NPR'S WEEKEND EDITION SUNDAY TURNS 10

NPR's Weekend Edition Sunday is celebrating its 10th anniversary (January 19 was the official anniversary day), and the first two programs in February will continue to showcase some of the greatest moments from the program's first decade. You can hear Weekend Edition Sunday every Sunday morning from 8:00 - 10:00 on WYSU-FM.

Weekend Edition Sunday is an informative blend of news and analysis, coupled with colorful arts and humaninterest features that appeal to even the most eclectic tastes. Liane Hansen has brought enormous curiosity and enthusiasm to her role as host. Over the course of Liane's stewardship, the program has developed a reputation for strong material on contemporary music, history, African-American affairs, medicine, space travel, archeology, and many of the topics that are difficult for the weekday shows—which are more news-driven—to deal with.

Each Sunday, NPR senior news analyst Daniel Schorr comments on one aspect of the past week's news, Will Shortz offers listeners games and puzzles, and political analysis is offered by a variety of commentators, such as Clarence Page, Pulitzer Prize-winning columnist from the Chicago Tribune; Fred Barnes of Weekly Standard Magazine; Carl Cannon of the Baltimore Sun; Owen Ullman of Business Week; Kate O'Bierne of the Washington Times; David Corn of The Nation; and Doyle McManus of the Los Angeles Times.

Please tune in to WYSU-FM on Sunday, February 2nd and 9th at 8:00 am to celebrate 10 years of this wonderful program.

CLASSICALLY BLACK: ON THE LISZT—ANDRE WATTS

This is the sixth program in the Classically Black series, each one focusing on the work of classically-trained musicians of African descent. This year Classically Black spotlights the career and triumphs of Andre Watts, one of America's truly great piano virtuosos. Mr. Watts will play music of Franz Liszt, Johannes Brahms, George Gershwin, Domenico Scarlatti, Claude Debussy, and others. Program host Roger Cooper talks with pianists Ian Hobson and Roger Shields about Mr. Watts and his impact on younger players.

You won't want to miss this musical special, airing Sunday, February 9 at noon.

- 2/7 Phil Markowitz. The multitalented pianist and jazz trio leader Phil Markowitz reminisces with Marian McPartland about student days at the Eastman School of Music. They play a combined version of "I Remember You," then Markowitz solos on his own composition, "Taxi Ride."
- 2/14 Clark Terry. One of the great innovators and educators in jazz, Clark Terry is celebrated for his technical virtuosity and swinging lyricism. The master trumpeter player creates magic and humor when he and Marian McPartland play "The Snapper" and "WHAM."
- 2/21 Michael Weiss. Michael Weiss excels in the creation of smooth melodic lines which incorporate the rhythms of bebop in an irresistible way. He solos on his own composition, "Optimism," then joins forces with Marian McPartland on "Out of the Blues."

2/28 Renee Rosnes. Renee Rosnes brings a strong lyrical grace to the keyboard. She solos on a tender Irving Berlin ballad, "The Best Thing for You," then duets with Marian McPartland on a special piano rendition of "Secret Love."

MAD ABOUT THE ARTS '97 TO BE HELD MARCH 7

The second annual Mad About the Arts will be held Friday, March 7, 1997 at 8:00 pm at the John J. McDonough Museum of Art. This lively evening of fine music, fine art, and fine wine will kick off Fine & Performing Arts Alumni Week at

Youngstown State University and features one of the Museum's most popular exhibitions, the Alumni Artist Biennial. Guests may sample wonderful foods and wines from around the world as they stroll through the galleries to the accompaniment of classical piano duo Timothy Ehlen and Caroline Oltmanns, and The YSU Student Jazz Quartet led by Jason Rigby. Jason, a saxophonist, is in his senior year of jazz studies at YSU. Caroline, assistant professor of keyboard studies at YSU, and Timothy have toured extensively throughout Europe and the United States. The duo's first CD will be released early this year. WYSU recently broadcast a special featuring Dr. Oltmanns performing Beethoven, Chopin and Liszt.

Guests will have a chance to view a variety of works by alumni in the juried Alumni Artists Exhibition, which is held every other year. Sandy Kreisman, director of McDonough Museum, expects over 200 entries in a wide range of media from ceramics to abstract painting. The Annual YSU Faculty Show will complement the alumni work and be on view at the same time. "The entire evening will be a feast for your senses," says Sandy.

Since federal funding for the arts has come under attack, communities across America have raised a unified voice in support of arts organizations which contribute immeasurably to the quality of their lives. Mad About the Arts is a joint benefit for WYSU-FM and the McDonough Museum of Art, and an opportunity for artists, businesses and community members to support and celebrate the arts. 


