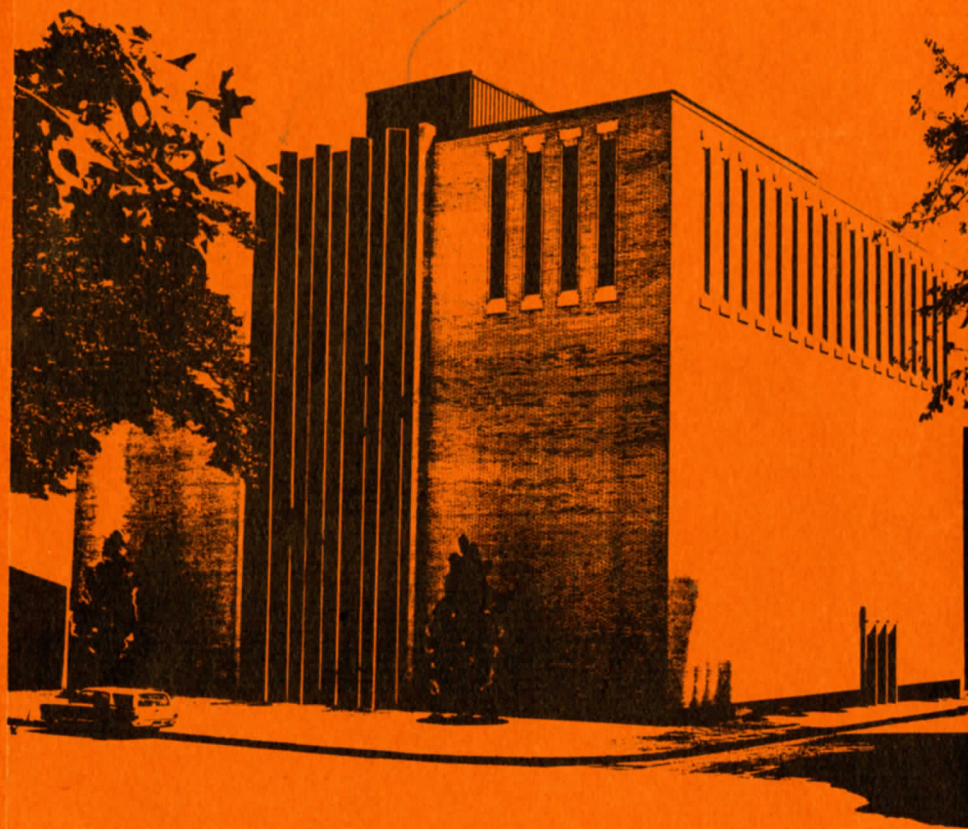
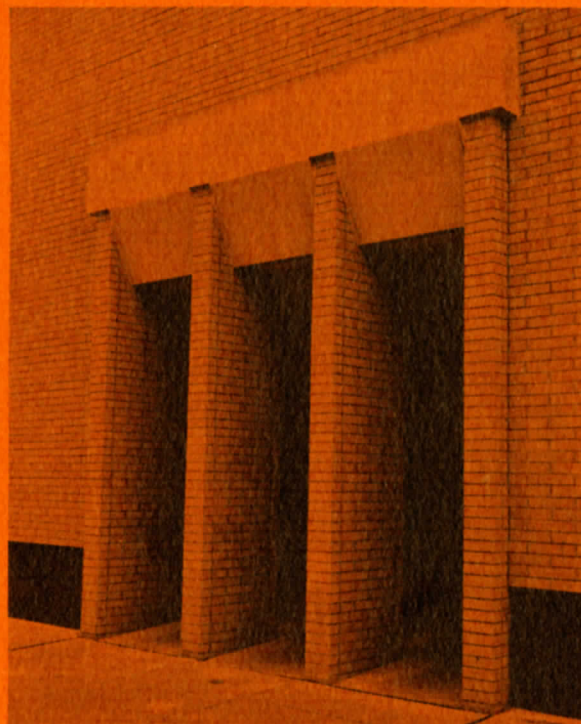
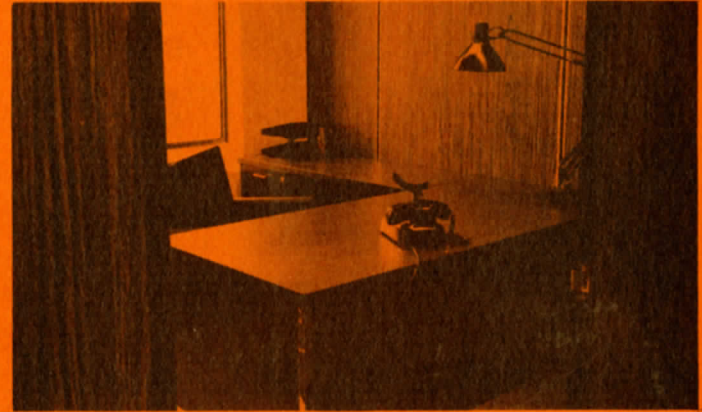

DEDICATION OF THE LINCOLN PROJECT
SEPTEMBER 16, 1970
YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO





The Lincoln Project/September 16, 1970

Rising six stories above the Youngstown State University campus at Lincoln and Phelps Avenues, the LINCOLN PROJECT is one of the University's most imposing and functional structures. Constructed of brick and stone on a steel frame and faced with six-story natural-cleft slate strips and solar glass, the \$1.62-million classroom and office building is strikingly contemporary in design and completely efficient in the utilization of interior space. Its air-conditioned interior contains 59,000 square feet of floor space surrounding a central core of elevators and stairwells, providing more usable area than is normally available in buildings of comparable size. The Lincoln Project houses 34 classrooms including a multi-purpose

auditorium-lecture hall and 112 faculty office spaces constructed of moveable partitions to allow for maximum flexibility of space. The Youngstown State University School of Business Administration and the offices of the Graduate School, the Department of Sociology, and Campus Planning are located in the Lincoln Project.

Construction of this facility was made possible through The University Foundation, Inc., a non-profit organization formed in 1969 by eight men acting in response to the pressing physical needs of Youngstown State University. The eight trustees of the Foundation acquired the property at Lincoln and Phelps Avenues from its owners, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard A. Cavalier, Jr., and erected

The Lincoln Project according to University specifications. The building will be leased to the University for a five-to-ten-year period, after which the total assets of the Foundation will be distributed to either Youngstown State University, the State of Ohio, or the Youngstown Educational Foundation for the primary use of the University. The trustees, administration, faculty, and students of the University are grateful to The University Foundation, Inc., to Mr. and Mrs. Cavalier, to the Dollar Savings and Trust Co. (Youngstown), and to the Youngstown Educational Foundation for their cooperation in providing this most recent extension of its educational facilities.
