Society for Collegiate Journalists moves headquarters to YSU

Mary Beth Earnheardt, assistant professor of journalism at Youngstown State University, has been elected national executive director of the Society for Collegiate Journalists.



With the appointment, the national headquarters of the society has moved to the YSU campus and will officially open on Aug. 18.

"As SCJ enters its second century of service to journalists, we are deeply honored to be headquartered at Youngstown State University, where the practice of journalism enjoys a rich tradition and a bright future," said Frank Barnas of Valdosta State University and SCJ president. "It is awardwinning programs like YSU that serve as inspirations to journalists, faculty, and college students everywhere."

Bill Ruehlmann, former SCJ president and executive director, added:

"YSU is a distinguished academic institution with a vigorous free student press that it has long supported. Dr. Earnheardt is a seasoned member and officer of SCJ with an important record of scholarly acumen and professional integrity."

SCJ was formed in 1975 as the result of the merger of two journalism honorary societies, Pi Delta Epsilon (founded in 1909) and Alpha Phi Gamma (founded in 1919). It is the nation's oldest collegiate journalism

honorary and has about 80 active chapters nationwide with 800 members.

Earnheardt, who earned a Ph.D. in communications studies from Kent State University in 2006, has served as national president of SCJ since 2006. Her term as executive director is four years.

At YSU, Earnheardt is adviser to the *Jambar*, the university's student newspaper, as well as thejambar.com, and the *yo magazine. She is also a member of the editorial board for the *Ohio Communication Journal* and the editor of the Ohio Communication Association newsletter, *The Conversation*. She has published articles dealing with new media and teaching communication media and teaching communication.

Prior to Earnheardt's election, former SCJ Executive Director Arthur H. Barlow visited YSU and met with Shearle Furnish, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences, and Gary Salvner, chair of the English department. Furnish and Salvner agreed to host the office beginning in summer 2010.
