

Enrollment hits 20-year high

The last time YSU's enrollment was this high, the first George Bush was president, the San Francisco 49ers were winning Super Bowls and *Seinfeld* was making its debut on TV.

According to preliminary 14th-day counts, enrollment is 15,194 this fall semester, an increase of 512 students over last year. That represents a 3.5 percent jump.


It is the highest enrollment since 1990, when the number of students on campus was 15,454. In the past decade, YSU's enrollment has climbed by 3,407 students or nearly 30 percent.

"Our continued enrollment growth is a testament to the quality of our academic programs, the dedication of our faculty and staff and the hard work of everyone on campus to carry YSU's message across the region," President Cynthia E. Anderson said.

"But getting students on campus is just the first step. The job now is to help every single one of our students do well in their classes, to graduate and to pursue their personal and professional goals. These students have chosen YSU; we are committed to their success."

Governor: Hub will bring 'best and brightest' back to Valley

Gov. Ted Strickland, joined YSU President Cynthia E. Anderson and other local political leaders, came to YSU this month to designate YSU and Youngstown an Ohio Hub of Innovation and Opportunity.

The designation, which aims to develop, manufacture, market and apply next-generation materials and to build upon the Youngstown region's emerging strengths in advanced materials commercialization, came two weeks after the chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents was on campus to approve YSU's first Ph.D. program – in advanced materials.

"With the new PH.D. program being launched next year, YSU will become a major destination for students looking to advance

their skills in the STEM disciplines," Strickland said. ".As part of the Hub, it will help bring some of the best and brightest minds back to the Valley."

The designation as a Hub is a partnership between YSU, the cities of Youngstown and Warren and the Youngstown Business Incubator, among others. With the help of a \$250,000 state grant, the Hub designation is expected to help attract future investment and spur new research in advanced materials in the Youngstown region. It also is an important validation by the state of Ohio that the Mahoning Valley has the talent and resources to support leading edge research.

"The history of this region is well known to all of us," the governor said "A century after the massive furnaces and foundries first brought prosperity to this city, the Steel Valley

suffered. We suffered from the decline of America's most iconic industry. But in recent years, this Valley has become a symbol of rebirth, with Youngstown serving as a national model of how cities can be reborn by investing in innovation and opportunity. The city's downtown economy is growing, and businesses of all sizes are investing in the Mahoning Valley once again."

YSU President Cynthia Anderson said the designation as a Hub "will not only allow YSU to reach its potential, but will also allow the city of Youngstown and the entire MV to move forward in its quest for economic revitalization."

Youngstown is the sixth region of the state to be designated an Ohio Hub. The Hub program is designed to allow university and local business and political leaders to leverage the resources and the skills of people living and working in the area to create new jobs and opportunities.



Students win Green Energy contest; advance to nationals

A team of six YSU engineering students will compete as a national finalist for the 2010 Green Energy Challenge in Boston on Oct 2.

The team qualified for the finals this spring by winning the Challenge's first-round competition against 12 universities. In the finals, YSU will compete against the Milwaukee School of Engineering and last year's winner, the University of Washington, for an \$8,000 award.

"We are thrilled to be selected as a finalist," said YSU team captain Brittany Stillwagon, who graduated this spring with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. "When you consider that we were chosen over such schools as Purdue and Penn State, it reinforces the quality of our education here at YSU."


The Challenge requires teams to run an energy-use audit on a local business and create an in-depth proposal for alternative energy options. The YSU team chose M-7 Technologies in Youngstown. With only two months to perform the analysis, formulate a plan and prepare a 50-page submission, the team produced a winning final report that M-7 Technologies President Mike Garvey called

"exciting, informative and extremely well presented."

With significant energy demands for manufacturing and repairing large scale industrial products, M-7 was utilizing no forms of alternative energy before the team presented a number of green solutions. The students proposed implementing solar panels, wind turbines and hydroelectric generators on the M-7 site to minimize energy consumption and employ renewable, natural energy sources like the Mahoning River. Cost estimates, tax-credit solutions and a return-on-investment analysis were also included in the team's project. Garvey said the proposal is doable and financially feasible. "It's more than just about the finances," he said. "It's about the responsibility we have to the environment to find new solutions."

The team is still in coordination with M-7 Technologies, which Stillwagon described as "an extremely green company of forward-thinkers" and "a huge help in our success." The company is already in the process of implementing some of the strategies the students detailed.

Competing in the finals on Oct. 2, the YSU team hopes to turn green into gold. "The accomplishment these students have already achieved is extraordinary," said Thomas Travers, executive director of Mahoning Valley NECA. "With the expertise, energy and focus they have demonstrated, we are confident that their success will continue when the final champion is announced in October."



YSU awarded \$1.66 million Wright Center grant

The Wright Center for Sensor Systems Engineering has awarded \$1.66 million to Youngstown State University to work with the Youngstown Business Incubator and M-7 Technologies to create sensor systems for next generation manufacturing and inspection systems.

The award, announced this month (September), was one of six competitive grants totaling more than \$17 million to Ohio universities and organizations that will facilitate the development and commercialization of sensors and sensor technologies. The funding is through the Ohio Third Frontier program.

Martin Abraham, dean of the YSU College of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, said: "We've put a lot of effort into this proposal and are very pleased to have received this level of funding through a competitive program. And that's a particularly important point – this was competitively selected from the best ideas submitted throughout the State of Ohio."

He said the project also ties in well with STEM's increasing research efforts in materials science and energy. Eric Fingerhut, chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents, announced last month (August) that he was approving a new Ph.D. at YSU in materials science engineering. Gov. Ted Strickland visited campus Sept. 1 to designate YSU and Youngstown as an Ohio Hub of Innovation and Opportunity in advanced materials and software development. And the governor this summer designated YSU an Emerging Center of Excellence in Materials Science and Engineering.

Darrell Wallace, assistant professor of Mechanical and Industrial Engineering and the principal investigator on the grant, said the bulk of the funding – \$1.25 million – will be allocated for major equipment purchases, including a 3D laser scanning system and a CT scanner.

Wallace said the project will contribute to the development and commercialization of a new inspection and scanning system known as RISETM – Rapid Integrated Sensing and Evaluation. RISE represents a major innovation in advanced manufacturing, allowing manufactured components to be inspected directly within the manufacturing process, simultaneously improving part quality and reducing manufacturing costs, Wallace said.

RISE is being developed by M-7 Technologies Inc. and will initially be marketed to manufacturers of high value-added, mission-critical components such as those found in military, aerospace, medical, and advanced energy applications, Wallace said.

The grant proposal was developed by a team that includes Wallace, and co-principal investigators Yong Zhang of the YSU Department of Computer Science and Information Systems, Jim Osterloh of M-7 and Julie Michael Smith of YBI. Trevor Jones, WCSSE board chair, said initiatives funded through the Wright Center are intended to create high-level technology jobs in Ohio.

"An important consideration in selecting these allocations was their ability to create high-paying jobs and



YSU named Military Friendly School

For the second consecutive year, YSU has been named a Military Friendly School by *G.I. Jobs* magazine, a publication designed for military members transitioning back to civilian life.

The honor ranks YSU in the top 15 percent of all colleges, universities and trade schools nationwide for its efforts in welcoming and accommodating post-military students.

"It's difficult to come out of a highly structured environment into one that's not," Jim Olive, program manager of YSU's Office of Veterans Affairs, said about the transition into university life. "That's our basis. We set up the Office for guidance and referral as a single point of contact for student veterans. It helps them feel more comfortable knowing we're here to try to answer their questions."


Launched in May 2009, the YSU Office of Veterans Affairs helps military veterans adjust to college life by assisting with admissions, financial aid, registration and advising, offering classes exclusive to veterans and generally "building an environment that's familiar and recognizable" for those still adapting to the change, Olive said.

Among the information provided in a survey for *G.I. Jobs*, Olive included a feature at YSU he felt was unique—an advisory council made up of students, faculty and community representatives that advises the Office and university on veterans affairs issues.

More initiatives are underway for the new academic year, including a proposal for the university to award undergraduate credit for military service, a "Share the Fair" project at the Canfield Fair, and a plan to achieve campus counseling services targeted to the needs of veterans.

But the biggest factor Olive recognizes for YSU's continued success as a Military Friendly School is the faculty and staff. "The support has been tremendous," he said. "The university is knowledgeable and empathetic to the experiences and sacrifices our military students have made. And it makes all the difference."


Provost Ikram Khawaja and Gene Grilli, vice president for administration and finance, the cochairs of the Strategic Planning Committee, said in a memo to campus that "it is imperative we receive campuswide participation in the process in order to develop a plan that reflects the input of a broad spectrum of campus stakeholders."

The Strategic Planning Committee has developed several ways to participate, including an online questionnaire, Facebook and Twitter accounts and focus group forums, which began Sept. 8. To participate, visit the Strategic Planning website at http://web.ysu.edu/2020strategicplan.

The Strategic Planning Committee, consisting of more than 50 members, was formed over the summer to develop a strategic plan for the university leading to the year 2020. The plan will provide YSU with the opportunity to develop goals and priorities and set a course for the university over the next decade. The planning process is focusing on four topic areas or Cornerstones – Student Success, Urban Research, Regional Impact and Accountability/Sustainability.

Anderson said the university plans to have a draft of the new Strategic Plan to the Board of Trustees by Dec. 15.

"It is an ambitious goal, but a goal that I am certain we can meet," she said. "I want to thank members of the committee for their hard work thus far, and I want to again encourage everyone to participate."




Discoverer of 'Lucy' skeleton, lectures Sept. 23

Renowned American paleoanthropologist and author Donald Johanson will present a lecture 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 23 in the Ford Family Recital Hall of the DeYor Performing Arts Center in downtown Youngstown.

Question-and-answer and book-signing sessions will follow.

The talk is free and open to the public, but tickets are required. Tickets will be available at the Information Center in Kilcawley Center beginning 8 a.m., Thursday, Sept. 16. Four tickets per person maximum.

Johanson is the current and founding director of the Institute of Human Origins at Arizona State University.



In his 30 years of field and lab research in paleoanthropology, he is most notably credited with the co-discovery of the female skeleton "Lucy," estimated to have lived more than 3 million years ago. The

finding of this hominid led to several books co-written by Johanson, including the widely read Lucy: The Beginnings of Humankind. Johanson holds a master's degree and Ph.D. from the University of Chicago and honorary doctorates from Case Western Reserve University and Westfield State College.

Hedges, who charts the dramatic and disturbing rise of post-literate American society that craves fantasy, ecstasy and illusion, will speak 12:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 30 in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center on the YSU campus. Hedges was a foreign correspondent for *The New York Times* from 1990 to 2005, covering Latin America, Africa, the Middle East and the Balkans. He writes extensively on war, religion and the conflict in the Middle East and has spent more time in the Palestinian territories than perhaps any other American reporter. His awards include the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for Explanatory Reporting for coverage of global terrorism and the 2002 Amnesty International Global Award for Human Rights Journalism. In his most recent best-selling book, *Empire of Illusion*, Hedges argues that we now live in two Americas. The minority functions in a print-based, literate world that can cope with complexity and can separate illusion from truth. The growing majority, the other America, retreats from a reality-based world into one of false certainty and magic. To this majority, which crosses social class lines, presidential debate and political rhetoric is pitched at a sixth-grade reading level. In this "other America," serious film and theatre, as well as newspapers and books, are being pushed to the margins. Hedges navigates this culture — attending WWF contests, the Adult Video News Awards in Las Vegas and Ivy League graduation ceremonies — exposing an age of terrifying decline and heightened self-delusion.








McDonough exhibit features Pittsburgh artist



Rooker is a senior fellow with the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers and has dealt with issues on FERPA, a comprehensive federal law that provides privacy protections for student education records, for over 20 years. Having served as director of the Family Policy Compliance Office at the U.S. Department of Education, Rooker administered laws and policies designed to help protect the rights of America's 58 million students, completed a major revision to FERPA regulations, published comprehensive guidance on the application of FERPA and HIPAA to student health records and traveled extensively to provide FERPA compliance training at conferences and schools.
