

This procedure states that a student has the opportunity to appear and seek redress for concerns involving official academic advisement, instructional practice, such as those delineated in a course syllabus, and grading for a class or laboratory.

# VD increase is due in part to greater sexual activity

As the age old joke goes "VD' is nothing to Clap about." No more truthful phrase could have ever been spoken.

Last year, in the United States alone, over a million cases of various types of Venereal Disease (VD) were reported. In Youngstown, particularly, over 1400 cases of VD were seen at = etc.

the VD Clinic, at South Side Hospital in a seven month period. According to Mrs. R. Price, a registered nurse who works at the clinic, most of the cases that are seen are gonorrhea and syphillis (489 and 20 cases respectively) with various other types also turning up. (See Story at Right) The main age group affect-

ed in Youngstown is the 15 to 24 year old group (the 15 to 19 year old sub-group has had a slightly higher incidence).

According to Price one reason for the high rate of VD among young people is that today there is "more sexual awareness and kids engaging in sex earlier" without an understanding of what they are getting into.


"We have kids coming into the clinic having no idea how they got it (VD)," stated Price. Many area secondary schools now have mandatory V.D. education programs taken with the permission of parents. Price said she had knowledge of several instances where parents of school age children attended lectures

The National Center for Disease Control reports there is a new strain of VD catching both the public and the medical community with their pants down. It's called Herpes Simplex Virus and there is no known cure. The more common version, HS 2, is generally called Genital Herpes and its increase as a communicable disease is causing public health officials to have more than an occasional headache.

Herpes is not your everyday infectious disease. Unlike gonorrhea or syphillis, which are bacterial infections, herpes is a vicrus. But unlike other known, curable virus infections (i.e.-Hong Kong flu), herpes will lodge in the nerve cells. Permanently. Antibodies already present, or injected, have little or no effect. Normally, the human body can produce its own defenses, antibodies, which will attack and kill foreign substances. Even after a case of measles, mumps or the flu, the body will "Id up resistance to ward the disease off the next time around. One health official in Denver, Colorado said that 90 percent of the adult population over twenty have herpes antibodies already built into their cirulatory system. that pregnant women who get infected with the disease stand a great chance of losing their babies or having them born deformed. Getting a suspected VD carrying pregnant woman to a doctor or clinic as quickly as possible is the policy against birth defects. Syphillis, infecting the baby before birth, may cause extensive damage to the brain and other parts of the body, while if a baby is born infected with gonorrhea he/she may be of their partners.

The transmission of VD is usually by sexual activity (oralgenital, anal-genital or vaginalintercourse).

(Cont. from page 5) of infected mothers die at birth. Children that do survive may have serious complications, including brain damage.<sup>1</sup>

Although gonorrhea is still first on the list of veneral disease, herpes is bucking for the number two slot with an estimated 300,000 persons infected annually. Symptoms include either cold sores around the mouth or blisters and open sores around the genitals, thighs or buttocks. The symptoms may disappear within a month but may recur periodically up to two years after the initial contact.

While the virus itself cannot be killed, local treatments may be applied to reduce pain and prevent infection. Several other treatments are now being studied in Seattle, Washington. Doctors recommend no sexual contact if a person has lesions, or open sores. Any sign of the above symptoms





Spotlight Theatre's opening night was called on account of snow. It was postponed until Wednesday night. Therefore, to compensate for the loss, the Theatre will present an extended schedule of performances of Robinson Jeffer's adaptation of Medea on both Saturday and Sunday nights. It is the most intense dramatic performance Spotlight has presented this season.

The set designers are to be commended for projecting the play's intensity through their usage of Classical Greek architecture to set the play in Medea's courtyard, a courtyard that becomes the arena in which we, the spectators, witness Euripides and Jeffers

successfully blended in a vivid and

violent emotional mesh. It is Classical Greek drama modernized and modern ideas classicized. Action is introduced, by an intense performance of the nurse, as played by Jo Ellen Pavlicko. Her performance remains in the ascendency, serving to keep the dramatic tension at a high level during the first act and serving to revive the flagging intensity in the second act.

Alexandra Vansuch, as Medea, is overpowering in the first act, though by the second act, her power has somewhat flagged as Vansuch. The women of Corinth again

from their first appearance to their last. They are, respectively, Denise Tkach, Kelly Schreck, and Marilyn Thomas. Their dramatic, intense performance cannot be truly singled out, as each other's action serves to underline that of her sister's. If favorites were to be played, I would favor Denise Tkach, the First Woman of Corinth. However, her dramatics give impetus to her sister per-

formers, as it should be. The first act is dominated by women, in terms of intensity, but Dennis Pallante's Aegeus, is Charles Lawrence's Jason projects properly, pompously played. The a heat and anger rivaling that of first act is given, in intensity, completely to women, though Lawrence's Jason reaches a peak outline this underlying tension in the first act shortly before

intermission. Robert Dubec's Creon cannot carry out the intensity required for such a role. In fact, to carry it out, he would have to shout down Vansuch and his voice does not have that projection.

Other players can be dealt with in terms of blocking. Blocking is an important part of a production, thus, this relegation is justified. The aforementioned Women of Corinth weave a mystical circle, mime emotions in an attitutde reminiscent of a tradition that can only be described by comparing their interminglings with that of a combination of the three Muses and the Three fates.

Their interactions with the attendants do serve to underline




