Private schools may hold hearings

In a decision that could affect students who pro
test at private colleges, a federal appeals court las teek spid Hamilton College in New York must of
weal week said Hamilton College in New York must of
fer judicial hearings to 12 of its students before
discipining them for participating in disciplining them for participating in a sit-in. The appeals court decision, college President J.
Martin Carovano said Sept. 11 , would give colleges "less discretion" in disciplining students.
The court, which voted $2-1$ in favor of th The court, which votad 2-1 in favor of the
students, said Hamilton's disciplinary policy, writ students, said Hamilton's disciplinary policy, writ-
ten specifically to comply with a 1969 New York ten specifically to comply with a 1969 New Yor
State law, violated the students' constitutional rights to due process.
The court said in Albert v. Carovano that, "there is little doubt that Hamilton would ever have adopted the new regulations and the policy reflected therein
state. The case, said the students' attorney, Michae Krinsky, could be used as a precedent in othe states if there's evidence of "state influence or coe cion on how to handle student protest.
"We successfully argued that the Constitution's due process clause gives the students the right to a hearing" before they are punished, Krinsky said.
Because they are state agencies, Because they are state agencies, public schools disciplingry matters. The Hamilton case, Krinsky said, established that right for private college students if their schools have links to the state. "In a broader sense, colleges must be truly inependent of the state if they want to avoid extending constitutional privileges," Krinsky said.
'I consider the Court of Appeals decision significant step forward in having Hamilton College deal with student protests in a fair and responble fashion.
