A SUMMER OF YOUNGSTOWN SYMPHONY CONCERTS ON WYSU



Music Director Isaiah Jackson in Powers Auditorium. WYSU will feature highlights of Maestro Jackson's highly successful first year with the Youngstown Symphony on Sunday afternoons at 1:00 beginning on July 6th.

On Sunday, July 6th, WYSU will begin broadcasting an eightweek series of performances from the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra's 1996-97 concert season. Music director Isaiah Jackson will showcase the orchestra and soloists in music that includes some standard favorites and some interesting new pieces as well. The series will temporarily take over the Sunday **Performance Today** spot, starting at 1:00 pm. Here is the July rundown:

July 6 Brahms: Symphony No. 2 in D major, Op. 73; Beethoven: Piano Concerto No. 5 in E-flat major, Op. 73. David Golub, pianist.

July 13 Rossini: Overture to La gazza ladra; Schumann: Symphony No. 2 in C major, Op. 61; Koyama: Kobiki-Uta (The Woodcutter's Song); Mendelssohn: Violin Concerto in E minor. Peter Winogrand, violin; Kotaro Sato, guest conductor.

July 20 Silverman: Khlestakov's Lullaby; Berlioz: Symphonie fantastique; Mozart: Piano Concerto No. 20 in D minor, K. 466. Misha Dichter, pianist.

July 27 Schubert: Incidental Music from *Rosamunde*; Bruckner: Symphony No. 4 in E-flat major (Romantic).

7/18 Charles Brown. In addition to being one of the world's greatest blues singers, Charles Brown in an extraordinary pianist and composer.



E-TOWN IS BACK IN YOUNGSTOWN!




