Specifically, my efforts at securing funds for the community has resulted in the development of the following: Drop In Center, Northeast Industries, Sojourner House, Horizon House, Suicide Prevention/Intervention Hotline, Substance Abusing/Mentally Ill Programming, Goodwill Industries workshop and many others. In addition, I have secured millions of capital construction dollars that have built or renovated the following facilities: Meridian Services, Turning Point Counseling's Belmont facility and their 420 Youngstown Poland Road site, D & E Counseling Center facilities on Javit Court and Belmont Avenue, the Doris Burdman Home, Help Hotline Crisis Center facility expansion and the former Woodside Annex building on Indianola Avenue.

I have always advocated for the development and implementation of quality mental health services for Mahoning County residents. However, I will be the first to tell you that nothing could be accomplished without the cooperation of the Board, the provider agency boards, Directors and staff.


