with Kent's head of history, Dr. A Sellow Roberts, the authenticit of the canoe paddle was proven. Dr. Roberts declared: "The
markings on the paddle, when translated, say that the Indians, in return for certain goods and sup-
plies, gave the site of what is now Youngstown to John Young and
