemble finalist in the Fischoff Chamber Ensembles Competition. His teachers include Byron McCulloh, Vern Kagarice, Elliot Chasanov, James DeSano, and Raymond Premru.

Phil Palombi ('01) is a graduate of Dana School of Music at YSU, where he pursued a dual major in Jazz and Classical Performance and Music Education. He studied jazz and classical string bass with Tony Leonardi. While in Youngstown, Phil performed with the Warren Chamber Orchestra, the Greenville Symphony, and the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. He also performed with jazz artists such as Greg Bandy, Ernie Krivda, Chip Stephens, and Dan Wall.

Phil spent approximately one year with trombonist Buddy Morrow and The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra before joining Maynard Ferguson and his new nine piece group Big Bop Nouveau. During his two year tenure with Ferguson, he recorded the CD "One More Trip to Birdland" (Concord), a track for a Concord Christmas CD, and performed on the television shows of Pat Boullard, Crook and Chase, Good Morning Texas, and Jazz Central on the B.E.T. Network. After leaving Maynard Ferguson's band, Phil moved to New York City where he currently resides. Phil can be heard on recordings with the group Section 8 on "In a Minute," the saxophone section from the Buddy Rich Tribute Band, and "Summer Night" with his pianist/wife Sarah Jane Cion, Billy Hart, and Michael Brecker. Phil recently recorded his first project as a leader, "80 East" which showcases his composing talents as well as his playing. The disc features the all-star line up of Harold Danko, Joe Labarbera, and Walt Weiskopf.

Ohio native **Darryl Pellegrini ('84)** received his BS in Music education and Jazz from YSU and his MS in Music Performance from the Manhattan School of Music. Darryl has performed with jazz greats such as the Woody Herman Orchestra, Lionel Hampton, Dizzy Gillespie, Milt Jackson, Clark Terry, Frank Foster, Sal Salvador, Ralph Lalama, and Harold Danko to name a few.

Darryl has performed in numerous hit shows on Broadway such as "The Lion King," "Fosse," "Swing," "Kiss of the Spider Woman," "42nd Street." In addition, he has toured internationally with "Westside Story" and "Blood Brothers." He often records for television, commercials, and cartoons and has performed in movies such as "The Palermo Connection," "Romeo is Bleeding," and Woody Allen's "Crimes and Misdemeanors." In New York, Darryl enjoys a busy and fulfilling free-lance career performing with such artists as, The Vanguard Jazz Orchestra, Toshiko Akiyoshi, and Lew Tabackin. He recently finished a world tour with jazz flugelhornist Chuck Mangione.

Dave Perrico is a Youngstown native who attended Youngstown State University from 1988-94. In 1994, he joined the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra conducted by Buddy Morrow. While David was a member of the TDO, the band recorded "Singin' With The Big Bands" with Barry Manilow which was released in 1996. In 1997, David accepted a job with Crystal Cruise Lines where he played lead trumpet. After two years with Crystal Cruises, he returned to the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra where he is currently a featured soloist and the road manager. David has also been a member of Ernie Krivda's Fat Tuesday Band and the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. **Lou Pisani ('88)** grew up in Natrona Heights, Pennsylvania and now resides in Allison Park, PA just outside of Pittsburgh. He is a 1988 graduate of YSU with degrees in Music Education and Jazz Performance. He also has a Masters degree in Trumpet Performance from the University of Akron, which he obtained in 1996. Following graduation from YSU, he spent 2 1/2 years on the road with the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra, the last year as the lead trumpet player. While on the road, the band toured Japan, Sweden, and two cruises. In 1991, Lou accepted the band director position at Roberts Middle School in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio where he led three concert bands and a jazz ensemble. In 1997, Lou returned to his home state to accept the position of middle school band director at Ingomar Middle School in the North Allegheny School District. At North Allegheny, he is director of three concert bands, the Ingomar Middle School Jazz Ensemble, and the North Allegheny High School Jazz Ensemble.

Lou has performed with such notable artists as Aretha Franklin, Barry Manilow, Tom Harrell, Louie Bellson, Jon Faddis, Frank Foster, Buddy Morrow, Vic Damone, Johnny Mathis, Arturo Sandoval, The Four Tops, and The Temptations. He has played in professional pit orchestras for Annie, City of Angels, A Chorus Line, Annie Get Your Gun, Copacabana, Grease, Guys and Dolls, and Miss Saigon. Lou is the lead trumpet player in the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra and can be heard on their recordings "Swingin' Together with Sammy Nestico," "Traditions," and "Night and Day" with Barbara Knight. He can also be heard on "Friends" with the Paul Ferguson Jazz Orchestra.

Tom Potjunas ('86) is from Warren, Ohio. He received his BA from YSU and his MS from Middle Tennessee State University. Tom is currently in his fifth year at the Alabama Theater in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. Previous to that, he performed regularly in Branson, Missouri at the Anita Bryant Theater and the Blue Velvet Theater with Bobby Vinton and the Glenn Miller Orchestra. He has performed professionally with artists such as Bob Hope, The Jordanaires, The Temptations, The Four Tops, and Jerry Lewis. He has also performed on numerous cruise lines such as Royal Caribbean, Norwegian, and Carnival. Tom is also a former public school music educator.

Chris Poulin ('99) holds a Bachelor of Music degree in jazz performance from the University of Maine in Augusta. He has studied with Tony Gaboury, Bob Thompson, and Gary Wittner. Chris came to YSU to continue his musical and academic studies in 1997. He graduated with a masters degree in jazz and classical performance from YSU in 1999, where he studied classical guitar with Jim Boyce and studied jazz with Tony Leonardi and Kent Engelhardt. Chris can be heard with the YSU Jazz Ensemble on their award-winning recording "Biddle de Bop."

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Chris is proficient in many styles of music including jazz, classical, and rhythm & blues, and draws inspiration from a variety of genres. He has performed extensively in New England and Ohio and on cruise ships in the Bahamas and the Caribbean. He is currently performing with and writing music for the group Antigravity, enjoying living in picturesque Orland, Maine and celebrating the birth of his new daughter, Tambre.

Dennis Reynolds ('88) of Warren, Ohio, was a member of the U.S. Army Band (Pershing's Own) in Washington, D.C. during the Carter and Reagan administrations. He was also a member of the Count Basie Orchestra under the direction of Frank Foster. Shortly after leaving the Basie organization, Dennis became a member of Clark Terry's Big Bad Band, where he played lead trumpet. In the 1990s, he was a member of the Illinois Jacquet Big Band and has also performed with the YSU All-Star Alumni Jazz Ensemble, the Arts Midwest All-Star Band, and The Cleveland Jazz Orchestra. Dennis is the founder of the Jazz Heritage Orchestra that is in residence at Cleveland State University's Black Studies Program. He has been a faculty member at numerous summer jazz camps, clinics and Cuyahoga Community College. Dennis is currently the band director at Kirk Middle School in the East Cleveland City School District.

Jason Rigby ('97) is a free-lance saxophonist residing in New York City. Originally from the Cleveland area, he attended YSU for four years earning a Bachelor's of Music degree in Saxophone Performance/Jazz Studies. While at YSU, Jason studied with Tony Leonardi, Dr. Kent Engelhardt, Dr. James Umble, Dr. Nancy Andrew and Dr. Kathryn Thomas-Umble. Jason attended DePaul University School of Music in 1997, and then continued his studies at the Manhattan School of Music. While attending MSM, he studied with Dick Oatts, Rich Perry and Mike Abene. In 1999, Jason was the winner of Down Beat Magazine's award for Best College Jazz Instrumentalist. Jason completed his Master's of Music degree in December, 2000.

Jason has toured extensively with trombonist Buddy Morrow and the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and the Glenn Miller Orchestra. He has also performed with the Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, the Cleveland Orchestra, and Chicago's Green Mill Big Band. Since moving to New York, Jason has performed with numerous professional ensembles including the Village Vanguard Jazz Orchestra. He has also appeared on television with Allan Harris on the show B.E.T. On Jazz with Ramsey Lewis. As a woodwind doubler, Jason subs on the Broadway hit "Urinetown" and performs with other non-Broadway shows. He recently toured the U.S. with the co-led group Trio Colossus and is a member of the Scott DuBois Quintet among other creative NY ensembles. For the last two summers Jason has taught at the Hartwick College Summer Music Institute and Festival in Oneonta, NY. He was also adjunct faculty during the 2000-2001 school year at Brooklyn's Polyprep Country Day School. A composer and bandleader, Jason is currently writing and working with original groups of his own in New York City.

Dave Rivello ('86) directs the award winning New Jazz Ensemble at the Eastman School of Music. In addition, Dave is also a freelance composer, arranger, and music copyist. He has served as composer-in-residence at a number of schools, writing for their ensembles and giving clinics and private lessons. His residencies have been sponsored by Meet The Composer, Harvard Project Zero, and The New York Council of the Arts. He leads the Dave Rivello Ensemble, his own twelve member group, which plays his original compositions. Dave has written for and been commissioned by The Smithsonian Institute, The Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, The Penfield Symphony Orchestra, The Penfield Music Commission Project, The YSU Jazz Ensemble, David Taylor, Phil Woods, Gene Bertoncini, Randy Brecker, Jiggs Whigham, Billy Hart, and The Bill Kirchner Nonet. His music has been widely performed throughout the U.S. as well as Germany.

Dave received his bachelor of music degree from the Dana School Of Music at YSU where he completed a dual major of trumpet performance (jazz emphasis) and a music education degree. While at YSU, Dave studied privately with Sam D'Angelo focusing on composition, arranging, and music theory. He moved to Rochester in 1987 to attend the Eastman School of Music, where he completed a masters degree in Jazz and Contemporary writing. During that time, he won the Down Beat magazine award for "best original extended composition", and the IAJE award for "best original large ensemble composition". Dave's music is currently being published by Advance Music in Germany, UNC Jazz Press, GIA Publications, and The Penfield Music Commission Project.

Bassist **Melissa Slocum ('80)** has an extensive and diverse background of musical experiences. She holds a BA in piano performance from YSU ('80), a Master of Music in Classical String Bass from Manhattan School of Music ('94), a Master of Music in Jazz String Bass from Manhattan School of Music ('96), and a Professional Studies Certificate from Mannes School of Music ('98). Currently she is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts at SUNY at Stony Brook.

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Melissa has performed with many renowned jazz artists including Lionel Hampton, Woody Shaw, John Faddis, John Hicks, Dee Dee Bridgewater, Toshiko Akiyoshi, Roland Hanna, Barry Harris, Bobby Watson, Art Blakey, and Wynton Marsalis. She has recorded with Kevin Mahoganey, Howard Johnson & Gravity, Diva, Ralph Peterson, Dakota Staton, and Charlie Persip & his Superband. She is currently the resident bassist of the show "Phantom of the Opera" and continues to perform in symphonies and period orchestras throughout the New York region.

Alumni

Like most great jazz artists, pianist/composer **James Weidman ('77)** got his start listening to records by jazz giants like Charlie Parker, Thelonious Monk, Bud Powell and Clifford Brown. It was his father's collection that sparked his interest and it was his father (a saxophonist) who urged Weidman to take up music. At age 8, he began to study classical piano and throughout his time in High School and at YSU, he was featured in his father's band.

James found his most pivotal career experiences in Brooklyn, New York. After moving there in 1978, he immersed himself in the city's growing jazz scene and established connections that remain strong to this day. Of the many associations he discovered in Brooklyn, Weidman considers Steve Coleman to have had the most significant impact on his life as a musician. In 1981, Weidman joined Bobby Watson's band. Shortly thereafter, Coleman introduced him to Abbey Lincoln. This led to the James's nine-year tenure with the jazz diva that included his appearance on three of her recordings. During that time Weidman also toured with Max Roach, Archie Schepp, James Moody, Slide Hampton, Dakota Staton, and Gloria Lynne. Then in 1987, he became the featured keyboardist for Steve Coleman's Five Elements and the M-Base Collective.

From 1991 to 1993, he toured and recorded with Cassandra Wilson and served as arranger and consultant for the singer's JMT release, "Blue Skies." Since the end of 1992, Weidman has been pianist and musical director for vocalist Kevin Mahogany. During that period, James updated another Brooklyn connection when he and reedman Talib Kibwe co-founded the quartet TAJA. In 1995 TAJA released its debut recording "A Night At Birdland." James has also garnered critical acclaim as a producer and arranger/composer for the rising star artist Ruth Naomi Floyd.

Weidman's own 1997 recording as a leader, "People Music" has the benefit of a 20 year career and a stylistic range that spans blues, bop, improvised electric funk and post-fusion. It is a trio record with bassist Belden Bullock and drummer Marvin "Smitty" Smith. James is currently on the jazz faculty at both SUNY Purchase College and William Patterson University. He has been involved in special education, led International Art of Jazz workshops in Long Island, and developed a program that combines jazz, Afro-Cuban and rap music during residencies under the umbrella of Vishnu Woods' Safari East.

A native of Warren, **Dr. Darryl White ('87)** has been playing trumpet since the age of ten. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree from YSU, a Master of Music degree from Northwestern University and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Colorado. While in Denver, he was a member of the Aries Brass Quintet-in residence at University of Denver-Lamont School of Music and the Denver Brass. At Lamont he was Instructor of Trumpet and also participated with the Faculty Jazz Quintet. White can be heard on several recordings including performances with the Denver Brass, "Rhapsody in Red, White & Blue" on Centaur Records, 1997; and "America, The Golden Dream" on Delos International, 1996. He can also be heard on the Capri Record Label with tenor saxophonist Keith Oxman. The most recent release, "Hard Times", featuring jazz great Joe Bonner and a 1997 release entitled "Out on Whim". Darryl recently released his first CD as a leader, soloist and composer, entitled "Ancient Memories," featuring several original compositions as well as those of jazz legends Thelonious Monk and John McNeil.

Darryl is currently an assistant professor of trumpet at the University of Nebraska School of Music. Before his current position, he taught at Mesa State College in Grand Junction, Colorado. He has also been a lecturer and soloist at the Mile High Jazz Camp since 1990 and has appeared as a guest soloist with the Omaha Symphony, Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, Mesa Chamber Orchestra, Grand Junction Symphony, Lake Forest Chamber Orchestra, Roaring Fork Jazz Festival, University of Nebraska Faculty Brass Quintet, and the University Faculty Jazz Quartet.

Glenn Wilson ('76) is a graduate of the Dana School of Music, YSU, where he was a member of the award winning Jazz Ensemble led by Tony Leonardi. While at YSU, he studied saxophone with Joseph Edwards. After graduation, Glenn moved to New York City. During the time he lived in New York, Glenn toured and recorded with The Buddy Rich Band, Lionel Hampton, Machito, Tito Puente, The Bill Kirchner Nonet, The Mel Lewis Orchestra, Toshiko Akiyoshi, and The Bob Belden Ensemble. Glenn's six solo albums include "Impasse," "Elusive," "Bittersweet," "Lee's Keys Please," "Blue Porpoise Avenue," and "One Man's Blues." He can also be heard on twenty-one recordings as a sideman including "The Buddy Rich Band," "Lionel Hampton: Live in Japan," "Treasure Island," "The Music of Sting," "Le Cigale (Live in Paris)," and "Turandot" with the Bob Belden Ensemble, as well as "What It Is To Be Frank" and "Infant Eyes," with the Bill Kirchner Nonet and "Harbor Lights" and "Hot House" with Bruce Hornsby.

Glenn has been awarded a grant by the National Endowment for the Arts and his CDs are featured in the "Grammaphone Guide to Good Jazz" and "The Penguin Guide to Jazz." He has recently relocated to Central Illinois after ten years in Richmond, Virginia. His latest CD, "One Man's Blues" was recorded live at Bogart's in Richmond, the band's steady gig for 9 years.



Margery McDuffie Whatley

Margery McDuffie Whatley performs from coast to coast as piano soloist and as chamber musician. She has performed at the United States Supreme Court at the request of former Supreme Court Justice Harry A. Blackmun, as well as at the World Congress Center in Atlanta for the Georgia Music Hall of Fame Awards Ceremony and at the Georgia Governor's Mansion with her brother, Robert McDuffie, an internationally acclaimed violinist with whom she frequently collaborates. She has appeared as concerto soloist with orchestras in the states of Alabama, Georgia, and Washington.

With a strong interest in making classical music accessible to people of all ages and listening experiences, Margery Whatley has presented a series of outreach programs throughout cities in Georgia, California, lowa and Illinois. She is one of three founding artists of the Pacific Music Alliance, which was organized in response to a need for community-based music enrichment programs, and is featured on the group's audio-cassette tape and video recording which was aired nationwide over PBS.

Margery Whatley received her Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in piano performance at the University of Southern California , where she studied with John Perry and was named the most outstanding piano doctoral graduate in 1994. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music, where she studied with Frank Weinstock. She has also studied with George Lucktenberg, formerly of Converse College.

Presently, Margery Whatley is an Associate Professor of Music at the University of Alabama in Huntsville, where she is very active in both campus and community endeavors. She resides in Huntsville with her husband Dr. Terry Whatley.

In November 1997, Margery Whatley released her first CD - *Piano Reflections - Encore Favorites.* Fanfare Magazine states "...there's enough steely music to keep you on edge - and even the softer repertoire is often energized by interventionist performances, notable for their pungent accents...the program as a whole is a most attractive one, and makes one eager to hear McDuffie in more extended repertoire. Recommended." A second CD, soon to be released, will feature more extended works by Bach, Haydn and Brahms.







When 17-year old Randall Avers captured second prize in the prestigious Guitar Foundation of America's International Competition in 1991, he became the youngest finalist in the competition's history and earned immediate recognition as one of America's top young guitar players. He has gone on to earn seven additional awards in international competitions including the Guitarists of Leadership and Distinction Competition

(G.O.L.D.), the Yamaha Music Competition, and the XXème Concours Internationale de Guitare Rene Bartoli. Avers has performed in festivals and concerts throughout North America, Europe, Africa and in the Middle East. In 1998, he was selected as an Artistic Ambassador of the United States and toured North Africa teaching, lecturing and performing American Jazz and classical music.

Away from the concert stage, Avers is a noted instructor, arranger and composer. His collection of guitar duos, Twelve Silly Songs for Twelve Silly Strings, co-composed by Rami Vamos, has been performed extensively by many artists including the acclaimed Newman-Oltman Duo. "VISTAS", his 1996 self-produced recording, also has received critics praise.

Avers began his musical studies at age 6. He studied at the Oberlin Conservatory, where he received a Bachelor's degree in Music (1996), and the University of Arizona, where he earned a Master's degree in Music (2001). He also has studied at the New England Conservatory, the Walnut Hill School, the North Carolina School for the Arts, and the University of Akron. His graduate studies began at the Conservatoire Nationale Supériere de Musique et de Danse in Paris, where he became the first American to receive first prizes in both classical guitar and chamber music.

He is a recipient of the Theodore Presser Award and the Harriet Hale Woolley Scholarship.



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



Otis Murphy, classical saxophone



Born in 1972, Otis Murphy joined the faculty of the Indiana University School of Music in the fall of 2001 as Lecturer in Music (Saxophone), becoming one of the youngest faculty members in the history of the School of Music. A recipient of the Fulbright grant, Otis spent the 1999-2000 academic year in Paris studying with the internationally acclaimed French saxophonist, Jean-Yves Fourmeau. At the completion of this year abroad, he received the final performance degree of the French music conservatory system, the Prix de Perfectionnement (by a unanimous decision of the jury), from the Conservatoire National Régional de Musique, Cergy-Pontoise.

Murphy holds the Master of Music degree from Indiana University, graduating with the Performer's Certificate, the highest honor given to a performer at this institution; he was a pupil of Distinguished Professor Emeritus Eugene Rousseau. Before attending Indiana University, Otis studied with Professor Kenneth Fischer at the University of Georgia, graduating Magna Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Music Education degree.

No stranger to competition success, Murphy won Second Prize in the Adolphe Sax International Saxophone Competition (1998) held in Dinant, Belgium. Critical reaction to his playing in Vers L'Avenirs emphasized 'his musicality and charisma.' According to a review, he 'played his program with the calm assurance of those who know themselves to be the best. His command...was of the utmost beauty.'

Otis Murphy is an active recitalist who has performed throughout the world. In addition to his numerous appearances throughout the United States, he has also performed in France, Switzerland, Germany, Japan and Belgium. Highlights of his performances include recitals at Civic Hall in Tokyo, the Embassy of the United States in Paris, Salle Pierre-Mercure in Montreal, and New York City's Merkin Concert Hall. He was an invited soloist at the 12th World Saxophone Congress in Montreal, Quebec, and has performed and recorded concertos with several orchestras and bands throughout the world.

Otis Murphy is a Yamaha Performing Artist and Clinician, actively performing recitals and teaching saxophone masterclasses throughout the United States and abroad. Murphy will perform this evening with accomplished pianist **Haruko Murphy**, a previous First Prize winner in the Bartok Piano Competition.



Program Notes

Antonin Dvorak's **Carnival Overture** was written as the second part of a trilogy of orchestral overtures between the years 1891-92. In the words of John Claphan, these works 'are the manifestation of Dvorak's belief that Nature was created by the Almighty, but was in another sense also the giver of life, which can be both beautiful and ugly." ('Dvorak' *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*). The Carnival Overture has enjoyed great popularity on the concert stage and remains as one of his most popular works.

Mark F. Walker, in adapting this work for the concert band, took great care to preserve Dvorak's sense of orchestration and the overall exhilaration of the original work. Destined to become a favorite and rewarding piece with bands across the country, Dr. Walker's transcription reveals the sure hand of a brilliant composer and arranger. Dr. Walker was a United States Army Warrant Officer Junior Grade, for whom he served as bandmaster in Blythe, California and Fort Walla Walla, Washington from 1942-47. He later taught at Butler University, Ohio State University, and at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music from 1968-1985.

The composer, Keith Gates wrote:

The first movement of the **Concertino for Flute and Wind Ensemble** is a toccata. I felt it was a fitting title. Because of the semi-agitato sixteenth note patterns so prevalent in the principle theme and development. Another reason that I used that term is that the percussion keyboard instruments are a very important element in the movement and make use of those steady sixteenth note patterns also. The form of the movement is Sonata Allegro, a form that I use quite frequently because it affords the opportunity of writing contrasting thematic material within the same movement and leaves plenty of room for development.

The second movement is a Nocturne, a night piece. I tried to create a dark and haunting atmosphere at the beginning. Basically the movement is a bel canto style melody for the solo flute supported by a rather simple accompaniment in the winds and brass. My inspiration was any one of those beautiful, elegant nocturnes of Chopin, whose music I greatly admire.

The final movement is a set of variations on the hymn tune 'Windsor.' It is one of my favorite hymns and is usually sung to the words of Isaac Watts, 'Great God, How infinite Thou Art.' Originally, this movement only contained 10 variations, but I later added five more at the request of my old high school friend, Ransom Wilson, who performed the complete set of variations at Yale two years ago.

Camphouse stated: **Elegy**, commissioned by and for The United States Marine Band, Colonel John R. Bourgeois, director, was composed between June and October, 1987. The work was premiered at a gala concert celebrating the 190th anniversary of The Marine Band on July 11, 1988 in the Concert Hall of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Other pre-publication performances include those by the Northwestern University Symphonic Band, Bowling Green State University Symphonic Band, and The Dallas Wind Symphony.

The inspiration and origins of these rhapsodic, quasi-fantasias are many and varied. Some of the principal thematic material originated from an earlier a cappella choral work based on the poem *Morning* by the Scottish writer and poet John Henry Mackay. The only non-originally composed thematic material is a quote from the religious hymn *The Church in the Wildwood* by Dr. William S. Pitts. Some of my earliest childhood recollections are of my father singing me to sleep with this wonderfully simple tune. In addition to this work being an elegiac tribute to my late father, the work's intense lyricism and rich harmonic vocabulary serve as a sincere musical memorial to the heroic sacrifices made by men and women of the armed forces in the defense of freedom.

Our performance of this piece is a tribute to the men and women who lost their lives in the World Trade Center and the Pentagon on the infamous day now known simply as 9/11...

Fucik's 240 compositions include the incomparable up-tempo march, *Thunder and Blazes* ("Entry of the Gladiators") has meant "instant circus" for the past 75 years. But Fucik had at least two other strong contenders for that inner circle of his compositional crown, *Children of the Regiment* (adopted by the German Army) and *Florentiner* this *Grande Marcia Italiana*.

In a short but brilliant career during which he served as bandmaster to the 86th Hungarian Infantry Regiment at Budapest, he developed his own wide-ranging style of writing marches, a popular dual profession among bandmasters amidst the on-going nationalism then flourishing Europe. Thus it is not surprising to find a Hungarian writing an Italian grand march and out-doing many Italians in the process! Among his many passions, Professor Leonardi was most proud of his Sicilian/Italian heritage. Therefore, this march is part of our tribute to the man known affectionately as "Tony."

Leonard Bernstein was probably one of America's foremost musical geniuses. He achieved immediate conducting fame when, at age 25, with 16 hours notice and without adequate notice, he conducted a Sunday afternoon broadcast of the New York Philharmonic Symphony after the scheduled guest conductor, Bruno Walter, became suddenly ill. Equally adept in the various activities of musical performance, composition, and analysis, he perhaps did more than anyone else to make the listening of music exciting and knowledgeable to the layman did.

West Side Story has been characterized as an American 'Romeo and Juliet.' With its romantic setting against a background of social and racial strife, Bernstein's music reflects the thousand and one moods that permeate Stephen Sondheim's lyrics. From the basic mood of studied nonchalance and defiance by the juvenile set, the music is at times devout and tender, or in contrasting sections, dynamic in intensity. Bernstein, like many American composers of the later half of the 20th Century, was able to meld the musical styles of Latin music and jazz into an orchestral context. Our performance of this set of five pieces from the *West Side Story* musical is in tribute to our colleague 'Tony' whose presence at the Dana School of Music was felt by so many students. Tony's love of the jazz medium was superceded by his love for his family, his students, and for the Dana School of Music. The staff and students of YSU Bands are honored to play a part in this semester-long tribute to the late, great, Tony Leonardi.

Carmen Dragon's classic arrangement of Samuel Augustus Wards' *America, The Beautiful* has, for nearly 40 years, been a staple of the repertoire for the concert band. Our narration, as done by YSU Associate Director of Bands, **John E. Veneskey**, has been borrowed from the library of the W.D. Packard Band, Robert E. Fleming and W. D. Byo, Conductors.

In the troubling time since 9/11, one of the great outcomes has been the outpouring of the American spirit. The YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble will close tonight's program with this moving work and pays a musical homage to all those brave Americans who lost their lives on one early September morning...

Tony Leonardi

Tony Leonardi's musical life had many facets. He was an outstanding jazz bass player who performed with many notable musicians including Woody Herman, Chuck Mangione, Sal Nistico, Harold Danko, Stan Kenton, Buddy Rich, Marvin Stamm, and many other too numerous to mention. Leonardi was also a great visionary and leader. He organized the first Jazz Ensemble at YSU in 1969 and built it into the YSU Jazz Studies program with three large jazz ensembles, four jazz combos, and a full complement of jazz studies class offerings. Under his leadership, the YSU Jazz Ensemble earned numerous honors including "Most Outstanding Band" at the Wichita Jazz Festival in 1976 and at the Central Ohio Jazz Festival in 1980, 1982 and 1984. The YSU Jazz Ensemble was the first to win both the Big Band and Small Group competitions during the same year in the history of the Wichita Jazz Festival. They also performed at such prestigious events as the International Association of Jazz Educators Convention, the Notre Dame Jazz Festival, the TRI-C Jazz Fest in Cleveland, Ohio, and the Central New York Jazz Festival in Syracuse, New York. In June of 2000, the YSU Jazz Ensemble won the "College Outstanding Performance" Award in the 23rd Annual Student Music Awards in Down Beat magazine for their latest recording entitled Biddle de Bop.

During his time at YSU, Leonardi produced nine recordings: *Reunion '82, Just Friends, When Tomorrow Comes, Live at Peabody's, Things To Come, 25th Anniversary, Celebration: The YSU All-Star Jazz Ensemble, Burnin' with the YSU Jazz Ensembles, and Biddle de Bop. In addition, the YSU Jazz Ensembles performed with numerous artists including Michael Abene, Louis Bellson, Joanne Brackeen, Kenny Burrell, Eddie Daniels, Jon Faddis, Benny Golson, Conrad Herwig, Duffy Jackson, Thad Jones, Mel Lewis, Chuck Mangione, Bob Mintzer, James Moody, Sal Nistico, Jimmy Owens, Bill Pierce, Maria Schneider, Bobby Shew, Marvin Stamm, Clark Terry, Bill Watrous, Jiggs Whigham, and Phil Woods.*

Leonardi's greatest gift was his passion for teaching and mentoring young musicians. His effectiveness is clearly indicated through the number of successful graduates.

Kent Engelhardt Coordinator of Jazz Studies

Nancy Andrew, flute

Nancy Andrew is Associate Professor of Flute at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. She performs with the Dana Woodwind Quintet and the Erie Philharmonic, and is principal flutist of the Warren Chamber Orchestra. She was invited to perform the *Concertino* by Keith Gates at the National Flute Association (NFA) convention in Dallas, Texas this past August, 2001. A former Secretary of the NFA, she is currently serving a two-year term on the Board of Directors.

Ms. Andrew completed her Doctorate of Music at Peabody Conservatory in 1993 as student of Robert Willoughby. While attending Peabody, she received the Britton Johnson Memorial Award for Flute and was a prizewinner in the Yale Gordon Competition. A member of the Annapolis Symphony from 1984-1992, she has also held positions with the Baltimore Opera Orchestra, the Erie Philharmonic and the Richmond Symphony. She has taught on the faculties of the Peabody Preparatory, Morgan State University, the State University of New York at Fredonia, and Virginia Commonwealth University.

Originally from New Mexico, she holds degrees from the University of New Mexico and the State University of New York at Stony Brook. She has also studied extensively with the legendary French flutist, Marcel Moyse and has founded the Marcel Moyse society to preserve and promote the legacy of this master teacher.

Stephen Gage, conductor

Stephen L. Gage is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a masters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a bachelors degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion at the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and was the Director of Bands at Auburn High School in upstate New York. At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving in his ninth season as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra (YSYO). He has numerous publications including articles in the *Kansas Music Review Journal*, in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, *TRIAD*, and in the *National Band Association* (NBA) *Journal* and *NBA Newsletter*. He has been a member of the NBA School Reform Committee, the ABA Ostwald Selection Committee and is currently in his fourth year as the NBA North Central Division Chair. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all state, sectional, regional, and district high school concert bands and orchestras across the United States and Canada. Gage also recently guest conducted the U.S. Army Band: *Pershing's Own* and the U.S. Army Field Band.

Under his direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble (SWE) and the YSYO were quest performers at the 1998 and 2000 OMEA State Music Convention. In April of 2002 the SWE will appear as a feature ensemble at the Music Educators National Association (MENC) Biennial 2002 Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. The SWE also was a quest performer at the 1996 CBDNA Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The SWE released its first produced compact disc, Lions, Jesters and Dragons, Oh My in the fall of 1998 and its second CD project, Star Wars and Other Scores was released in December 2000. A third CD will be recorded in the spring of 2002 for a November 2002 release. Gage's groups have also performed at state music conventions in Kansas and New York. He serves on the Board of Advisors for the St. Patrick's Day Festival in Dublin, Ireland, and in May of 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at YSU. Professor Gage's biography has been listed on two occasions in the Who's Who Among America's Teachers Journal.

In addition to his conducting career, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Jimmy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; and he was a marimba concerto soloist with the Fredonia Symphony Orchestra. From 1987-89 he served as the President of the International Association of Jazz Educators–New York State Chapter.

Dr. Gage's professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (ABA). He is also a member of the CBDNA, NBA, OMEA/MENC, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, and Phi Kappa Phi. Stephen lives in Poland, Ohio with his wife, Stephanie, sons Matthew and Brendan, and daughter Claudia.

John Veneskey, narrator

John Veneskey joined Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in July 1998 as the Associate Director of Bands after ten years of successful teaching in the public schools. His responsibilities at Dana include directing the 190 member YSU Marching Pride, Penguin Review Basketball Band, Fall Symphonic Band, and Concert Band. He also teaches trumpet and is a member of the instrumental music education faculty, where he supervises student teachers and teaches a variety of courses to undergraduate music education majors.

John holds a Master of Music degree from the Dana School of Music, a Bachelor of Music degree from Bowling Green State University, and is currently working toward a Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education degree from Kent State University. His professional affiliations include the Music Educator's National Conference, International Association of Jazz Educators, College Band Director's National Conference, National Band Association, International Trumpet Guild, Phi Mu Alpha, and Kappa Kappa Psi.

In addition to his teaching duties, John maintains an active professional performing schedule. He is currently associated with Special Productions in Cleveland and the Western Reserve Brass Quintet. John's other performance credits include: The Warren Philharmonic, Youngstown Symphony, Ohio Chamber Brass, WD Packard Band, Toledo Opera Orchestra, Toledo Jazz Orchestra, Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus, Shrine Circus, Clark Terry, Phil Woods, Zoot Sims, Henry Mancini, and Maureen McGovern, among others. John resides in North Lima with his wife, Dana, and two sons, Matthew and Michael.

Dr. Glenn Schaft is Assistant Professor and Director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University. He directs the YSU Percussion Ensemble, Latin Percussion Group, and a Jazz Combo. He has performed with the World Percussion Group Battu, Colorado Music Festival, Cleveland Chamber Symphony, Cleveland Ballet, Cleveland Opera, Youngstown Symphony, Akron Symphony, Ohio Chamber Orchestra, Chip Stephens Trio, Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Chuck Berry, Englebert Humperdink, Marvin Stamm, John Fedchock, and numerous other jazz and popular artists. He also teaches at the Richland Arts Academy Summer Jazz Camp in Mansfield, Ohio. Dr. Schaft earned three percussion performance degrees including the Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, the Master of Arts from Eastern Illinois University, and the Bachelor of Music from the Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music. He has studied Afro-Cuban percussion at the Escuela Nacional de Arte in Havana, Cuba through a grant from the Ohio Arts Council and at the Berklee School of Music World Percussion Festival with Giovanni Hidalgo.

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YSU PERCUSSION PROGRAM

The **YSU Percussion Program** includes approximately 23 majors in various performance and education degree programs. The percussion curriculum encourages musical and cultural versatility and includes private lessons, small group classes, percussion seminar class, percussion methods courses, percussion ensemble, and independent study courses. 

Active in a wide variety of percussive areas, Mr. Di Sanza may be heard on a number of CD recordings with a variety of artists and ensembles, including Keiko Abe and the Michigan Chamber Players, the Brass Band of Battle Creek, the American Wind Symphony Orchestra, and a number of others. Currently, he is completing his first solo recording project, featuring works by Per Nørgård and an original work for electronic and acoustic percussion. Mr. Di Sanza regularly tours as a percussion soloist, and has performed with numerous orchestras as timpanist or percussionist, including the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, Flint Symphony, Youngstown Symphony, and Jackson (Michigan) Symphony. He currently holds the position of principal percussionist with the Madison Symphony Orchestra. Anthony is touring as a solo percussionist during the spring of 2002, visiting universities in Wisconsin, Ohio and Michigan. As a part of each university residency, Anthony will perform a solo recital and teach percussion masterclasses and lessons

In addition to his orchestral, solo, and chamber performances, Mr. Di Sanza regularly performs with SoleNero, a piano and percussion duo with Jessica Johnson. The duo is currently involved in a variety of commissioning projects with Wisconsin composers and will premiere the new works in fall of 2002. Mr. Di Sanza also performs music from various non-Western musical cultures, including those of Brazil and the Middle East.

Anthony Di Sanza earned the Bachelor of Music Education degree from Youngstown State University and the Master of Music degree in percussion performance from the University of Michigan. Currently Assistant Professor of Percussion at the University of Wisconsin–Madison, Mr. Di Sanza teaches undergraduate and graduate level studio percussion, percussion techniques, percussion repertoire, and percussion pedagogy, and directs the Western and world percussion ensembles. Anthony Di Sanza

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These two movements are from a set of four character pieces that were composed throughout the 1990's. They are strongly influenced by Chick Corea's set of *Children's Songs* for solo piano and include a significant amount of improvisation. *Youthful Impressions* grew out of my fascination with the thoughts, emotions and expressions of the world's youth.

An awakening can be both beautiful and traumatic...for many this is a lifelong goal ...

Waves

Per Nøgård

Waves, my first work for solo multiple percussion, is dominated by two "wave principles," both directly audible. One is the vibrations of skin and metal, produced by freely hanging sticks, or by freely jumping heads of sticks, or even by rubber balls. The other wave principle is more "biological" in the sense that it requires the percussionist to be able to change the stress from one beat of a four beat pattern to another, producing an impression of waves as the various elements of this pattern increase dynamically. Reflections on the Nature of Water

Jacob Druckman

Reflections on the Nature of Water is a small payment toward a very large debt. There were primarily two composers, Debussy and Stravinsky, whose music affected me so profoundly during my tender, formative years that I had no choice but to become a composer. It is to Debussy that I doff my hat with these reflections of his magical preludes. (Druckman)

This work is dedicated to my friend and teacher Abdulhamid Alwan. Born in Baghdad and a master of Middle Eastern percussion, Hamid is among the most gentle and thoughtful people I have yet to meet. 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PROGRAM NOTES by Glenn Schaft

10.00

Ritmica's 5 & 6 by Amadeo Roldan. Roldan was born in 1900 in Paris, France, came to Havana, Cuba in 1921 and died in 1939 in Havana. He studied at the Madrid Conservatory c. 1916. The premiere of Ritmica's 5 & 6 was at the Cornish School, Seattle, Washington, with John Cage conducting. These are possibly the first written works for percussion ensemble. They preceded the famous "Ionization" of Edgard Varese by one or two years. Nonwestern influence is exhibited by Roldan's use of Latin-American instruments such as claves, maracas, bongos, timbales and his use of folkloric rhythms such as the clave rhythm. Roldan builds up volumes of sound and tremendous rhythmic polyphony and complexity in these brief pieces.

Piano Phase may be performed by two pianists or two marimbists. The piece explores the concept of a musical piece as a gradual process. This process determines the note-to-note details and the overall form simultaneously. The process is audible because it is happening extremely gradually. One cannot improvise in a musical process - the concepts are mutually exclusive. The piece consists of three large sections (composed of various repeated melodies) each of which undergoes a rhythmic phasing process. For example, the first section is comprised of a twelve note pattern which is constantly repeated, joined (in unison) by the second player, and then the second player begins to embark on a series of twelve phasing episodes. During each phasing the second player gradually accelerates his pattern (against the fixed tempo pattern of player one) until he advances to the second note of the pattern, then the third, etc. This process continues until, eventually, player two arrives back at the unison pattern. Then the second section, an eight note pattern, undergoes the exact same process. And finally, the third section is based on a four note pattern.

Omphalo Centric Lecture was composed for the Synergy percussion group of Australia. This marimba quartet makes

extensive use of polymeter - that is, several rhythmic time structures going on simultaneously. That device, coupled with complex but accessible melodic activity and strong rhythmic "grooves" propel the piece.

Musique de Table is by Belgian composer Thierry De May. It is for three percussionists, each using a small wooden table as their only instrument. The various sounds are produced by different ways of striking the table with the hands. The tables are amplified by means of contact microphones attached underneath the tables. The piece is precisely notated with a combination of traditional notational symbols and a variety of unique graphic symbols. The music is choreographed via the composer's precise notational instructions.

Mexican and Guatemalan marimba music. The marimba is a large keyboard percussion instrument that usually contains 48-60 chromatically pitched rosewood bars. The marimba is the most important instrument in Guatemala and the marimbists of Guatemala and Mexico play this style of music for many occasions such as weddings, parties, dances, and marimba band competitions.

The Doomsday Machine is named for an episode from STAR TREK, my favorite science fiction series. The "Doomsday Machine" is an enormous weapon, both in size and strength, that was left adrift in space. The war machine was capable of destroying whole planets and was discovered, of course, by Captain Kirk and his crew. The Enterprise ultimately conquered the "Doomsday Machine" by feeding it another star sip that was set to self-destruct. My "Doomsday Machine" is meant to be an aurally and visually captivating work that explores a multitude of wood, metal, and membrane sounds in an explosively energetic dance. DR. GLENN SCHAFT

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Dr. Glenn Schaft is Assistant Professor and Director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University. He directs the YSU Percussion Ensemble, Latin Percussion Group, and a Jazz Combo. He has performed with the World Percussion Group Battu, Colorado Music Festival, Cleveland Chamber Symphony, Cleveland Ballet, Cleveland Opera, Youngstown Symphony, Akron Symphony, Ohio Chamber Orchestra, Chip Stephens Trio, Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, Chuck Berry, Englebert Humperdink, Marvin Stamm, John Fedchock, and numerous other jazz and popular artists. He also teaches at the Richland Arts Academy Summer Jazz Camp in Mansfield, Ohio. Dr. Schaft earned three percussion performance degrees including the Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, the Master of Arts from Eastern Illinois University, and the Bachelor of Music from the Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music. He has studied Afro-Cuban percussion at the Escuela Nacional de Arte in Havana, Cuba through a grant from the Ohio Arts Council and at the Berklee School of Music World Percussion Festival with Giovanni Hidalgo.

YSU PERCUSSION PROGRAM

The **YSU Percussion Program** includes approximately 23 majors in various performance and education degree programs. The percussion curriculum encourages musical and cultural versatility and includes private lessons, small group classes, percussion seminar class, percussion methods courses, percussion ensemble, and independent study courses. The percussion faculty also includes Janet Pemberton – adjunct instructor, Ron Coulter – graduate percussion teaching assistant, and James Abate – graduate assistant in marching percussion. Each percussion major

may choose a degree specialization track from among the comprehensive, symphonic, jazz and commercial drum set, jazz vibraphone, keyboard percussion, ethnic percussion, contemporary music, and marching percussion tracks.

The YSU Percussion Ensemble program includes performance, touring, and recording experiences in contemporary percussion chamber music, marimba ensemble repertoire, various Latin Percussion Groups, and student compositions.





Kabalevsky Notes by Melanie K. Gran

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Dmitri Borisovich Kabalevsky was born in St. Petersburg on December 30, 1904 and died in Moscow on February 14, 1987. Kabalevsky was not only a composer, but also a pianist and music critic. In 1918, his family moved to Moscow where he studied painting and piano at the Scriabin Institute and later at the Moscow Conservatory. He worked as editor at a music publishing house and was a member of the Union of Soviet Composers. In 1932, Kabalevsky earned a position as instructor in composition at the Moscow Conservatory and became full professor in 1939. It was during this time that he began composing Colas Breugnon Op. 24. Although the majority of the complete work was accomplished between 1936 and 1938, revisions were made in both 1953 and 1969. The overture we will play tonight is from his latest revision.

Grøndahl Notes by Mike Shevock

Trained trumpet player, violinist, and conductor, **Launy Grøndahl** (1886-1960) studied theory and composition under Carl Nielsen. As a conductor, Grøndahl led the Danish National Radio Symphony Orchestra from 1925 until 1956.

Grøndahl composed 17 works in all, many of which were instrumental works. The Concerto was composed when Grøndahl was studying in Italy in 1924, and was written for and premiered by Danish trombonist Vilhelm Aarkrogh, accompanied by the Trivoli Wind Band on June 30, 1925. This work is accepted as one of the most 'important and demanding' works in trombone repertoire.

Arutunian Notes by Andrew Erb

Alexander Grigori Arutunian was born in Erevan, Armenia, on September 23, 1920. He graduated from the Erevan Conservatory in 1941 and studied composition with Litinsky in Moscow at the House of American Culture (1946-48). Arutunian then returned to Armenia as Music Director of the Royal Philharmonic Society. In 1954, he was appointed music director of the Armenian Philharmonic Orchestra. He was given a "People's Artist of the USSR" award in 1970.

The melodic and rhythmic characteristics of Armenian folk music are a strong influence in Arutunian's work. As a composer, he expresses his nationality by incorporating the flavor of *"ashughner"* (folk minstrel's) improvisations. His compositional style was similar to Khachaturian in the 1940's, at the time the concerto was written, but in the 1960's he tended towards classical forms and clearer tonality.

Arutunian's trumpet concerto was his sixth major composition. It was written in 1950, for the renowned trumpet player Timofei Dokschitzer. The concerto, an energetic powerhouse of Eastern European lyricism and harmonic textures, is played without pause.

Caplet Notes by Michael Hanson

André Caplet (1878-1925), French composer and conductor. He was a student at the Paris Conservatoire, where he studied harmony with Xavier Leroux, fugue and composition with Charles Lenepveu, and accompaniment with Paul Vidal. He established an important friendship with Claude Debussy which greatly influenced his earlier compositional style.

In 1901, André Caplet won the Grand Prix de Rome, defeating friend and colleague, Maurice Ravel. During his residency at the Villa Medici, he received a commission from American saxophonist, Elise Boyer Hall to write a work for saxophone and orchestra. Légende, for alto saxophone and orchestra was completed in 1903 and premiered by Elise Hall in Boston, January 19, 1905 under the direction of Georges Longy. She performed it again in either April or May of 1905 in Paris, at Salle Pleyel Hall. This was the last performance of the work before it disappeared for over eighty years.

In 1988, the piece was re-discovered by French saxophonist, Jean-Marie Londeix. He had been searching for the piece since the 1960's and finally acquired it in the harp collection at the Bibliothéque Nationale in Paris.

Légende is a symphonic poem written for nine instruments (oboe, clarinet, alto saxophone, bassoon, and string quintet). It is "atmospheric" in character, and unfolds in an improvisatory manner. Caplet's sensitivity and understanding of instrumental color, melodic gesture, emotion, and style are exemplified in this important work.

Schumann Notes by Melanie K. Gran

Robert Alexander Schumann was born in Zwickau on June 8, 1810 and died in Edenich, near Bonn on July 29, 1856. Like Kabalevsky, Schumann was also a composer, pianist and music critic, but that is where the similarity ends. Schumann was a man with many highs and many lows. Mental illness ran in his family. His father, a publisher and bookseller, had frequent bouts with nervous ailment. Schumann's sister Emilie also had mental and physical problems and drowned herself in 1826.

Despite his predisposition to these inherited problems, Schumann persevered in many ways. His mother pushed him towards being a lawyer, but he was found more often in the practice rooms, than in classrooms while attending the University of Leipzig for law. Schumann also showed no weakness while courting the lovely Clara Wieck. He first met Clara when she was nine, while taking lessons from her father, Friedrich Wieck and living in their household. It took almost nine years for the two to be married, but only after Schumann had taken her father to court for her hand and Clara had been disowned.

Clara had a brilliant career as a concert pianist which proved to have mixed blessing for their marriage. Around 1845, Schumann's ailments began to include long episodes of ringing in his ears. By 1854, these episodes included hallucinations. On February 26, 1854, Schumann pleaded to be placed in a sanatorium. His plea was denied and that night he attempted suicide by jumping into the Rhine. He spent the remainder of his life in the sanatorium, where sources say he starved himself slowly.

Schumann's Symphony No. 1 in Bb, subtitled the "Spring" Symphony, was written in response to his wife's first pregnancy. He spent four sleepless nights and days (January 23-26, 1841), creating sketches for this symphony. The entire symphony was orchestrated by February 20. Schumann reported, "I feel like a young woman who has just given birth — so relieved and happy, but also sick and sore."

Music Director



William B. Slocum received the bachelor of fine arts and master of music degrees from the University of New Mexico and earned an artist's diploma at the Julliard School of Music where he studied French horn with James Chambers.

William Slocum is a member of the faculty of the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University.

At the Dana School he is music director of the Dana Symphony Orchestra, professor of French horn, and a member of the Dana Faculty Brass Quintet. He is also a lecturer in conducting, symphonic literature and the history of art and music.

Previously, Mr. Slocum was conductor of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra in Wyoming. He played principal horn in the Buffalo Philharmonic under Josef Krips, toured Japan under Leonard Bernstein, Europe and South America under Zubin Mehta with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra and toured under George Szell while he was member of the Cleveland Orchestra.

Slocum has conducted numerous district, region and state orchestras. During the summer of 1994 he appeared as guest conductor with the Aguascalientes Symphony Orchestra in Mexico performing a program devoted entirely to the music of Manuel de Falla.

In May, 2000 Slocum was the guest artist at the Horn Swoggle in New Mexico, where he played a solo horn recital, conducted master classes and conducted the professional ensemble. He was guest professor of horn at the Harid Conservatory in Boca Raton, Florida, and most recently played extra horn with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

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Slocum has appeared on two compact disc recordings issued through the Dana Recording Project. One compact disc "The Expressive Horn" consists of music for horn and piano and the other, "Apocalypse", is a recording of the Dana Brass Quintet.

Currently Slocum is serving in the twenty-first season as music director of the Cleveland Philharmonic Orchestra.

Young Artist Competition Winners

Andrew Erb is a native of the Youngstown-Sharon area, araduating from West Middlesex High School in 1992. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from nearby Westminster College, in 1996, where he studied trumpet with Steve Hawk and Sue Sexton. Andrew has completed graduate work at Carnegie Mellon University, where he studied with the esteemed Anthony Pasquerilli, and is currently working on his Masters Degree in Trumpet Performance at Youngstown State University. He currently studies with Dr. Christopher Krummel. Andrew has performed locally with the Packard Concert Band, in Warren, Ohio, the Youngstown Fine Arts Brass Quintet, the Butler Symphony Orchestra, and as a recitalist. While living in the Pittsburgh area, Andrew was the Principal Trumpet with the Pittsburgh Savoyard Opera Company Orchestra, and the Principal E-flat Cornetist with the Allegheny Brass Band. The Allegheny Brass Band featured Andrew as a cornet soloist several times during his time with the band. Andrew is one of the founding members of the Butler Brass Quintet. Currently, Andrew is the band director at the Sharpsville School District, where he directs all of the bands, grades five through twelve, including the award-winning Blue Devil Jazz Ensemble and Blue Devil Marching Band. He also maintains a private trumpet studio of over twenty private trumpet students at Marks Music in Hermitage, Pennsylvania.

Michael Hanson is completing his studies for a Master of Music in saxophone performance at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music. He holds a Bachelor of Music in music education from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. He has studied with several eminent saxophone artists, including: Steven Jordheim, Russell Peterson, and Dr. James Umble. Additional teachers include Dr. Eugene Rousseau, and Elizabeth Rheude.

Mr. Hanson has received several awards including, the 1994 Lawrence University Conservatory Trustee Scholarship, the Lawrence University Conservatory IDEA Fellowship; he was a

competitor in the 1995 Geneva International Saxophone Competition, the 1998 Winner of the Minnesota MTNA Collegiate Woodwind Competition, the 1999 Winner of the Concordia College Concerto Competition, and the 2001 recipient of a Northwest Regional Development Commission/ McKnight Individual Artist Grant for partial funding of current CD project. 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

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Michael Gelfand, cello



Michael Gelfand received his Bachelor of Music degree at Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana, and his Master of Music at the Cleveland Institute of Music in cello and conducting. His cello teachers have included Janos Starker, Fritz Magg, and Marion Feldman. He pursued doctoral studies in conducting at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and at the Pierre Monteux School for Advanced Conductors. From 1980-1990 he was Director of Orchestra, Opera

and Musical Theater Productions at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University.

Since 1975 he has been Professor of Music at Youngstown State University and Principal Cellist of the Youngstown Symphony and Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, and has performed concerts since 1990 as a member of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra cello section. He is a former member of the Cleveland Orchestra, former principal cellist of the Syracuse Symphony, Paris Chamber Orchestra, Nice Philharmonic, and member of the Cazenovia String Quartet. He is a founding and performing member of the Cleveland Cello Society.

Gelfand is active as a guest soloist, conductor, adjudicator at many high schools, colleges, and music festivals throughout the United States. He was awarded the Distinguished Professor of Music Award at Youngstown State University in 1984, and was promoted to the rank of Full Professor in 1994. Mr. Gelfand performs as a member of the Amici Trio in residence at Youngstown State University. Gelfand was named Music Director/Conductor of the Ashtabula Area Orchestra in June 1992, and in that capacity has expanded its season which now includes subscription and pops concerts, as well as performances with the Ashtabula Arts Center Ballet, the Ashtabula County Choral Society, and the Youngstown Symphony Chorus. His recent guest conducting have included orchestras in South Dakota and Pennsylvania.

John Wilcox, violin

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John Wilcox is Associate Professor of Violin/Viola at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. He received his Bachelor of Music Degree from Florida State University and his Master of Music degree from Kent State University. Prior to joining the YSU faculty in 1979, he was a first violinist with the National Symphony orchestra the direction of Antal Dorati and Mstislav Rostropovich. Mr. Wilcox studied violin with **Richard Burgin, former**

Concertmaster of the Boston Symphony and Ruth Posselt, internationally known violinist. He is Concertmaster of the Warren Chamber Orchestra, and was Concertmaster of the Youngstown Symphony from 1979 - 1986. He is very active as an adjudicator and recitalist, and, as violinist in the AMICI TRIO at YSU. Wilcox is Music Director/Conductor of the YSU Dana Chamber Orchestra and Musical Theater Productions. He maintains a large private teaching studio.

Nancy Zipay DeSalvo is an Assistant Professor of Music at Westminster College in New Wilmington, Pennsylvania, where she teaches piano, accompanying, and music theory, and where she performs solo recitals and accompanies visiting guest artists. She performs extensively across the United States as a professional accompanying pianist and chamber music collaborator.

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Guest solo appearances have included performances with the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra.

Dr. DeSalvo received her terminal degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music with a major in Collaborative Piano, where she studied with Anne Epperson. She and baritone Jason Fuh captured First Prize for their performance of the Four Claudel Poems in the Darius Milhaud Performance Auditions held at the Cleveland Institute of Music.

The CIM Collaborative Piano Faculty named her a 1997 recipient of the Gwendolyn Koldofsky Award, given at the discretion of the faculty to a Collaborative Piano Major, with a special aptitude for vocal accompanying, who exemplifies the important dual role of the profession -- that of support, service and cooperation, balanced with professional skill and high standards of performance.

Program Notes by Craig Hill

Peeping Tom, a solo snare drum and voice, is based upon a poem by Senn. Senn, a true performance artist in his use of sculpting, video, and electronic/acoustic material, applies brushes to the concert snare drum. This piece is part of The Noble Snare collection compiled by composer Stuart Saunders Smith in a desire to explore contemporary snare drum compositions.

Balafon is inspired by the African keyboard percussion instrument of the same name; a xylophone made of wooden blades with gourd resonators. Sejourne's balafon influences stem from Guinea and Mali. Balafon recreates the improvisational and polyrhythmic feeling of the African balafon player through its lack of unified meter and its use of unusual note groupings. It explores several timbral variations through techniques such as striking on the nodal points of the bars as well as in the center. The performer also muffles the vibrations of the bars through use of the hand and of dead strokes. This piece is dedicated to marimbist Robert Van Sice.

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Generalife is one of 5 Pieces For Marimba Volume 4. Its dynamic character suggests images of the Spanish garden for which it is named. Its animated performance and harmonic structure are reminiscent of Spanish flamenco music and dance.

Program Notes excerpted from Steven Schick

Corporel means 'of the body' and was written in 1985. This piece is shocking on a fundamental level, because the body of the human performer is so often a nonentity component of classical music. Corporel reverses that by insisting on the body and the idea that we ourselves make sounds and are by nature musical creatures. The physical part of the piece is really tied to the emotional and musical part. You are not only invited to look, you must look. And when you consider the emotional ramifications of playing a piece without instruments and you yourself being the instrument, there's a very complex interaction that is not easy to quantify. Corporel is the purist percussion piece I know because it is just the body.

Program Notes by Craig Hill

"I recently read this remark: The history of mankind is a long succession of synonyms for the same word. It is a duty to disprove this." -Vinko Globokar

Schreiber, a German percussionist/teacher, has performed and recorded marimba and solo percussion in Leipzig, Moskow, Nurnberg, St. Petersburg among other areas. **InEs** can be described as a trance or a delusion. It contains two contrasting sections, the first of which establishes a flowing modal groove. Interspersed with this groove are bursts of conflict which eventually lead into the trance-like state of the middle section. This section floats as on water; sometimes calm, sometimes harsh. Eventually this section dissipates, returning to the previous groove section in which the experience fades.

Party Platter is inspired the revolution of sampling in modern music. Sampling is the use of extracted musical material from past compositions to create new music. One can relate this to the collage found in visual art. Party Platter exhibits material from Beck, Deee-Lite, Young MC, and the Beastie Boys, artists are known for their effective use of samples. The purpose of Party Platter is to allow live musicians to recreate that which has been created through the use of computers. Synthesizers, samplers, and drum machines have revolutionized the music community, but they are only the tools and not the creators of music. Acoustic and amplified instruments are used to bring this computer-driven music to a live performance format.

Craig Hill

Craia Hill is a Junior Music Education Major at Youngstown State University. His teachers include Dr. Schaft, Mr. Parlink, and Mr. Rachelle. A well-rounded percussionist, Mr. Hill is trained in orchestral and contemporary percussion literature, including drumset and Afro-Cuban styles. He performs regularly with the Youngstown State Wind Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, and Jazz Ensemble I. He is a member of the Don Burns Orchestra, a '30's-'40's big band which performs throughout northeast Ohio. As a member of the Percussion Art Ensemble, Mr. Hill performs classic and contemporary percussion trio literature. The Percussion Art Ensemble has performed at the Butler Museum of American Art as well as at various Youngstown State functions. Mr. Hill plans to pursue a Masters Degree following his graduation of Youngstown State University. He actively performs and teaches in the Youngstown area.

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Stephen Gage

Stephen Gage is Director of Bands, Instrumental Music Coordinator, and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University (YSU). He earned a doctorate at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, a masters degree at the Eastman School of Music, and a bachelors degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion at the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to his current position, Dr. Gage was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and was the Director of Bands at Auburn High School in upstate New York. At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting.

Dr. Gage is currently serving in his ninth season as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra (YSYO). He has numerous publications including articles in the Kansas Music Review Journal, in the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRIAD, and in the National Band Association (NBA) Journal and NBA Newsletter. He has been a member of the NBA School Reform Committee, the ABA Ostwald Selection Committee and is currently in his fourth year as the NBA North Central Division Chair. His many professional credits include serving as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for all state, sectional, regional, and district high school concert bands and orchestras across the United States and Canada. Gage also recently guest conducted the U.S. Army Band: Pershing's Own and the U.S. Army Field Band.

Under his direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble (SWE) and the YSYO were guest performers at the 1998 and 2000 OMEA State Music Convention. In April of 2002 the SWE will appear as a feature ensemble at the Music Educators National Association (MENC) Biennial 2002 Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. The SWE also was a guest performer at the 1996 CBDNA Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The SWE released its first produced compact disc, Lions, Jesters and Dragons, Oh My in the fall of 1998 and its second CD project, Star Wars and Other Scores was released in December 2000. A third CD will be recorded in the spring of 2002 for a November 2002 release. Gage's groups have also performed at state music conventions in Kansas and New York. He serves on the Board of Advisors for the St. Patrick's Day Festival in Dublin, Ireland, and in May of 1999 he was selected as Distinguished Professor at YSU. Professor Gage's biography has been listed on two occasions in the Who's Who Among America's Teachers Journal.

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In addition to his conducting career, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Jimmy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; and he was a marimba concerto soloist with the Fredonia Symphony Orchestra. From 1987-89 he served as the President of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter.

Dr. Gage's professional affiliations include a March 1999 induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (ABA). He is also a member of the CBDNA, NBA, OMEA/MENC, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, and Phi Kappa Phi. Stephen lives in Poland, Ohio with his wife, Stephanie, sons Matthew and Brendan, and daughter Claudia.

Caroline Oltmanns

Caroline Oltmanns receives recognition for performances in the United States as well as abroad. Reviews rave about her "focused and heartfelt emotion" (L'Alsace, France); her "mature creativity" (Fürther Zeitung, Germany) and her "finesse, power and liveliness" (Dernières Nouvelles d'Alsace). Recital venues in Europe have included the Stadttheater Fürth, Germany and Festival International de Piano Franz Liszt, France. Performances in the United States have included the Cleveland Institute of Music; the Redlands Bowl, Redlands, CA; Ohio University in Athens, OH and Music from Stan Hywet, Akron, OH. She was featured as soloist with the Cleveland Philharmonic Orchestra. Her most recent recital tour of South Africa included performances at the Universities of Potchefstroom and Johannesburg. Caroline Oltmanns' latest solo CD features works by Haydn, Schumann, Liszt and Sonata in f minor op. 5 by J. Brahms.

Ms. Oltmanns' playing has been heard on radio stations KUSC and KKGO Los Angeles; FMR Cape Town, South Africa; WKSU in Kent, OH; WXXI in Rochester, NY; WYSU in Youngstown, OH; and WQED, Pittsburgh, PA. Radio interviews in Germany have been broadcast on Norddeutscher and Süddeutscher Rundfunk; Radio Bremen; Hessischer Rundfunk and Westdeutscher Rundfunk. Televised interviews include KVCR-TV, San Bernadino, CA; Bayerisches Fernsehen and other stations.

Dr. Oltmanns is a Fulbright Scholar, she received an Annette Kade Foundation Scholarship and a Stipendium der deutschen Wirtschaft. Her primary teachers were John Perry and Robert Levin. She currently teaches at Youngstown State University where she joined the faculty in 1994.

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Till MacIvor Meyn earned his Bachelor of Arts in Music at the University of California at San Diego, a Master of Music Composition at Indiana University, and the Doctorate of Musical Arts in Composition at the University of Southern Californias Thornton School of Music. Dr. Meyn studied composition with Roger Reynolds, Rand Steiger, Frank Ticheli, Frederick Fox, and Don Freund among others, and has taught at the University of Southern California, Pepperdine University, Saddleback College, and Irvine Valley College. He currently holds the position of assistant professor of music composition at Youngstown State Universitys Dana School of Music. He has received the Sadye J. Moss Endowed Music Composition Prize, the Alchin Scholarship, and has composed for the Ernest Bloch Festival. Dr. Meyn is also a baritone singer, and has performed with numerous choral ensembles, notably the Los Angeles Master Chorale and the Indiana University Pro Arte Early Music Ensemble.



Aria with Thirty Variations, BWV 988 (Goldberg Variations) Johann Sebastian Bach Born March 21, 1685, in Eisenach Died July 28, 1750, in Leipzig

Johann Sebastian Bach's Aria with Thirty Variations, BWV 988, a landmark in the keyboard literature, and indeed in human thought, apparently went to press in late 1741 for issue the following year. The score is familiarly known as the Goldberg Variations because of its traditional association with Bach's pupil Johann Gottlieb Goldberg, a gifted harpsichordist. Scholars once believed that the Aria itself originated much earlier, for it appears in a keyboard notebook that Bach's wife Anna Magdalene began keeping in 1725. Experts on Frau Bach's handwriting, however, now conclude that she added the Aria to her notebook no earlier than 1740, perhaps even copying it from the first printed score. Bach's magisterial variations have served generations of keyboard players as a Parnassan goal, and also provided a challenge to composers – fully met by Beethoven in his *Diabelli* Variations.

Bach's early biographer Johann Nikolaus Forkel tells a charming story of the work's origins. It was supposedly commissioned by Goldberg's employer, Count Kayserlingk of Dresden, an insomniac who wanted a "smooth by lively" harpsichord piece that could be played to him during the long midnight hours. It is further reported that the composer designed the variations to suit Goldberg's skills, and that a thoroughly delighted Kayserlingk

rewarded Bach extravagantly with a golden goblet containing one hundred *louis d'or*. "Had the gift been a thousand times larger," Forkel observed, "[the score's] artistic value would still not have been paid for."

Alas, the Bach scholar Christoph Wolff has recently poked some convincing holes in Forkel's myth. First, Kayserlingk surely did not commission the *Goldberg* Variations because his name appears nowhere on the title page, an inconceivable omission given the princely sum he reportedly paid. Second, Goldberg was only fourteen years old when "his" variations were written, and Bach could

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scarcely have intended so demanding a work for so young a pupil, however talented.

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Wolff suggests an equally interesting connection with Kayserlingk and Goldberg, however. Bach is known to have spent a night in Kayserlingk's house in November 1741, and, says Wolff, "it seems highly plausible" that on that occasion he gave the Count a presentation copy of the variations "hot off the press". Kayserlingk would surely have reciprocated with a generous gift of cash. Moreover, there is every reason to believe that later in the 1740s a mature Goldberg gave his employer night after night of enchantment with Bach's wondrous score.

The work is conceived for harpsichord with two keyboards, and ten of the variations necessitate extraordinary crossings of the hands, a spectacle rare in the eighteenth century (though present in some of Scarlatti's earlier sonatas). Bach chooses the bass line of the Aria as the foundation for the variations, each of which he casts in binary form with both halves repeated. The variations are grouped in sets of three, the successive groups ending with strict canons at progressively larger intervals. Thus Variation Three is a canon at the unison, Variation Six a canon at the second, and so on, until Variation Twenty-Seven, a canon at the ninth. Crowning the cycle, the thirtieth and last variation is not the expected canon at the tenth, but instead a populist "quodlibet" ("do as you will") which unites two folk songs: "Kraut und Ruben haben mich vertrieben" ("Cabbage and beets have

chased me away") and "Ich bin so lang nicht bei dir g'west" ("It's so long since I've been to your house"). Bach's remaining variations comprise a veritable encyclopedia of Baroque keyboard forms: virtuoso toccatas, arabesques and inventions being interspersed with dances such as gigue, minuet, allemande and polonaise. The work is in G throughout, with twenty-seven variations in G major. The three in g minor all display special expressivity, especially number Twenty-Five, a high point of musical intensity that has been described as "a diamond surrounded by twenty-nine precious stones".

"Bach poised the contrasts and climaxes of the Goldberg Variations so accurately," wrote Sir Donald Francis Tovey, "that the ending of the whole by a simple *da capo* of the theme is astonishingly effective. It is as if a charming old ancestress of a living line of great folk were to step from the frame of her Holbein portrait and bow to her assembled posterity".

Program Notes

La Forza del Destino, or The Force of Destiny, originally began with a prelude leading without break into the first act of the opera. For the revision, Verdi lengthened and strengthened the prelude, making it into an overture coming to a full close before the curtain rises. Built from melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic matters dealt with in the opera itself, the overture quotes and combines several of the most striking melodies as well as the ominous opening three chord motive and the rapid, repeated and ascending accompaniment figure associated in the opera with tragic destiny.

Eleven Scenes from a Kingdom I Once Knew was composed by Matthew Horzempa, a senior music education major from Pennsylvania. It is a highly programmatic work that has undergone several transformations during the time that we have been preparing it. We are very proud of Matt, and I am both pleased and excited that we are able to present the premier performance of his outstanding work this evening.

Scenes from "The Louvre" was commissioned by the Baldwin-Wallace College Symphonic Band and premiered in 1966 with Dello Joio conducting. The work was originally scored for a NBC television special for which the composer received an Emmy award in 1965. The band version is taken from the original television score and is comprised of a suite of five movements, each depicting the period of the famous Paris museum's development during the Renaissance.

Rich in harmony, dynamics, and thematic interplay, **Eternal Father, Strong to Save** is based on the missionary hymn of the same name composed in 1860 by William Whiting, which was later adopted as the official hymn of the U.S. Navy. The work opens with a brilliant fanfare, followed by the hymn melody appearing in the form of a fugue developed by the woodwinds. The brass echo the fugue until the hymn appears once again, this time scored for french horn quartet. The ensemble joins in for a finale reminiscent of the opening fanfare.

Ferdinand David was born in Hamburg on June 19,1810 and died in Klosters, Switzerland on July 18,1873. He was a German violinist, composer, and teacher. David was a contemporary of Mendelssohn and performed in chamber ensembles with him. This is a new arrangement for trombone and band, and we are pleased to have the opportunity to work with Dr. Michael Crist, a marvelous teacher and performer, in presenting it this evening.

An American Elegy was commissioned by the Columbine Commission Fund, a special project sponsored by the Alpha Iota Chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi at the University of Colorado on behalf of the Columbine High School Band, who premiered the work with Mr. Ticheli conducting on April 23, 2000.

In the composer's words, "An American Elegy is, above all, an expression of hope. It was composed in memory of those who lost their lives at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999, and to honor the survivors. It is offered as a tribute to their great strength and courage in the face of terrible tragedy. I hope the work can also serve as one reminder of how fragile and precious life is and how intimately connected we all are as human beings". John Philip Sousa composed **Hail To The Spirit Of Liberty** for an appearance by the Sousa Band at the dedication of the Lafayette Monument in Paris on July 4, 1900. This march can hardly fail to immediately grasp the attention of the listener with its skyrocketing unison introduction, and maintains that interest with Sousa's genius in bringing out the inherent tone colors of the concert band.

John Veneskey, Conductor

John Veneskey joined Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in July 1998 as the Associate Director of Bands after 10 years of successful teaching in the public schools. His responsibilities at Dana include directing the YSU "Marching Pride", Fall Symphonic Band, Concert Band, and co-directing (with Dr. Stephen Gage) University Band. He also teaches applied trumpet and is a member of the instrumental music education faculty, teaching a variety of methods courses to undergraduate music education majors, and serving as a campus supervisor to student teachers in music. In addition to his teaching duties, John maintains an active schedule as a clinician, adjudicator, and performer.

Mr. Veneskey holds a Bachelor of Music from Bowling Green State University, a Master of Music from Youngstown State University, and is currently pursuing candidacy as a Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education from Kent State University. His professional affiliations include the Music Educator's National Conference, The International Association of Jazz Educators, The Society for Music Teacher Education, The Society for Research in Music Education, College Band Directors National Association, The National Band Association, The International Trumpet Guild, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and Kappa Kappa Psi.

Mr. Veneskey resides in North Lima, Ohio with his wife, Dana, two sons, Matthew and Michael, and daughter, Elizabeth.

Joseph Gervase, Guest Conductor

Joseph Gervase hails from Hamburg, New York, and is currently a graduate assistant in bands at Youngstown State University where he is pursuing a master's degree in conducting. Joseph studies conducting with Dr. Stephen Gage, Director of Bands at YSU, and trumpet with Dr. Christopher Krummel, Assistant Professor of Trumpet at YSU. Joseph earned his Bachelor of Music degree from Grove City College, where he studied trumpet with Susan Sexton.

Joseph's conducting assignments include the YSU Concert Band, YSU University Band, and the Stambaugh High School Honor Band. Joseph currently performs with the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble, the Dana Symphony Orchestra, and the YSU Jazz Ensemble II. He is a member of OCMEA and a probationary member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.

Matthew D. Horzempa, Composer

Matthew D. Horzempa is a music education major at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music. He currently plays tenor trombone in the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and bass trombone in the YSU Jazz Ensemble I. Along with playing the trombone, Matthew enjoys expressing his musicianship through the craft of composition. He is currently studying composition with Dr. Robert Rollin, professor of theory and composition at the Dana School of Music. After graduation, Matthew plans on pursuing a master's degree in jazz/studio composition.

Michael Crist, soloist

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Michael Crist has been a member of the Dana School of Music faculty since 1983. His teaching responsibilities have included; applied trombone, assistant band director, director of Jazz Ensembles II and III, conductor of the Dana Trombone Ensemble, and numerous classes in music education and music technology. Prior to his appointment at YSU, Dr. Crist taught music in public schools in upstate New York.

Dr. Crist's degrees include a B.M. and B.M.E. from Ithaca College, New York, a M.M. in trombone performance from Youngstown State, as well as a Ph.D. in music education from Kent State University. Dr. Crist has studied conducting with Edward Gobrecht, Edward Lisk, Robert Fleming, and Wayne Gorder. His trombone teachers include Frank Brown, William Harris, Bruce Burritt, Charles Dalkert, Allen Ostrander, Vern Kagarice, and James Desano. Dr. Crist is principal trombone with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra. He has also performed with the Tri-Cities Opera, Binghampton Symphony, Broome County (NY) Pops Orchestra, and the Cleveland Opera Orchestra.

An active member of the International Trombone Association, Dr. Crist serves as a member of that association's scholarship committee and as membership chair for the state of Ohio. He has been published in the <u>International Trombone Association</u> <u>Journal</u>, the O.M.E.A. <u>Triad</u>, <u>Dissertation Abstracts</u>, and <u>Contributions to Music Education</u>, where he has recently been appointed Editor.

Dr. Crist has released a CD, <u>What To Do</u>, featuring 20th century music for the trombone. He performs on a Benge 190F, a Benge 170 and a Conn 36H Alto Trombone. Dr. Crist serves as an Artist/Clinician for United Musical Instruments Inc., Elkhart, IN.



Richard Stoltzman, guest artist



Clarinetist Richard Stoltzman's virtuosity, musicianship and sheer personal magnetism have made him one of today's most soughtafter concert artists. As soloist with more than a hundred orchestras, as a captivating recitalist and chamber music performer, as an innovative jazz artist and appearances on nearly fifty recordings, Stoltzman has defied categorization, dazzling

critics and audiences alike throughout many musical genres. The most recent CD release for this two-time Grammy winner is "WorldBeat Bach", on BMG/RCA Victor. An orchestral recording of works by Nielsen, Lutoslawski and Prokofiev on BMG/RCA Red Seal is scheduled for release in the 2001-2002 season.

Stoltzman has created new musical horizons for the clarinet and its devotees. He was the first clarinetist to perform solo recitals at both the Hollywood Bowl and Carnegie Hall. In 1986 he became the first wind player to be awarded the Avery Fisher Prize, joining such past winners as Murray Perahia and Yo-Yo Ma. Hailed for doing for the clarinet what James Galway has done for the flute, Stoltzman has appeared as soloist with numerous



orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic, La Scala, the Berlin Radio Symphony, the English Chamber Orchestra, the Boston Symphony, the Cleveland Orchestra, and Mostly Mozart in New York.

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

Program Notes

Celtic Duo

The Celtic Duo was written for Walter Mony and John Wilcox and is inspired by two contrasting Celtic folk songs, one slow and lyrical, and the other fast and lively with alternating 3/4 and 6/8 time. The setting employs invertible counterpoint and some intricate original countermelodies that compete for the listener's attention. The piece is dedicated to Walter Mony and John Wilcox.

Sonata on Zuni Ceremonials and Dances

Movements 1 and 3 are based on original material. Movements 2 and 4 paraphrase two Zuni songs from the Corn Dance as transcribed by Natalie Curtis in her work, The Indians Book published in the early nineteen hundreds. The corn ceremony and dances are an important part of the Zuni year. These pueblo Indians live in apartment house-like dwellings. They use a metate to grind the corn for flour which runs down into a room below the grinding room for storage. The corn dance is a prayer of thanksgiving. The piece is dedicated to Gwyneth Rollin, who originally performed the premiere.

Canto In Memorium

This work is in four continuous sections and was written in reaction to the events of September 11, 2002. The composer had first-hand experience of the bravery of the New York firemen and knew when he saw the towers collapse that hundreds had lost their lives trying to save others. The more serene lyrical sections are a tribute to a close family member who past away shortly before September 11.

Joseph Schwantner was born in Chicago and received his musical and academic training at the Chicago Conservatory and Northwestern University, completing a doctorate in 1968. He was one of the younger Pulitzer Prize winners when he received the award in 1979 for his orchestral work Aftertones of Infinity. Currently teaching at Yale, he previously served on the faculties of the Eastman School of Music and the Julliard School.

Schwantner was Composer in Residence with the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra with funding from major U.S. corporations and the National Endowment. He has been the subject of a television documentary entitled, SOUNDINGS, produced by WGBH in Boston for national broadcast. He is frequently programmed by major orchestras. Last season Maestro Isaiah Jackson and the Youngstown Symphony performed Schwantner's New Morning for the World for narrator and orchestra with text from the works of Martin Luther King Jr. with the Reverend King's daughter as narrator, as well as his percussion concerto, with renowned Scottish percussionist Evelyn Glennie as soloist.

Dr. Karen Dannessa is an active soloist and chamber musician. She has appeared at numerous regional, national, and international conventions such as the International Clarinet Association Convention, the International Double Reed Society Convention, Montana Clarinet Festival, and the University of Oklahoma Clarinet Symposium. Her performances have been described as "magical...especially lovely...with a full, centered silky tone." (*The Clarinet*). Having an affinity for chamber music she has performed extensively with *Colloquy*, an ensemble dedicated to commissioning and performing contemporary music as well as The Serenade Reed Trio, The Midwest Quintet and as a collaborator with the Audubon String Quartet.

Her orchestral experience includes performances with a variety of orchestras including the Northeastern PA Philharmonic, Delaware Symphony, Harrisburg Symphony, Philadelphia Classical Orchestra, Pennsylvania Pro Musica, American Wind Symphony Orchestra, and Springfield Symphony (MO). Dr. Dannessa has also published articles and reviews in *The Clarinet*, journal for the International Clarinet Association. Her private teachers include Frank Kowalsky, Elsa Ludewig-Verdehr, Joseph Edwards, and Alexander Stuart. Prior to her appointment at Clarion University of Pennsylvania, Dannessa served on the faculty of Pittsburg State University (KS) for 12 years teaching woodwinds and music literature. She holds degrees from Youngstown State University (BM in Education), Michigan State University (MM in Performance/Woodwind Specialty), and the Florida State University (DM).

She recently recorded "American Lyrique," her first compact disk of chamber music of John G. MacKay, Jr. and Mark Sforzini. This CD contains two sonatas for clarinet and piano by MacKay as well as his **Romance** for clarinet, oboe and piano. **Two American Sketches** for clarinet and English horn by Sforzini are included as well. Other performers on the CD are her husband, oboe/English hornist, Henry Grabb, and pianist Kenneth Boulton.

Henry H. Grabb, oboe/English horn

Henry H. Grabb is an associate professor of music at West Chester University in Pennsylvania. Currently directing the WCU Community Music Program, Grabb previously served as department chair of instrumental music for 7 years. He regularly performs in the Philadelphia area with a variety of orchestras including the Delaware Symphony, Harrisburg Symphony, Lancaster Symphony, and Pennsylvania Pro Musica. He holds degrees in oboe performance from Florida State University (DM), Northwestern University (MM) and University of Central Florida (BA). At home in West Chester, Henry serves as a board member and fund-raiser for the Cat Angel Network, a non-profit, no-kill cat rescue organization.

Steven Edmund, piano

Steven Edmund is a native of Minneapolis and is an active recitalist, chamber musician and free-lance artist. He is an active collaborator and frequently performs on the Pittsburg State University Solo and Chamber Music Series. He has performed concertos with a variety of orchestras including the Springfield Symphony, Southeast Kansas Symphony and with the Kankakee Symphony Orchestra. A prize-winner of numerous awards, he most recently won the Kankakee Piano Competition in Illinois. He holds degrees from the Conservatory of Music at Lawrence University and Pittsburg State University (MM). He also attended the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and the University of Iowa. His teachers include Mack McCray, John MacKay, Sylvia Wang and Theodore Rehl.



Program Notes by Melanie Gran

L'Histoire du Soldat (The Soldier's Tale). The first few measures of L'Histoire du Soldat say so much. The call from the trumpet and trombone leads to a rhythmic stride in the other instruments. Roger Shattuck chose to leave it as a "physical summons to a performance, to start walking, to find some spring and verse in our bodies." This walking music returns each time the soldier travels.

Stravinsky's many varieties of popular music in the score of L'Histoire du Soldat indicate the beginnings of neoclassicism. He sets an eclectic variety of music side by side in this work. There is ragtime, a tango, a waltz, a march, and two Lutheran chorales. These many different styles take away from the unity of the piece and reiterate how different L'Histoire du Soldat is from the bourgeois theatre. Elliot Carter feels that, "all the brief, almost discrete fragments, however roughly they connect with each other, end up by producing a work that holds together in a very new and telling way."

L'Histoire du Soldat remains a standard chamber music piece of the twentieth-century. Excerpts from each part are used on major orchestral auditions all over the world. In fact, Stravinsky, in collaboration with Ramuz, utilizing Afanasiev's tale, managed to create a work of art that has intriaued and fascinated artists for centuries, a work which embraces civilization itself. An ordinary person becomes a soldier (therefore has to deal with war and violence). The devil (life's intrigues and enticements) lures the soldier into a world which only appears to give him satisfaction. He finds a soul mate (the princess) with whom he finds love and yet she wants more, to know him better, to see his home, and he is drawn into the possibility of reuniting with his mother and he will, as he says, "have everything". The human condition (in the form of the devil) knows better. The final dance is cynical, sardonic, and yet full of life and doomed vitality. Stravinsky aives us a work of art that both entertains and educates and, perhaps, above all forces us to deal with the human condition and to know ourselves better whether we like it or not. This is what makes L'Histoire du Soldat timeless and one of the extraordinary artistic achievements of the twentieth-century.

She Sings, She Screams (1995)

She Sings, She Screams was commissioned by Susan Fancher, with financial support from the Austrian Ministry of Culture. The premiere was given on 18 February 1995 by Ms. Fancher at a Kulturspektakel concert in the Stadtinitiative in Vienna.

This piece represents the first work created in my own electronic music studio. It was made using a Korg 05R/w synthesizer and Cubase sequencer. **She Sings, She Screams** is made of three large sections (or arcs) of increasing intensity, with a short coda. The piece reflects my increasing interest in melody (in particular, melody using quarter-tones) and musical motion.

Heartbreaker (2001)

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Dana Richardson

The music of Dana Dimitri Richardson has been broadcast over more than 70 radio stations in the U.S. and Greece including WNYC and ERT, Athens, where he spent three years teaching music theory, becoming the only non-Greek citizen ever to become a member of the Greek Composers Union. His record released on the Dionysian label in 1987 features The American Chamber Ensemble. Between 1990-1991 he wrote and produced a monthly series of two-hour programs on WBAI-FM that explored the relation between music and society. After earning a Ph.D. in Theory and Composition from NYU, he taught at Fredonia College and NYU. He is the recipient of six Meet The Composer Awards, and is presently teaching at Kingsborough Community College, and working on a commission from the Beaufleuvian Trio for harp, soprano saxophone and flute. His Sonata for alto saxophone and piano was recently performed by Mark Engebretson and Steve Harlos at the biennial conference of the North American Saxophone Alliance in Denton, Texas.

Heartbreaker, written in 2001 for Mark Engebretson, is based on the classic riff from the Led Zeppelin tune of the same name, but constructed using the composer's unique compositional approach dubbed "syntonality."

Energy Drink I (1999)

Mark Engebretson

Energy Drink I was written for Matt Sintchak, who gave the premiere performances at an Amamus Saxophone Salon April 22, 2000 and on the Minnesota Contemporary Ensemble "Voodoo" Tour in April, 2000.

The piece is the first in a series of planned solo works for various instruments, which will demand high-speed (and energetic) virtuosity from the performers. Not only intended to be exciting and exhilarating, **Energy Drink I** is also a highly structured work that uses an array of processes that affect paramaters such as pitch, timbre and duration at different rates throughout the piece.

Mark Engebretson



Born in California and raised in Minnesota, **Mark Engebretson** attended the University of Minnesota, graduating Summa cum Laude in 1986. He pursued composition and saxophone studies in Bordeaux, France on a Fulbright Fellowship and then pursued Masters studies at Northwestern University. He subsequently lived as a freelance musician in Stockholm, Sweden and spent three years living in Vienna, Austria, where he performed with the Vienna Saxophone Quartet and received commissions from the

Austrian Ministry of Culture. Returning to Northwestern in 1995, Engebretson received the Doctor of Music degree in 2000. He has held teaching positions at SUNY Fredonia and at the University of Florida.

Dr. Engebretson's works have been performed in concerts, festivals and venues around the world, including Wien Modern (Vienna), Gaida Festival (Vilnius, Lithuania), Hörgänge Festival (Vienna), Filharmonia Hall (Bialystock, Poland), Ny Musikk (Bergen, Norway), Théâtre la Chapelle, (Montreal), Indiana State University New Music Festival (Terre Haute, IN), ISCM Festivals (Tirana, Albania and Baku, Azerbaijan), World Saxophone Congresses (Pesaro, Italy, Montreal) and Stockholm Radio. He has received numerous commissions from the Austrian Ministry of Culture as well as from STIM (Sweden) and the American Composers Forum Composers Commissioning Program.

As a performer, he was a member of the Vienna Saxophone Quartet from 1992-1999. In addition to performances all over the world with the quartet, he has performed in many countries as soloist with orchestra, in recital and as a chamber musician, particularly with Susan Fancher, Swedish percussionist Anders Astrand and the Chicago-based ensemble MeloManial.

Dr. Engebretson received a Fulbright Fellowship for studies in France with Jean-Marie Londeix (saxophone) and Michel Fuste-Lambezat (composition). His doctorate in music composition is from Northwestern University where he studied composition with M. William Karlins, Pauline Oliveros, Marta Ptaszynska, Michael Pisaro, Stephen Syverud and Jay Alan Yim and saxophone with Frederick Hemke. 



Sonata For Solo Flute

Jason Clark (b.1976)

Written in three days, the **Solo Sonata for Flute** is cast in the form of the Classical-era three-movement sonata (fast- slow- fast). The Sonata is dedicated to his wife, Emily.

The first movement has a slow introduction, followed by an allegro section which lays out the basic theme. It ends with a recapitulation of the slow introductory material and the allegro, concluding with a chromatic display.

The second movement, Lento e molto rubato, uses the Baroque techniques of inversion and cancrizans counterpoint to extend the implications of the opening motives. Careful listeners will note that the entire movement turns upon itself at the midpoint, in the manner revived from pre-Classical counterpoint by the twentieth-century second Viennese school led by Arnold Schoenberg.

The third movement is based on the idea of a descending scale pattern, similar to the Baroque chaconne or passacaglia. This opening motive is developed across the length of the movement, in various transformations and ornamentations, concluding in a stringendo passage implying an increasing tempo concluding with a high C.

String Quartet No. 1, f minor

Jason Clark (b.1976)

The **String Quartet, No. 1 in f minor**, is a four-movement work in the tonal idiom. Written over a span of seven months, it is Jason's most substantial work to date. It also represents his first full attempt at chamber writing (a short trio work for guitar, flute and double bass has been willfully suppressed).

The work opens with a tense introduction over a sustained 'cello pedal point. From this grows the first movement, in sonata form. This traditional structure is subverted to the demands of the music, as it reverses the return of each thematic idea. A short, chorale-like coda closes the movement while implying the direction of the next. The slow, second movement features the first violin in a song-like first theme, contrasted with a 'cello-led canon in the center. A slight programmatic reference has been implied, relating to the Hopewell Furnace Trail (itself the subject of a work-in-progress).

The Presto third movement uses a favorite texture, in the pizzicato strings supporting a melody. A rondo form, this melody is given to both violins and the 'cello, while the contrasting material is heard in a more contrapuntal texture. A short coda closes the movement while again preparing for the next movement.

The finale is in a free fugal form, showcasing the 'cello, viola and second violin in separate statements of the theme. It then is heard in a more conventional manner, in the violins again. The theme is finally heard in the key of f minor, the central tonality of the entire piece, in a rhythmically aggressive presentation. The work concludes with a canonic idea suggested during Mrs. Clark's work on the YSU production Two Rooms, where much of this movement was composed.

Jason Clark

Jason Clark, born 1976, is a junior at the Dana School of Music. A native of the Youngstown area, he has studied composition with Dr. Robert Rollin for four years. Other works performed at YSU include his Concerto for Oboe, Clarinet, Bassoon and Strings (2002's New Music Festival commissioned work), Three Pieces for Piano Quintet, and excerpts from a set of short pieces for oboe and clarinet.

A bassist, Jason has also studied at YSU with Tony Leonardi and Micah Howard. He recently performed Igor Stravinsky's L'Histoire du Soldat in an ensemble under the direction of Mr. William Slocum.


