"While I'm here, I may as well ask. You folks aren't looking for any help, are you?"

It was 1979. I was six months pregnant with my first child, and we were, in fact, looking for someone to temporarily replace me on the morning shift. Ann was a voice student at Dana, so the language pronunciation wasn't a problem. She also had a strong music history background, and a pleasant voice. And that's how it all started.

This December, it ends with Ann's voluntary retirement from WYSU. She still loves us, we're reassured, but her life-long interest in yoga and massage therapy is pulling her in a different direction, and she's decided to follow that tug.

Those of us who've worked with her will most likely remember her for her seemingly endless capacity to listen. Those who have invited her into their homes each morning these past many years will remember her for her calm professionalism and her great musical instincts.

But this is no time for a euology, and this article is beginning to sound like one! Ann is simply retiring, but even that's a word that's

hard to use with reference to her. If she sets about doing half of what she plans to do, it will be enough to keep her occupied as much as any full-time job could. She's not the one we worry about. It's the rest of us, of course. There will be a hole for all of us to fill, and it won't be easy.

It's possible that she'll adjust to life without WYSU more easily than WYSU will adjust to life without her. And we wonder how long it will be before she's home listening, and some glitch will catch her ear. Pad music where there shouldn't be any; a pause that goes on a little too long; a mis-programmed CD. She'll know she's made the break when she can shake her head and mutter, "I wonder what really goes on down there?"

11/1 Mike Stern. Miles Davis alumnus and guitarist extraordinaire.

11/7 New Releases. Featuring T.S. Monk's latest, Monk on Monk.

Throughout November, Tom Hanchett, assistant professor of History at YSU, will host four discussions that explore our industrial heritage and how it affects our lives today. Part of our Focus series, these programs will air on Saturday afternoons at 4:30, following the opera broadcast, November 8-29.

Saturday, November 8, 4:30 pm

Industry and Culture. In two very different ways, artist Bryn Zellers and community historian Jim Algren use our Valley's rich heritage to prove that "industry" and "culture" are not mutually exclusive concepts.

Saturday, November 15, 4:30 pm

Industrial Heritage: What to Preserve?
How do two individuals with zero dollars dismantle and preserve a 40-ton steam engine? Better yet, why do they attempt it? Rick Rowlands, a leading history activist in the Valley, answers these questions and more.

Saturday, November 22, 4:30 pm

Italians in the Mills. History professor Martha Pallante describes her students' research into the Niles Firebrick factory, which brought numerous Italian families to the Valley and spurred the growth of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel church.

Saturday, November 29, 4:30 pm

Creating a "Center for Historic Preservation." YSU and West Virginia University are two schools taking the lead in preserving America's industrial history. WVU's Dr. Billy Joe Peyton will describe his Institute for the History of Technology and Industrial Archaeology, and Dr. Jeff Drobney will discuss the newly-created Center for Historic Preservation at YSU.


Live Folk Concert

WYSU-FM proudly presents its third annual Evening of Live Folk Music on Friday, November 7 at 8:00 pm. The free concert will be held at The Pub in Youngstown State University's Kilcawley Center. Featured performers are singer/songwriters Walt Campbell, back for an encore appearance, and Shirley Jay. Both artists have Ohio connections. Walt Campbell hails from Cleveland while Shirley Jay, a 1981 YSU graduate, resides in Marshallville. Charles Darling, producer of WYSU's Folk Festival, will host the evening.

Walt Campbell, who has traveled all over the U.S., sings his tales of life on the road. Accompanying his bittersweet voice with acoustic guitar and harmonica, Campbell will perform works from his critically acclaimed CD, Crashin' on the Breakwall, along with many new pieces. In recent years, he has toured the Midwest, New York, and New England performing at concerts, coffeehouses, and festivals. His music is played on public radio stations nationwide. Folk fans will enjoy Campbell's engaging, insightful delivery.

Shirley Jay has a big, expressive voice and a repertoire that ranges from goodtime folk and country to jazz and R&B. Drawing on her Midwestern blue-collar upbringing, Shirley Jay's soaring melodies and powerful lyrics ring with determination and longing. Her sparse, percussive guitar style is the perfect backdrop for her dynamic vocals. *Drawing the Shades*, her impressive debut album, has been called "what the repeat button on a CD player is for." Shirley Jay was one of 30 artists nationwide to participate in the prestigious Telluride Troubadour Contest and has opened for performers such as Mary-Chapin Carpenter and Shawn Colvin.

Guests are encouraged to use the M-8 parking lot off University Plaza behind the Alumni House. There will be a \$3.00 parking fee.


