And just remember, it isn't President Jones' university or the Dean's or the faculty's university. It isn't "Those other students' university." It's OUR university. Do your part. Don't let us down.

#### Do We Need ROTC?

There are those who will tell you that ROTC is "sissy stuff." There are those students on the campus who will smile openly when asked if they wanted to join ROTC at registration. There are those hardened veterans who will tell of worthless and incompetent officers who were once ROTC students. There are those who would rather not see an Reserve Officers Training Corps on this campus at all and are quick to tell you just that.

The late Governor of New York, Alfred E. Smith, who had a way for finding the right word, often used a really good one after hearing ridiculous arguments from politicians. That word is "Baloney." We think it applies to the views listed above.

Pure logic will tell any intelligent citizen that ROTC is necessary and that without it the hard core of our officers corps would dis-

West Point does not graduate enough officers to guide our Army. Officers Candidate School doesn't do it, either. The ROTC does it.

The Officer corps of the United States Army possesses some of the noblest traditions devised by mankind for the preservation of our nation. They trained, planned and won our wars for us, by guiding the men under their command with integrity and honor. To be sure, there are foul balls at every baseball game and the Army is no exception. But they are in the minority.

The ROTC is not a giveaway program. Nothing is given for the student merely to take for granted. A commission is worked and studied for and the filtering process of all candidates is continually going on, with the results being shown in the high quality of men who have received their lieutenants bars here at the Youngstown

We're not patting anybody on the back. We just think it's time that all the arm-chair militarists should either prove what they can say or

The old idea that four years of ROTC is any easy way to dodge the draft is out. Surely it is sensible for any student to want to complete his education at one time, without a two year break interfering, but cadets who enter the corps with that idea alone in their mind don't last long. Their indifference to the traditions and importance of the officer training program soon show up.

We are fortunate to have here at the university an ROTC branch. The high enrollment increase this semester in the cadet corps, and the successful participation in the many corps activities justify our belief, we think.







# Civil Service Positions Open

A new examination is now open for Student Trainee positions in the fields of physics, metallurgy, chemistry, cartography, engineering, mathematics, meteorology, and oceanography, the U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced. The jobs are in the Potomac River Naval Command and in various other Federal agencies in Washington, D.C., and the nearby area, and pay from \$2,690 to \$3,415 a year.

College students who have completed (or will complete within 9 months of filing application) either publicity and on the availability of one, two, or three years of study leading to a bachelor's degree with major study in one of the optional fields listed above may apply.

#### Training Offered

The program consists of periods of on-the-job training at a Federal agency alternating with attendance at a cooperating college or university. In some fields, trainees may be employed only during the summer months and attend college during the entire school year. Written tests will be given.

Further information and application forms may be obtained at many post offices throughout the country, or from the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C.

Applications must be filed with the Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners for Scientific and Technical Personnel of the Potomac River Naval Command, Building 72, Naval Research Laboratory, Washington, D.C.



# Why Take Social Science?

There can be no question but what the incoming student takes Social Science 101 and 102 in the spirit of a newcomer who has sufficient respect for the experience of others not to engage in argument the first day.

Nevertheless, few are so naive as not to realize within a week or so that in these courses they are up against something unusual, not to say vexatious and bewildering.

Hence, it is my intention in a series of articles in the Jambar to explain the nature of this subject and to demonstrate the purpose that lies back of the decision, a number of years ago, to require every candidate for a degree at Youngstown University to take at least six hours of social science.

#### Had No Requirement

Students in my own college days faced no such requirement. They had to take a laboratory science, aforeign language, a course in English composition resembling Communications 105 and 106, and some History sequence like History 201 and 202, but nothing like Social Science 101 and 102,

In fact, colleges and universities offered no such course that we could have taken, though they offered many in various social science subjects conomics, sociology, political hience, psychology, and so on - quite s all colleges did and still do.

These, however, have a wholly different approach with different objectives, and these differences account for the requirement that faces every Youngstown University freshman to register for social science.

#### Watch Jambar

If you want to know more about this, keep an eye on the Jambar each time it comes out, and I will work out as best I can an explanation for Social Science 101 and 102.

#### BY-LAWS OF THE INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL CONCERNING RUSHING

- . A rushee must be a full time student of the Youngstown University in good standing at the time of rushing.
- 2. Bids shall be turned in to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Interfraternity Council by twelve (12) noon on Wednesday of the eleventh week of the fall semester, and the ninth week of the spring semes-
- . Rushees shall give no acceptance in any form to any fraternity before the Wednesday of the twelfth week of the fall semester, and the tenth week of the spring semester. At this time, rushees shall make all positive replies to bids in writing. These replies shall be turned into the Dean's Office in the Main Building by 3 p.m. on Wednesday of the twelfth week of the fall semester, and the tenth week of the spring semester. These bids must be accompanied by a \$2.00 fee which shall be employed to present a booklet on fraternities at the Youngstown University.
- 4. Each rushee shall accept only one bid.

5. Any potential pledge who willfully co-operates with any illegal form of rushing will be denied pledging privileges to any fraternity until the beginning of the following semester.





"If enough advertisements are sold to cover the expense of printing a student directory, one will be included. It will be complete, covering all full and part-time students," he added.



A low wall of the same material provides a background for the letters, which are silhouetted by fluorescent lights at night.

The idea was developed by Dean Boop, treasurer of the graduating class, William Nelson, assistant business manager, and Jon Naberezny, head of the University Art Department, who made the original drawings.


