

Pianist Avguste Antonov leads an active career as soloist and teacher. He is Artist in Residence at The Master's Touch School of Music & Performing Arts, LLC. in Grapevine (Texas).

Avguste Antonov has presented recitals in Bordeaux(France), Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Florida, Pennsylvania, Texas, Ohio, South Carolina, Tennessee and has performed extensively with the University of Kansas Wind Ensemble, University of Kansas Symphony, Symphonic Choir and the Texas Christian University Wind Symphony. Performance venues include the Music Education National Convention with the University of Kansas Wind Ensemble and the College Band Directors National Association with the Texas Christian University Wind Symphony.

He has been featured as soloist with the Alton Symphony Orchestra, the Tulsa Camerata, the San Jose Wind Symphony, the Trevecca Symphony Orchestra, the Hardin-Simmons University Orchestra, the Kansas City Medical Arts Symphony, the University of Kansas Symphony and the University of Kansas Wind Ensemble.

Mr. Antonov is a dedicated performer of 20th and 21st century American living composer, and has performed World and USA premieres at venues across North America. Over the years, he has worked with composers Carter Pann, Raina Murnak, Matthew Lewis, Till Meyn, Matthew Saunders, Robert Rollin, William Vollinger and others. In 2012, Avguste Antonov was a music reviewer for the Society of Composers, Inc. Region 6 Convention.

Previous seasons highlights included a recital at the Bulgarian Ambassador Residence in Washington, DC and the performance of Carter Pann "Concerto Logic" with the San Jose State University Wind Ensemble.

During the 2014-2015 season Avguste Antonov will perform in Ohio, Kansas, Missouri and Texas. The season will feature many highlights including a live performance for the Kansas Public Radio, the world premiere of Matthew Saunders "Piano Concerto" and a limited tour of Texas.

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

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

Program Notes:

French harpist and composer **Bernard Andrès** studied at music conservatories in Besançon, Strasbourg, and Paris before becoming the harp soloist for the Orchestre Philharmonique de Radio France in 1963. He is a leading composer of harp music, including solos, etude books, and chamber music. His compositional style focuses on melodies, whether in a traditional or contemporary setting.

Algues, which means "seaweed" in French, is originally written for harp and either flute, oboe, or violin. However, the mysterious and lilting music lends itself well to the warm middle register of the horn. The work consists of seven short pieces that flow from one to the next. The tonality of the piece alternates between minor, modal, and even four-note scales, with sections of major tonality that stand out in contrast.

Marcel Tournier was also a French harpist who studied at the Paris Conservatory and won the Second Grand Prize of the Prix de Rome in 1909. In 1912, he succeeded his teacher, Alphonse Hasselmans, at the Paris Conservatory and held the position for thirty-six years. His compositions for harp pushed the technical and harmonic boundaries of the instrument and are often used as competition pieces.

Tournier composed four suites, all entitled Images. La volière magique (The Magical Aviary) is part of his fourth suite. The other pieces within this suite are named *Clouches sous le neige* (Bells in the Snow) and *La Danse du Moujik* (The Dance of the Russian Peasant). His compositional style was influenced by Impressionism and Romanticism.

Barbara York is a concert accompanist, choral and theatrical music director, and composer who works in both Canada and the United States. Her score and lyrics for the Canadian musical Colette won a Dora Mavor Moore Award in 1981. She has received commissions from two Canadian symphony orchestras, the Boise State University Symphonic Winds and the BSU Symphony Orchestra, plus numerous private groups and soloists in both the US and Canada.

Program Notes:

Her first tuba piece, Sea Dreams, was on the required repertoire list for the International Tuba Euphonium Association's 2004 Young Artists Competition. Conversations, for euphonium and alto saxophone, won the Harvey Phillips Award for euphonium in chamber music at the 2006 International Tuba – Euphonium Congress.

Like much of York's music, her **Sonata for Horn and Piano**, subtitled "Landscapes," is programmatic. York's lyrical writing style is immediately apparent in the first movement, "Hills." Here the gently rolling melody bobs up and down, then climbs in register only to spill down in cascading arpeggios. The movement features rich harmonies in the key of g minor and the texture of triplets in the piano that contrast against the eight- and sixteenth-notes in the horn.

The meditative second movement, "Fields of Heather," instructs the players to perform "dreamily." The horn plays the descending fifth half-note theme over and over, never wandering far from the key of d minor. The third movement snaps the listener back out of the day-dream with its lively scherzo. The piano and horn play off of one another in imitation and round. In the middle of the movement, the scherzo gives way to a lyrical interlude before returning to the leaping arpeggios.

Jazz Set for Solo Horn is comprised of a group of four pieces Douglas Hill composed between 1982 and 1984 and presented in full at the Nineteenth International Horn Workshop in Provo, Utah.

The fourth movement is named after Hill's daughter, Emily. Hill writes, "Jazz Set could simply be thought of as a parent's feelings and responses to his or her child: from the admiration of a child's innate and contagious silliness to the burdensome feelings of sadness, from the child's peaceful moments of rest to those of teasing and outrageous energies for play. These pieces are meant to sound as if improvised and to be fully enjoyed. As a grouping, the pieces can work together as a unified set utilizing a rather traditional though freely modified four-movement design."

Program Notes:

Inherent in Hill's compositions and this piece in particular is Hill's use of jazz and extended techniques, including quarter tones, throbbing tones, different varieties of vibrato, glissandos, doinks, plops, various stopped horn effects, and multiphonics. However, the extended techniques exist to serve the music, rather than the other way around.

Douglas Hill is Professor Emeritus of Horn at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he enjoyed an extensive and successful teaching career and membership in the Wisconsin Brass Quintet. Prior to his teaching career, he held the principal horn position with the Rochester Philharmonic in New York. Many of Hill's compositions can be heard on his recording, *Thoughtful Wanderings*.

Born in Amsterdam, Jan Koetsier began his musical studies on piano and at age 16, he was the youngest student of his day to pass the entrance exam in piano at the Berlin Hochschule für Musik. During his studies, he took up composition as well as conducting, and held many prestigious conducting positions throughout Munich, Bavaria, and Amsterdam. Although his writing is well-known and regarded in Europe, in the United States his compositions are mainly known among brass and wind players, for whom he devoted most of his compositional efforts. While much of his writing is virtuosic and sometimes humorous, he also wrote lyrically, as in the second movement of his Sonata for Horn and Harp.

This piece demands much of both parts and uniquely joins these two contrasting instruments to give a fresh interpretation to the standard sonata.

Harpist, Marissa Knaub, is a frequent soloist and orchestra member throughout Pennsylvania, Ohio, and West Virginia. This past summer she played *The Fantasticks* and *Merry Widow* with the Opera Theater of Pittsburgh's "Summerfest." She recently played Tchaikovsky's *Nutcracker* with the Concert Artists' of Baltimore and Moscow Ballet. She performs regularly with the Edgewood Symphony and Alia Musica in Pittsburgh as well as with the Youngstown Symphony and Wheeling Symphony. She was a special guest performer at the American Harp Society Conference in New York City. She was the principal harpist of the Firelands Symphony in Sandusky, Ohio. She held harp teaching positions with the Urban Youth Harp Ensemble in Atlanta, GA, at Toccoa Falls University, and Young Artists' Harp Seminar. Currently, Ms. Knaub teaches harp at Youngstown State University and maintains a private harp teaching studio for students of all ages.

Marissa completed the Performance Studies program at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Yolanda Kondonassis. She holds a Master of Music degree from Peabody Conservatory of Johns Hopkins University where she studied with Jeanne Chalifoux. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from Berklee College of Music in Boston, MA where her studies included jazz harp under the tutelage of Felice Pomeranz. She spent many summers at the Salzedo Harp Colony in Camden, ME studying with the legendary harp teacher, Alice Chalifoux. She began the harp at age ten with Lucy Scandrett.

Stacie Mickens is Assistant Professor of Horn at Youngstown State University. She completed her Doctorate of Musical Arts (DMA) at the University of Michigan, where she was a recipient of the Rackham Fellowship Award. She previously served on the music faculties of Luther College (Decorah, Iowa) and Winona State University (Winona, Minnesota), where she was a horn and brass instructor and chamber music coach. Mickens received her Bachelor of Arts (BA) in music and English from Luther College and her Master of Music (MM) from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. In addition to her teaching, she is a frequent solo recitalist and chamber music participant.

Mickens is a member of the Wheeling Symphony, the Akron Symphony, and the Youngstown Symphony. Previously, she was a member of symphonies in Lansing, MI, Dearborn, MI, and Southwest Michigan, La Crosse, WI, Cedar Falls, IA, and Dubuque, IA. She has performed with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Chamber Winds, Blossom Music Festival, Madison Symphony Orchestra, and Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. Representing the University of Michigan, Mickens performed in recital at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. in 2012 as part of the Kennedy Center Millennium Stage's Conservatory Project. Mickens was featured at the 2006 Midwest Horn Workshop and the 2013 Southeast Horn Workshop. In 2011 and 2012 Mickens was a performer at the Thy Chamber Music Festival in Denmark. Her primary teachers include Adam Unsworth, Douglas Hill, Bryan Kennedy, and Patricia Brown.

Diane Yazvac has been an adjunct faculty member of Youngstown State University since 1999, teaching introductory theory classes, keyboard musicianship classes, piano pedagogy, accompanying classes and piano lessons. Known especially for her accompanying skills, Diane toured Europe with the Dana Chorale playing in such countries as Italy, Switzerland and Austria. She has accompanied guest artists from all over the United States, China and South Africa, as well as countless area student and faculty musicians. She served as accompanist for Franco Iglesias in his vocal studio in New York City. She is a well-respected area piano teacher and church organist. Diane received her BM and MM in piano performance from YSU studying with Delores Fitzer and Dr. Robert Hopkins.

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

Sean Schulze is on the piano faculty of the Cleveland Institute of Music. He teaches applied piano to music majors and non-majors at Case Western Reserve University, teaches piano pedagogy and piano literature to conservatory graduate and undergraduate students and serves as Chair of CIM's nationally recognized Preparatory Piano Department. After receiving his early training in South Africa where he studied with two of that country's most renowned pedagogues, Moira Birks and Isabella Stengel, he was invited to pursue a Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Arizona on full scholarship where he studied with Nicholas Zumbro (a student of the famed Rosina Lhévinne). He undertook further studies with Brazilian pianist Caio Pagano and has performed in masterclasses for many of today's leading pianists and pedagogues including Yoheved Kaplinsky, Bela Siki, Nelita True, John Owings, Martin Canin, Tamás Ungár, and Joseph Banowetz.

A prize-winner of several competitions, he has appeared as concerto soloist with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, the Cape Town Symphony Orchestra, The Natal Philharmonic Orchestra, The University of Arizona Symphony Orchestra, the Suburban Symphony Orchestra and the Eastern Arizona Symphony Orchestra. He has also performed as a solo recitalist and chamber musician throughout the U.S., South Africa, Mexico, Ecuador and Brazil and has collaborated with members of the Cleveland Orchestra and also with the Calder Quartet (quartet in residence at the Colburn School). In 1999, Dr. Schulze along with violinist Luca Ciarla won a residency award through Chamber Music America that resulted in performances throughout the Southwest United States and Mexico, including an appearance at the Alamos Arts Festival. In 2003 and 2006, he was invited to teach and perform as a guest artist at the University of Rio de Janeiro. A published scholar, Dr. Schulze's research on Beethoven's Fantasy for Piano, Op.77 appeared in the Beethoven Journal in 2004. In recent

years he has formed a duo with violinist Stephen Sims with whom he has performed to great acclaim throughout Ohio. In the last few years, Schulze has performed as a soloist and chamber musician at Heidelberg University, Youngstown State University, Bethel University, Case Western Reserve University, Texas Christian University, The Fort Worth Museum of Art, Denison University, The University of Akron and also on the CIM Concert Series.

A sought-after teacher, adjudicator and clinician, Sean Schulze's students continue to win prizes regularly in competitions throughout Ohio and the United States. In recent years, Schulze's students have won first prizes in the MTNA National Performance Competition, The American Protégé Competition, The OMTA Graves Competition (on multiple occasions), the OMTA Buckeye Competition (on multiple occasions) and have performed as concerto soloists with the Suburban Symphony Orchestra, the Lakeland Civic Orchestra, the Solon Philharmonic, The Cleveland Philharmonic and the CIM orchestra on multiple occasions as a result of winning various young artist concerto competitions. Schulze is regularly invited to present masterclasses to young pianists, appearing recently as a guest artist for the Columbus Music Teachers Association as well as the Kent State Summer Piano Institute. In 2008, Schulze founded and continues to direct Summer Sonata, an intensive two-week program of lessons and masterclasses for talented pianists aged 10-18 which takes place annually on the CIM campus. In addition, Schulze serves on the artist-faculty of the Young Artist World Piano Festival which takes place annually on the campus of Bethel University in St. Paul, Minnesota. In 2014 Schulze was honored with the annual Excellence in Teaching Award during CIM's commencement exercises. In 2015, Schulze will serve on the international jury of the Cleveland International Piano Competition's Young Artist Competition.

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

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

Bio:

Suzanne Rouse

Suzanne Rouse was born and raised a dairy farmer's daughter in upstate New York, just a stone's throw from Vermont. She quickly discovered she excelled in singing and often performed old time country with her Dad and folk music in the local coffee houses. But she loved musical theater most and from the mountaintop was often heard singing hit songs from the popular musicals of the day such as Sound of Music, Carousal and Oklahoma.

After Suzanne graduated with a BM from the Boston Conservatory of Music, and a MM from Youngstown State University, classical vocal music became her focus. Following her marriage to concert pianist, Roman Rudnytsky, she focused on opera, art songs and sacred music; often in recital with Roman. After many years and much life experience, Suzanne wrote "Sarah's Song" which is her autobiography and includes fifteen original songs from the many she wrote over a thirty year period. Her good friend and long-time colleague, Leslie Chain, who experienced some of "Sarah's Song" in real time, is graciously collaborating in presenting the Youngstown premiere. Roman Rudnytsky is the featured pianist on the 1972 recording of the Liszt Etude used in this production.

Suzanne and Roman have a daughter, a son, and five grandchildren.

Leslie Chain

Leslie Chain was the first American playwright/director/actress invited to Stanislavsky's estate, in Liubimovka, Russia, & The International Young Dramatists' Festival, for a reading of her first play, "Kiss Kiss." Chain then performed "Kiss Kiss" in several theatres in America, including YSU's Black Box Arena Theatre. Mickey Kessler, whose play, "Tribunal," recently world premiered at YSU's Spotlight Theatre, appeared opposite Chain.

Chain's first, public appearance, at 3, was in church, reciting, "What Can I Give Him?" on Christmas Eve. Chain still sings in church, at St. John's Episcopal, on YSU's campus. So does Suzanne Rouse, Chain's Dana classmate, current choir mate, & writing partner.

Chain started in the theatre at The Youngstown Playhouse; apprenticed, handled publicity, & worked as a showgirl/dancer/singer/actress, for John Kenley, at Kenley Players. That was followed by Las Vegas, New York, Off-Off Broadway, stock, tours, the First National Tour, & L.A. Company, of the original production of "La Cage aux Folles." Chain's work in film, & television, includes guest shots on "Who's The Boss?," "Tales From The Darkside," "Gone, But Not Forgotten," & featured roles in Indie films, "The Private Worlds Of Sophie & Bernie Schwartz," & more.

Chain's A.S.C.A.P. name is Tigress. Her charity single C/DVD she wrote & recorded for Animals of disaster, "Katrina's Kritters," was nominated for an NME ShockWaves' Award, in London. Chain's Docu-Drama-Comedy, about her Down's Syndrome brother who died, "Mart-Face," won "Best Doc," at Rough Cut Film Festival, in San Francisco; & has screened from New York's Anthology Film Archives to Bangalore, India's Voicing Silence Film Festival. "Mart-Face" was a Finalist for two Roy Dean Grants, for Writing & Directing.

Chain's B.A. in Music & Foreign Languages is from YSU. Her M.A., in T.E.S.O.L., is from N.Y.U. Chain/Tigress is pleased to be working with her friend, Suzanne Rouse, on Rouse's first play, the autobiographical musical, "Sarah's Song."

LORAINE SIMS is an Associate Professor and the Vocal Area Coordinator at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana where she teaches Voice and Vocal Pedagogy. She has achieved critical-acclaim for her "vibrant, bell-like soprano" as well as her "warm intimacy, engaging passion and casual artistry." She is an active recitalist whose voice has been described as "remarkably versatile, ranging from delicate lyricism to dramatic power" and her repertoire includes a broad range of songs and arias from the Baroque through Contemporary periods as well as a variety of selections from the American Musical Theater tradition.

Recent performances have included an appearance as an Invited Performer at the 2014 National Opera Association Conference on the Golden Age of Broadway Cabaret Program in New York. She recently appeared in the role of the "Baroness Angelina" in the World Premiere of a One-Act Opera by Dinos Constantinides, Rosanna, which was commissioned for the State LMTA Conference in Shreveport, LA. Other performances include a Guest Artist Recital on the Musical Arts Concert Series at Southeastern Oklahoma State University in Durant, OK and appearances as Soprano Soloist with the Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra, Handel Messiah, and the Southeast Kansas Symphony, Brahms Requiem.

Professional activities include being an invited presenter at the 2012 National NATS Conference in Orlando with her session, "Training the Terrible Tongue! (Using Mirrors and the Power Spectrum for Visual Feedback to Target Vowel Shapes)." Other presentations include "Practical Applications for the Spectrogram in the Voice Studio: A Demonstration," at the 2007 CMS/ATMI Conference, the 2007 Southern Regional Conference of NATS, and recently at the 2011 Voice Symposium at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Dr. Sims is the Southern Regional Governor of the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS) and is also a member of the National Opera Association (NOA) and Music Teachers National Association (MTNA). She enjoys giving master classes which have included those at the 2011 Voice Symposium at the University of Southern Mississippi, the Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin, Ireland, Minnesota State University, Gustavus Adolphus College (Minnesota), Drury University (Missouri), Southeastern Oklahoma State University, and the University of Southern Mississippi. Her students have been winners in national and regional competitions such as the 2010 NOA Voice Competition and the 2010 NATSAA Finals. Many have participated in young artist programs including Martina Arroyo's Prelude to Performance, La Musica Lyrica, Wolf Trapp Opera Summer Festival, Opera in the Ozarks, Operafestival di Roma, and the Franco American Vocal Academy (FAVA).

MARIA CURRY is a native of Carthage, Missouri. She is a pianist, soloist, collaborative artist and poet. Maria has played principal trombone for the Southwest Missouri Orchestra, SE Kansas Symphony and numerous jazz ensembles, bands, & chamber groups. She has traveled the United States performing in solo concerts as a religious singer song writer, has been a frequent artist, spiritual team leader, and teacher for the YMCA of the USA Leadership Training Schools and camps, has produced several recordings with Spirit's Call, New Jerusalem, The Precious Moments Singers, and other solo and band ventures. Maria has been a church musician since age 11, a program coordinator, tennis pro, and recreation instructor for the City of Joplin, MO, taught public school, has served on the boards of various civic organizations such as the PSU Axe Library, the Joplin Substance Advisory Street Smart initiative, and the highly successful Park Academy At Risk Program. She enjoys Hope Keepers of Baton Rouge, Round Table at Coyote Moon, and leading VBS and summer camps at Trinity Episcopal Church. Maria is the choirmaster/organist at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church, Baton Rouge. Honors and awards include Outstanding Music Student Award, MSSU, Outstanding Musician Award, William Jewel College, and the Excellence of Professional Service Award, Graduate Student Association, PSU. She is a member of Phi Kappa Lambda, Sigma Alpha Iota, Omicron Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, and Phi Kappa Phi. 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

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
















Program Notes:

Mozart: Quartet in D major, No. 21 KV575 "Prussian"

In May of 1789 while in Berlin, Mozart was received by King Friederich Wihelm II of Prussia. Mozart accepted a commission from him to write six string quartets and six piano sonatas (for the king's daughter, a pianist). He set to work upon his return to Vienna in June, but struggling with the stress of a temporary illness of his wife, Constanze, and the unhappy state of his finances due to failed attempts at concert organization, he completed only three of the quartets and not one of the piano sonatas. The quartet in D Major was the first to be finished. King Friedrich Wilhelm II was an able amateur cellist. As a result in this quartet in D major, the cello part is favored and is prominent in every movement of the quartet. But this favoritism caused Mozart to also give a competing prominence to the violin and the viola. Throughout the work, there is a unity of relationship between the themes and counterpoint utilized by Mozart that is more conspicuous in his later works.

Despite the "sturm und drang" of Mozart's private life at that time, he did not compose a work reflecting his troubled state; but he chose to compose in graceful and elegant manner. The movements are fashioned as, first: sonata-allegro, second: A-B-A, and third: minuet (featuring the cello playing in its upper register). The bright and buoyant final movement, with the main theme introduced by the cello, adopts the material of the first two movements.

Bartók: String Quartet No. 3

Béla Bartók wrote this string quartet in Budapest in 1926. Bartók has been likened to Beethoven as a pivotal composer who revolutionized string quartet composition. The String Quartet No. 3 is the shortest of his six string quartets. It was composed in one continuous movement without breaks and consists of four parts. It is a complex and bold work. The music is concentrated and convoluted yet methodically structured.

Program Notes:

The austere character of the first part gives way to the second part of a faster more animated development with dancelike themes in which Bartók's study of Hungarian folk music becomes apparent. This is followed by compact recapitulation of the spirit of the first part and ending with a coda reflecting the density of the second part and pressing toward a powerful conclusion.

Bartók employed several string instrument playing techniques in this string quartet:

sul ponticello - applying pressure to play with the bow as close to the bridge of the instrument as possible without distorting the sound con legno - playing with the wood of the bow rather than the hair glissando - sliding from one note to another Pizzacato - In this case an aggressive plucking of the string with the finger so hard that the string slaps against the fingerboard, called by musicians the "Bartók pizzacato."

Beethoven: Quartet in C major, Op. 59 No. 3 "Rasumovsky"

Beethoven wrote the "Rasumovsky" String Quartet while staying in Mártonvasár, a town in the countryside near Budapest, Hungary in 1806. Despite his deafness, this was a year of great productivity for Beethoven in which he wrote his Symphony No. 4, his Violin Concerto and Piano Concerto No. 4. The String Quartet No. 3 takes its name from the commissioner, a wealthy Russian count who was the Ambassador to Vienna.

This is one of Beethoven's most clamorous string quartets. It reflects back to the styles of Haydn's and Mozart's time, yet also pressing ahead with revolutionary expansiveness.

The first movement begins with a short slow and darkly measured chromatic introduction and moves quickly on to more ebullient and extended passage leading the final brief coda. The second slower paced and more contemplative movement is dominated by the recurring underlying pizzicato ostinato played by the cello. The third movement is a graceful minuet and trio. This movement ends on the

unresolved feeling of a dominant seventh chord that drives the music immediately into the fourth movement (marked "attacacca subito"—attack suddenly). The fourth movement bursts forth with a rapid six note motif presented as the subject of a fugue. The fast energetic tempo and this six note theme reappears throughout the movement and in the movement's swift push to a vigorous conclusion.

Concert Band Program Notes:

In 1927, Gustav Holst was commissioned to write a competition piece for the BBC and the National Brass Band Festival Committee. The result was The Moorside Suite. It is said that Holst was very happy upon hearing the fifteen brass bands play his piece in the competition at the Crystal Palace, London, in 1928. The suite has three movements: Scherzo, Nocturne, and March. Gordon Jacob arranged the suite for orchestra in 1952 and for wind band in 1960. The March begins with a rising, four-note motive that leads into a vigorous theme, noteworthy because of its six-bar phrases. The alto saxophone introduces a second theme, employing more normal eight-bar phrases. The trio is reminiscent of the ceremonial marches of Elgar and Walton in its pomp and dignity. After a brief modulatory section based on the opening motive, the first two themes are restated and the march concludes with a coda containing material from the trio.

"Seis Manuel" is the third of four sections Shelley Hanson included in her tribute to the islands and mountains of Latin America. Named for Manny Laureano, conductor of the Minnesota Youth Symphonies and Chuck Lazarus' colleague in the Minnesota Orchestra, this seis is based on a dance form of the Jibaro, the peasant farmers of the mountains of Puerto Rico. Its name derives from its originally being danced by six men or six couples. "Seis Manuel" is built on a recurring harmonic pattern called the Seis Mapeyé, over which a singer improvises a melody. Because of the long history of military bands in Puerto Rico, with a Particular importance placed on low brass and clarinets, those instruments are given solos.

Come, Sweet Death is one of the 69 choral preludes by Bach in the group of Geistliche Lieder – Sacred Songs published in 1736. Although usually considered a Bach composition, it is in reality a harmonization by Bach of a beloved traditional German folk song. Bach's choral prelude adaption consists of a single melodic line with a figured bass, leaving the harmonization of the inner voices to the keyboard player.

Mt. Vesuvius, the volcano that destroyed Pompeii and Herculaneum in A.D. 79, is the icon of power and energy in this work. The tension and suspense of the impending cataclysm characterizes the introduction of the main themes. Driving rhythms and complex mode changes convey a bacchanalian mood that is interrupted by quotations from the Dies Irae of the medieval Requiem Mass, invoked as a symbol of death and destruction. An image of everyday village life in the towns oblivious to the danger, portrayed in a quiet interlude, is disturbed by the first fiery events on the mountain. A final battle of themes builds to a state of extreme agitation, conveying the chaos of the pyroclastic explosions and suffocating ash.

Wind Ensemble Program Notes:

Included in Malcolm Arnold's compositions are symphonies, concertos, chamber music for ensemble and solo instruments, and a variety of film scores including "1984", "The Inn of the Sixth Happiness", and "The Bridge on the River Kwai." On *Four Scottish Dances*, Arnold supplied his own program notes:

"These dances were composed early in 1957, and are dedicated to the BBC Light Music Festival. They are all based on original melodies but one, the melody of which was composed by Robert Burns. The first dance is in the style of a slow strathspey – a slow Scottish dance in 4/4 meter – with many dotted notes, frequently in the inverted arrangement of the 'scotch snap'. The name was derived from the strath valley of Spey. The second, a lively reel, begins in the key of E-flat and rises a semi-tone each time it is played until the bassoon plays it, at a greatly-reduced speed, in the key of G. The final statement of the dance is at the original speed in the home key of E-flat. The third dance is in the style of a Hebridean Song, and attempts to give an impression of the sea and mountain scenery on a calm summer's day in the Hebrides. The last dance is a lively fling, which makes a great deal of use of the open-string pitches of the violin (saxophones in the band edition)."

Molly on the Shore is an arrangement of two contrasting Irish reels, "Temple Hill" and "Molly on the Shore," that presents the melodies in a variety of textures and orchestrations. Each section of the band has long stretches of thematic and counter melodic material but it especially features the clarinets and saxophones.

Grainger composed this piece for strings in 1907 as a birthday gift for his mother Rose who had home-schooled him and with whom he was extraordinarily close. He later arranged it for wind band and for orchestra. When Fritz Kreisler set it for violin and piano, Grainger was not impressed: "[It] was a thousand times worse than I had fore-weened (expected), and I had not fore-weened anything good."

Grainger wrote, "Melody seems to me to provide music with initiative, [but] rhythm appears to me to exert an enslaving influence. For that reason I have tried to avoid regular rhythmic domination in my music ... I prize discordant harmony, because of the emotional and compassionate sway it exerts." Percy Aldridge Grainger (1882 – 1961) was an Australian-born composer, arranger, pianist and musical innovator. He enlisted as an army bandsman, became a U.S. citizen and made many worldwide concert tours. He was a complicated, controversial figure in every facet of his life. He rebelled against the disciplines of the central European tradition, largely rejecting conventional forms such as symphony, sonata, concerto and opera. He believed that "free music" required non-human performance and worked years developing machines for it. Convinced of Nordic superiority, he eschewed Italian, the customary language of music, in favor of "blue-eyed" English.

'Up' was completed in the spring of 2013. I had this piece on my 'back burner' so to speak for months prior and hadn't really had the time to sit down and develop it the way I'd like. But the frame...e work was there. And when my colleague and longtime musical friend Seth Wollam (YSU alum!!) contacted me about a piece, I knew I had to finish it. So after a few days of hard work I had completed the work. A picture of hot air balloons I saw inspired this composition. I've always enjoyed hot air balloons, the way they float in the sky and the bright colors of the balloons.

The work is a study of sorts in contrast and harmony, although those two elements are not the only focus. 'Up' spins together beautiful melodies, fresh harmonies, a relentless ostinato, whimsical solos, and moments of pure exaltation and affirmation. The piece begins with the 2 bar ostinato played by such a small and seemingly insignificant voice of the ensemble, the sand blocks. The percussion comes in and plays what will be the harmonic backbone of the piece. Additional percussive colors are added, with the Hi-Hat reinforcing the sand block rhythm and the kick drum adding another punctuated layer. Out of all this emerges a single clarinet that plays a carefree melody that seems to take its time in comparison to all the rhythm twittering around it. The flutes and piccolo add to this with short burst of notes at a hushed dynamic like so many gentle gusts of air. After a short flutter from the clarinet soloist and the crotales and piano the solo line is slyly taken over by the solo oboe. The murmuring line in the flutes and piccolo culminate in a unison gesture with the crotales and piano presenting the upper woodwinds adding to the ostinato layer. The euphoniums, bassoons and tenor sax then play the melody earlier played in the solo clarinet and oboe. This time with a fuller and more robust sound, and the melody is traded off and more activity is added and added. Then music gets denser and gains intensity until the entire bottom of the band drops out resulting in a moment of weightlessness until the bottom instruments re-enter. The percussion takes over beating the unwavering ostinato figure until it's pushed to it's limit and a fanfare like explosion is played by the winds and brass that will foreshadow events soon to come later in the music. The brief section transitions from decay of a residual cluster in the horns and clarinets while the ostinato are quietly reiterated in the glockenspiel and flutes. Out of the decay new music presents itself in a simple form, a melody in the clarinets with a contrapuntal line in the bassoons and bass clarinet. More counterpoint is added and the clarinets begin a flowing line of eight notes that weave in and around the melody while more instruments are added in and the musical soundscape begins to bloom into a tutti statement of the melody. The noble sound of the horns and trombones then echo a short cell of this melody and the muted trumpets restate the earlier fanfare. Everything cuts out and the muted trumpets draw in the attention of the ear with a diatonic cluster based on the notes of the harmonic ostinato found in the first portion of the piece. The cluster crescendos and the rhythmic drive returns and we are drawn back into the earlier music, but now instead of its bright major harmony the harmonic ostinato is now juxtaposed with a mellow natural minor sounds with broad shifting chords in the low

brass and winds. On top of this dual texture appears a solo saxophone with a smooth and introspective line, which is then paired with the solo flute. The line evolves and returns the brighter harmony we remember from earlier. The music builds and builds until the fanfare-like explosion returns catapulting us into the thrilling conclusion of the piece in a brilliant life-affirming moment that grows and exhausted the ostinato to a point of collapse leaving only the solo sand blocks that seem to disappear in the wind, or in this case the rain stick, resulting in a powerful yet breathtaking ending.

On a personal level, 'Up' was written at a time when my career was beginning to flourish before my eyes and it seemed like everything was going my way for a change. My music was being performed regularly and I had gained the respect of a lot of musicians and composers that I had idolized only a few years ago as a teenager (and whom I still idolize!). To me gaining this respect and being seen as a serious artist and musical colleague was one of the high points of my life. The thrill of seeing your dreams come true and your hard work and dedication to craft paying off is a personal joy unsurpassed by any other in my life. And this piece, while inspired by hot air balloons, also perfectly depicts the exhilaration I felt those early months of 2013; On top of the world! Anthony O'Toole, composer

An award-winning composer, conductor and clinician, Eric Whitacre is one of the bright stars in contemporary concert music. He composed October in 2000, commissioned by the Nebraska Wind Consortium. About this piece, Whitacre writes, "October is my favorite month. Something about the crisp autumn air and the subtle change in light always makes me a little sentimental, and as I started to sketch I felt the same quiet beauty in the writing. The simple, pastoral melodies and subsequent harmonies are inspired by the great English Romantics (Vaughan Williams, Elgar) as I felt that this style was also perfectly suited to capture the natural and pastoral soul of the season."

Armenian Dances, Set One is an extended symphonic rhapsody built upon five authentic Armenian folk songs from the extensive collection of musicologist Gomidas Vartabed. Considered the founder of Armenian classical music, Vartabed is credited with collecting and preserving well over four thousand Armenian folk songs. The opening song, "The Apricot Tree," consists of three organically connected songs. Its declamatory beginning, rhythmic vitality, and ornamentation make it a highly expressive and sentimental song. "Partridge's Song" was written by Vartabed and originally arranged for solo voice and children's choir. It has a simple, delicate melody, depicting the tiny steps of the partridge. "Hoy, My Nazan," is a lyric love song in which a young man sings the praises of his beloved Nazan. "Alagyaz," named after a mountain in Armenia, is a well-known Armenian folk song, sounding as majestic as the mountain it portrays. The final song used in the piece is "Go, Go." It is a humorous, lighttextured tune with a repeated note pattern that depicts the expression of laughter. Armenian Dances, Part One was first performed by the University of Illinois Symphonic Band on January 10, 1973, and is dedicated to the director of the ensemble, Dr. Harry Begian.

ABOUT THE YSU WIND ENSEMBLE & YSU BANDS:

The wind band program at Youngstown State University encompasses a wide range of performance groups, from concert bands and chamber groups to marching, pep, and jazz organizations. More than 250 students perform in one or more of these bands. Comprised from among the top wind and percussion students in the Dana School of Music, the Wind Ensemble performs a broad spectrum of music. ABOUT THE GUEST COMPOSER:

ANTHONY O'TOOLE holds a bachelor's degree in Music Theory & Composition from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania where he studied composition with Daniel Perlongo, Jack Stamp and David Martynuik. He is currently a master's student in Composition at George Mason University where he studies with Mark Camphouse. Anthony O'Toole's music is unique and fresh with its intense rhythmic energy, lush jazz-influenced harmonic language, and his talent for highly effective and colorful orchestration. Mr. O'Toole has written more than 100 works for almost every medium and began writing music in his early teens.

In high school his interest in composition stemmed from his studies as a percussionist and love of performing. He also became a competent multi-instrumentalist learning piano, viola, saxophone, clarinet, trombone and tuba. Although he is largely self-taught as a composer he credits many of his teachers for being mentors and advocates of his music. While at IUP he had the pleasure of receiving lessons and attending lectures from guest composers such as Cindy McTee, Samuel Hazo, Christopher Marshall, Frank Ticheli, Clark MacAllister, Richard Danielpour, Bruce Yurko and Drew Hemenger.

After graduation from IUP in 2011 he worked full-time as a composer while also working as an orchestrator and arranger for 2 years before beginning his MM in Composition at GMU. In the last 5 years Mr. O'Toole has seen success as a composer winning numerous prizes, which include the Grand Prize in the 2012 Garritan Composition Contest for his orchestral, work 'CA-91' as well as other accolades and honorable mentions. His music has been featured in the GIA Publication 'Teaching Music Through Performance in Band' (Solos with Wind Band Accompaniment edition) and BVD Press, Cimarron Music Press, Euphonium.com and Bandworks Publications publish a large amount of his music.

In particular, his band music has become rather popular and has been played by some of the finest ensembles including the University of North Texas Wind Symphony, 'The President's Own' United States Marine Band, The Indiana University of Pennsylvania Wind Ensemble and the United States Coast Guard Band. His band music and chamber music have been performed all over the country and internationally in Canada, Australia, Taiwan, Portugal, Britain, Brazil and Singapore.

Mr. O'Toole currently lives in Fairfax, VA as a graduate student all while maintaining a full load of commissions for original works as well as arranging and orchestrating projects

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS:

STEPHEN L. GAGE has served as Professor of Music and Director of Bands & Orchestra at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music since 1993. In fall 2014, Dr. Gage was appointed as the conductor of the YSU Dana Symphony Orchestra in addition to his work with the YSU Wind Ensemble and Dana Chamber Winds & Strings. Stephen holds degrees from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, the Eastman School of Music, and the State University of New York at Fredonia where he also earned the Performers Certificate and was a concerto winner. Stephen studied conducting with Harry John Brown, Donald Hunsberger, David Effron, Roy Ernst, James Keene, H. Robert Reynolds, and Paul Vermel. In September 2012, Dr. Gage was appointed as the Conductor of the W. D. Packard Concert Band in Warren. Stephen begins his 22nd season as the Edward Zacharias Memorial Chair/Conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. Previous teaching positions include serving as Director of Bands & Orchestra at Emporia State University (KS) and as Director of Bands at Auburn High School (NY).

Professor Gage has written numerous published articles on conducting, rehearsal techniques, and wind band literature, and he is an active wind band and orchestral guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator of international repute. Stephen has guest conducted and cliniced high school honor bands and orchestras as well as a number of university wind bands throughout the United States. His list of guest conducting appearances includes the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, the U.S. Army Band: "Pershing's Own", and the U.S. Army Field Band & Chorus among others. The list also includes experiences in Canada, Ireland, and in 34 states. Dr. Gage has received critical acclaim from a number of distinguished composers. including a number of Pulitzer prize winners: Joseph Schwanter, Carter Pann, John Mackey, Samuel Adler, Karel Husa, Frank Ticheli, John Mackey, Michael Colgrass, Donald Grantham, D.J. Sparr, Jerry Ascione, and David Gillingham for his interpretation and recordings of their music. Stephen's professional affiliations include memberships in the CBDNA, NBA, OMEA/MENC, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, Sigma Alpha Iota, and Phi Kappa Phi. Dr. Gage has been inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters and was named as both Distinguished Professor and Faculty Mentor of the Year at YSU; he is currently on the NBA Foundation Board of Directors. In 2012, Gage was awarded the Marty Manning Faculty Mentor Award at the University. Stephen and the YSU Wind Ensemble made their Carnegie Hall debut in 2005 and the group has produced seven CD recordings. The sixth CD in this series, Urban Requiem, was released on the NAXOS International Recording Label in June 2008 and the seventh; Old Wine In New Bottles was released by NAXOS in August 2012. Both of these NAXOS recordings have earned critical praise from numerous critical reviewers and represented composers for their artistically convincing performances and musical and technical quality.

Stephen lives in Poland, Oh with his wife, Stephanie, and two of his three children, Claudia and Brendan; Gage's son, Matthew, and granddaughter, Zoey, live in Austin, TX.

BRANDT PAYNE is Director of Athletic Bands, and Assistant Professor of Music for the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. At YSU he conducts the marching band, pep band, concert band and university band. He teaches courses in conducting, instrumental music education, and graduate wind literature. Dr. Payne conducts the Stambaugh Youth Concert Band in Youngstown, Ohio. Brandt has held similar academic appointments at the University of Hawai'i and University of Wyoming. Dr. Payne began his teaching career as a high school band director in the Red Oak Public Schools in Red Oak, Iowa.

Dr. Payne is active as an author, guest conductor, and clinician throughout the United States. Dr. Payne recently co-authored the new editions of two textbooks, including the Complete Marching Band Resource Manual, with University of Pennsylvania Press and Conducting; the Art of Communication with Oxford University Press. He has published articles with the Instrumentalist, and written literature and recording reviews for the International Trombone Association Journal. Dr. Payne has given presentations at the national conferences of the College Band Directors National Association and the CBDNA National Athletic Band Symposium.

A native of Iowa, Dr. Payne holds a Bachelor of Music degree in trombone performance and teacher certification from the University of Iowa, a Master of Music degree in trombone performance and, Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting, both from Arizona State University, in Tempe.

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
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

PROGRAM NOTES AND TEXT TRANSLATIONS

Missa brevis in D, KV 194

During the summer of 1774 W. A. Mozart wrote two Masses within a few weeks: the *Missa brevis* in F major, KV 192, and the *Missa brevis* in D major, KV 194. In these two *brevis* Masses Mozart sought to combine traditional polyphonic technique with a more modern musical language. Mozart's autograph score is dated the 8th August 1774. This work, like KV 192, was intended for Salzburg Cathedral. Corresponding to the restricted scale of a *missa brevis*, Mozart wrote this work for a small ensemble of four voices (SATB), choral and solo, two violins, bass and organ, together with the three trombones normally used at Salzburg to double the three lower voices of the choir.

Stylistically speaking, KV 194 is similar to the Mass KV192, but here contrapuntal writing seems a less prominent feature overall. Its lessened importance is at once evident in the *Kyrie*. Only the opening of the *Kyrie II* takes the form of a regular fugal exposition. The *Christe eleison* suggests a fugue, but in fact it consists of episodic contrapuntal play with motives; indeed, the brief modulatory passage after the opening presentation of the theme even resembles the later technique of development, which may be seen to have evolved from intensive exploration of polyphonic technique. The orchestra is generally employed to accompany the singers, but in passages of thematic development it contributes brief independent motives.

The Gloria and Credo are principally homophonic in conception. In Gloria it is only at the "Domine Deus Agnus Dei" and in the concluding "Amen" that the voices are interwoven in imitation; there is no concluding fugato like that in the F major Mass. In the Credo, counterpoint is restricted to the passages "Et resurrexit and in remissionem peccatorum," and the "Amen." Elsewhere the chordal texture is seldom broken up by contrapuntal episodes. Mozart has here solved the problem of giving musical cohesion to the Credo, with its many separate declarations of faith. Instead of repetitions of the word "Credo" (the priest's intonation "Credo in unum Deum" is not set to music in this Mass), Mozart made repeated use of the opening motive of the violins, at various points in the movement, thus creating a unified structure. He also linked the end of the first section of the Credo with the conclusion of the third section by reverting to the themes of the "descendit de coelis" for the final "Amen." Similarly he achieved unity within the third section of the Credo by reverting to the "Et resurrexit" theme for the "Amen" fugato. Indeed, the "Et vitam," with its re-use of the most important formal elements of what has gone before (Credo opening, "et resurrexit" fugato and "descendit" passage), proves to be a resume of the whole movement. A similar desire to achieve formal unity is also evident in the Kyrie and Gloria, with the return, akin to a recapitulation, of the opening idea of each.

Al Shlosha D'varim is a lyrical setting of the popular maxim for Pirkei Avot (Jewish morality laws): "The world is sustained by three things, by, truth, by justice, and by peace." It is commissioned by the Interfaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington Combined Choir of the 21st Annual Interfaith Concert, honoring Austin H. Kiplinger Washington National Cathedral, November 14, 2000. Two counter melodies support each other while dictating one continuous statement in the form of a partner song.

Gabriel's Oboe

Ennio Morricone, an Italian composer, orchestrator, conductor and former trumpet player, has written music for more than 500 motion pictures and television series, as well as contemporary classical works. *Gabriel's Oboe* appears in the Academy Award-winning motion picture, *The Mission* (1986). The film is about the experiences of a Jesuit missionary in 18th century South America. The story is set in the 1750s and involves Spanish Jesuit priest Father Gabriel who enters the South American jungle to build a mission and convert a Guarani community to Christianity. The Guarani community above the perilous Iguazu Falls has tied a priest to a cross and sent him over the falls to his death. Father Gabriel travels to the falls, climbs to the top, and plays his oboe (Gabriel's Oboe) in the middle of the jungle sensing the presence of Guarani warriors. The Guarani warriors, captivated by the music, allow him to live. Craig H. Johnson, composer and conductor of the *Conspirare*, arranged the music for oboe and cello as well as his famous professional choir.

MLK is the tenth and final song from U2's 1984 album, *The Unforgettable Fire*. Honoring Martin Luther King, Jr. This composition is set to be a lullaby in a pensive and meditative character. The simple and repetitive melody and long sustained chords with the simple lullaby text transport audience's mind into a deep and reflective world.

I'll Make the Difference

Moses Hogan was an African-American composer and arranger of choral music. He was best known for his settings of spirituals. He was also an accomplished pianist and conductor of international renown. His works are performed and celebrated by all levels of choirs from all over the world. He died at the age of 45 of a brain tumor. He was educated at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and Julliard School of Music studying piano. *I'll Make the Difference* was commissioned by the American Cancer Society Relay for Life, "Celebration on the Hill," Washington D. C., 2002. The song is subtitled "A Song of Hope for Singers around the World."

The text of *Adon Olan* (Eternal Lord) comes from one of the few strictly metrical hymns in the Jewish liturgy. It is one of the most familiar hymns in the wide range of Jewish liturgy. This text has been set to many different tunes. This particular setting is based on a hymn-tune used by the Jews of the Isle of Djerba, off the Tunisian coast of Africa. Their unusually strong adherence to their ancient traditions makes their prayer melodies both historically authentic and musically fascinating. This melody is an exceptionally beautiful one.

He is the eternal Lord, who reigned before any being had yet been created; When all was done according to His will, already then His name was King. And after all has ceased to be, still will He reign in solitary majesty; He was, He is, and He shall be in glory.

And He is One; none other can compare to Him, or consort with Him. And he is first and he is last to every matter and every form.

Cielito Lindo (Little Sky) is one of Mexico's most beloved folk songs. The arranger, Barbara J. Harlow is founder of Santa Barbara Music Publishing. Years ago when she took her college chamber choir on tour to Santa Barbara's Sister City, Puerta Vallarta, Mexico, the choir performed in different venues, including cobble stone streets as part of a parade, outdoor concert on a balcony, elementary school, and a tiny downtown church. And the singers were entertained royally at a mountaintop restaurant. The composer dedicates this arrangement to the gracious people of Puerta Vallarta.

Pretty Cielito comes down from the mountain,
Her black eyes like those of a smuggler.

Gloria in excelsis

Joseph Haydn, an Austrian composer, is probably best known for his establishment of Classical Symphony. He became the principal architect of the classical style of music. He also has a significant accomplishment in sacred music, including his unique oratorio *The Creation* and Masses. His late six Masses are particularly significant in terms of setting them in a symphonic form. *Gloria in excelsis* is the opening section of the *Gloria* movement from *Heiligmesse* of 1796, one of his late six Masses. The Mass was written in honor of St. Bernard of Offida, a Capuchin monk who devoted himself to helping the poor. It is clearly indicated in the official title of the Mass, *Missa sancti Bernardi von Offida*. The German title, *Heiligmesse*, became popular because the 'Sanctus' section of the Mass is a setting of a then-popular Austrian tune to the German translation of "Sanctus": "*Heilig.*"

Gloria in excelsis Deo et in terra pax hominibus bonae voluntatis.

Hail Holy Queen is a choral selection from the motion picture Sister Act, an American film released in 1992 by Touchstone Pictures. It was one of the most financially successful comedies in the early 1990s, featuring musical arrangements by Marc Shaiman. Hail Holy Queen is sung by nuns at one Sunday Mass in the film. It begins in a traditional manner beautifully, but soon it shifts to an unexpected one, a gospel and rock-and-roll-infused performance of the hymn, bringing the people together into excitement.

Hail holy queen enthroned above, oh Maria.
Hail mother of mercy and of love, oh Maria.
Triumph all ye cherubim. Sing with us ye seraphim.
Heaven and earth resound the hymn. Salve regina.
Our life our sweetness here below, oh Maria.
Our hope in sorrow and in woe, oh Maria.
Alleluia! Mater a mater a-ma-ter-in-ter-mer-at-a, Sanctus, Dominus.
Virgo respice mater ad spice. Sanctus Dominus. Alleluia!

Sfogava con le stelle is a selection from Monteverdi's Madrigal Book IV published in 1603. This is the first known setting by Monteverdi of a poem by his Florentine friend Ottavio Rinunccini. With his Fourth (1603) and Fifth (1605) Books of Madrigals, Monteverdi began to stretch the accepted musical language of the sixteenth century beyond the limit. This madrigal opens with a technique known as falsobordone, a kind of declamatory, chordal recitative on a repeated triad. Although the technique is nothing new in the period as it was often used in psalm settings as a quick and easy way to set the many repeated notes of psalm tones, here, though, Monteverdi employs falsobordone to express the stark, emotionally neutral voice of the narrator, who says: "A lovesick man was venting to the stars his grief, under the night sky..." In the ending section Monteverdi uses the technique again to accommodate the dramatic sense of the texts: "Make her, with your golden likeness merciful indeed," repeating it three times in different harmonic triads. It certainly adds a dramatic effect to the music and brings this composition to a unique place in the history of music.

A lovesick man was venting to the stars his grief, under the night sky. And staring at them he said: "O beautiful images of my idol whom I adore, just as you are showing me her rare beauty while you sparkle so well, so also demonstrate to her my living ardor: by your golden appearance you'd make her compassionate, just as you make me loving."

The Seal Lullaby is a masterpiece by the famous contemporary American composer, Eric Whitacre whose virtual choir video of another masterwork Sleep (sung by 2052 singers from all over the world) in the YouTube hit close to three million viewers. The composer tells about his composition: "The Seal Lullaby is a beautiful story, classic Kipling, dark and rich and not at all condescending to kids. Best of all, Kipling begins his tale with the mother seal singing softly to her young pup:"

Oh! Hush thee, my baby, the night is behind us, And black are the waters that sparkled so green. The moon, o'er the combers, looks downward to find us At rest in the hollows that rustle between.

Where billow meets billow, then soft by thy pillow; Ah, weary wee flipperling, curl at thy ease! The storm shall not wake thee, nor shark overtake thee, Asleep in the arms of the slow-swinging seas.

For the Beauty of the Earth is another masterwork by an Irish composer, Philip Stopford. Stopford is Director of Music at Belfast Cathedral in Northern Ireland. He began his musical career as a Chorister at Westminster Abbey, read music and was Organ Scholar at Keble College, Oxford, and has held posts at Cantebury, Chester and Truro Cathderals. His compositions are well focused on the liturgy of the church. For the Beauty of the Earth was written for the Belfast Cathedral Choir. It is a gentle reflection on God's creation written in a hymn variation style of seven-part mixed choir. The music flows with a steady constant pulse and moves naturally.

Messiah, an oratorio by George Frideric Handel, is one of the most famous compositions in the whole of Western music. Unlike most oratorios, Messiah does not have actual characters depicting a biblical story in recitative and arias, although its text is taken from the Bible. Handel, after having an ideal libretto (compiled from the Bible by Charles Jennens, Handel's long-time librettist), began to set it to music on August 22, 1741 and completed the score on September 14, 1741. The first performance of Messiah was for charity at the New Music Hall, Dublin, Ireland on April 13, 1742. As the Dana holiday concert of December 3, 2014 will feature the Messiah as the centerpiece of the concert, this concert previews two chorus numbers from the Messiah: no. 4 And the Glory and no. 44 Hallelujah.

Soo-Kyung Park first won international acclaim as winner of the Promising Artist Search in her native South Korea, where she performed in recital at the Seoul Arts Center, and subsequently won first prize in the New York Flute Club Competition, performing in New York's Cami Hall. She has performed as soloist with the Korean Symphony at Alice Tully Hall. Her radio credits include APR's "Performance Today" and WQXR's "McGraw Hill Young Artist Showcase" hosted by Bob Sherman. She has performed solo and chamber music concerts in the United States, and throughout Europe and Asia.

As an orchestral musician, she has performed and toured as principal flute and piccolo with orchestras in the United States, Israel and Asia, with some of the world's most eminent conductors, including Pierre Boulez, James DePreist, Jahja Ling, Kurt Masur, Byung Hyun Rhee, Leonard Slatkin, Gerard Schwarz and Hugh Wolff.

Highly in demand as a teacher and coach, Ms. Park has taught master classes in the United States, Europe and Korea. In addition to her position on the faculty of New York University, she remains a faculty member of the Manhattan School of Music, Pre-College Division.

In addition to maintaining an active flute studio, she is founder and president of an educational consulting company specializing in preparing American and International students for conservatory auditions and National/International competitions. She also has produced numerous master classes featuring world renowned flutists, including Jeanne Baxtresser, Jasmine Choi, Nicolas Duchamp, Karl-Heinz Schutz, Keith Underwood and Carol Wincenc to name a few.

As the founding member and artistic director of the Musicians of Lenox Hill, she has led the ensemble for annual performances at the Temple of Israel in NYC for over a decade

Ms. Park has written for "Flute and Flutist" magazine in Korea, where her contributions include featured cover story interviews with Jeanne Baxtresser and Carol Wincenc. Her articles have also appeared in the Juilliard Journal.

Last year, her first album, "Reminiscing" was released under SONY Korea label.

Donna Amato was born in Pittsburgh, where she also received her earliest musical training. She later studied with Ozan Marsh, Louis Kentner, Gaby Casadesus, Guido Agosti and Angelica Morales von Sauer. She has made concert appearances in Great Britain, France, Italy, Germany, Spain, Austria, Norway, Mexico, Canada, Russia and the United States, and radio broadcasts on the BBC as well as the inaugural live broadcast on Classic FM. Her concerto performances have included the Mozart Concerto, K.488, Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto No. 1, Daniel Dorff's Piano Concerto, Nancy Galbraith's 2nd Piano Concerto and the 4th Piano Concerto 'Aurora Borealis' by Geirr Tveitt (which can be seen in its entirety on YouTube). She performed works of Giacinto Scelsi in Rome at the invitation of the Scelsi Foundation, and toured with Pittsburgh's River City Brass Band in a series of performances of the Jazz Concerto in D by Dana Suesse. Other performances with orchestra have included the Skryabin Piano Concerto, the 2nd Piano Concerto of Edward MacDowell, the Saint-Saëns Piano Concerto No. 4, Leonardo Balada's Concerto for Piano, Winds and Percussion, and the world première of Sorabji's 5th Piano Concerto. In 2005 she performed Michael Daugherty's Le tombeau de Liberace in Arizona, and Messiaen's Couleurs de la cité célèste with the Carnegie Mellon University Wind Ensemble, conducted by George Vosburgh. A number of leading composers have written works especially for her, which she has performed, broadcast and recorded. Donna Amato currently teaches piano at the University of Pittsburgh and Carnegie Mellon University, and works at Carnegie Mellon as an Assisting Artist, while maintaining a busy schedule of solo and chamber-music concert appearances.
