it was a false alarm," said second floor resident Janet Kemper, senior, accounting.

curred said they didn't realize there was a fire until they went out into the hallway
Anita Apte, junior, combined sciences,
"thought it was just another false alarm so l just "thought it was just another false alarm so I just
moseyed down the hall. When I got to Dorothy and Julie's room I saw smoke and grig to Dorothy light coming from under the door. Then I saw that our RA [resident assistant] was about to open the door. I didn't wait around - 1 just ran." Lee Ann Mains, freshman, public relation was on the phone when the alarm rang
thought someone had pulled the alarm but then I saw the smoke in the hall. I just hung up the phone real fast and ran downstairs. "First I got annoyed when I heard the alarm. Then I got really scared when I realized there was there! I was very worried," said Hiral Vyas, junior combined sciences
Kristin Peterson, freshman, F\&PA, said she thought it was ironic that there really was a fire ing with other residents about all the false alarms. "We had decided not to go down if another alarm went off. Then the alarm didgo off and we all sat around and laughed since we had just
been talking about it. We almost didn't go downstairs until we realized we could be fined if we didn't."
"Once I realized it was a fire I was shocked $I$ just wanted to get out. shoes since they thought it was a dalse withou What they didn't expect was the glass in the third floor hallway from the fire extinguisher case and all the water from the water hoses. Charles Wu, freshman, combined sciences,
said he was "irritated" when he heard the alarm but he went downstairs. "The steps from the third floor down were wet and I slipped and landed on my front. My sweat pants were pretty much soaked. I realized when we were allowed to come back inside
the glass."
Despite the initial sluggishness of the residents after the alarm sounded, third floor resident assis tant Cindy Deeks, senior, dietetics and nutrition said she "was really pleased with everyone. They

## Disney seeking Pan Am talent

Exhibit makes social statement

| The Butler Institute of American Art is currently showing <br> an impressive display of paintings and prints by artist Aaron Bohrod. <br> This retrospective begins with work done in 1932 and spans the decades of his life through 1985. There is an interesting progression between Bohrod's somewhat primitive early works, such as Strèet Scene in Santa Fe from 1932, to his later realistic Warts and All painted in 1985. <br> A particulariy outstanding social statement is made in Mississippi Landscape depicting the poverty of the black race - not a popular subject in 1937. <br> Several ink washes done in the 1940s give an eerie antiwar feeling, particularly one titled Military Necessity which intertwines war with the Crucifixion of Christ. <br> Bohrod's sense of humor is obvious too, not only in his subject matter but also in his choice of tittes, Octopussies and Septuplicats both deal with cats in a humorous way. <br> Not to be ignored are the series of lithographs, mostly city scenes, done in the 1930s and 40s. His realistic style begins to show strongly as a threshold toward some of his later paintings. <br> Overall, this retrospective is both entertaining and educational. It follows the life's work of a gifted artist, expressing both his humor and his sensitivity. It is inspiring to look at one talented man's view of life. |  |

One show sure to catch the eye is that of the paintings by Lester Johnson. Johnson's paintings deal with stylized figures in natural
settings. Influenced in his early works by the French Impres setings. Influenced in his early works by the French Impres sionists, the artist expresses his own taste rather than that of a realistic nature. Sexy ladies on the street with bold colored dresses
dominate paintings such as Street Scenes with Three Graces (1977) or Street Scenes (1979-80).

One painting which stands by itself is that of Johnson's daughter, Leslie. Portrait of Lesile (1972) shows a young girl pos another popular Johnson subject With an unfinished quality, Lester Johnson passes from tones of gray, Seven Men with Hats (1970), to colors that seem to flow right off the canvas, City Girls.(1985).
In the short biography at the entrance to the show, Johnson talks of compressing figures together to create energy. This rhythmic composition works nicely in the paintings shown here.
