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### YU Is a Bargain

Tuition at Youngstown University, in the past ten years, has risen from \$11 to \$18 per hour.

In 1955 tuition was \$11 per hour with additional fees for student activities, athletic books, library, Neon, guidance, and many others. Tuition was increased to \$16 per hour and fees, with the exception of lab fees, were eliminated. The present rate of \$18 per hour came into being in 1963.

During this ten year period enrollment at Youngstown University has increased from 4,597 to 11,041. The present 240% student population is paying tuition of approximately 144%, when compared to ten years ago. Recognizing this fact, the Youngstown University student is paying considerably less than those students at most other private institutions of higher learning.

were in favor of the proposal. Dixon also commented on the University speaker series stating that any chartered organization can bring speakers to campus if they wish. She pointed out that if a speaker or subject were controversial, the sponsoring organization would be responsible for any repercussions that might occur.

Ruth Yozwiak, speaking for absent Ivan Milekovic discussed that a separate Major Events committee be set up by Student Council to handle campus entertainment and activities She went on to say that this committee might be financed by charging students an activity fee at registration.

Jambar editor Luis Suarez said that he felt students not interested in these concerts and speakers should not be charged and that a special ID card should be given to those students who would be interested and choose to purchase one. The majority of representatives felt that this would prove too confusing.

Paul Katz stated that he had spoken with President Jones about possible administrative aid and suggested Student Council look into the possibility of financial aid from the University finance committee before considering charging the student body.

These proposals and suggestions will probably be brought up and discussed at Student Council this afternoon.




