## IS NPR'S WINDOW TO THE WHITE HOUSE

Imagine you have an interview scheduled with the President of the United States, and that morning you find that he is being accused of trying to persuade his alleged paramour—a young White House intern—to lie to

investigators about their affair. On January 21, 1998, NPR White House Correspondent Mara Liasson found herself in this situation. "Obviously that changed the nature of the whole interview," she says.

Liasson has had some big breaks in her career, such as her interview with President Clinton on the day the Monica Lewinsky scandal broke. However, she gained her position the old-fashioned way - with brains, talent, and hard work. A 1977 graduate of Brown University, Liasson began her journalistic career at the *Vineyard Gazette*, a small, respected newspaper on Martha's Vineyard. Later, she was managing editor and anchor of "California Edition," a California public radio news program. Liasson joined NPR in 1985 as a newscaster and general assignment reporter, who covered Congress and followed the 1992 presidential election. She's been covering the White House ever since.

A typical reporting day begins at the "morning gaggle," with Press Secretary Joe Lockhart. At 1:00 pm, Liasson attends the daily press briefing where reporters may record comments. Through the day, she makes phone calls, develops sources, attends public White House events, and files reports as requested for Morning Edition and All Things Considered. Liasson has her own office at the White House, but she says that her physical surroundings certainly aren't glamorous. "If I stick out my elbows in both directions I can touch either wall."

As White House Correspondent, Liasson has traveled all over the world with President Clinton. She rides on Air Force One, taking turns alphabetically with other stations for the one radio seat allotted. From campaigns to fundraising to international diplomacy, the work is taxing and often unpredictable. When she is not traveling, Liasson finds that the most rewarding aspect of her job is being able to watch how the Presidency operates and how policy is made and debated. That has attendant frustrations; she can't always have the kind of access she wants. "There is sometimes an adversarial aspect to reporting," Liasson says. "I have to work very hard to get around that to report what's really going on at the White House."






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
