## Summer Study Is Offered

Two publications issued recently by the Institute of International Education will be of interest to the summer traveler -- SUMMER STUDY ABROAD, an annual listing of summer schools in other countries -- and the Merch issue of the Institute's monthly NEWS BULLETIN which is devoted to summer educational travel.

Of particular interest in the NEWS BULLETIN are several articles discussing the latest trends in student travel, including new programs to Asia and Africa and shipboard orientation.

Helpful hints on "How to Be Lovable though Rich and Vulgar" are offered to beleaguered Americans by Graham Wilson of San Jose State College (California), who served as one of the first leaders on the IIE's Trans-Pacific Orientation Program.

### Useful Analysis

Dr. Hans Simon, President of the New School for Social Research, in an editorial on student travel presents a useful analysis of the American tourist abroad.

This issue also contains a list of sources of information on specific summer travel programs.

Over 120 summer courses in 21 countries of interest to students from the U.S. are listed in SUMMER STUDY ABROAD. This 23-page leaflet tells where to apply and gives helpful information on language requirements, credits, living arrangements and costs, transportation, passports and visas and scholarships. Early application should be made for the few awards available.

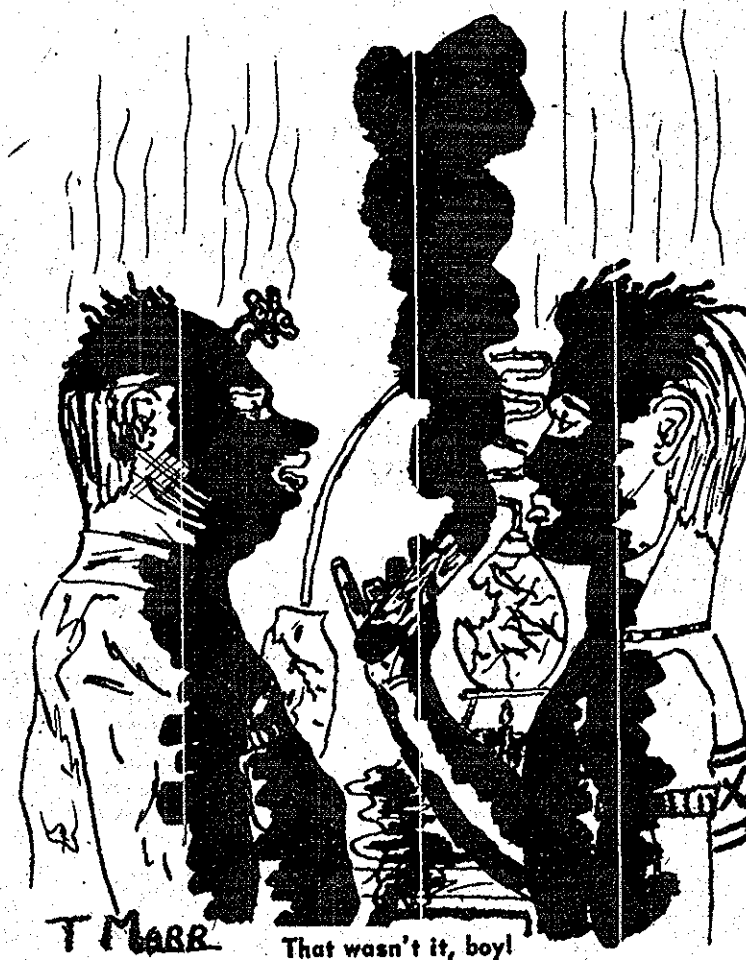
### Specially Designed

Most of these programs for summer visitors are designed to give insight into the language, history and culture of the host country. In addition to such "civilization courses" instruction is offered in music, art, law, political science and sociology.

There are often special courses for teachers of foreign languages. Many programs include visits to nearby sites of interest.

SUMMER STUDY ABROAD includes only those courses which are sponsored by foreign educational institutions. Reference is made to other publications which discuss study tours, work camps or other opportunities for a summer abroad.

Copies of SUMMER STUDY ABROAD may be obtained free from the Institute of International Education in New York or from its regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, San Francisco or Washington, D.C. There is a charge of 25 cents per copy for the NEWS BULLETIN.

## Study in Spain Offered by IIE

Six fellowships for study in Spain are available to American graduate students for the 1957-58 academic year, it was announced by the Institute of International Education.

The awards given by a private donor are administered by the Institute. Closing date for filing applications is May 1, 1957. The fellowships provide \$2000 to cover travel, maintenance and tuition.

Candidates must be United States citizens preferably under 30 years of age. Other eligibility requirements are: a Bachelor's or preferably a Master's degree by the time of departure; demonstrated academic ability and capacity for independent and advanced study or research; a plan for advanced study or research; good knowledge of Spanish; good moral character, personality and adaptability; good health; and ability to provide for any dependents.

Applications may be obtained from the Institute of International Education in New York or from its regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, San Francisco or Washington, D.C.

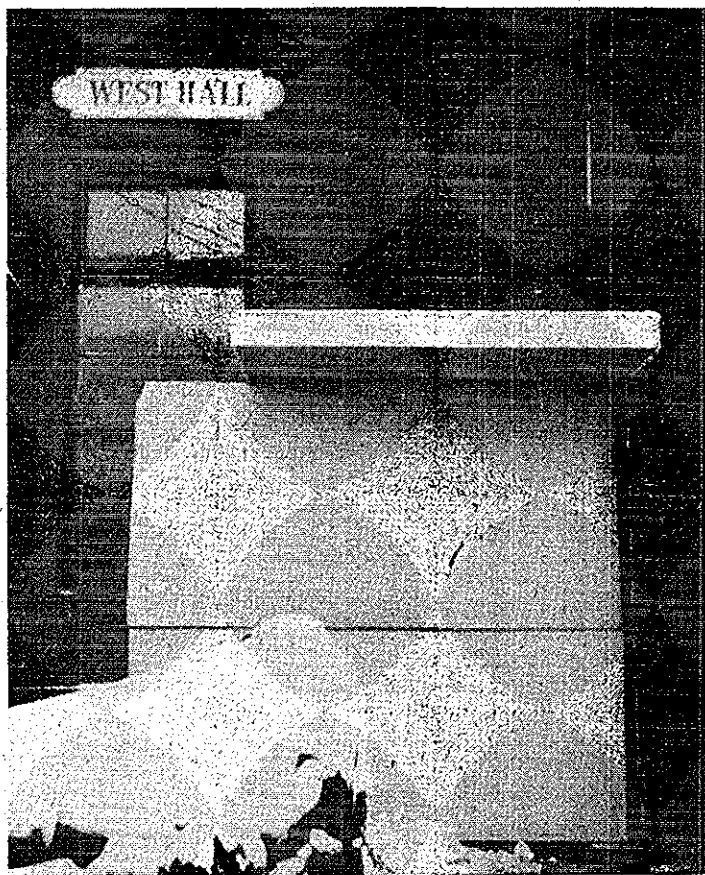

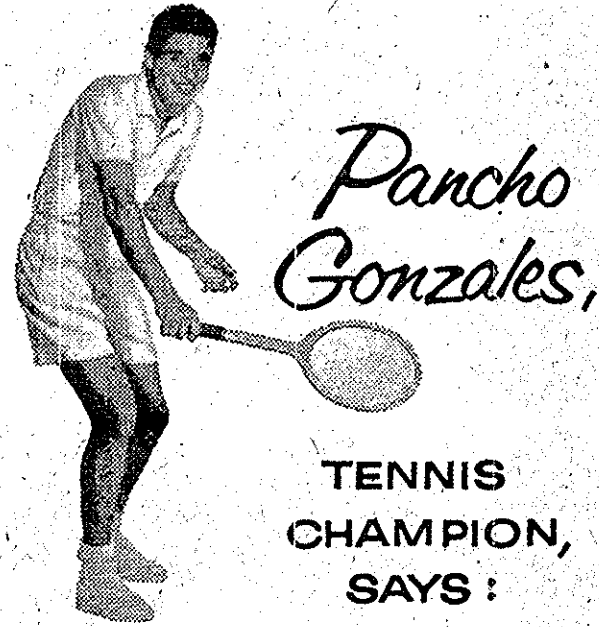
Other officers are: Larry Nord, vice-president; Al Hedegus, secretary; and Bill Bigley, treasurer.

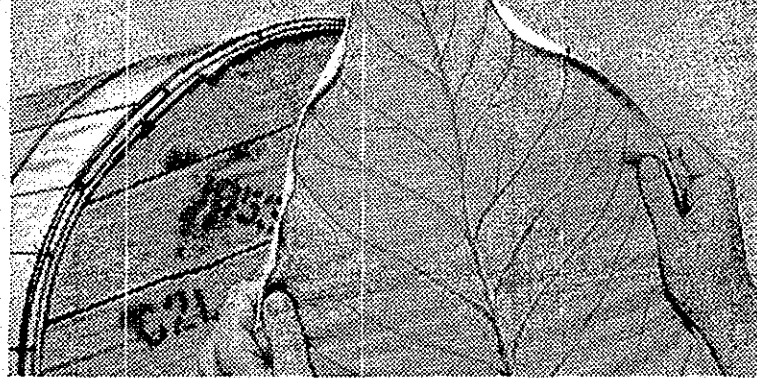

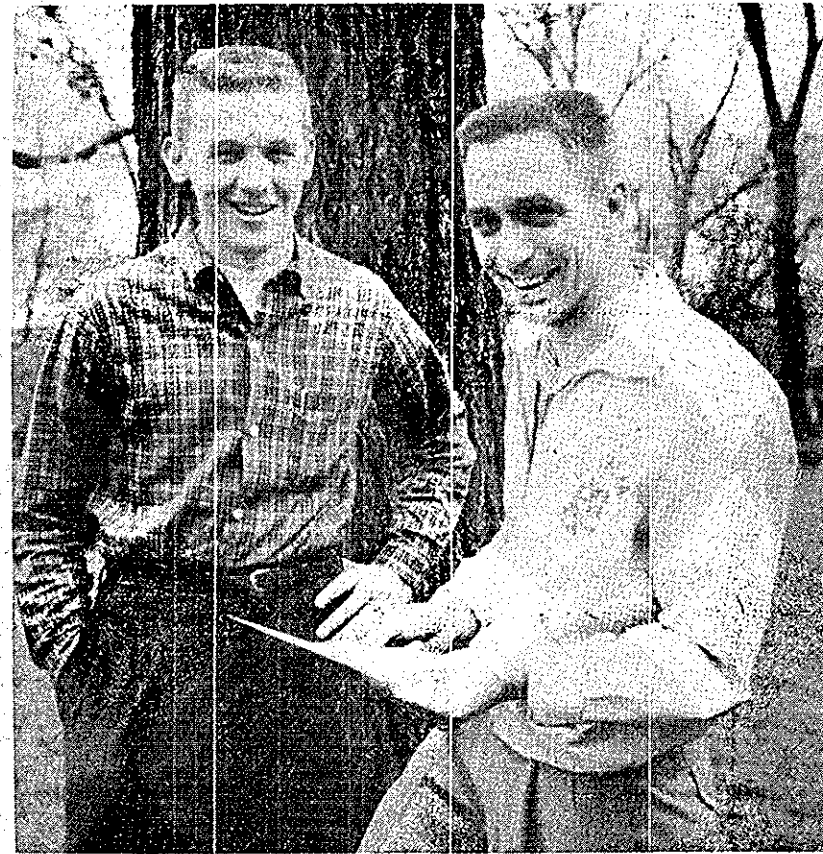

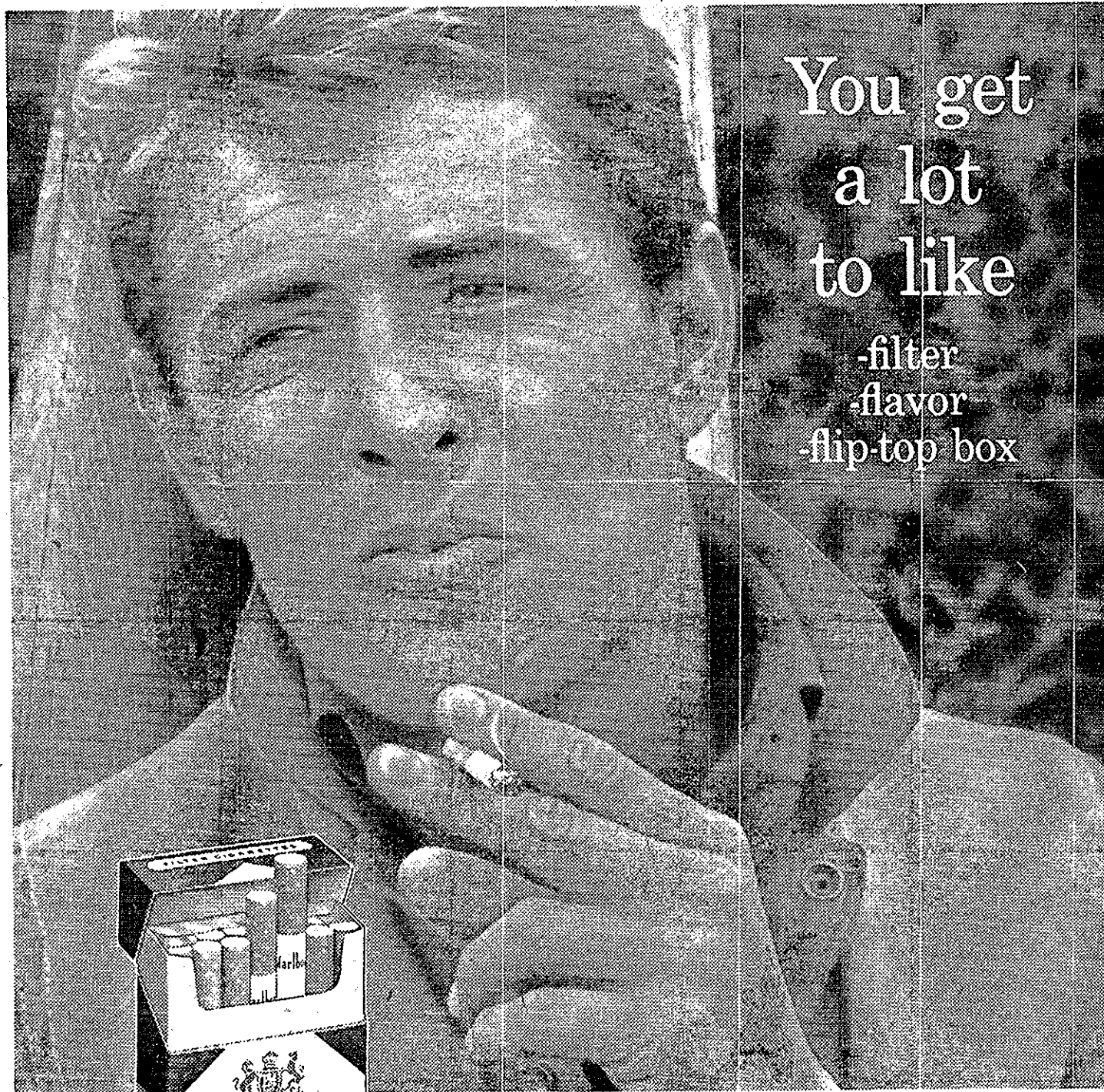

## Profs Hold Hobby Display At Library

An interesting display of the hobbies of some of our faculty members has been arranged for a showing by Dr. Charles Evans in the library showcases on the second and third floors for the next several weeks.

Bottles, dishes, candlestick holders, vases, bowls, shades, and other variously colored objects of iridescent glass that have been gathered by Charles A. Evans and Roy E. Miller can be viewed in one showcase along with a short account of the history of iridescent glass making.

In another showcase the collection of different articles made of many types of glass such as: milk glass, vasoline glass, satin, hob-nail, quilted satin, amber, amberine, peach blow, cranberry, thumb print, and pigeon blood glass that Mack and Marion Browne have collected in their travels, can be seen. There is also a doll made up as an old man that comes from Genoa, Italy.

### Has Wide Collection

A picture "Autumn Sunset" which was painted by Walter Mayer is displayed along with his collection of savory seeds, dill, poppy, sesame, celery, anise, coriander, herb vinegars, orange mint, peppermint, sweet cicely; dried herb leaves, lemon verbena, lovage, rosemary, tarragon.

Marjorie Mills has arranged sample pieces of her experimental weaving. There are samples of pattern and texture weaving in Raffia, a Spanish lace variation of fiber and metallic thread, Jaspé weaving, a creative piece of Raffia and cane, and double brocade wool.

On the third floor Nellie Dehn-hostel's collection of crosses and other religious articles is on display. There are sun, Pectoral, ritual, ornamental; Byzantine, Barbary, Swedish, wooden, coronation, St. Bridget's, Celtic, Huguenot, Cornish, crusader's crosses. Crucifixes and a crown of thorns carved by Passion Players of Germany are also included in the collection.

Examples of Reverend Linder's hobby, photography, are shown, some of which have appeared in religious magazines, illustrated folders, and in bulletins put out by Youngstown University. One of the pictures "Small Fry" has been exhibited in ten leading United States cities.

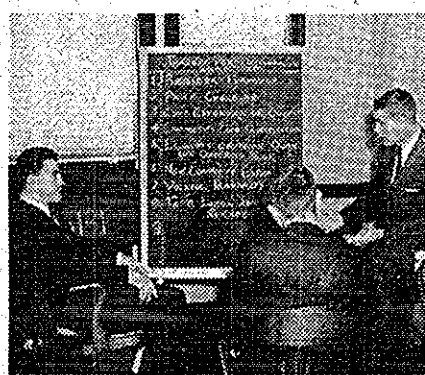

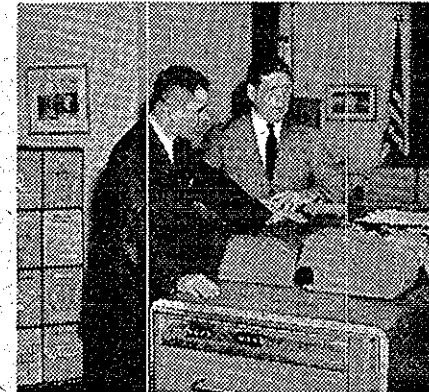

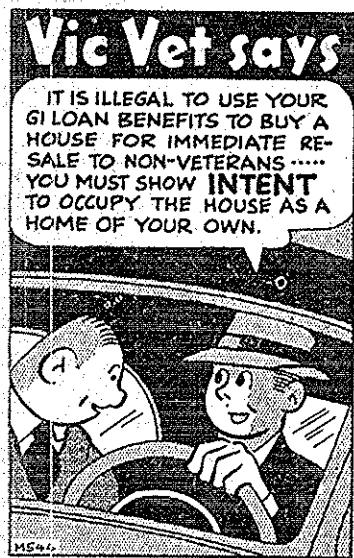
University Contract Committee headed the program with 21 leading agencies, advertisers, media, and service organizations.

## Dr. Gould To Retire Joined YU Faculty In 39; Has Written Numerous Articles

Dr. Clarence P. Gould, Head of the Department of History at Youngstown University, has planned to retire from the faculty. A banquet in his honor will be held Thurs., May 9 at Calvin Center on Mahoning Avenue in Youngstown.

Dr. Gould joined the faculty here at Youngstown University after serving as Dean of Kenyon College from 1933 to 1939. Before, he was Associate Professor at Western Reserve University, President of Washington Col-

lege in Chestertown, Maryland, and professor of history at the College of Wooster.

He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Johns Hopkins University in 1907 and his Ph. D. from the same University in 1911.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the American Historical Association, the Economic History Society (English), Society d' Histoire Modern, the Mississippi Valley Historical Society, and the Ohio Academy of History of which organization he has served as president.
