fort of those interested in serving the public should be at least as efficient as the separate attempts, of
each group.
The cry at the loss of recognition is the result of the name of their group in front of the public eye

deals with the relationship of deals with the relationship of

ties of college freshmen.
In his investigation Dr. JohnIn his investigation Dr. John-,
son compares a prior study of imson compares a prior study of im-
provement made by a group of provement made by a group of
poor readers who were given in-
tensive training in reading with poor readers who were given in-
tensive training in reading, with
the improvement made by a sithe improvement made by a si-
milar group who attened a "psy-
chotherapy" class. Findings show that those in the special class

as those taking the training. as those taking the training.
"There is

points out Dr. Johnson. "Other points out Dr. Johnson. "Other
stuties indicate that if students
are tense, anxious, or feel inferiare tense, anxious, or feel inferi-
or, it may be reflected in poor
reading. Increasing the students reading. Increasing the students'
self esteem, and giving him con-
fidence, will mean better read self esteem, and giving him con-
