NPR CORRESPONDENT **NEAL CONAN COMES TO YSU**


You'll want to reserve Monday evening, October 24 at 8:00 for a talk by Neal Conan, correspondent-at-large for National Public Radio, to be held in the Chestnut Room at YSU's Kilcawley Center. Conan will be here as part of the Skeggs Lecture Series and to help celebrate WYSU-FM's 25th anniversary. Topics of discussion will include Conan's experience as a foreign correspondent, current events, and the future of public radio. There will also be plenty of opportunity to ask questions following Conan's prepared talk.

Neal Conan brings 25 years of journalism to his work, which includes anchoring NPR live events coverage, serving as back-up host for NPR's news magazines, and reporting from Saudia Arabia and Kuwait during the Gulf War as defense correspondent. During this assignment, Conan was one of three dozen journalists held hostage in Iraq by the Republican Guard. He was released unharmed after a month in captivity. Conan was part of the NPR team that won a prestigious Alfred I duPont-Columbia University Award for coverage of the Gulf War.

Conan was already well familiar with the Persian Gulf area, having covered U.S. military operations there in 1987. Beginning in 1983, Conan spent nearly four years as senior editor of NPR's London Bureau, reporting from Moscow, Warsaw, and almost every country in Western Europe. Before moving to London, Conan was bureau chief of NPR's New York Bureau from 1980 to

Conan is a highly-honored journalist, winning the 1987 Armstrong Award for his coverage of U.S. military actions in the Persian Gulf and Citations of Excellence from the Overseas Press Club for his 1972 reporting on Northern Ireland and his 1980 coverage of events in Afghanistan.





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
