Fund Drive Makes Over \$16,000, May Go Higher

The recently completed Youngstown University Alumni Fund Drive has raised over sixteen thousand dollars.

The campaign, whose goal had been set at \$20,000, was composed of contributions from 15 percent of the total alumni.

Dean Charles H. Aurand, charge of the drive, explained that 90 percent of the faculty-many of whom are not alumni-contributed to the drive and raised some \$1700.

Contributions will be accepted until June 30, and Dean Aurand is confident that the \$20,000 goal will be reached. He credited the success of the drive to the tremendous support by Circle K representatives in manning phones and tabulating contributions. "I seriously doubt the drive would have done as well
