DANIEL SHAPIRO

Daniel Shapiro began the study of piano at the age of six. His teachers have included Leon Fleisher, John Perry, Joanna Graudan, and Reginald Stewart. He earned his bachelor's degree, summa cum laude, from the University of Southern California and master's and doctoral degrees in piano performance from the Peabody Conservatory.

He has performed recitals across the United States, as well as in, Ireland, Spain, France, and at Amsterdam Concertgebouw. His concerto appearances include the National Symphony, the Sao Paulo State Symphony Orchestra, the Academy of London Orchestra, the Colorado National Repertory Orchestra and the Los Angeles Debut Orchestra.

Shapiro received the top prize in the William Kapell International Piano Competition, in addition to winning the American Pianists Association Beethoven Fellowship Award, the Joanna Hodges International Piano Competition, the Young Musician's Foundation Debut Competition, and the International Piano Recording Competition.

As a chamber musician, he has won the Coleman Chamber Music Competition and has participated at the Marlboro Music Festival, the Ravinia Festival and the Fellowship Program at Tanglewood. He is a member of the Brandeis-Bardin Trio, whose compact disc is released on the Harmonia Mundi label.

As a conductor, Shapiro has studied with Daniel Lewis, Victor Yampolsky, Fritz Zweig, Gustav Meier and Sheldon Morgenstern. He made his conducting debut at Tanglewood at the age of sixteen, where, two summers later, he was given a special award for Outstanding Achievement in Piano, Chamber Music, and Conducting.

Dr. Shapiro is currently on the piano faculty at the University of Iowa.

PROGRAM NOTES

Smetana Fanfare for Wind Ensemble was commissioned by the San Diego State University (SDSU) for the 1984 Festival of Music honoring the Czech State University (SDSU) for the 1984 Festival of Music honoring the Czech Composer Bedrich Smetana. It was first performed on April 3, 1984 in San composer Bedrich Smetana. It was first performed on April 3, 1984 in San composer by the SDSU Wind Ensemble, on the occasion of the centennial Diego by the SDSU Wind Ensemble, on the occasion of the centennial Celebration of Smetana's death. This short work uses two excerpts from celebration of Smetana's symphonic poem The Wallenstein's Camp, completed in 1859 in Smetana's Sweden, during his exile from Prague.

Variants on a Medieval Tune was commissioned by the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation for the Duke University Band, and was first performed by that band in April, 1963 under the baton of its conductor, Paul Bryan. The theme, "In dulci jubilo," has been used by many composers, including J.S. Bach, as the subject for a variety of musical works. After a brief introduction, the theme is clearly stated by several solo woodwind instruments. It then goes through five metamorphoses or "variants," strongly contrasting in tempo and character, and fully utilizing the timbral possibilities of the wind band.

As the title, Marche des Parachutistes Belges, indicates, the listener expects to hear a march with a European flavor. The thin scoring (for example: two piccolos and two oboes on the introduction, and bass clarinet and bassoon on the first melody) and the folk song idiom of the first strain soon confirm the European origin. At the trio, the same tune reappears as a counter melody to a smooth-flowing melody. The march was first heard on a recording by members of the Lamar University Band. Finding no music available in this country, assistance was eventually received through the American Embassy in Belgium, and a copy of the march was sent to Charles Wiley, the Lamar band director, who rearranged the march to fit American (and Texas!) band instrumentation.

Leemans wrote this work in 1945 after a dinner with a group of Belgian paratroopers. As their commander, Major Timmerman, drove him home that night, the march melody came to mind and he finished the other parts after reaching his home. As Leemans, explained, "Like all successful music, this tune came from my pen as water out of a fountain."

Skolion of Seikolos was written by California composer, Michael Kibbe, for solo oboe with wind and percussion accompaniment. The melodic content of this "Fantasy" is based on an ancient Greek drinking song, found inscribed on the tomb of Seikelos, in Asia Minor--dates from circa 100 B.C. The work was premiered by Michael Kibbe and the Santa Barbara City College Band in 1987.

The subtitle of Saint-Saens' Algerian Suite is "Picturesque Impressions of a Voyage to Algiers." Of its four movements, three are decidely oriental in coloring. The fourth, the Military March, is by contrast quite French; it was intended to emphasize the contrast found a Algiers between the native and the French settlements. In a note on the score, the composer emphasized the fact that he not only felt joyful at seeing French soldiers, but was conscious of the security he enjoyed under their protection.

Program Notes (Continued)

In Puszta, 4 Gypsy Dances, the young and talented Belgian composer, Jan Van der Roost, has constructed an exciting set of dances related to Slavonic folk music. The character and sounds are comparable to the Hungarian and Slavonic dances of Brahms and Dvorak, however, the tunes are newly composed, and not actually based on existing melodies.

Fiesta depicts the pageantry of Latin American celebrations--street bands, bull fights, and bright costumes. It is one of a group of five dances originally commissioned for the 25th anniversary of the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra. It was first performed by that orchestra in January, 1965. The composer then scored the work for band, and this arrangement was first performed in March, 1967, by the University of Miami Band, under the composer's direction.

PROGRAM NOTES

Revolution, Enlightenment, and Romanticism in Beethoven's Fifth Symphony

Inside the Sturm und Drang (storm and stress) of the French Revolution, there was a reconciliation of 18th century Enlightenment with 19th century Romanticism. The Enlightenment ideas of empirical and rational 18th certainly like the divine right of kings, and of the Natural Rights of the individual--those rights of life, liberty, and thinking, of the divine right of kings, and of the Natural Rights of the individual--those rights of life, liberty, and thinking, of the American Declaration of Independence in 1776, but even more passionately and happiness expounded in the American Declaration of the Pichte of Man and Civil 1776, but even more passionately and happiness of the French Declaration of the Rights of Man and Citizen in 1789-epitomized the Age of Reason vehemently in the French Declaration of the Rights of Man and Citizen in 1789-epitomized the Age of Reason

But from within this idea of Natural Rights, there emerged a revolutionary strain which would sway the European Continent, and indeed the world, for the next hundred years; the Sturm und Drang came to embody the Burden of the times. As the age of the good monarchs-Louis XIV in France, Maria Theresa in Austria, and Friedrich Wilhelm in Prussia--deteriorated into rule by their weak, yet excessive, successors, the French

Revolution exploded, enveloping all of Europe into its nationalistic and libertarian fervor.

Yet, for all its promises of freedom, the Revolution quickly spun recklessly out of control, spawning a cycle of tyranny and rebellion, eventually leading the French into the clutches of Napoleon Bonaparte and exactly the kind of dictatorship against which they had fought so diligently. By 1807-1808, when Beethoven wrote and premiered his Fifth Symphony, the Napoleonic regime ruled over most of Europe and was preparing to extend its oppressive reach throughout those areas over which it did not have ruling authority.

All was not lost, however. The drive for nationalism and the hope for freedom which drew the French into their Revolution originally still drove the Continent as a whole. The Revolution that began protesting the authority of the ancien regime and the First and Second Estates (the clergy and the monarchy) represented much more than a political protest. It signified a revolution in culture as well--"a distinct leap forward in the development of Western culture, a revolution in philosophy and in the arts favoring the individual spirit and soul. This was the good French Revolution; the other, with its millions of victims, was its late, misbegotten child." Hence, the drive toward 19th century Romanticism, that philosophy which expounded not only the Natural Rights of the Individual, but also the affirmation of his mind and spirit, found its place not only in the 1770's and Jean-Jacques Rousseau's Social Contract, but in the first decade of the 19th century and in the intellectual and cultural reformation ultimately emerging from the French Revolution--from the paintings of Jacques Louis David, from the poetry of Wordsworth, and perhaps most influentially, from the music of Beethoven.

In the Fifth Symphony then, Beethoven provides the revolutionary scheme: his four-note motif of "fate knocking at the door," which becomes, as Leonard Bernstein called it, "the whispering promise of things to come." It is that "whispering promise" of "fate" which inspires the Symphony, it permeates the movements, it provides the basic thematic material, and it indeed promises profound revolution.

And it is that promise which makes the Beethoven great. Not only does the Symphony's four-note motif promise an upheaval in music theory, not only does it promise an entirely new, Romantic, era in music history, but the Symphony promises the resolution of Beethoven's age--an age of Enlightenment, of Revolution, of Imagination. He promises both the triumph of the Enlightenment's Natural Rights and of Romanticism's Spirit and Imagination. It is a warning: we shall fight until we overthrow our oppressors.

By the second movement, Beethoven illustrates his promise clearly, revealing precious glimpses of the world to come. For Beethoven, it is a world of stateliness, of elegance, of beauty, yet it is also a world of liberty, equality, and fraternity; it is a glorious combination of the divine right of kings and the declaration of the rights of man. The brass sing the praises of the crown, the winds, the sweetness and light of liberation, and the strings, the testimony of their existence together. It is a dream complete, Beethoven's great vision of the possibility and perfection of the best of all possible worlds.

So in the third movement, the revolt begins. The four-note motif evolves into the musical voice of rebellion, always progressive, always forward, indeed, excelsior. The push never eases, it never ceases. Beethoven has answered the "whispering promise of things to come" with open revolution. The heroic strik in the horns spreads to the strings and then throughout the orchestra until it reaches within all voices to bring forth a shout, an audacious exclamation of human virtue. Nothing will silence the voices short of triumph.

Then, ultimately, the triumph springs forth. Beethoven opens his forth movement to a full orchest, chorus, a celebration of nationalism and freedom.

And it is a celebration; the Fifth Symphony reaches its climax in the fourth movement, prophesying but the end of political oppression as well as the dawning of the Romantic movement in music. It is a triumple indeed—Beethoven takes the original four-note motif and transforms it into a brilliant affirmation of the liberating spirit of man. The dominating ancien regime has fallen, the Napoleonic dictatorship is beginning to teeter along the edges of its self-made abyss; Beethoven knows that the time has come, that the "good French Revolution" will not signify simply upheaval and despair, but that ultimately, it will come to symbolize a new age, one in which the only limits placed upon man will be the limits of his imagination. It is a crowning moment for Romanticism; it is a crowning moment for mankind. Emerging inside such a momentous explosion, the Fig. Symphony inspires and invigorates music for the next century. It is part vindication, part declaration, of freedom, and of free man.

Spiritual Liberation in Strauss' Death and Transfiguration

When he was only 25, Richard Strauss saw Richard Wagner's opera, Tristen und Isolde, for the firm time. Becoming enamored with the Liebestod (Love-Death) theme that supplied the opera's emotional base, i inspired the talented young composer to develop the same idea in a symphonic poem of his own. The result we Death and Transfiguration, an incredibly mature composition that dealt solely with the most fundamental questions of human existence—death and its meaning, and the world beyond.

Set in four parts, *Death and Transfiguration* begins with the dying man's heartbeat and his Happy Memories of Childhood. Confronted by his own mortality, the dying man struggles to recall the happiness of his youth. From his memory, his childhood emerges, a happier time, a shaft of light and Life within his moment of darkness and Death.

And then the Life and Death struggle begins. Death fiercely springs forth, nearly engulfing the dying man, but still there is Life in him. Inside the Death, the memories of Life, still strong, are fading quickly. The can give the dying man only a little comfort before Death takes him.

But in his Dreams of Dying, the dying man finds comfort. He glimpses the sway of infinity, the light that transcends the darkness; he knows, for perhaps the first time, of the immortality of his own soul. With the knowledge, the dying man can release himself from Life, from the Happiness of his youth, and submit to Death since he knows that all is not futile, that Transfiguration awaits. His heartbeat ceases; he gives in to Death.

And Death takes him, unforgivingly, but quickly, its explosion transforming itself into the Transfiguration within which the soul can release itself from the boundaries of Life and enter into the liberating hereafter.

The Transformation begins slowly, the dying man's soul gradually awakening from its corporeal sleep. It is a steady rise into liberation, into the spiritual realm which the dying man foresaw. The shafts of light is found in his Dreams do indeed enlighten the darkness. Transcending the boundaries of his body, the man is taken, in his joy, enlightened by a vision of heaven, and begins his Transfiguration, ascending from the shallow font of corporeality to the depths of spiritual realization, his Dream no longer simply the intimations of his immortality, but indeed the echo of his transformation to the realm of angels.

PROGRAM NOTES

Victor Ullmann (1898-1944) was a student of Schoenberg in Vienna. He moved to Prague as a conductor at the German Opera assisting Alexander von Zemlinsky. Ullmann was one of several successful levish composers imprisoned in the Terezenstadt Ghetto. The Nazis allowed performance of chamber music, levish composers, and even a new music studio for propaganda purposes. After filming camp activities orchestral music, opera, and even a new music studio for propaganda purposes. After filming camp activities for the propaganda film, The Fuhrer Gives a City to the Jews, inmates were sent by train to their deaths in for the propaganda film. The Third Quartet is a masterpiece. It is one continuous movement in five parts with opening material returning in the final rondo.

Ed Sallustio is a junior composition major at Dana. The title of his piece refers to a famous rock guitarist.

Jaco van der Merwe, Graduate Assistant in Composition and Theory, is a South African composer working on a Masters degree while on leave from a faculty position at Potchefstrom University. The bedground to his composition, *Ten/Four* for violin, bassoon, and piano is as follows: "I'd prefer to die to the sounds of childish laughter than to the sound of Chopin's 'Funeral March.' And let me tell you this: all the evil in the world is in that 'Funeral March,' which is a glorification of death. If there were fewer funeral marches there might perhaps be fewer deaths." -- Immortality -- Milan Kundera

On April 10, 1993, Chris Hani, a prominent South African political leader, was assassinated in front of his home in Johannesburg by right-wing radicals. In the days following the event, chaos erupted on the Witwatersrand and in other parts of the country with mass demonstrations leading to carnage and violence.

Michael Pepe is a senior composition major. The *Trio* is a lively work using whole-tone and extended tertian harmony.

Henri Dutilleux (b. 1916) is a talented French composer who attended the Paris Conservatory and taught at L' Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris. Figures de Résonances is a rather experimental work employing cluster-like sonorities in an interesting musical tapestry.

Robert Rollin's Two Contrasts for Two Pianos was commissioned by the Ehlen/Oltmanns Duo with the support of the College of Fine and Performing Arts, Youngstown State University. It received its world premiere at the Los Angeles Museum of Art, August 27, 1995. "Nocturne of Changes," the first movement, uses bell-like sounds to create a sense of distance. The two pianos may be physically separated to accentuate the exchange of musical ideas that generate form and content, so that in addition to bell changes, the concepts of musical change and exchange are explored. Musical flow is derived from that peculiarly English tradition of change ringing, bell music created by a precision team of rope pullers working with arcane sequences. "Dinu's Mysterious Rag," the second movement, was originally composed for the New York University Chamber Players and was premiered by them at the Gubbio International Festival in Italy in summer, 1990. The title refers to Dinu Ghezzo, the conductor of the ensemble. The mystery lies in the harmonies used in the piece. The new version, done especially with the sensitive playing of the Ehlen/Oltmanns Duo in mind, exploits the sophisticated possibilities of the two pianos fully by using various doubled as well as soloistic textures.

Bela Bartok (1881-1945), one of the foremost composers in the twentieth century, was also an exceptional concert pianist and scholar of Eastern European folk music. He escaped the Nazi persecution of Hungarian experimental composers and continued his career in the United States. The Sonata for Two Pianos and Percussion (1938) was written shortly before Bartok's emigration in a style more accessible to general audiences than that of his early works. It is a work of major proportions and is popular with audiences.

ABOUT THE NEW MUSIC SOCIETY

The New Music Society was founded in 1983 to encourage performance, access creation and discussion of new music of all styles by living composers. Under the direct Professor Robert Rollin, the society's season consists of evening concerts and the international Music Festival to be held this Spring, from April 16 to 20, 1996. Performers at the concerts are composers.

The Composers Ensemble, the resident ensemble of the McDonough Museum of Antifounded in 1985 for the purpose of performing music of a variety of styles by living composers. Composers Ensemble performs music by Ohio composers and by featured visiting American internationally known composers.

The Festival Chamber Orchestra is made up of talented professional performents. Northeast Ohio and Western Pennsylvania. The Orchestra presents music by guest composed faculty at the festival.

The New Music Society is supported by YSU, YSU Student Government, The Ohio Council, The College of Fine and Performing Arts, the Dana School of Music and individual contributors. Watch for our new compact disc recording Music in Mexico coming in 1996!

PROGRAM NOTES

Mozart chose to set Beaumarchais' Le Marriage de Figaro to music in 1785 as an opera, notwithstanding certain political obstacles imposed by Emperor Joseph II of Mozart employed the court poet Lorenzo da Ponte to transcribe the work into Austria. The majority of the work on Figaro was completed in October and November of 1785, with certain elements of social criticism still included within the context of the opera but without the definite prospect of a performance. Eventually, da Ponte pleaded with the Emperor to grant a performance of Mozart's new opera — a performance that would occur on Mayday of 1786. The famous Overture became a standard piece in the symphonic repertoire, while the opera itself represented a tremendous leap forward in the history and development of the opera genre.

Handel wrote "Let the Bright Seraphim" as a final added aria for his opera, Samson, of 1743. Written for the soprano Christina Avoglio and the trumpeter Valentine Snow, who were respectively considered some of the best performers of the Baroque period, Handel exploited the contrasting timbres of the soprano and trumpet, using repetition of themes to accentuate their delightful unity while celebrating the triumphs of the biblical Samson.

When he wrote Tannhaüser and the Contest of Song on the Wartbug, Richard Wagner himself premiered the opera at Dresden in 1845, shortly before he left for France during the Revolutions of 1848. The Overture became so overwhelmingly popular almost immediately, both in the opera house and on the concert stage, that Wagner suplied a description of the ideas he meant to portray: "At first the orchestra introduces us to the Pilgrim's Chorus alone. It approaches, swells to a mighty outpouring and finally passes into the distance. — Twilight: dying echoes of the chorus. — As night falls, magic visions show themselves. A rosy mist floats up, exultant shouts assail our ears and the whirling of a fearfully voluptuous dance are seen. These are the seductive spells of the "Venusberg," which show themselves by night to those whose souls are fired by bold, sensuous longing....A slender man's figure draws near: it is Tannhaüser, the minstrel of Love. He sings his proudly jubilant chant of love...as if to force voluptuous magic to come to him....As if in response to his call, all the wonders of Venusberg are revealed to him...But already morning dawns: from the distance the Pilgrim's Chorus is heard again. As the chant draws nearer and nearer and daylight replaces night...the sun rises in splendor, and the pilgrim's chant proclaims joy to all the world...Salvation won. He song rings out the tidings of sublime rejoicing. The carol of Venusberg, redeemed from the curse of impiousness, mingles with the hymn of God. So wells and leaps each pulse of life in the chorus of redemption; and both dissevered elements, the soul and the sense, God and Nature, are united in the atoning his of hallowed Love."

During the second half of the 18th century, composers revived the art of writing for trumpet, which had earlier fallen somewhat out of favor. Bach's Second Brandent Concerto and Handel's extensive use of the instrument in Water Music, Fireworks, and even Messiah immediately re-popularized the trumpet and music. But in 1796, the trumpet resurgence got its greatest boost. Having just return from his second trip to England, Franz Joseph Haydn was introduced to Weidinger's new invention—the trumpet "de la cour," which Weidinger, the Viene Court Trumpeter had adapted in order to gain mastery of a wider chromatic series maintain better intonation. Realizing the potential of the new instrument, Having proposed the Concerto for Trumpet, perhaps the greatest of all his Concertos.

In 1905, Maurice Ravel was asked to set several Greek folk songs to paraccompaniment. Normally, Ravel took extensive periods of time to complete to compositions, but he managed to complete the piano accompaniment to the Mélodies populaires grecques in only 36 hours. When he later orchestrated the insongs for full orchestra, the songs' relationship to the larger picture of contemporary French music became clear. The similarities between Ravel's Cinq Mélodies and Joseph Cantloube's Chants d'Auvergne, a collection of French folk songs set to orchestral accompaniment, provided a previously unmade link between the managed to contemporary French musical schools.

Asked to write a festive composition for the "All Russian Art and Industrial Exhibition of 1881 either for the opening ceremonies, the 25th anniversary of Czar Alexande III reign, or for the consecration of the Church of Savior, Tchaikovsky at first refuse expressing his distaste for such a program as well as his underlying distress concents music (especially his) for any such occasion. However, in late 1880, Tchaikovsky finally relented and began work on the composition. Using a traditional Russian for song, a Russian Orthodox chorale, the "Marsellaise," and the Russian Imperial anther, he wrote the extravagant Overture 1812, a grand nationalistic piece tracing its program to the Czar Alexander I's defeat of Napoleon and France in Moscow in 1812. It interspersing the various themes throughout the Overture, Tchaikovsky recreated and Battle of Moscow through sound, constantly varying the themes until finally to Orthodox chorale and Russian Imperial Anthem triumphs over the France "Marsellaise." It became immediately popular, having been quickly adapted into the Russian nationalism and pan-Slavism that enraptured the Russian people in the last for decades of the 19th century.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

In the fall of 1994, Dr. Margery McDuffie joined the music faculty at the University of Alabama in Huntsville where she teaches studio piano, class piano and appreciation.

A native of Macon, Georgia, Dr. McDuffie has performed throughout the United States as piano soloist and chamber musician. At the request of former Supreme Court Justice Harry A. Blackmun, she performed at the United States Supreme Court With a strong interest in making classical music accessible to people of all ages listening experiences, she has performed a series of outreach programs throughout cities in Georgia, California and Iowa. She has performed at the World Congrectives in Atlanta for the Georgia Music Hall of Fame Awards Ceremony and Georgia Governor's Mansion with brother Robert McDuffie, international acclaimed violinist, with whom she frequently collaborates. She has appeared soloist with the Macon, GA Symphony. In February she performed the Grieg Pin Concerto with the Bremerton, WA Symphony. This spring she has recitals scheduled in Georgia, Alabama and Ohio.

Margery McDuffie is one of three Founding Artists of the Pacific Music Alliance which was organized in response to a need for community-based music enrichment programs. These interactive concerts permit Pacific Music Alliance artists to cross the barriers that often exist between a performer and the audience. Dr. McDuffie is featured on Pacific Music Alliance's audio-cassette tape, and will be featured in a upcoming video about Pacific Music Alliance. This video will be given airtime on PBS stations nationwide.

During the summers she is a member of the music faculty at MidSummer Macon, arts festival in Macon, Georgia. She has been an Assistant Lecturer in piano at the University of Southern California where she completed her Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in piano performance. At USC, Dr. McDuffie studied with renowned pianis and teacher John Perry and was named the most outstanding 1994 piano doctors graduate. She received her Master of Music degree from USC, and her Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music where she studied with Frank Weinstock.

Dr. McDuffie is a member of the Music Teachers National Association and has been a special panelist at the National Conventions in 1990 and 1994. In 1987 she was named "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was inducted in the Golden Key National Honor Society.

Program Notes

Festival Prelude was written in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of Enid, Oklahoma Tri-State Music Festival and was first performed by the University Band with Alfred Reed conducting. The music is built up from one main theme and two fanfare-like figures that occur strely from one main theme and two fanfare-like figures that occur strughout the score. The scoring of this work embraces the modern concept integrated symphonic band with the brasses separated into three of the color groups (brass, woodwind, and percussion); the woodwind writing distinct centered around the clarinet choir.

The Biblical story of Joshua and the Battle of Jericho is a familiar one. In pericho Rhapsody Gould uses jazz rhythms and modern chords, antiphonal and heavy percussion to emphasize the various programmatic managements. Moving without pause, the rhapsody begins with the Prologue, with the Roll Call, Chant, Dance, March and Battle, Joshua's Trumpets, The Walls Cam Tumblin' Down, and concludes with a victorious fallelujah.

Norwegian Rhapsody, written in 1979, is based on six old Norse folk melodies. Two of these are Halling tunes (the Halling is a lively, capering dance; a sort of Fling). The work commences with a the first Halling tune, then, after a brief massition a soft, quiet lullaby, "Bissam, Bissam Baadne" appears. The maining selections are "The Landsman and His Mare," "Eg Beisla Min Styvel-Rakvend Sadt," and "Surendalen Wedding Day."

guite of Old American Dances, composed in 1950, is an original composition for concert band in which the composer seeks to set the mood of a Saturday night harn dance with all the happiness and excitement which festivity demands. Bennett strives to recall several of the characteristic dances remembered from his childhood. The goal is achieved in a genuine piece of music--not a novelty is one might expect from such a setting. Bennett has described the music as 'native American dance forms. . . treated in a 'riot' of instrumentation colors," and the composition is distinguished by superb effectiveness of instrumental writing and facile flow of musical ideas. The dances include: Cake Walk Schottische, Western One-Step, Wallflower Waltz, and Rag.

After learning many hard lessons through experience in the managing of band concerts and the publishing of his music, Sousa entered into a contract with John Church Company to publish his music on a royalty basis. Whereas formerly he had sold his music outright for nominal amounts only to see the publisher make handsome profits, he could now realize some profit for timself. The Liberty Bell was the first of his marches to be published under the new arrangement, and it became, and still is, one of the most popular of Sousa's marches. The Liberty Bell netted him over \$40,000 in less than seven tears. The title resulted from 1.) Sousa and manager seeing a huge painting of the Liberty during a show in Chicago, 2.) a letter from Sousa's wife the next morning telling how their son had marched in a parade honoring the Liberty bell, and 3.) Sousa's unashamed patriotism which predisposed him toward any tille with a nationalistic ring.

Morton Gould's (1913-1995) music is unique in its Americanism and in the seemingly endless wealth of creativity displayed by the composer. Like much of his music, American Salute is semi-serious in nature, and reflects uncanny skill in thematic development. Using only "When Johnny Marching Home Again" for melodic resources, he contrives a brilliant originally written and transcribed for wind band, American Salute has become a program favorite for both instrumental mediums.

In Portrait of a Trumpet, Sammy Nestico provides this pleasant "mood" piece that exploits the colors of the full band with trumpet solo. The solo part requires solid musicianship including experience in jazz performance. The mood and style are largely legato with emphasis on musical blend, balance, and nuance. This evening's soloist is Thomas Resnick, a senior music education major and winner of the 1996 Symphonic Wind Ensemble Concerto Audition.

Australian composer, David Stanhope, has written a series of new compositions for the wind band. The compositional style demonstrated by Stanhope is reminiscent of the Australian composer, Percy Grainger, and Folksongs for Band No. 3, published in 1996, has a definitive connection to the Grainger masterwork, Lincolnshire Posy. Stanhope presents three movements in this composition. The first, "Droylsden Wakes," is a beautiful and free-flowing folksong which incorporates interesting harmonic treatment of a simple melody; uses a variety of timbral combinations in addition to homophonic scoring; and includes varying beat lengths to typify the performance style of folk singers.

The second movement, "Lord Bateman," is a complex movement which explores unique orchestration ideas as well as a number of rhythmic modulations. The finale to this selection, "Three Ships and Lisbon," includes the popular Christmas song and the melody from the opening movement of Grainger's Lincolnshire Posy. These pieces are superimposed and cleverly treated throughout the movement. Stanhope uses bagpipe-sounding compositional devices in this closing section.

Three main ideas bind Husa's Music for Prague, 1968 together. The first and most important is an old Hussite war song from the 15th century, "Ye Warriors of God and His Law," a symbol of resistance and hope for hundreds of years, whenever fate lay heavy on the Czech nation. It has been utilized by many Czech composers, including Smetana in My Country. The beginning of this religious song is announced very softly in the first movement by the timpani and concludes in a strong unison (Chorale). The song is never used in its entirety.

The second idea is the sound of bells throughout the work. Prague, also named the "City of Hundreds of Towers," has used its magnificently-sounding church bells as calls of distress as well as calls of victory. The last idea is a motif of three chords first appearing very softly under the piccolo solo at the beginning of the piece in flutes, clarinets, and horns. Later it reappears at extremely strong dynamic levels, for example in the middle of the Aria.
