

Institute focuses on low incidence disabilities

More than 125 people are expected to attend the Youngstown State University Low Incidence Summer Institute 8:15 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Tuesday, June 29, featuring a keynote address by William Heward, professor emeritus from the College of Education and Human Ecology at Ohio State University.

The Institute, titled "Using Evidence Based Practices to Evaluate and Enhance Treatment Outcomes for Students Diagnosed with Low Incidence Disabilities," will be in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center and is conducted by the YSU Department of Counseling and Special Education and the YSU School Psychology Program Planning Team.

The Institute is designed to provide cutting edge "low incidence" training. Low Incidence Disabilities include autism, deaf/blindness, multiple disabilities, severe/profound cognitive disabilities, and traumatic brain injuries. The target audience for the event includes school psychologists, school psychology faculty members, counselors, low incidence educators, related service providers and graduate students.

YSU President Designate Cynthia E. Anderson, Youngstown Mayor Jay Williams and State Rep. Joe Schiavoni are scheduled to speak at the opening session at 8:45 a.m.

Heward will give two keynote addresses: "Applied Behavior Analysis: Using Science to Improve the Education of Students with Autism Spectrum Disorders" and "Ten Faulty Notions about Teaching and Learning that Hinder the Effectiveness of Special Education." Heward has served as a Senior Fulbright Scholar in Portugal, a Visiting Scholar at the National Institute of Education in Singapore, a Visiting Professor of Psychology at Keio University in Tokyo, and given lectures and workshops in 14 other countries. His publications include more than 100 journal articles and book chapters and nine books. He is a recipient of OSU's highest honor for teaching excellence, the Alumni Association's Distinguished Teaching Award.

Additional breakout sessions will be offered covering assessment procedures and consultation methods designed to assist children diagnosed with low incidence disabilities.

The final breakout session will include information about YSU's proposed school psychology program. The program is designed to help meet the demands for school psychologists in the region and in Ohio by providing contemporary and comprehensive training in school psychology. The proposed Education Specialist (ED.S.) curriculum aims to have a practical focus and also to involve YSU graduate students in research activities.

The Institute is sponsored by YSU, YSU Beeghly College of Education, YSU Department of Counseling and Special Education, YSU School Psychology Program Development, The Rich Center for Autism, School Study Council of Ohio, and the Ohio Department of Education, Office for Exceptional Children.

Awards will be presented at the sixth annual YSU Hispanic Heritage Celebration Friday, Sept. 24, in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center on the YSU campus. Keynote speaker will be Dr. Ivania del Pozo, YSU professor of foreign languages and literatures.

The event – "Listen to Our Hispanic Voices" – begins at 5:30 p.m. with light refreshments featuring Hispanic foods. Informational booths hosted by area businesses and organizations will be on display throughout the evening. Also included will be a ceremony featuring flags from 22 Hispanic countries, folkloric dance performances, musical entertainment, art exhibits, and more.

Smoky Hollow run and walk set for July 10

The seventh annual Smoky Hollow 5K Run and 1 Mile Family Fun Walk will be Saturday, July 10.

The event, which celebrates the history of the Smoky Hollow neighborhood just east of the Youngstown State



University campus, commences from Harrison Field on Walnut Street behind YSU's Bliss Hall. The 5K run starts at 9 a.m., followed by the family fun walk at 9:10 a.m. Race day registration starts at 7:45 a.m. at Harrison Field.

Awards will be presented in several categories and age groups. Entry fee is \$13 before July 5, and \$16 after July 5 and on race day. The fee is \$7 for children 12 and under. The first 300 registrants will receive a t-shirt. An awards ceremony and post-race party, including free brunch for all participants and volunteers, will be held at Cassese's MVR in Smoky Hollow beginning at 9:45 a.m.

YSU's Flexible MBA enables students to pursue their degree either part-time or full-time. Classes are offered one night per week and on Saturdays. Some MBA courses are offered in eight-week blocks. Students may start any term – fall, spring or summer. The MBA program is accredited by AACSB International, which represents the highest standard of achievement for business schools worldwide.

Ohio Business Week is this week on campus

More than 70 high school students from across Ohio are participating in Ohio Business Week this week at Youngstown State University.

"YSU plays a crucial role in helping the Foundation prepare Ohio's youth for future leadership roles in the business community," said Gayle D. Troy, executive director of the Ohio Business Week Foundation. "After attending OBW at YSU, students will emerge from the program with the skills necessary for success in higher education and the work force."

The program started Sunday, June 20, and concludes this Saturday, June 26. Nineteen of the students attending the program are from the tri-county area.

The program brings high school sophomores, juniors and seniors from diverse backgrounds together to form companies and learn business skills, concepts and theories from local and regional business leaders. Students compete in activities that promote leadership and integrity and learn about entrepreneurship by developing a business plan, a marketing plan and a financial plan for a start-up business. Advisors and guest speakers represent large and small businesses from around the state.

"The Williamson College of Business Administration strongly believes in preparing Ohio's youth for success in the American free enterprise system," said Betty Jo Licata, dean of YSU's Williamson College of Business Administration. "Each summer, Ohio Business Week participants leave our campus with a better understanding of entrepreneurship, business success and ethical business practices."

Participants are assigned to a "company" with 10 to 12 other students and a loaned executive called a company advisor. The students develop an idea for a new business venture; complete business, financial and marketing plans; construct a trade show display; develop an advertisement or web page; and create a TV or radio commercial. At the end of the week, the companies compete in the Emerging Entrepreneur Project Competition.
