Led by the educated throwing arm of Jim Heber and some brilliant defensive play by Sloko Gill the Penguins managed to squeeze out a well earned victory in downing the Waynesburg eleven 12-0 at Waynesburg last Saturday.

A 28-yard pass from Heber to Lanzi accounted for the first Penguin marker, climaxing a 72-yard drive, and immediately afterwards a 30-yard off-tackle smash by

Perantoni netted the other, following a blocked kick. Both attempts for the extra point failed. The encounter was bitterly fought throughout the first three quarters with each team digging in when one or the other got within scoring territory.

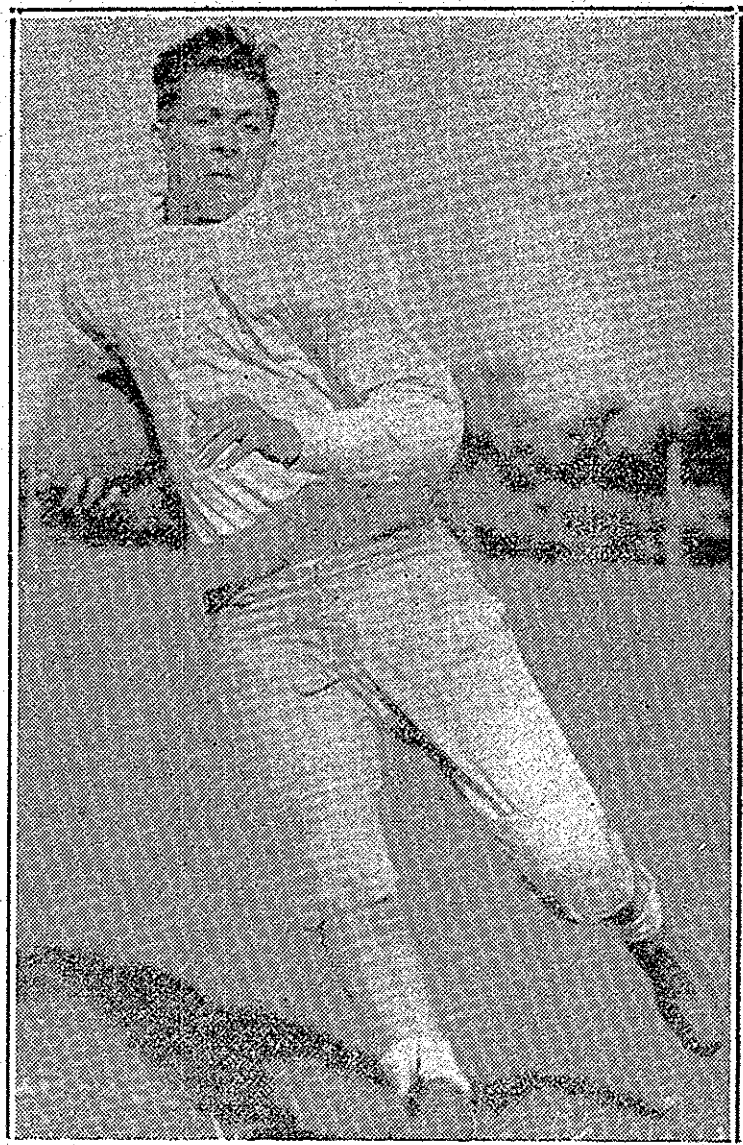
Waynesburg, although showing some rugged defensive play when the Penguins threatened on two occasions, came close to pay dirt only once, as a result of a poor kick. The ball sailed out of bounds on the Youngstown 28 and the Yellow Jackets lost the ball on downs.

Approximately 3,500 fans witnessed the fray with some 500 loyal rooters from YoCo making the trip.

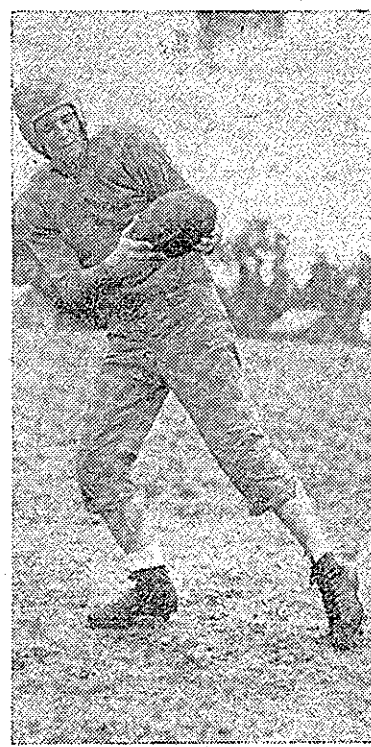

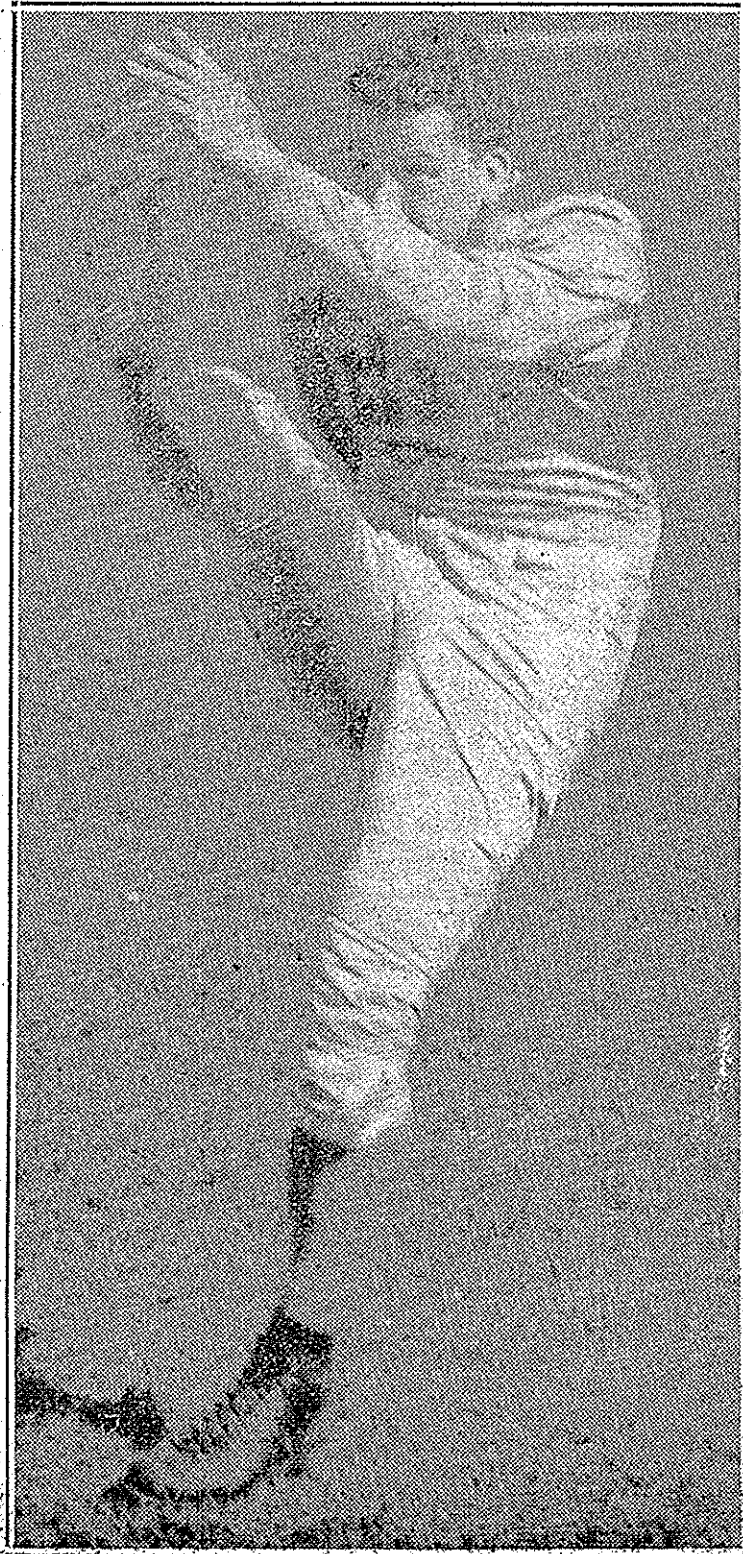

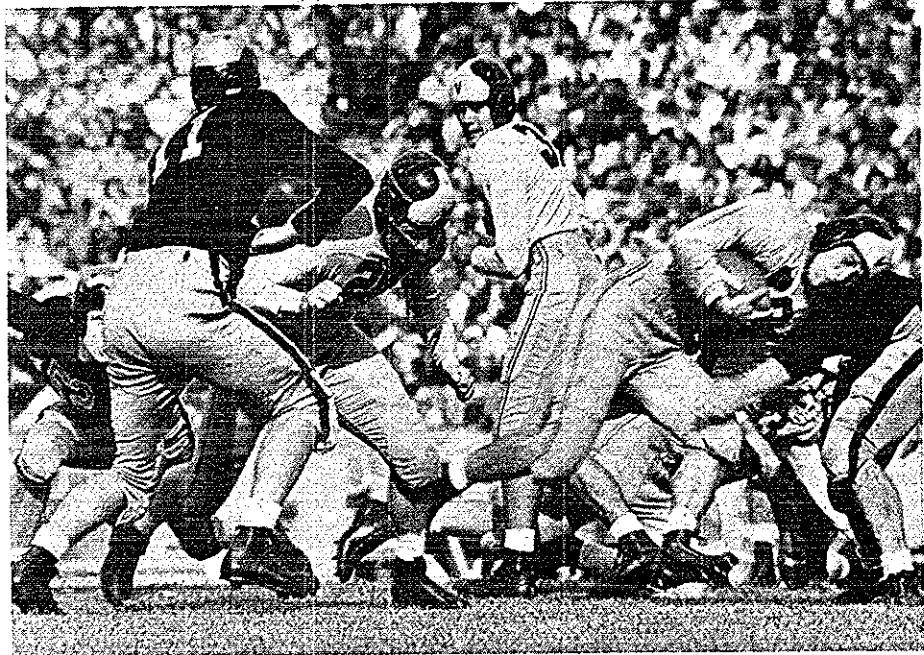

Football's Forgotten Men

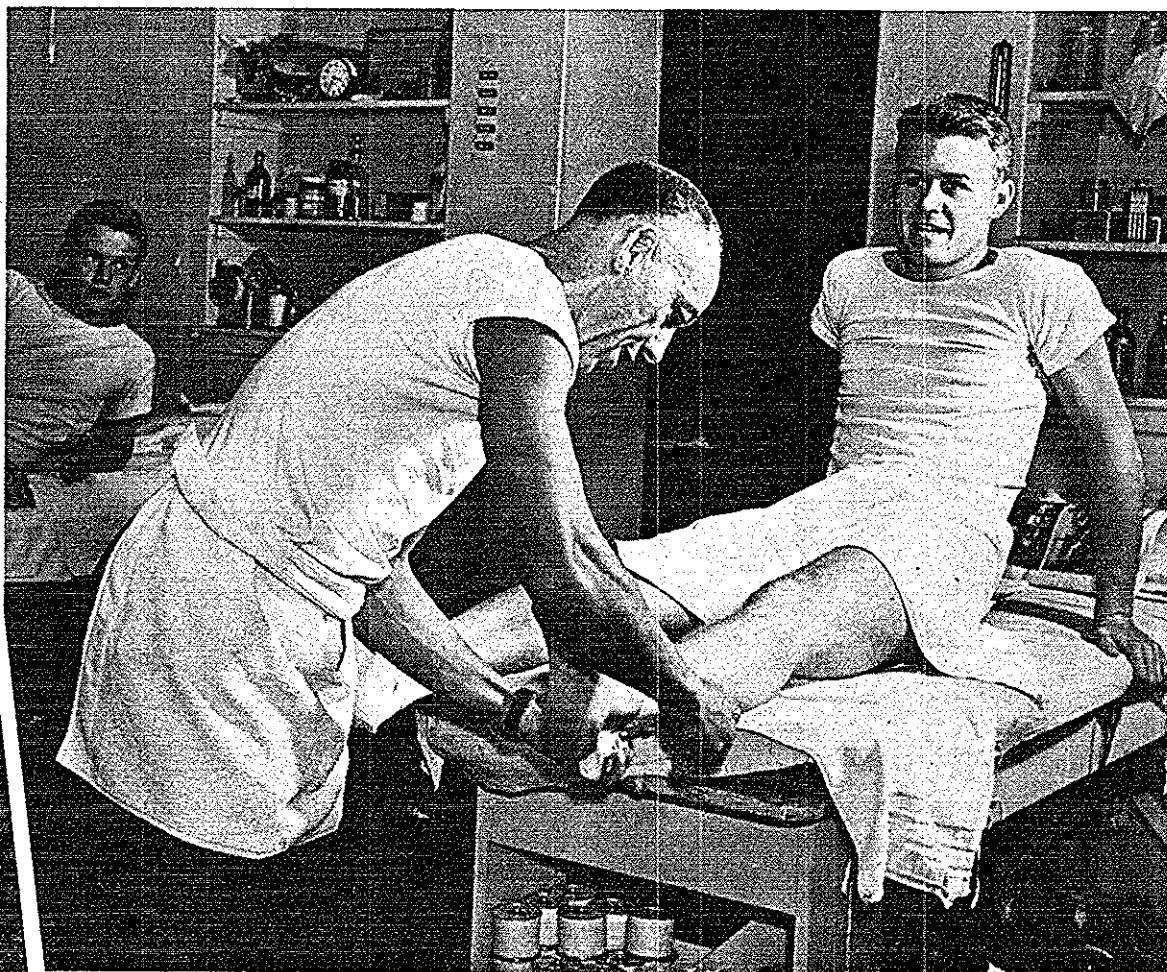
Another football season is under way. They are passing out the honors, publicity, and backslaps to the heroes on every campus. But there are many others, also factors

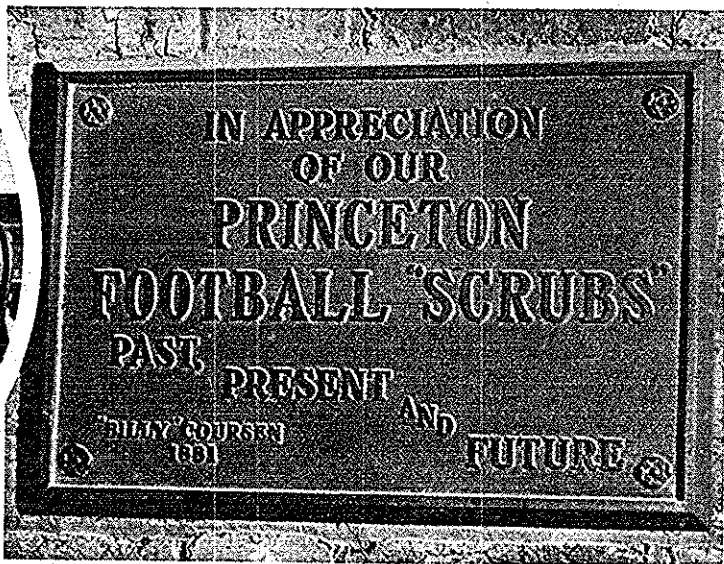

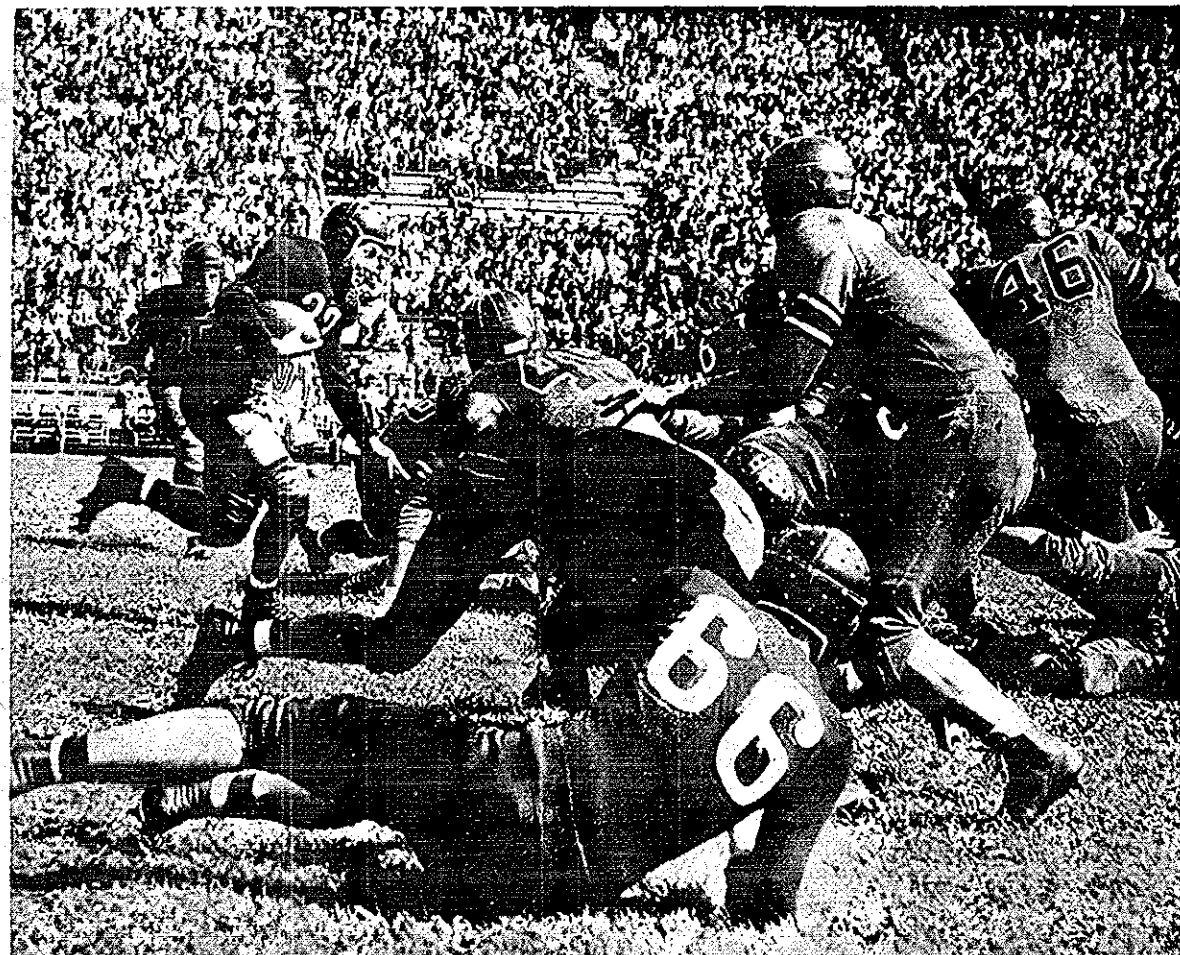

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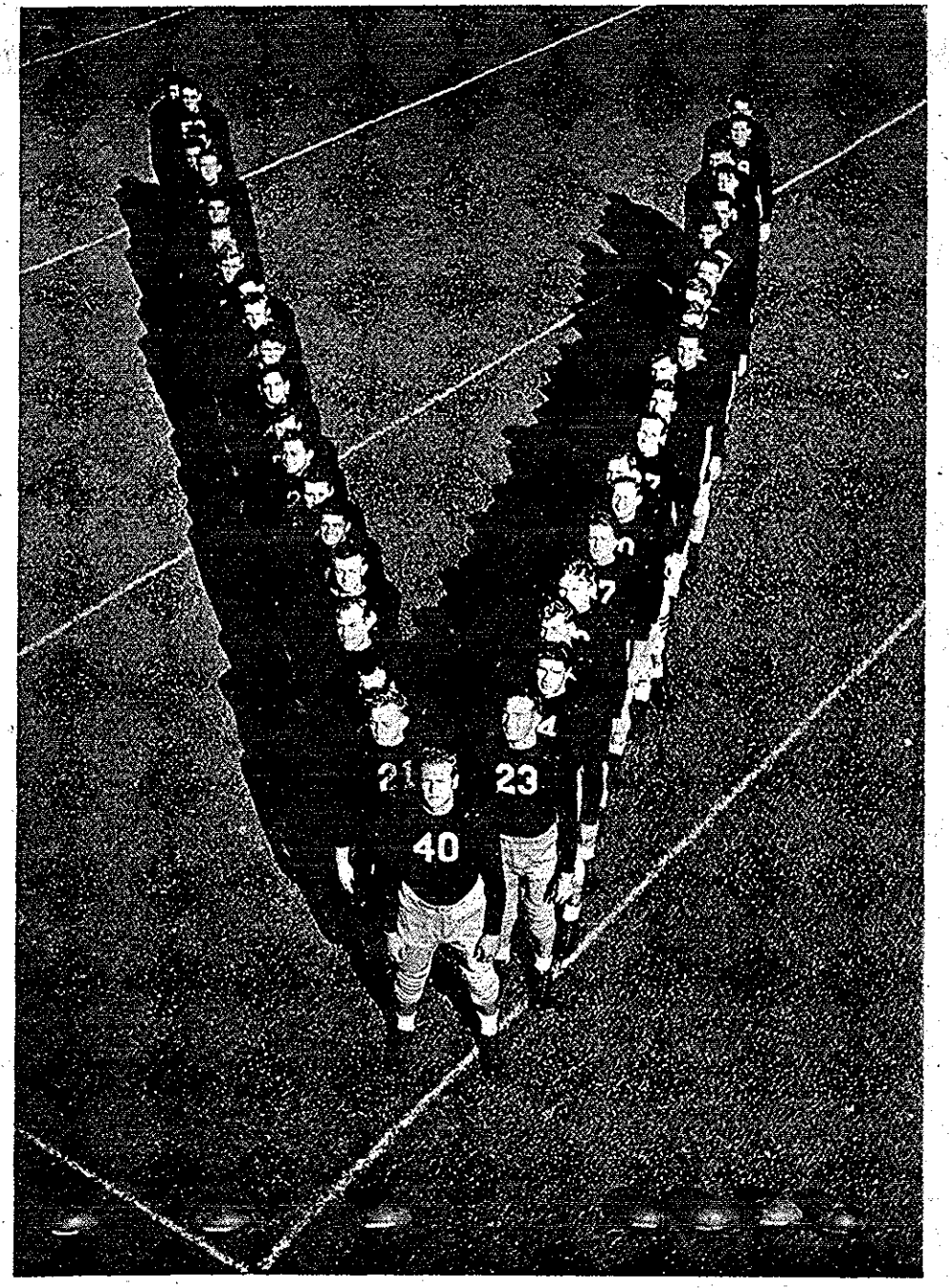

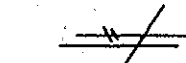

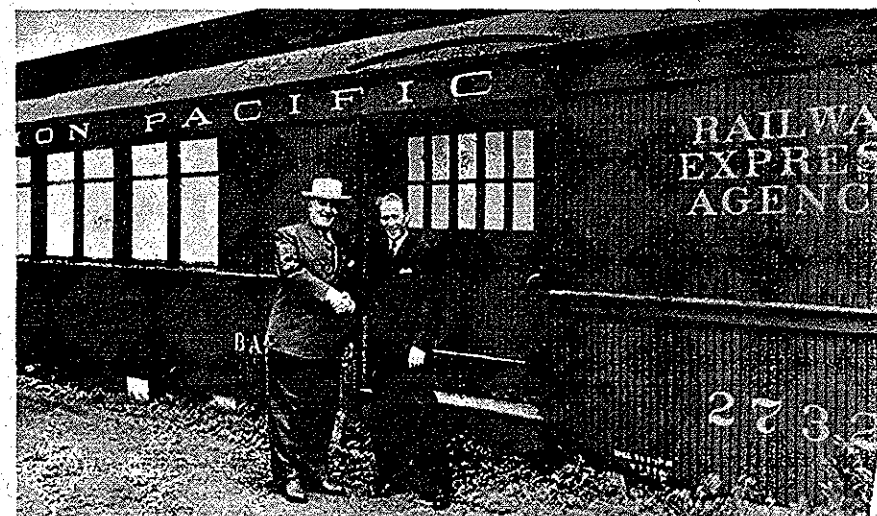
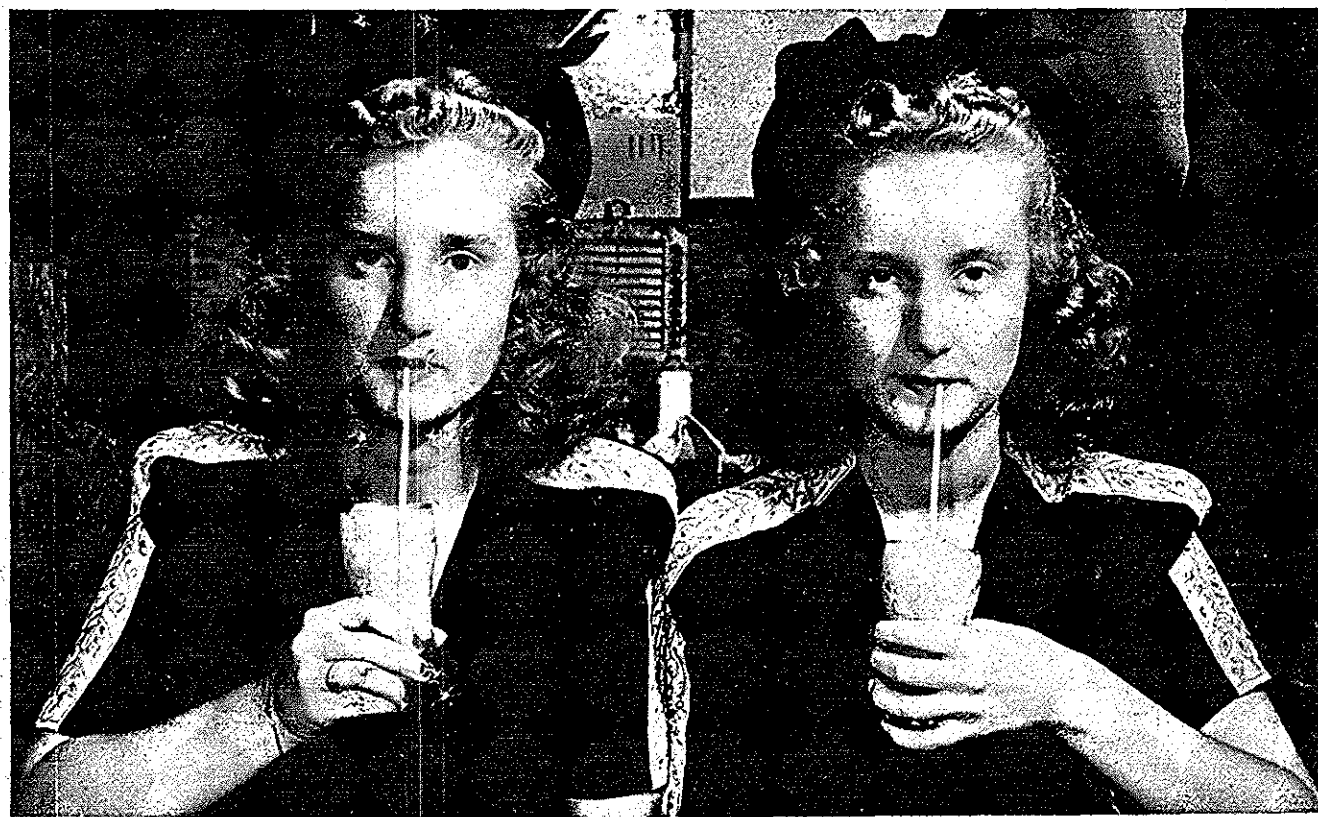
