Convenience recycles 377 tons of materials per year.




He began a similar program in the YSU dormitories. The "YSU Dump-N-Run" sets boxes in dormitory hallways when students are moving out for the summer. Students can throw reusable items in the boxes that are then trucked to area charities.

The transition from YSU to the county has not slowed Petuch down one step. He says the very first thing he's doing is increasing the number of dropoff sites in the county from 24 to 36.



aught in the frenzy of his death, people have been too quick to dismiss the con-/troversial- and in some cases downright backward - views of Pope John Paul II.

In a blow to women's rights, this pontiff spoke out against the use of contraception, citing the importance of motherhood rather than a woman's choice to control her reproductive life. In supporting such a line of thinking, the pope can also be seen as helping propagate the spread of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Africa (home of one of the largest growing populations of Catholics in the world) and around the globe.

He also shot down the idea of gays and women entering the leadership of churches. Using the Bible and the church as a way to discriminate against "God's children" in no way constitutes a benevolent worldview.






