WYSU GOES INTO THE SCHOOLS

April is Classical Music Month, and WYSU's ongoing efforts to get more young people involved in listening to classical music will be in evidence this month as many area students share the fruits of their labors in a joint project that had them studying Gustav Holst's The Planets.

Study guides were prepared by Barbara Krauss and Gary Sexton and sent out to local music teachers throughout northeast Ohio and western Pennsylvania, with suggestions on how to integrate art, language skills, music and even physical science for the project, using Holst's famous piece as a focal point. Mrs. Susan Obergefell, a music teacher in the Hermitage School System, assisted with providing detailed lesson plans.

While students studied the music over several weeks in their classrooms, they created their own artistic interpretations of the music, had their art work

displayed in the Shenango Mall, and realized their potential for creative writing by composing themes for an essay competition sponsored by WYSU-FM. You'll hear some of those essays read on the air by the students themselves throughout the month. In addition, *The Planets* will be played in its entirety at 1:06 pm on April 17.

Last year a similar effort revolved around Mussorgsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition* and met with enthusiastic success. The purpose is not only to awaken young people to the magic of classical music through the study of some well-known masterpieces, but also to make them aware of public radio as a life-long source of that music. We salute the efforts of the teachers, parents, students and administrators who lent their invaluable assistance to the project, and congratulate the students themselves for a job well done.

SPACE SHUTTLE DRIVERS CALL-IN TO CAR TALK

"Hello Tom and Ray, this is John from Houston. I work for the government so I can't tell you much. I occasionally drive this government vehicle."

This was the beginning of one of the most interesting calls in the history of Car Talk, not to mention the one from farthest away. John Grunsfeld, a mission specialist, was calling from the space shuttle Atlantis, which at the time had just docked with the Russian space station Mir. The call was a complete surprise to Tom and Ray Magliozzi as they tried to figure out why John's vehicle "vibrates like crazy" for two minutes after start-up, runs smooth for six minutes, then cuts out completely. As they chatted, the guys discovered that mission specialist Grunsfeld was a former customer of their garage in Cambridge, Massachusetts when he was a student at MIT in the 1970s. "Oh yeah," said Ray, "I remember you. You still owe us five bucks!"

This is not the first time that the Magliozzis have been surprised by a celebrity caller. In the past, they have received calls from Jay Leno as he drove down Hollywood Boulevard, and Iowa senator Tom Harkin.


