Carter has hesitantly resheathed his campaign trail Bowie knife, apparently having second thoughts about slashing down the proposed spending. Ford recommended that the overnment spend $\$ 11.1$ billio on higher education activities fo
iscal 78 (which . begins next October 1). Approximately $\$ 8$ billion will be spent of aid tudents and educational instituions, with the remaining $\$ 2.9$ development projects at colleges and universities. These figure indicate a cut-back of a billio dollars from the present fisca ear spendings and nearly 1976. and a from spending 1976
The funding cut-back seems to Ford to phase out and eliminate several aid and institutional assis tance programs, like national direct student loans, supplementary edu ational opportunity grants, and included in the budget recom mendation was an outline to begin a four-year phase-out of Socia Security benefits for college stu dents. Ford, as his budget reflects, says the Veterans Administration xpects spending for educatio GI Bill to decline from the $\$ 42$ billion this year to $\$ 3.9$ billio in fiscal 1978.
For the present, the higher ducation budget is unlikely to change, except for areas that may coincide with Carter's pro posed "economic stimulus" proram, which includes tax reform mendations. It is expected that

There are several schools around the country which have switched from intercollegiate sports to intramural sports and have not been the worse for doing so. In fact, many of these schools have a better academic atmosphere because intellectually and physically instead of bettering their intellectually and physically, instead of bettering their
Before the Stadium is begun these and other question have to be answered. Once the six million is spent and the Stadium constructed, it will be too late.

The program was hosted by Glen Campbeil, Lou Rawls and Helen Reddy. pecial Distinguished Merit Award, presented by Tennessee Governor Ray Blanton.
Double winner Elton John was named Favorite Male Vocalist in the pop/rock category. His single, "Don't Go Breakin'My Heart," recorded with KiKi Dee, was named Favorite Single in the same category
Country and westen singer Loretta Lynn was twice honored being named the Favorite Female Vocalist in the country category, and Group Award in the country catcgory.
Stevie Wonder was named Favorite Male Vocalist in the soul category, and his abum, Songs in the Key of Life, received the award for Favorite Album in the soul category.

beauty. Unlike most vocal artists, his lyrics neither dominate, nor submit to the music. This blend provides the listener with some thing much better than average in ustening pleasure.
