- 8 THE WORLD OF SAM RIVERS. "The way I see it, the music of the 70's should be a fusion of the 40's, 50's, and 60's." Sam Rivers is heard with orchestra, quartet and trio in this all-encompassing show.
- WOMEN'S JAZZ FESTIVAL, March 24 and 25, 1979, in Kansas City. Among the performers are AERIAL, singer URSULA DUDZIAK and husband MICHAEL URBANIAK with his group, MARIAN MC PARTLAND, trombonist MELBA LISTON, pianist JOANNE BRACKEEN, and singer CARMEN MC RAE.
- From the October, 1978, Zurich Jazz Festival, the GIL EVANS ORCHESTRA, and bassist NIELS PEDERSEN. Pianist DAVE BURRELL gave a solo recital in New York last March.
- A TRIBUTE TO COUNT BASIE. Most of the jazz being played today has in some way been influenced by the "Master of Time." Last New Year's Eve, some of his friends got together at Sandy's Jazz Revival in Beverly, Mass. They included pianist JAY MC SHANN, long-time drummer JO JONES, bassist MAJOR HOLLEY, AL GREY and JIMMY FORREST leading a quintet, and singer CARRIE SMITH.

- Dec. 1 THE YSU JAZZ ENSEMBLE, featuring such soloists as Bill Watrous, Max Roach, Thad Jones, and Ralph LaLama.
 - 8 THE YSU JAZZ ENSEMBLE, Leonardi's Legions again, with more past glories and promising portents.
 - 15 ELVIN JONES, the remarkable modern drummer, mostly with his own groups.
 - 22 SIDNEY BECHET, flamboyant master of soprano saxophone and clarinet in and beyond the New Orleans tradition.
 - 29 MILT JACKSON, vibes, before, during and after the Modern Jazz Quartet.

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"ASK THE PRESIDENT"
