Students, Civic Leaders Support NAACP March

Over a thousand people chanted freedom songs in freezing weather and waved freedom signs before County Courthouse to make last Friday memorable as "Freedom Day."

YU's NAACP chapter, supported by the Newman Club, the United Campus Christian Fellowship, and the Orthodox Christian Fellowship, planned the successful demonstration. The NAACP organized and led a march of some 200 students from the University to the Court-

Concerning the cost, several students wondered whether part of the funds that Student Council has accumulated for the leasing of a Student Union (over \$20,000) could be dedicated to the recreation room.

"Wonderful Town" will play Thursdays through Saturdays at 8:30 p.m. for three weeks, ending with a 2:30 matinee Sun., April 11.


