

NEW DIRECTOR appointed

Youngstown State University and WYSU-FM are pleased to announce that Gary A. Sexton has been appointed director to the radio station after a nationwide search of candidates. The position became vacant following the death of former director Robert Peterson, in February of this year.

Gary came to the area from Michigan when his wife Susan accepted a teaching position at the Dana School of Music in the summer of 1987. Since both are passionate music lovers, one of their first connections to the area's music circuit was to establish contact with WYSU-FM as listeners and contributors. Shortly after Gary completed his master's degree in music performance at Dana, he came to work for WYSU as an announcer/producer, and has served as program director and associate director since 1993.

Both Sue and Gary maintain very active professional calendars, with a considerable amount of musical performance experience in both large orchestras and smaller chamber settings. Their own group, The Sheet and Tube Brass Quartet, continues to give live concerts on campus and throughout the area.

In addition, Gary has served on a number of committees supporting the funding and enhancement of music education in the area. He received a Distinguished Service Award from Youngstown State University in 1993.

His recent appointment to the directorship is a welcome move for many reasons, not the least of which is that it assures a continuity and affirmation of many of the goals and perspectives Robert had for the station. As friends and colleagues, Robert and Gary shared a philosophy of commitment for WYSU that builds on a reputation of trust and responsibility that began 30 years ago. Station founder Don Elser and pioneers Steve Greevich, Dick Stevens, and Bill Foster envisioned a station that would dedicate itself to offering quality fine arts and news programming. Those ideals continue to define WYSU as a leader in fine arts broadcasting to this day.

We're proud and pleased to have Gary assume this leadership role for the station, and we, the staff, extend him our very best wishes.



PITTSBURGH SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA BEGINS NEW SEASON ON WYSU-FM

The new season of Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, a weekly two-hour program of concert performances by the Pittsburgh Symphony from Public Radio International, begins on Sundays at noon in October. "This season's line-up is excellent," says Gary Sexton. Music director Mariss Jansons conducts Schoenberg, Dukas, Brahms, and Britten, among many others, and features an outstanding array of guest artists and conductors. "It's a real pleasure to bring our listeners one of the nation's premiere symphony orchestras. We're looking forward to another stellar broadcast season," Sexton adds.

The 2000-2001 season of Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra features major works such as Haydn's London Symphony, Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, Dukas' The Sorcerer's Apprentice, and more. It also boasts some of the world's greatest performers and conductors, including Shaham, Chang, Zukerman, Parkening, Dutoit, Previn, and many others. Hosted by Jim Cunningham, the season also showcases such works as Brahms' Symphony No. 4, Mahler's Kindertotenlieder, Britten's Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra, and Schumann's Symphony No. 4.

Who's on Michael Feldman's Whad'ya Know?

JIM PACKARD, Announcer

In addition to his weekly appearances on Michael Feldman's Whad'Ya Know?, Jim Packard has multiple commitments to radio production. He is a serious journalist who arrived at Wisconsin Public Radio in 1981 with 16 years experience in commercial radio. Today, Packard serves as producer, and often as host, for Conversations with Larry Meiller, a weekday call-in program on the Ideas Network of Wisconsin Public Radio.

Packard's association with Michael Feldman began before Feldman's stint on WGN, and resumed when Whad'Ya Know? was still in development. Packard and his wife Deborah were married in 1981 and added their Boston terrier, Archie, to the family in 1992.

JOHN THULIN, Musical Coordinator

Since 1985, John Thulin has been the musical coordinator and pianist for Michael Feldman's Whad'Ya Know? In this capacity, he has shared the stage with such jazz and blues greats as Von Freeman, Claude Williams, Ernestine Anderson, Howard Levy, Barbara Carr, The Memphis Horns, Dave Stryker, and many others.

Whad'Ya Know? often showcases Thulin's music—a unique combination of blues, bebop, and pianistic, hard-swinging grooves. Thulin performs many of his own compositions on the show, as well as at live performances and on recordings. In addition to his musical contributions, Thulin adds to the wit and spontaneity of the show, often injecting his own humorous asides.

JEFF ECKELS, Bassist

Jeff Eckels has shared the musical spotlight on Michael Feldman's Whad'Ya Know? with John Thulin for over 10 years. As one of the Midwest's most sought-after bassists, Eckels has appeared with jazz greats Roscoe Mitchel, Ben Sidran, Joe Lovano, Winton Marsalis, Victor Lewis, and Ernie Watts. He is also an accomplished classical musician who has performed with members of the Pro Arte Ensemble under the baton of Gunther Schuller, and with symphonies and chamber groups around the Midwest.

Together Thulin and Eckels have produced two CDs: John Thulin and the "Whad'Ya Know?" Band, released in 1990, and John Thulin "Whad'Ya Know?" Trio Solo

released in 1993. Drawing on a musical relationship that spans over a decade, Thulin and Eckels create a blues-tinged jazz that is both accessible and entertaining.

Whad'Ya Know? airs Saturday mornings at 11:00.

9/2 MONTEVERDI: Orfeo. Apollo's Fire; Jeannette Sorrell, conductor. Cast: Jeffrey Strauss, Sandra Simon, Sylvia Hall, Robert Stafford. It's not the first opera ever written—though it comes close—but it's certainly the first great opera, and Monteverdi the first composer who truly understood and exploited the genre's powerful potential.

9/9 GALUPPI: The World Backwards
(or, Women in Command). Italian
Swiss Radio; Vanitas Ensemble; Diego
Fasolis, director. Cast: Marinella
Pennicchi, Rosa Dominguez, Mya
Fracassini, Fulvio Bettini. As the title
suggests, this one is a tad provocative.
It's set on an island where the men are
in chains, and obey every whim of the
women, who rule all. That is, until a
boatload of macho types comes along
and "sets things right."

9/16 VERDI: Ernani. Opera Orchestra of New York; Eve Queler, conductor. Cast: Richard Margison, June Anderson, Carlo Guelfi, Paul Plishka. This drama has some politics, but at heart it's pure passion, with the title character choosing to stab himself rather than give up his true love.

9/23 DONIZETTI: Lucrezia Borgia.

Opera Orchestra of New York; Eve
Queler, conductor. Cast: Renee
Fleming, Marcello Giordani, Dean
Peterson, Stephanie Blythe. In this
steamy little corker, the title character
throws one of the all-time great parties,
with one of opera's finest drinking
scenes. Unfortunately for Lucrezia's
unsuspecting guests, she poisons the
punch bowl, and all that drinking leads
to tragic consequences.

9/30 BELLINI: The Capulets and the Montagues. Opera Orchestra of New York; Eve Queler, conductor. Cast: Vesselina Kasarova, Annick Massis, Gregory Kunde, Phil Cokorinos. Unlike some operatic versions, this one does end tragically, though Bellini and his longtime literary accomplice, Felice Romani, do play fast and loose with the traditional story.

10/7 DONIZETTI: Adelia. Opera
Orchestra of New York; Eve Queler,
conductor. Cast: Mariella Devia,
Warren Mok, Stephan Pyatnyichko,
Paul Plishka, bass. Donizetti probably
wrote too many operas for his own
good—so many that some aren't only
neglected, they're virtually unheard of,
not to mention unheard. Adelia falls
into that category but unjustly, as
you'll hear in this compelling
performance.

10/14 STRAUSS: Elektra. Houston Grand Opera; Christoph Eschenbach, conductor. Cast: Hildegard Behrens, Leonie Rysanek, Roger Roloff, John Duykers, Josephine Barstow. Surely in all of literature, myth, and legend-or for that matter, reality-there's been no more dysfunctional family than this bunch. Strauss's opera joins them after the murders of daughter Iphiginia (Dad did it) and father Agamemnon (Mom did the honors)-and just in time for son Orestes to murder mother Clytemnestra, and daughter Elektra to die of what seems to be terminal insanity.

10/21 ADAMO: Little Women.
Houston Grand Opera; Patrick
Summers, conductor. Margaret Lloyd,
Stephanie Novacek, Chad Shelton,
Stacey Tappan, Joyce DiDonato. Based
on Louisa May Alcott's classic book,
Mark Adamo's score is that rarest of
modern operas: a work so popular with
its first audiences that it earned a
second production by the same
company that mounted the premiere.

10/28 DONIZETTI: The Elixir of Love. Houston Grand Opera; Patrick Summers, conductor. Ana Maria Martinez, Ramon Vargas, Earle Patriarco, Alfonso Antoniozzi.
