



Be informed

Many people are finding reason for concern in the general attitude toward our presidential candidates.

In this upcoming election, the public must profess a disturbing ignorance of the basic issues. The chief reason for this is that these issues have been completely ignored and have been jammed into party platforms merely, it seems, for the sake of tradition.

This campaign has deteriorated into a conflict between two images; each of which is, in many respects, completely false. The only discussion of the question takes the shape of vague opinions and ideas. This is clearly illustrated by the general opinion of Barry Goldwater's stand on so many of the crucial campaign questions before us. Ask anyone what Goldwater's position is on the civil rights bill, tax reform, labor and Social Security. The answers range from fearful guesswork to irrational bigotry.

This same kind of analysis is closely followed on the various planks of LBJ's platform, although not nearly as often because of the general lack of concrete platform to

The existence of these ideas are fearfully and crucially vital only in questioning your understanding of the candidates before you. What have you read recently that provides a non-partisan, pro and con, analysis of the campaign?
