PROGRAM NOTES

Seven Sound-Images on Seven Stanzas by a Child was witten over twenty years ago, and has had many performances in the United States, Europe, New Zealand, Mexico and South Africa. It was inspired by a poem written by a 14-year old child inmate of the Terezin Concentration Camp.

During the Second World War, the Terezin Concentration Camp served as a kind of way station to Auschwitz and other extermination centers, and was meant to be a model camp which foreigners could be shown. Chamber music, orchestra and opera were permitted by the Nazis. The child who wrote this poem was one of the prisoners at the camp, and it appears that he was describing his thoughts at a concert set up, perhaps, to impress some visiting neutralist dignitaries.

It is suggested that the poem be read silently while the piece is in progress. There are five main divisions in both the poem and the music as follows: Stanzas one and two--three--four--five--six and seven.

*Gideon Klein (1919-1945) was a talented composer/pianist among the talented musicians in the camp. He died in Fürstengrube Concentration Camp. A recent resurgence of interest in his music has resulted in many CD recordings of his small, but significant musical output.

The "Largo ma non troppo" from the Concerto for Two Violins of J.S. Bach is a highly expressive movement in 12/8 time. The dialogue between the two instruments often produces marvelous echo effects.

Gwyneth Rollin will be featured violinist on Robert Rollin's Lyric Counterpoint on a Theme by Warshawsky for violin and pianos which recently had its world premiere by the Cleveland Duo in Toronto, and its U.S. premiere in Cleveland by the same ensemble. Mark W. Warshawsky (1849-1907) was a traveling bard who performed extensively in late nineteenth century Russia and Poland. He also composed for the Yiddish theater. His melody, "Eyfin Pripetchuk" (By the Fireside), took on the importance of a traditional folk song, and was sung by Jews throughout Europe in times of distress. The song as played by violinist Itzhak Perlman was used on the sound track of the movie [Shindler's List]. The text pictures a school master with his young students huddled in front of the warm hearth in the school house. As he drills them on the alphabet, he tells them "all the beautiful things of the world can be found in these letters, but they are also full of tears."

Ernesto Nazareth (1863-1934) wrote many popular songs and dance pieces which have become part of Brazil's musical legacy. The two Tango's performed here are lively, and have the captivating rhythmic and harmonic changes so characteristic of Nazareth's music.

The "Vivace" from Bach's Concerto for Two Violins is a rapid, intense movement. Imitation takes place between the two violins at the phrase level so that there is a constant, intricate, yet driving counterpoint supported by other orchestral imitative and free entrances throughout.

Rondinella is one of a number of performing groups at the Academie voor Musiek en Woord, in the cities of Knokke-Heist, Belguim. The Academie is an evening school for music and theater, and is funded by the Belgian national government. About seven hundred thirty students attend this academie. In this particular area of Belgium there are about one hundred ten such music schools in operation.

The members of Rondinella rehearse three hours per week and most receive training on a musical instrument, vocal training, chamber music and solfege singing. The group has performed across Europe, including performances with the National Orchestra of Belguim, a performance for Her Royal Highness Princess Paola in Antwerp, and numerous concerts in Vienna, Salzburg, Graz, Budapest, Versailles, Paris, and Stockholm. They are planning the release of a compact disc of their recent performances.

The Ehlen-Oltmanns Piano Duo: Caroline Oltmanns and Timothy Ehlen

NOTES

In the early part of the 19th century, Achim von Arnim and Clemens von Bretano published three volumes of old German folk songs titled, Des Knaben Wunderhorn (The Youth's Magic Horn). Many famous German composers have set at least part of these texts to music including: Mahler, Brahms, Strauss, Schönburg, Schumann, and many others.

This selection written in 1934, is set by Alexander von Zemlinsky (1871-1942). This charming piece tells of the mischievous doings of a tiny crooked man, and explains why some things still go bump in the night (even for grown-up children).

Das bucklichte Männlein - The Gnome (from Des Knaben Wunderhorn)

There's a tiny crooked man Standing in my little garden. If I go to water it. He scares me with his sneezing. If I go to make my soup In my little kitchen. There's a tiny crooked man Leaving with my saucepan. When I go back to my room Just to eat some porridge, There I see the little man-He's already eating! Sitting at my spinning wheel, Little threads I'm turning; When the tiny crooked man Makes the wheel stop running.

Alexander von Zemlinsky (1871-1942)

When I go to make my bed In my little corner,
There I hear the tiny man Who is always laughing.
On my little bench I kneel
When it's time for praying,
Here I see the little man,
Who is always talking;
"Please, dear child,
Say a prayer,
For the tiny crooked man!"

Die Versuchungen des Heiligen Antonius (1984/85): [The Temptations of Saint Anthony]

This work is based on the novel *La Temptation de Saint Antoine* by Gustave Flaubert. The work describes one night in the life of St. Anthony. While praying, to saint struggles to fend off numerous temptations. The underlying idea of the piece lends itself to the form of theme and variations because the chant theme is inflicted by the various temptations which he experiences.

Introduction: The desert on the upper river Nile at sunset, high rocks, echoe of the last bird voices.

Theme: Anthony at his evening prayer.

Var. 1: Beginning unrest of Anthony.

Var. 2: The prayer theme appears distorted in an ugly way. Var. 3: The prayer theme appears temptingly and beautifully.

Now Anthony encounters different visions depicted in episodes with themes for episode:

episode: Demons, spirits and disgusting creatures.

Var. 4: Anthony tries to deter these appearances through prayer.

episode: The Queen of Saba with grand seduction.

Var. 5: Again Anthony tries to fend off the visions.

episode: Tibetan Buddha in meditation.

episode: Indian dance-girls.

Var. 6: Anthony resumes his prayer, but all temptations come upon him simultaneously. This variation flow into the next section.

Development: More and more visions torture him; Anthony has visions of Christians and tortures. He collapses.

Epilogue: First dawn; sunrise. "From the disc of the sun the face of Jesus Christ shines brightly. Saint Anthony makes the sign of the cross and resumes his prayer." (Fiaubert, end of the novel.)

German composer Wolfgang-Andreas Schultz was born in Hamburg, Germany on September 7, 1948. He studied musicology, philosophy and German linguistics as well as theory and composition in Hamburg. His main influence was teacher György Ligeti, and he became Ligeti's assistant at the university in 1977. In 1988 he accepted a Professorship at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater in Hamburg. Numerous awards include the Bach-Preis-Stipendium der Stadt Hamburg as well as the Walter Scheel Preis.

His music is influenced by Debussy, Ravel and Richard Strauss, in additional Italian opera. His compositions include compositional techniques of the Second Viennese School [Schoenberg, Webern and Berg] and influences from Far-Eastern musical sonorities. Wolfgang-Andreas Schultz has written numerous stage and orchestral works, as well as chamber music for various instrumental combinations.

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



Benjamin Britten was one of this century's most prolific and composers. His works dominate 20th century opera, oratorio, song, and symphonic music. He has be called the greatest setter of English text since Purcell. In the early 1940's, Britten arranged six volumes of English, Irish, and Scottish folksong for voice and piano. The folksongs, rich in folk history and, combined with Britten's unique style, have been a treasured source of recital material since their first publication. The Salley Gardens is first song of Folksong Arrangements, Vol. 1. This song tells of a young man's love for woman, and the subsequent end of their romance when he does not heed her advice to "take love easy".

In the early part of the 19th century, Achim von Arnim and Clemens von Bretano public three volumes of old German folk songs titled, Des Knaben Wunderhorn (The Youth's Magic For Many famous German composers have set at least part of these texts to music including: Mahle, Brahms, Strauss, Schönburg, Schumann, and many others.

This selection written in 1934, is set by Alexander von Zemlinsky (1871-1942). This charming piece tells of the mischievous doings of a tiny crooked man, and explains why some testill go bump in the night (even for grown-up children).

PROGRAM NOTES

Zo Elliotts *British Eighth March* stands as one of the classic concert marches in the repertory for wind band. The piece was written for and dedicated to the members of the immortal British Eighth Army, and it was accepted for them by General Sir Benach and the beautiful and lyrical trio make it a staple of concert programs around globe.

Born on October 21, 1921 at Northampton, England, Sir Malcolm Arnold today ency the reputation in his native land as the most uninhibited of all England's contemporary composers. He was a trumpet player in the BBC Orchestra and in the London Philharmonic, prior to his decision to be, strictly, a composer in 1948. Tam o'Shante (not to be confused here with the Scottish woolen cap) is the title and hero of a poen by the Scottish poet, Robert Burns (1759-1796). He is a drunken farmer who, while riding home late from Ayr, in a stormy night, disturbed a witch's party in the haunted church of Alloway. The hags pursued him to the keystone of the bridge over the river Doon, but had to stop there as they could not cross running water. One which, however, plucked the tail from his mare, Maggie.

The poem concludes with the following admonition:

"Now, wha' this tale o'truth shall read, Ilk man and mother's son, take heed: Whene'er to drink you are inclin'd, Or cutty-sarks run in your mind, Think, ye may buy the joys o'er dear, Remember Tam o'Shanter's mare.

The Second Suite, composed in 1911, uses English folk songs and folk dance tunes throughout, being written at a time when Holst needed to rest from the strain of original composition. The suite has four movements, each with its own distinctive character. The opening march movement uses three tunes, set in the pattern ABCAB. Tune As a lively morris dance, a Renaissance dance style. Tune B, Swansea Town, is a broad and lyrical piece played initially by the euphonium. The third tune, Claudy Banks, is distinctly different from the other two with a lilting, swing feeling derived from its compound duple (6/8) meter

The second movement is a slow, tender setting of an English love song, I'll Love My Love. It is a sad tune with words which tell of two lovers separated by their parents, and of the deep love they will always have for each other. The Song of the Blacksmannia is complex, rhythmically, much of it being in septuple meter. It demonstrates Holst's inventive scoring with a lively rhythm being played on the blacksmith's anvil The Dargason is an English country dance and folk song dating at least from the 16th century. Its peculiar property is that it does not really have an end but keeps repealing endlessly, almost like a circle. Holst combines this with a well known tune, Green Sleaves, with a complex superimposition of 6/8 and 3/4 meter.

Daniel in the Lions Den was written for and dedicated to Daniel Perantoni and was premiered in March of 1992 by Mr. Perantoni and the U.S. Air Force Band, Col. The work is an attempt to create a Eastman School of Music in 1962-63. The work is an attempt to create a contemporary Herbert L. Clarke solo for tuba.

In Children's March, Over the Hills and Far Away, cast in a sunny, care-free mood, Grainger has carried into practice certain theories with regard to scoring for the military band. Grainger was of the opinion that it is in the lower octaves of the band and from the larger members of the reed families that the greatest expressivity is to be looked for, and consequently we find in his Children's March a more liberal and more highly specialized use of such instruments as the bassoons, English horn, bass clarinet, contra-bassoon, and the lower saxophones than is usual in writing for military band. The march was first performed by the Goldman Band in 1919 and was recorded in its original form by the same band with the composer at the piano.

Blue Bells of Scotland is one of the many virtuostic solo works written by the legendary Arthur Pryor. This arrangement for tuba solo is by Ohio native, Tucker Jolly. The composition is in classic theme and variation style and shows off, handsomely, the technical and musical proficiency of Professor Turk. Many of the Arthur Pryor trombone and Herbert L. Clarke cornet solos were written for and used by the touring professional bands of the late 19th and early 20th century (e.g. the Goldman and Sousa bands). These solo masterpieces are still used in concerts and recitals throughout the world.

The Enigma Variations were written for orchestra in 1888 and bore the dedication, "To My Friends Pictured Within." The theme and fourteen variations belong to that period in which Elgar developed the style that placed him in the front rank of English composers. The immediate success of the opus can be attributed in part to its programmatic characterics, but the fact that the work has lived and continues to bring enjoyment to audiences is due to the contrasting moods and to Elgar's masterful writing for instruments. Earl Slocum has selected six variations for his transcription.

The theme is pliable, plastic and expressive in itself, tender and noble. Variation I (C.A.E.) is a study of the composer's wife, Caroline Alice Elgar. Variation II (W.M.B.) marches in with the furious energy of the country squire, William M. Baker. Variation III (R.P.A.) takes as its subject a son of Matthew Arnold. Variation IV (G.R.S.) is George S. Sinclair, organist of Hereford Cathedral. Variation V is called Nimrod. Nimrod is the great hunter of the Bible; "hunter" in German is "Jaeger." So the subject is A.J. Jaeger, publisher. Variation VI (E.D.U.) is known only to Elgar's closest friends. Said to depict his strugglings and energies, the work is nevertheless concluded nonprogrammatically so that it caps the series of variations in a broad, triumphant presentation of the original theme in major.

ABOUT THE GUEST SOLOIST

JOHN TURK has appeared across the country as a recital artist and clinician. He made his New York debut in 1975 with a solo recital in Carnegie hall. Recognized at one of the nation's leading proponents of new music for the tuba, he has commissioned a large number of new works for the instrument. Glenn Smith, David Bernstein, Robert Rollin, Gene Nichols, Jose Serebier, and others have received the premiere performances on his recitals. He was a member of the quartet which premiered Gunther Schuller's landmark Five Moods for Tuba Quartet at the First International Tuba/Euphonium Symposium in 1973. His most recent commission, a work for solo tuba and bell choir by Gene Nichols, will be premiered in the fall of 1992 Mr. Turk has appeared as a soloist at the Midwest Bandmasters Convention, the American Society of University Composers National Conventions, the Ohio Music Educators State Conventions and has performed as a featured soloist at State and National Conventions of the Tubists Universal Brotherhood Association.

A native of Wilmington, Delaware, Mr. Turk holds degrees from Baldwin-Wallace College and Indiana University. While at Indiana University he held two graduate fellowships and was awarded the University's coveted Performer's Certificate. He has studied with William Bell, Harvey Phillips, Keith Brown, Chester Schmitz, and Ronale Bishop. In 1967 and 1968 he was an Arthur Fromm Fellow performing with the Berkshire Festival Orchestra at the Tanglewood Music Center. He had also periomed with the United States Army Band in Washington, D.C., the National Orchestral Society of New York, and the Blossom Music Festival Band. Mr. Turk has performed under such noted conductors as Sir Adrian Boult, Jorge Mester, Aaron Copland, Erich Leinsdorf, and David Effron.

John Turk has been principal tuba of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra since 1972. During his tenure with the orchestra he has been featured as soloist on both to Masterworks Series and on Pops Concerts as well as the inevitable performances of Tubby the Tuba on Children's Concerts.

Professor of Music and Director of Financial Aid, John Turk has been a member of the faculty of the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University since 1972. In addition to teaching tuba and euphonium he, for eleven years, directed the Dana Contemporary Music Ensemble. He also instituted and teaches one of the nation's first college-level courses in the history of rock-and-roll music. He has appeared as soloist with the Youngstown State University Wind Ensemble on numerous occasions performing; Helix by Warren Benson (1978), The Survival by Glenn Smith (88), Concerto for Bass Tuba by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1990), and Symphonic Varians by James Curnow (1994). "Low Blows!" his CD of solo and chamber works for the tuba, was nominated for a 1993 Grammy Award. Mr. Turk's recently completed histor of the Dana School of Music; The Musical Danas of Warren, Ohio Their Institute and Elegacy, is in the final phase of editing and will soon be offered for publication.

ABOUT THE GUEST CONDUCTOR

JOSEPH EDWARDS, Director of the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University, joined the faculty in 1969 after his tenure at Morningside College, Sioux University, Joined his appointment to the Dana School of Music, his responsibilities City, Iowa. Since his appointment to the Dana School of Music, his responsibilities City, Iowa included the teaching of clarinet and saxophone, and directing the symphonic, nave included marching bands.

Professor Edwards received a Bachelor of Music Education from YSU, a Master of Music Performance as a Woodwind Specialist from Michigan State University, and pursued doctoral studies at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

Having appeared frequently as guest soloist and clinician with high school and college ensembles, Professor Edwards has also performed with the American Wind Symphony, Sioux City Symphony, Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Concert Band, Blossom Festival Band, and the Cleveland Symphonic Winds. He was awarded the Distinguished Professor of Music Award at YSU in 1988 and the prestigious Watson Award at YSU in 1996. Currently, he performs with the Warren Chamber Orchestra and the Dana Woodwind Quintet.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

Youngstown State University. He earned the Doctor of Education in Music at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Prior to this study he was the Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS), for three years, and for nine years he was the band director at Auburn High School (NY). At YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and he co-directs the Marching Pride and the Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting and music education courses.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has written a number of musical arrangements and compositions for concert band, jazz ensemble, and marching band and percussion, and has been published in the Kansas Music Review Journal, the National Band Association Journal, and the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRIAD. His many professional credits include serving as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for All-state, sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchrestras throughout the northeast and midwest. Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble will perform at the 1998 OMEA State Music Convention in Columbus and recently performed at the College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. His bands have also performed at All-State festivals in New York and Kansas.

In addition to his teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngston Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; also, he served the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter. His biography was listed in the fourth edition of Who's Who Among America's Teachers.





PHILIP THOMSON, pianist

Born in Saint John, New Brunswick, Canada, Philip Thomson received his early training with Carol O'Neil until he went to the University of Toronto, where his teacher was Pierre Sound Subsequently he studied at New York's Juilliard School under Abbey Simon. While there, he was the school's Liszt competition, and performed the Liszt Concerto #1 in Alice Tully Hall, Lincol Center with the Juilliard Orchestra. Before he finished his studies he had already concertized in Canada, both in solo recitals and concerto performances. He has since played with all of Canada with the Juilliard Thomson's "profound musicianship" (Classical Music Magazine, Canada "beautifully liquid romanticism," (la Libre Belgique, Belgium) along with his "sheer piano virtuosity," (The Citizen, Ottawa) and "hair-raising power," (Financial Times, London) have down him recognition outside of Canada. He has performed in England, France, The Netherland Belgium, Austria, Hungary, Italy, and throughout Ireland and the Eastern United States. For the weeks in the fall of 1996, he was in Chengdu, China, teaching and performing at the Sichuan Conservatory. His performances have been broadcast on radio and he has appeared several time CBC television.

Mr. Thomson received wide attention in 1991 when his world-premiere recording of the Maxwell edition of Liszt's *De Profundis* and two other rarely-heard Liszt concertos garnered unanimous critical acclaim in musical journals throughout the world. *De Profundis* is a 40-mine tour-de-force, the manuscript of which had lain in the Goethe-Schiller Archive in Weimar for our 150 years without any serious musical examination. Mr. Thomson managed to obtain a copy of manuscript, and found that *De Profundis* was a fully- realized piano concerto, complete with orchestration, which for some reason had been left off in mid-stroke only a few bars before the intended end. He showed the work to Canadian composer Michael Maxwell who copied out the score. Together they prepared a performing edition, Mr. Maxwell adding the necessary last nine bars. Philip Thomson's recording of this work, with the Hungarian State Orchestra for Hungare Records, was enthusiastically received, and its success secured him the opportunity to perform several countries' premieres of *De Profundis*. The world premiere of the work in Budapest in the spring of 1992 was followed by performances in Italy, at the Festival Pianistico Internazionale of Brescia e Bergamo, and in Canada, at the Montreal International Piano Festival. He performed to American premiere at the International Liszt Festival in Washington, D.C., in 1993.

Philip Thomson's accomplishments have not been limited to the keyboard. While still in high school, he played the violin in both the Provincial and National Youth Orchestras. During same years, he captured New Brunswick's table tennis championship and was, for one year, the province's chess champion. He also played ice hockey on his school team, a sport at which he do not excel. In 1991, a few weeks before going to Hungary to record the Liszt De Profundis, he

fulfilled a long-standing desire to parachute out of an airplane.

An active teacher, Philip Thomson taught for five years at the University of Waterloo, Ontario, and has been on the faculty of the University of Akron, Ohio, since 1994.

Mr. Thomson records for Naxos Records, and has completed five CDs of Liszt's must first two of which were released in the summer of 1997.

Courtly Airs and Dances is a suite of Renaissance dances which were characteristic five European countries during the 1500s. Three of the dances (Basse Danse, Pavane and Allemande) are meant to emulate the music of Claude Gervaise by drawing on the style of his music as well as the characteristics of other compositions from that period.

This composition, which has a title based on the arms of the Wales *Red Dragon*, we written for the 100 year anniversary of the Wales Brass Band in 1984. It received be performance premiere at David's Hall in Cadif, the capital of Wales, under major Attenny in March, 1984. The work was conceived for the British Band instrumentation and transcribed in 1985 for the contemporary wind band.

Phillip Sparkes (b. 1951), born in London, studied trumpet, piano, and composition the Royal College of Music. His has more than 60 compositions to his credit, most which have been recorded and broadcasted throughout the British Isles. His must has taken America by storm. Sparkes' continues to provide quality literature for the contemporary concert band.

The first movement, Toccata, begins with muted brass and snare drum and is, stylistically, march music. The second movement, Interlude, commences with high pitched woodwinds and brasses. Sparkes weaves the band's textures throughout chorale. The Interlude segues to the Finale (molto vivace) which demands a peak

level of technical artistry from the band and has a wonderfully rousing final statement to "bring the piece home!"

YSU Concert Band

The Concerto, commissioned by Steve Houghton, has become a frequent favorite in his repertoire. The work highlights Dr. Schaft's unique and diverse artistry, which draws upon traditional, modern, and jazz styles. Written in the classic three movement form, the piece reflects a strong interest in rhythmic variety and melodic fragmentation. It uses the elements of texture and timbre to create variety as well as contrast throughout the course of the composition.

This bunch of "musical wildflowers" (hence the title *Lincolnshire Posy*) is based on folk songs collected in Lincolnshire, England (one noted by Miss Lucy E. Broadwood; the other five noted by Grainger, mainly in the years 1905-1906, and with the help of the phonograph), and the work is dedicated to the folk singers who sang so sweetly to him. Grainger stated, "Indeed each number is intended to be a kind of musical portrait of the singer who sang its underlying melody--a musical portrait of the singer's personality no less than of his habits of song--his regular or irregular wonts of rhythm, his preference for gaunt or ornately arabesque delivery, his contrasts of *legato* and *staccato*, his tendency towards breadth or delicacy of tone."

Grainger was a picturesque nationalist who tried to retain something of the original lavor of British folk songs and their singers by strict observance of peculiarities of performance such as varying beat lengths and the use of "primitive" techniques such as parallelism. The movements and their source follow:

Terpsichore, for symphonic band, is based upon dances from the Court of Henry N France that were first published (under the same title) by Michael Praetorius, in Germany, in 1612. Terpsichore is the Greek Muse of dancing. She is one of the Muses who are the daughters of Mnemosyne (the goddess of memory) and Zeus presiding Greek god).

The beginning of this work is a quiet invocation to the spirit of ancient dance, and followed by a street scene depicting wild and savage goings-on. The energy tunes are explosive, the moods, constantly and unpredictably changing. Speed flexibility, and energy dominate. Towards the middle of the movement a brass of plays the original Renaissance music upon which the movement is based. The invocation reappears, and the music ends in a florid swirl of notes.

The second movement begins with a quintet of gently chirping flutes ("The Robin followed by a slow Spanish dance for solo harpsichord then tutti band. Next con brazen ballet, "Amazons;" and finally a loud chime introduces a scintillating and vibrant jumping dance, or "Volte," coming to a breathless and abrupt close.

The third movement begins with a bright xylophone solo, followed by a series of "Bourees." Sounds are bright and transparent. The end of the movement repreas nearly as is possible in the modern symphonic band, the sound of an actual Renaissance wind band.

The final movement begins with a series of warmly peaceful variations called "Reprinses;" next come a unique series of tunes that feature the individual instruchoirs of the band. Finally, an exhilarating and strongly rhythmic "Volte" first show the euphonium soloist, and builds in energy to a resplendent conclusion.

Upon meeting Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov in 1868, Tchaikovsky renewed his keens of musical nationalism. Inspired by the master composer, Tschaikovski's compositional style would forever capture the color and zest of Russian folk dand music. The flurry, energetic drive and playful melodies associated with his balls scores are all heard in this rare and invigorating music. This edition comes from arrangement from the ballet, The Snow Maidens, that was originally transcribed Russian military band.

About the music:

The marimba tradition of Guatemala and Mexico's southernmost state of Chiapas is woven into the fabric of everyday life. While accounts vary as to when the marimba actually arrived in this region, one of the earliest dates given is 1545, when it is believed that African slaves suspended wooden slabs over an open pit in the ground (which served as a natural resonator). Until the late 1890's, all instruments were single-keyboard or diatonic in nature. In that year a marimbaist, Corazon de Jesus Borraz Moreno, designed and built the first double-keyboard, or chromatic instrument.

Throughout the twentieth century the marimba has served as both icon and instrument in Chiapas and Guatemala. The marimba is heard in many different contexts; at fiestas, in restaurants, civic and even religious functions. In fact, it is difficult to walk down any street without hearing the sound of las maderas que

cantan (the wood that sings).

During the early twentieth century Chiapan marimba ensembles began to tour the United States as well as Europe. Their repertoire was quite eclectic and remains so to this day. Western European concert works, traditional and folkloric music, and popular music from across Mexico are all examples of musical styles that a typical marimba orchestra might play. As there are no symphonic or string/wind chamber groups in Chiapas, the marimba serves the dual function of performing (and thereby sustaining) traditional music of the region and nation, as well as performing arrangements of the repertoire which a symphony orchestra or concert pianist might perform. Above all, the marimba is something that unites the people of this region.

The Afro-Cuban music you will hear this evening is derived from my studies in Cuba during the summer of 1994. I had the great fortune of receiving a grant from the Ohio Arts Council's "International Arts 2000 Program" which allowed me to study with master Cuban folkloric drummers at the Centro Nacional de Esculas de Arte (National School of the Arts) in Havana. I traveled there with the Caribbean Music and Dance Program of San Francisco with a group of forty

drummers and dancers from around the world.

My days typically included folkloric drumming classes (four to five hours per day), traditional song classes, dance classes, and attending numerous concerts and workshops by folkloric and popular ensembles. Some of the groups I heard in Havana include the famous popular music group Los Van Van, as well as raditional folkloric ensembles such as Raices Profundas, Clave Y Guaguanco, Yoruba Andabo, Cuban National Folkloric Dance Ensemble, and a well known comparsa carnival ensemble. WE also traveled to the rural town of Jovellanos to hear Grupo Arara de Jovellanos, and spent several days in the beautiful seaside town of Mantasas to hear Grupo AfroCuba, who are masters of the famous rumba radition. Not only did we hear (and of course dance to) these groups, but we were regularly invited to sit-in and play with them. One of the most interesting days included an impromptu trip to Havana Viejo (Old Havana) to participate in a rumba jam session with one of our teachers Santiago Nani and percussion and dancer friends from his neighborhood.

Tonight's selections are all examples of traditional Afro-Cuban folkloric styles. Many of the instruments have their origins in West Africa, particularly of the Yoruba and Bantu peoples. These include the conga drums - usually played in groups of three distinct drums, claves - small hardwood sticks struck together, kata - a wood block (or hollow bamboo block) struck with sticks, various cowbells, and the shekere - a hollowed out calabash gourd that is strung with a network of plastic beads. Other instruments commonly used in the Comparsa include the sartenes - frying pans mounted upside down and played with sticks, bass drum, snare drum trumpet, and singing.

A special thanks to Richard Walker and all the folks at the Avedis Zildjian Cymbal Company for their generous support of the Y.S.U. Percussion Program. Zildjian has recently provided myself and the Dana School of Music with many outstanding cymbals for our various Dana ensembles. We proudly endorse and exclusively perform on Zildjian Cymbals.

Allegro vivace Adagio grazioso Rondo: Allegretto Daniel Shapiro, a native of southern California, began the study of piano at the age of six His teachers have included Leon Fleisher, John Perry, Joanna Graudan and Reginald Stewart. He earned his bachelor's degree, summa cum laude, from the University of Southern California and master's and doctoral degrees in piano from the Peabody Conservatory.

Dr. Shapiro has performed recitals across the United States, as well as in Brazil, Ireland, Spain, France, and at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, and has garnered a large and increasing reputation as an interpreter of the music of Beethoven, Schubert and Mozart. At the age of thirty-two, he perfromed the complete Beethoven Piano Sonata cycle at the University of Iowa over a four-week period. He continues to present Beethoven and Schubert cycles. He has performed with orchestras including the National Symphony, the São Paulo State Symphony Orchestra, the Academy of London Orchestra, the Colorado National Repertory Orchestra and the Los Angeles Debut Orchestra.

Dr. Shapiro received the top prize in the William Chapel International Piano Competition in addition to winning the American Pianists' Association Beethoven Fellowship Award, the Joanna Hodges International Piano Competition, the Young Musicians' Foundation Debut Competition, and the International Piano Recording Competition.

As a chamber musician, he continues to be highly active. He performs regularly with members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic in the orchestra's chamber series, and is currently in the process of performing the complete Beethoven violin sonatas. He is a member of the Brandeis-Bardin Trio, whose compact disc is released on the Harmonia Mundi label; as well as Duo Hebraique, whose compact disc will soon be released on the Quicksiler label. He has participated at the Marlboro Music Festival, the Ravinia Festival and the Fellowship Program at Tanglewood, and was a winner of the Coleman Chamber Music Competiton.

As a conductor, Dr. Shaprio has studied with Daniel Lewis, Victor Yampolsky, Fritz Zweig, Gustav Meier and Sheldon Morgenstern. He made his conducting debut at Tanglewood at the age of sixteen, where, two summers later, he was given a special award for Outstanding Achievement in Piano, Chamber Music and Conducting.

Dr. Shapiro has also had extensive experience as a vocal accompanist and coach. He studied with Gwendolyn Koldofsky and Natalie Limonick, and was an opera and art song coach at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Dr. Shapiro is a full-time professor of piano at the Cleveland Institute of Music; previously, he was on the piano faculty at the University of Iowa.

Performers

Artistic director Jiří Mottl was born in 1950 and became the concertmaster of the Moravian Chamber Orchestra and a winner of the international violin competition in Lausanne in 1971 while still a student at the Brno Conservatory. He studied violin at the Janáček Academy of Performing Arts, graduating in 1975; he returned later to the same institution to undertake serious intense study in conducting and received a second diploma in 1993. As a result of his research on and performance of historic music, he founded the Brno Chamber Orchestra in 1977 and became its principal violinist and artistic director, which he still is today. He was also chosen to be Chief Editor of the New Janáček Critical Edition of complete works for Bärenreiter-Supraphon.

Michiko Otaki was born in Japan and received her early training there. In 1977 she moved to the U.S. to study at the San Francisco Conservatory, Mahattan School of Music, and the University of Miami where she received her Doctorate. Currently she is a professor and Director of Keyboard Activities at Clayton State University in Atlanta. She has toured extensively as soloist and chamber player including tours with the Warsaw Wind Quintet, the Wallinger String Quartet, the Swiss Woodwind Quintet, and the Slovak Sinfonietta of Žilina as well as the Brno Chamber Orchestra.

Mária Filová was born in 1964 in Košice in the Slovak Republic. She studied at the Conservatory there and taught at the Music School for Gifted Children in Bratislava before finishing her studies at the Janáček Academy in Brno. Since 1990 she has been a first violinist of the Brno State Philharmonic Orchestra, and since 1992 a member of the Brno Chamber Orchestra.

Pavel Wallinger was born in 1968 in Boskovice. He studied at the Brno Conservatory and at the Janáček Academy of Performing Arts. His many awards include 1st prize in the 1984 Brno Conservatory Competition, honorable mention at the 1987 Otokar Ševčík Competition, and 1st prize at the 1985 Beethoven Competition in Hradec. Since 1992 he has been concertmaster of the Brno Philharmonic Orchestra, and is founder of the Wallinger String Quartet.

Program Notes

Four Little Pieces for Strings were composed in 1955 and first performed at the Youth Music Festival at Fürsteneck Castle in Germany in 1957. Although relatively simple, the work displays many techniques used by 20th century composers while deriving melodic and rhythmic elements from the folk music of Bohemia. The composer, Karel Husa, was born in Prague in 1921, studied there and in Paris, and moved to the United States in 1954 where he joined the faculty of Cornell University. He is recipient of many awards including the Pulitzer Prize in 1969 and the Grawemeyer Award in 1993.

The *Piano Concerto in A Major*, K. 414 was written by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart shortly after he settled in Vienna in 1782. The buoyant character reflects the composer's optimism at that time. It is one of three concertos written at the same period which Mozart hoped would showcase his talents as a composer and performer. All three movements have places reserved for cadenzas.

The *Concerto in C Minor*, RV.509 is a Baroque Concerto Grosso with two violinists as the concertino against the rest of the orchestra as the ripieno. Somewhat unique is the unison textures of the tutti sections in the first and last movements. Antonio Vivaldi wrote many of his compositions for studens at a school for unfortunate girls in Venice where he was engaged as a teacher until 1740.

Memorial Pavan was commissioned in 1995 by the Commission for Jewish Education in Youngstown for the Holocaust Memorial Program at the Mahoning County Courthouse. The piece was premiered jointly by the Chaney High School Orchestra, an inner city group, and the Dana Composers Ensemble with the composer conducting. Two folksongs, which were sung in the concentration camps in World War II, are the main source of melodic material. The harmonizations and contrapuntal treatments are original. Robert Rollin has been on the faculty of the Dana School of Music since 1977. He is recipient of the YSU Distinguished Professor Award (1985), and the Ohio Governor's Special Recognition Award for creative excellence (1986).

Benjamin Britten's *Simple Symphony*, Op. 4 is his first work for string ensemble, and employs materials and themes from piano works composed between ages 9 and 12. The composition, in neo-classical style, was premiered in March of 1934 and was an instant success.

The Cleveland Duo consists of Carolyn Gadiel Warner, violin/piano, and Stephen Warner, violin, both long time members of the Cleveland Orchestra. Ms. Warner is also piano accompanist with the Cleveland Orchestra Chorus. Beside their busy orchestra schedule, both performers maintain active careers as solo performers, touring extensively. The Duo is making their second appearance this year with the New Music Society having been our guest on the Winter Pops Benefit Concert in February.

Retrospective '15-'50 was written by Cleveland composer Klaus G. Roy and dedicated to the Duo. Mr. Roy is an active composer and

long time program annotator for the Cleveland Orchestra.

Two Ladino Songs was written by Robert Rollin for his wife, Gwyneth Rollin and is a simple movement based on two ancient folk songs of the Jewish group expelled from Spain in 1492. This group was scattered as far east as Bulgaria and to the New World, especially New Mexico and South America. Lyric Counterpoint on a Theme by Warshawsky, written for and dedicated to the Cleveland Duo, is a set of contrapuntal variations on a theme written by Mark M. Warshawsky, a wandering Jewish bard who toured Poland in the late 1800's and who wrote for The Yiddish Theater in Poland and Russia.

Two Rags and an Interlude by Brian Dykstra, a member of the piano faculty at Wooster College, was written for the Cleveland Duo and Dana Faculty Saxophonist, James Umble. Professor Umble performs regularly with the Duo.

Micah Howard is a Dana alumnus who is now bassist with the Pittsburgh Symphony. He holds a Masters Degree in String Bass from Duquesne University. His wife, Olga Howard, originally from Moldavia, now teaches at Duquesne University and often appears as recital accompanist for members of the Pittsburgh Symphony.

Duo for Bass and Piano was written by Micah's brother, Jason Howard, a graduate student at Dana. The Sonata for Double Bass and Piano was written by Frank Proto, bassist with the Cincinnati Symphony.

Brian Wright is a Fellow of Trinity College of Music (London) and has studied with Anthony Rooley, Adele Kramer, Michael Jesset; and studied composition with Anthony Gilbert. He has given recitals at Music Societies, Festivals and Independent Schools; has performed or radio and TV; and additionally has performed for the National Trust throughout the United Kingdom.

His recitals, teachings, and radio and TV performances have taken place in France, Holland, Germany, Eire, Poland, Czech Republic (including the Prague Early Music Festival 1992) the U.S.A. (including Cornell University and the Shrine Music Museum, South Dakota) and Bulgaria. In Bulgaria in 1995 he sat on the jury of the International Guitar Competition in Plovdiv. Many of his international concerts have been supported by the British government.

He is a published composer, having provided music for television films. His compositions arrangements have been played by leading lutenists and guitarists. In the field of Early music he has performed with many leading musicians and has recently recorded two CD's with the tenor, James Griffett.

Smetana Fanfare for wind ensemble was commissioned by the San Diego State University (SDSU) for the 1984 Festival of Music honoring the Czech composer Bedrich Smetana. It was first performed on April 3, 1984 in San Diego by the SDSU Wind Ensemble, on the occasion of the centennial celebration of Smetana's death, This short work uses two excerpts from Smetana's symphonic poem, The Wallenstein's Camp, completed in 1859 in Goteberg, Sweden, during his exile from Praque.

Basil Kalinnikov, a contemporary of Tchaikovsky, was an unusually brilliant composer His works are characterized by great artistic refinement, and there seems no doubt that, but for his premature death at the age of 35, he would have won a place in the too rank of Russian composers.

His first symphony is an inspired work, national in style. It is highly melodious and beautifully written and is generally considered to be this composer's freshest and most popular work. The transcription of the vigorous finale was made by Glenn Cliffe Bainum.

YSU Concert Band

In 1891, when he was 50 years old, Dvorak composed a triptych of overtures conceived as a set with the overall title Nature, Life, and Love, planned as his Op. 91. He later reconsidered the plan and gave the three works separate titles and opus numbers. And thus they are known today as: In Nature's Realm (Op. 91), Camival

I have always been fascinated by colors, not only in music but also in art and nature. The paintings of the impressionists and Fauvists have been particularly attractive to me, and their French origin accounts for the title of my piece. The two movements (Persisting Bells and Ritual Dance Masks) gave me a chance to experiment with colors . . . sometimes gentle, sometimes raw . . . of the wind ensemble, something that John (Paynter) liked to do. John has been a wonderful friend since we first met in 1968, when we both taught summer courses at Northwestern University. At that time I had only one work for band, the Saxophone Concerto. John's devotion to wind ensembles made a great impression on me and certainly influenced me to write more for these instrument combinations. His honest dedication to the art of music and to teaching was exemplary. He had first-class baton technique and communicated to the players, as well as to the audiences, in a very moving way: powerful, passionate, or delicate and gentle, as the score required. I was reminded of those French painters, whom I admired as a young student in Paris. They called themselves fauvists (vivid, wild), for they used bold, often powerful strokes of brushes with unmixed colors. Their paintings, though, breathe with sensitivity, serenity, and gentleness. John's transcriptions as well as his conducting had these characteristics and hopefully Les Couleurs Fauves will remind you of them.

An ancient Russian Christmas carol ("Carol of the Little Russian Children"), together with a good deal of original material and some motivic elements derived from the liturgical music of the Eastern Orthodox Church, form the basis for this musical impression of old Russia during the jubilant Christmas season. Although cast in the form of a single, continuous movement, four distinct sections may be easily recognized. The composer originally sub-titled these sections Children's Carol, Antiphonal Chant, Village Song, and the closing Cathedral Chorus. All of the resources of the modern, integrated symphonic band are drawn upon to create an almost overwhelming sound picture of tone color, power, and sonority.

A Slavic Farewell (Farewell to a Slavonic Woman) (1912)........Vasilij Ivanovitj Agapkin freely arranged for the wind band by John R. Bourgeois

This classic Slavic march was originally called *Farewell to a A Slavonic Woman*, and since its premiere during World War I, it has become the best-known, best-loved march in Russia and in the surrounding independent states of the former Soviet Union.

Vasilij Ivanovitz Agapkin was born in Sjatjerovo in 1884. When he was child, his parents moved to Astrachan near the Black Sea. Tragically, both parents died when he was 8 years old, leaving him homeless. Soon after, he was accepted as an apprentice "band boy" in the 308th Cavalry Regiment in Tambov, he composed A Slavic Farewell, or Farewell to A Slavonic Woman. Agapkin also worked as a cimena pianist, playing accompaniments for silent films.

(Op. 92), and Othello (Op. 93). Or perhaps it would be better to say that they are not known today, except for the *Carnival Overture*, which is filled with a gaiety and high spirits that have brought it to performance far more frequently than its companion scores.

Carnival epitomizes a happy return to the bustling world of human contact, filled with jollity, dancing, and merrymaking. When heard by itself, the Carnival Overture exudes high spirits from its vigorous opening theme, the beginning of a tightly-knit exposition in which each idea seems to grow out of an element found in its predecessor. After the bustle of the exposition, the beginning of a development section is suddenly cut short by unsettling diminished chords in the vibraphone, and the energy of the opening fades away, settling on a distant key. The participant in the carnival gaiety has withdrawn momentarily to a tranquil retreat of peace and natural beauty, one feature of which is the clarinet's brief recollection of the Nature theme from the first overture. The peaceful interlude ends on the same diminished harmony that introduced it; now we continue with the "normal" development of materials from the exposition, culminating in a recapitulation of tremendous elan. The performed transcription was completed by Dr. Mark Walker, deceased Professor Emeritus of Composition and Theory at YSU.

Blue Bells of Scotland.......Arthur Pryor
freely arranged for band by E.M. Pearson
David Sisk, trombone, 1998 SWE Concerto Winner

Blue Bells of Scotland is one of the many virtuostic solo works written by the legendary Arthur Pryor. The composition is in classic theme and variation style and shows off, handsomely, the technical and musical proficiency of the trombone. Many of the Arthur Pryor trombone and Herbert L. Clarke cornet solos were written for and used by the touring professional bands of the late 19th and early 20th century (e.g. the Goldman and Sousa bands). These solo masterpieces are still used in concerts and recitals throughout the world. Our audition-winning soloist, David Sisk, is a third year music education major hailing from from Moon Area Township High School in westem Pennsylvania. David is an honors student whose performing experiences at YSU have included the Symphonic Wind, Ensemble, the Dana Symphony Orchestra, the YSU Jazz Ensemble I, and the Marching Pride. He is a student of Dr. Michael R. Crist, Associate Professor of Trombone at the Dana School of Music and will be graduating in June, 1999.

Les Couleurs Fauves was commissioned by alumni and friends of the Northwestern University School of Music for John P. Paynter in honor of the 40th anniversary of his appointment to the faculty. Husa states:

According to legend, the inspiration for this march came from Agapkin having seen newsreels of the Balkan War. During this conflict, Russian and Slavic forces fought together, and reportedly the newsreels contained poignant footage of Slavic soldiers parting with their wives and families. The march became popular in World War I, during which time Agapkin served as the musical director of the Tjekan 7, a forerunner of the KGB. Agapkin died in 1964, but with the transformation of the former Soviet Union into independent states and resulting shift of borders and location name changes, it has been very difficult to pinpoint the exact place of his birth or to determine the site of his death.

In 1990, the United States Marine Band toured five cities in the then-Soviet Union, during which A Slavic Farewell was performed as the final encore. These performances of the Soviets' most-famous march resulted in enthusiastic, emotional, spontaneous ovations, cheers and rhythmic clapping.

ABOUT THE GUEST COMPOSER/CONDUCTOR

Karel Husa (b. 1921) is an internationally known composer and conductor. An American citizen since 1959, Husa was born in Prague, Czechoslavakia, on August 7, 1921. After completing studies at the Prague Conservatory and, later, the Academy of Music, he went to Paris where he received diplomas from the Paris National Conservatory and the *Ecole normale de musique*. Among his teachers were Arthur Honegger, Nadia Boulanger, Jaroslav Ridky, and conductor Andre Cluytens.

In 1954, Husa was appointed to the Cornell University faculty; from 1967-1986, he was also Lecturer in Composition at Ithaca College. He was elected Associate Member of the Royal Belgian Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1974 and has received numerous honorary degrees of Doctor of Music. Among other recognitions, Husa has received the Guggenheim Fellowship, a Koussevitsky Foundation commission, the Czech Academy for the Arts and Sciences Prize, and the Lili Boulanger award.

Husa received the Pulitzer Prize in 1969 for his *String Quartet No. 3*. He has contributed several works to the wind literature repertoire that have become standard program fare. *Music for Prague, 1968* has received well over 7,000 performances world-wide in its versions for band and orchestra.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

STEPHEN L. GAGE is Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at Youngstown State University. He earned the Doctor of Education in Music at the University of Illinois: Urbana-Champaign, the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music degree and a Performer's Certificate in Percussion from the State University of New York at Fredonia. Previous Positions including serving as Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) for

three years. From 1980-89 he was the band director at Auburn High School (NY). YSU he conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and he co-directs the Marching Pride and the Concert Band. He also teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting and music education courses.

Dr. Gage is currently serving as the music director and conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. He has written a number of musical arrangements and compositions for concert band, jazz ensemble, and marching band and percussion, and has been published in the Kansas Music Review Journal, the National Band Association Journal, and the Ohio Music Educators Journal, TRIAD. His professional credits include serving as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor for all-state, sectional, regional, and district concert bands and orchestras throughout the northeastern and midwestern United States and Canada. Under Dr. Gage's direction the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble and the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra Symphonic Wind Ensemble performed at the 1996 College Band Directors National Association Convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin. His bands have also performed at all-state music education festivals in New York and Kansas. In March, 1998, Dr. Gage served as the guest conductor of the West Virginia All State Symphony Orchestra in Morgantown.

In addition to his teaching and conducting background, Dr. Gage has performed with the Erie Philharmonic (PA), the Champaign-Urbana Symphony (IL), the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra (OH), and the Tommy Dorsey Jazz Orchestra; also, he served as the president of the International Association of Jazz Educators--New York State Chapter. His biography was listed in the fourth and fifth editions of Who's Who Among America's Teachers.

His professional affiliations include the College Band Directors National Association, National Band Association, Ohio Music Educators Association/Music Educators National Conference, Kappa Kappa Psi Honorary Band Fraternity, Kappa Delta Pi and Phi Kappa Delta Honor Societies, and the Phi Beta Mu--Ohio Chapter--National Band Fraternity. He and his wife, Stephanie, and daughter, Claudia, reside in Poland, Ohio.

JONATHAN E. WILLIS is acting Associate Director of Bands at Youngstown State University (YSU). He is a 1984 graduate of Austintown-Fitch High School and he earned the Bachelor of Music in Performance from Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in 1989 and Master of Music in Performance in 1997. As a trombonist, Mr. Willis has studied with Michael Crist, Vern Kagarice, Glen Dodson, Ralph Sauer, and Greg Cox. While an undergraduate student at Dana, Mr. Willis attended the Chautauqua Institute of Music (1984), the Eastern Music Festival in Greensboro, North Carolina (1985-87), and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute Festival (1989), all on full scholarship.

Mr. Willis' professional performance experience includes 10 years with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, and five years with the Heritage Trombone Quant

founded at the Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, PA. He also performs regularly with the Warren Chamber Orchestra, the WD Packard Band, and many of the area's fine big bands. As an arranger/composer Mr. Willis has been the chief arranger of YSU's Marching Pride for five years, and his pieces have been performed by the Dana Trombone Ensemble and several of the region's high school marching bands.

As an educator/conductor, Mr. Willis has worked with many of the area high schools, including the Canfield High School Trombone Choir, the Jackson-Milton High School Concert Band and Marching Band, the Ashtabula Harbor High School Band, and the Warren G. Harding High School Concert and Symphonic Bands. From 1993-95 Mr. Willis served as the Assistant Director of the Warren Jr. Military Band. He plans on finishing the requirements for Ohio teaching certification in the 1998-99 academic year.

Thomas Otten is a Steinway Artist

THOMAS OTTEN, a California native born of German-American parents, has appeared in recital and as an orchestral soloist in such venues as the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, Carnegie Hall, the National Press Club, the German Embassy, and the Chautauqua and Brevard Summer Festivals. His performances have been broadcast on both coasts, including WQXR New York, WGMS Washington, and KUSC Los Angeles. He has performed in Germany numerous times, including a television performance and a debut at the Gasteig in Munich.

Mr. Otten has been the recipient of numerous national and international prizes, including first prize in the Joanna Hodges International Piano Competition, the Palm Beach Invitational International Piano Competition, the International Masters Piano Competition, and the USIA Artistic Ambassador Competition. As a result of the latter, he represented the U.S. in a three-week concert tour of the Caribbean. Since 1991, Mr. Otten has been a member of the California Arts Council's prestigious Touring Artist Roster, performing recitals and giving residencies throughout the state. He was appointed to the Nevada State Council on the Arts' Artist-in-Residence Program.

A student of John Perry and Nelita True, Mr. Otten holds performance degrees from the University of Southern California (DMA, MM) and the University of Maryland, College Park (BM, summa cum laude). He is the only person to have twice received USC's Podolsky Prize, awarded annually to the outstanding keyboard performer. Mr. Otten has also studied vocal accompanying with Gwendolyn Koldofsky and Martin Katz.

In the fall of 1997, Mr. Otten received the appointment of Assistant Professor of Piano at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, where he currently is in charge of the piano performance program. He has also been on the piano faculties of Chapman University in Orange, California; California State University, Sacramento, and Occidental College in Los Angeles.

Synopsis:

The first act is concerned with the quest of Prince Tamino and the birdcatcher Papageno for Pamina, the lovely daughter of the Queen of the Night. Pamina has been stolen by Sarastro, high Priest of Isis and Osiris. Tamino finally discovers that Sarastro has abducted her for her own good, to keep her away from the evil influence of her mother. By the aid of a magic flute and a set of magic bells, Tamino, Pamina, and Papageno are momentarily brought together.

The second act is concerned with the initiation of Tamino and Papageno into the mysteries of Isis and Osiris, Tamino being actuated by a love of wisdom, Papageno merely by a desire for a wife — for his long-wished-for Papagena. The Priests tell the two young men that during their probation they must not talk to any women. Pamina misunderstands Tamino's silence, and is broken-hearted. Papageno repeatedly talks when he is not supposed to, and almost loses his Papagena. But the magic flute and bells solve all difficulties, and the two happy pairs are at last united.

UNIVERSITY BAND

Concert Variations was the result of a commission by the Lambda Chapter (Missouri) in 1977. The work is based on a short theme heard in the first eight measures, and found throughout in a number of variations. The work alternates between a chorale setting and a rhythmic dance like setting. In addition to his numerous contributions to the wind band repertoire—many which have been premiered by the U.S. Marine Band—Smith was also the Director of the Orchestras at Southwest Missouri State University.

A leader in the development of modern American music, Copland's major works blend a wide range of national musical influences with a modern technique and style. Believing that contemporary symphonic music had limited popular appeal, Copland sought a way to express his musical ideas in, as he phrased it, "the simplest possible terms." His first composition in this spirit was El Salon Mexico (1936). The culmination of this period was a ballet, Appalachian Spring (1944), in which he drew on traditional Shaker music. Adapted in 1945 as a suite for symphony orheestra, Appalachian Spring won for the composer a Pulitzer prize in music. Down A Country Lane is a short ballad in the spirit of the Shaker Hymn from Appalachian Spring; characterized by simple melodic lines and colorful orchestrations which help to bring meaning to the descriptive title.

I Am (1990)...... Andrew Boysen, Jr.

Andrew Boysen, Jr. is one of the more popular, talented composers of concert band music today. I Am, commissioned by Craig Aune and the Cedar Rapids Prairie High School Band of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was written in memory of Lynn Jones, a baritone saxophone player in the band who was killed in an auto accident during the winter of 1990. The work includes an aleatoric section—music of a free nature, without time, and with some improvisation of rhythm—which is intended to represent the foggy morning of the crash in which Jones died. The words "I Am," which are sung by members of the band are taken from a poem that Lynn Jones wrote just days before his death. I AM won the 1992 Claude T. Smith Memorial Band Composition Contest.

Composed in 1965, Chance's *Variations on a Korean Folk Song* won for him the American Bandmasters Association Ostwald Award in 1966. Chance provided the following information concerning the work:

I became acquainted with folk song known as Arrirang (pronounced "AH-dee-dong") while serving in Seoul, Korea, as a member of the Eighth U.S. Army Band in 1958-59. The tune is not as simple as it

sounds, and my fascination with it during the intervening years led to its eventual use as the theme for this set of variations.

The work is in six sections; the opening pentatonic theme which is then followed by five distinct variations.

Holsinger's *Helm Toccata* was written for, and dedicated to, Malcolm Helm, who was a high school band director in Texas, and Past-President of the Texas Bandmasters Association. The work is essentially a prelude and toccata, reminiscent of the late 19th century organ form, but with that pounding "early Stravinskien" flavor that the composer finds so appealing.

Holsinger was twice the recipient of the prestigious Ostwald Award for band composition, sponsored by the American Bandmasters Association.

CONCERT BAND

The dominant English composer of the early 20th century, Williams broke the ties with continental Europe that for two centuries—notably through Handel and Mendelssohn—had made Britain virtually a musical province of Germany. Primarily a composer of orchestral music, including nine symphonies, Williams also wrote chamber music, ballet, songs, opera, and has contributed much to band repertoire. *Toccata Marziale* was written just ten years after Vaughan Williams had composed his second symphony, *A London Symphony* (1914).

Grainger considered the folksingers the "kings and queens of song...lords in their own domain—at once performers and creators." It was for the wind band that Grainger composed some of his most memorable folk song settings, several of which are now cornerstones of band repertoire. Ye Banks and Braes O' Bonnie Doon is a slow, sustained Scottish folk song which is reminiscent of two other Grainger folk songs: Molly on the Shore, and Shepherd's Hey.

Finale from Symphony No. 1 in G Minor (1893)......Basil Kalinnikov Transcribed for Band by Glenn Cliffe Bainum (1958)

Basil Sergeivitch Kalinnikov, a contemporary of Tchaikovsky, was a talented Russian composer whose works were characterized by great artistic

refinement and nationalistic style. If not for his premature death at the age of thirty-five, he would have won a place in the top rank of Russian composers. His first symphony is typical of the Russian national style, utilizing long melodic passages and effective, and extrmely chromatic, transitions as a means of building tension and power. The work is generally considered to be his freshest and most popular.

Howard Hanson is one of the most important figures in the American music scene. In a world where the term "Renaissance Man" is too often misused, Hanson is the "real deal." His influence on American music, composition, and education is significant. In addition to his compositions, he has conducted many major American orchestras—both in concert and in recording sessions—and also served as the director of the Eastman School of Music from 1924–64. In 1936 he was elected to membership in the National Institute of Arts and Letters in New York, and in 1938 to fellowship in the Royal Academy of Music in Sweden. He won a Pulitzer prize in 1944 for his Symphony No. 4. Other awards include the Ditson Award (1945), the George Foster Peabody Award (1946), the Award of Merit of the Alumni Association of Northwestern University, and thirty-six honorary doctorates from American colleges and universities.

Chorale and Alleluia was completed in 1954 and represents Hanson's first work for the wind band. It was given its premiere on February 26, 1954, at the convention of the American Bandmasters Association at West Point with William Satelmann, leader of the U.S. Marine Band, conducting.

In The Spring: At The Time When Kings Go Off To War (1986)....... David Holsinger

In The Spring, the 1986 American Bandmasters Association Ostwald Award winner, is a programmatic work based on I Chronicles 20:1–3 (NIV translation), which depicts the assault of King David's army, led by his commander, Joab, upon the cities of the Ammonites. The three verses recall the siege of Rabbah and its destruction, King David's seizure of the jewel-encrusted crown of the Ammonite King, the plunder and slave consignment of the survivors of all the doomed Ammonite towns, and the triumphal return of David's army to the walls of Jerusalem.

Using a variety of compositional resources and textures, from melodic diatonicism to "sound mass clusters," plus vocal permutations from within the playing ensemble, Holsinger has woven an image-laden pageant of sound where we actually "see with our ears" the army's preperation for battle, its colorful charge from Jerusalem, the warfare, the chaos, the pathos, and the triumph.



Program Notes

Implosion - notes by Mantle Hood

The basic principles of composition are derived from practices on the island of Bali, Indonesia. The vibraphone plays the principal melody which is continually elaborated by the interlocking parts of the marimba and two xylophones.

Ragtime Music - notes by Bob Becker

During the last twenty years of the 19th century, a revolutionary method of playing popular music emerged in the United States — a style of creative, syncopated transformation and embellishment of a melody. Essentially an Afro-American phenomenon, the style was crystalized by Black pianists into a genuinely classical compositional called the "Rag," a word probably derived from vernacular descriptions of the highly syncopated melodic lines as "ragged." These melodies were set against a steady, march-like bass pattern played by the pianist's left hand.

After 1915 the rag began to be transformed and its infectious syncopation was applied to many types of popular and some classical music. Stravinsky's "Ragtime for Eleven Instruments" and Debussy's "Golliwog's Cakewalk" are examples. The term "ragtime" came to refer to all music that used the characteristic four against three syncopation of the earlier piano rags. By 1920 a type of ragtime became popular along with a new dance called the fox-trot. Known as "novelty ragtime," this music was highly technical, programmatic, and speedier than previous rag music, and it was a perfect vehicle for an instrument which had recently been engineered to a high standard of quality by manufacturers in the Chicago area -- the xylophone.

During the 1920's the xylophone as a solo instrument reached a peak in popularity. Xylophone soloists appeared with piano accompaniment, in dance orchestras and concert bands, and were heard regularly on radio broadcasts and phonograph records. George Hamilton Green, Sammy Herman, and Harry Breuer, the best known xylophonists of this era, won critical acclaim as well as tremendous public esteem. All were great arists, but perhaps the most important was George Green, who until his retirement in 1940, reigned supreme among xylophonists. He was a great technical innovator, as well as a prolific composer, and hence played a major role in the creation of an extensive solo literature for the xylophone. This body of music came to include transcriptions of standard overtures, Hungarian rhapsodies, violin concertos and concert piano selections, as well as original compositions for the xylophone in the form of medleys, rags, and novelty dance music.

Today's music has been arranged by Bob Becker and Bill Cahn, two members of the renowned Canadian percussion group Nexus. These unique arrangements are scored for xylophone solo, four marimbas, and a potpourri of percussive accents.
