WYSU shuts down for two days to install antenna



WYSU-FM 88.5, Youngstown State University's public radio station, is installing a new transmitting antenna on Monday, Nov. 1, to increase the station's broadcast signal and provide stronger coverage to its listening audience.


To complete the installation, the station will shut down its transmitter at 9 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 1, taking the station off the air in the Youngstown and New Wilmington areas. The installation is scheduled to take two days, but could take longer if unforeseen complications arise, according to Gary Sexton, WYSU director.

"Going off the air is an unfortunate but unavoidable consequence of providing better service in the future," Sexton said.

After the projected two-day installation period, the station will intermittently broadcast at low power and/or go off the air in order to tune the new antenna, to have an engineer examine the structural integrity of the installation, and to ensure that the station is operating under FCC regulations. The station plans to be operating normally, at the latest, by Wednesday, Nov. 3.

WYSU will remain broadcasting as usual on the Internet and in Ashtabula for the duration of the installation. No programming or services will be affected. You may access the internet streams at http://wysu.org/audio.php. "2010 Fair Trade: Be a Conscious Consumer" is the title of a meeting of the Youngstown State University Students in Free Enterprise at 4 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 3 in Room 3422 in the new Williamson Hall on the YSU campus.

Students, faculty, staff and the public are welcome to attend. Complimentary fair trade coffee and chocolate will be available.

Speakers include Natalie Terry, former Fair Trade Intern through the Catholic Relief Services Fair Trade Fund. Terry is a 2010 graduate of John Carroll University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in religious studies. As a Fair Trade Intern, she worked with students, faculty and staff to bring awareness of fair trade to the campus through coffee tastings, alternative shopping events and initiating dialogue

with JCU's foodservice provider, which led to the inclusion of 100 percent fair trade coffee and tea in all JCU dining service facilities. In 2008, she served as the Fair Trade Universities campaign coordinator with United Students for Fair Trade and participated in its leadership summit in Nicaragua. She has served on the NE Ohio Fair Trade Expo planning committee for the past two years. She is currently a full time volunteer with the Humility of Mary Sisters in Youngstown, where she works at Villa Maria Organic Farm/Retreat Center and with the Dorothy Day House Catholic Worker.

Also speaking will be Lauren LeBlanc, manager of The Olive Branch, Hiram College's student-run fair trade store. The store, operated in collaboration with the Integrated Entrepreneurship Center, sells fair trade clothing, handcrafts, coffee, tea, chocolate and other items. IT conference focuses on women in STEM

The 5th Annual "We are IT" Conference, designed to expose young women to careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics, will be Friday, Nov. 19, on the Youngstown State University campus.

The one-day professional information technology conference will help familiarize young women in grades 7 through 10 with various aspects of IT and other STEM disciplines and to encourage them to continue their education and pursue a career in one of the STEM fields.

Participants will attend two sessions and choose from eight workshops scheduled for each session. Workshops include: Engineering (Bridge Construction or Building a Digital Counter), Computer Science and Information Systems (How to Program with Alice, Building Lego Robots, Working with Binary Numbers, Cryptography: Writing Secret Codes; or Flash Animation), and the Planetarium (Behind the Console at the Planetarium).

The keynote speaker is Tianyi Ma Krupka. Krupka defied the odds, leaving a remote farming village in northeast China and immigrating to the United States in 1999 and has since earned a Ph.D. in biomedical engineering.

The conference is an initiative of the Ohio IT Business Advisory Network produced with funds provided by the federal Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Act and through a grant from the Office of Career-Technical and Adult Education, Ohio Department of Education.
