YSU herbarium blooms into one of Ohio's largest

If you were driving through parts of West Virginia or Pennsylvania this summer and thought you saw Carl Chuey along the highway yanking plants out of the ground, you probably did.

Chuey, professor of biological sciences, and a handful of YSU students spent parts of the summer traveling throughout Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania searching for plants to fill in gaps in the collection of the Herbarium of YSU in Ward Beecher Hall.

"We try to pick diverse, public places to find the plants, and sometimes students will end up finding 90 to 100 plants in a single trip," said Chuey, herbarium curator.

The Herbarium of YSU, which is a collection of dried plants used for teaching and research, currently includes 89,000 specimens from 91 countries in six continents, each of the 50 states and nine Canadian provinces.

Chuey hopes to increase that number to 100,000 by 2008, YSU's centennial year.

With 100,000 specimens, YSU would tie with the herbarium at the University of Cincinnati and would make the YSU facility tied for the third largest among the state's 35 herbaria, behind only Miami University and Ohio State University.

"Reaching the 100,000 level means that we will no longer be a regional herbarium, but a large one," Chuey said. "There are approximately 100 of these large herbaria in the country."

To help reach the 100,000 goal, Chuey has received a \$2,200 University Research Council grant to pay travel expenses to collect additional specimens. He also has received \$35,000 from the National Science Foundation to purchase 35 large cabinets to provide additional archival quality storage for the collection.

Started in 1965, the herbarium had only 200 specimens when Chuey arrived at YSU in 1967.

Plants for the herbarium are collected in the wild, dried, pressed and

Penguins visit Joe Paterno this year, 'The Horseshoe' next year

The YSU Penguin football squad visits Joe Paterno's Penn State Nittany Lions this year and will open the next two seasons against the Ohio State Buckeyes at Ohio Stadium.

The Penguins will face the Buckeyes at "The Horseshoe" on Sept. 1, 2007, and August 30, 2008.

"The opportunity to play a tradition-rich program like Ohio State in consecutive years benefits our student-athletes, our university, our fan-base and the entire Mahoning Valley," said Ron Strollo, YSU executive director of intercollegiate athletics.

"I know everyone in our football family appreciates this chance to play one of the most storied college football programs in the nation."

The games pit former YSU coach and current Buckeye coach Jim Tressel against his old team. Tressel amassed a 15-year record of 135-57-2 at Youngstown State from 1986-2000, including four national Division I-AA championships.

Meanwhile, expectations are high for this year's YSU squad. The team was ranked third in the Football Gazette Preseason Poll and seventh in the Sports Network's Preseason Top 25.

The Penguins, who went 8-3 last season, are one of three Gateway teams ranked in the top 10 in both polls. The last time the Penguins opened the season ranked in the top 10 was in 2002.

This season's schedule features a trip to State College, Pa. on Sept. 16 for a game against Penn State, ranked third in the nation last season. The schedule also features home games against Slippery Rock, Maine, University of California Davis, Indiana State, Northern Iowa and Southern Illinois and road games against Missouri State, Western Illinois, Illinois State and Western Kentucky.

Davis previously was director of the International Students and Scholars Office at Clark University in Massachusetts. He also worked for the Experiment in International Living in Azerbaijan, was director of the State University of New York's Keller International Studies Residential College, was resident director for the Semester at Sea program at the University of Pittsburgh and was international program director at Miami University in Ohio.

Campus introduces 26 'hotspots'

From Arby's in Kilcawley Center to the first-floor student lounge in Beeghly Hall, wireless access to YSU's network is now available in 26 "hotspots" across the YSU campus.

"We're trying to give students, faculty and staff more mobility when it comes to accessing their e-mail, internet and other services," said Jason Rakers, director of network services.

The campus wireless project began in 2005 in Maag Library, where laptop computers were available with wireless network access on select levels of the building, Rakers said.

Wireless is now being expanded in three phases:

- **Phase 1.** Started in the spring and finished over the summer, Phase 1 targeted 26 common areas in 14 buildings on campus. (For a listing of those locations, visit eUpdate at http://eupdate.ysu.edu.)
- **Phase 2.** Starting this fall, the deans of YSU's six colleges will identify locations in their buildings for wireless access. Those locations will be implemented starting January 2007.
- **Phase 3.** Set for 2008, Phase 3 will include additional common areas of campus.

glued to paper. They are then identified, labeled and cataloged in cabinets specially designed to keep out insects and moisture, Chuey said.

About 20 percent of the herbarium's specimens are pteridophytes (ferns), and most are from Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The oldest date to 1893.

The bulk of the collection is stored in 65, 7-foot-tall cabinets on the fourth floor of Ward Beecher Hall.

"Completing the herbarium to me is

important because it will mean my students and I have achieved a noteworthy goal for YSU," Chuey said. "I guess it can be said that it will be my footnote in the history of YSU."
