5/26 Harold Land. Classic bop tenorman.



Lyric Opera of Chicago Returns Of Eight Performances

Since its early days, Lyric Opera of Chicago has been regarded as one of the top three opera companies in the United States, along with the Met and San Francisco. This season does nothing to damage that position with first-class performances of Giuseppi Verdi's Rigoletto and Attila, Piotr Tchaikovsky's The Queen of Spades, Gioacchino Rossini's The Barber of Seville, Giacomo Puccini's Tosca, Richard Wagner's The Flying Dutchman, Leos Janacek's Jenufa, and John Harbison's The Great Gatsby. The first radio broadcast is Saturday, May 5.

New Day Sponsorship Guidelines Established

To better serve our growing number of day sponsors, and to be clear and fair to all, we have put together a few basic guidelines regarding day sponsorships and the corresponding on-air credits.

Length

Up to 15 seconds (two or three sentences).

Frequency

Weekday day sponsors are guaranteed a total of ten spots, including hourly from 9:00 am – 5:00 pm.

Weekend day sponsors are guaranteed a total of ten total spots between 7:00 am and 9:00 pm, distributed around network programs.

3. Content

Announcements may be used as memorials, celebrations, or to publicize events. They should be restricted to answering the basics: who, what, when, and where. All day sponsorships must follow public broadcasting underwriting guidelines (no calls to action by for-profit businesses and no value-laden descriptions). The content should be non-controversial, although announcing an event for some organizations will inevitably be controversial to some people, something that cannot be avoided. Day sponsorships promoting specific religious or political positions will not be accepted, but sponsorships publicizing a

religious event or special day, and sponsorships listing the services of businesses and organizations are acceptable.

4. Exclusivity

To provide more members with the opportunity to get the day they want, two sponsorships per day will be allowed.

Requests

Day sponsors have the opportunity to make two classical music requests. The air staff will do their best to honor the requests, but we cannot guarantee that the requests will be played, or that they will be played in their entirety.

Cost

\$150.
