Complete opera performances — some of which have never been played, and most in exceptionally good condition — will start at just \$5 per set. Spoken word, seasonal and yuletime records, and musical theatre will be sold at just \$1 a disc. Major record labels and well-known artists will be represented abundantly, but there will also be some rare performances and obscure artists. For the best selection, be sure to come early. Bring cash or check, and a means to carry your treasures home with you. The record sale starts promptly at 1:00 pm and ends at 7:00 for one day only, Friday, September 17. Underwriter Profile: UPMC Horizon



UPMC Horizon has been a WYSU-FM program underwriter since 1997, but its commitment to improving the quality of life for the community it serves has been part of its mission since the hospital's founding in 1906. Dedicated to excellence, compassion, and respect for human dignity in providing patient-centered quality health care, UPMC Horizon is the market leader in serving the residents of Mercer County.

The 369-bed system has two facilities -- in the Shenango Valley, and in Greenville, Pennsylvania -- with a combined medical staff of over 250 physicians and more than 1,000 employees. In addition to its medical and surgical services, Shenango Valley operates a center for sleep disorders, a state-of-the-art labor and delivery unit, and a chemical dependancy program. Known throughout the mid-Atlantic region as a major orthopaedic center, UPMC Horizon ranks within Pennsylvania's top five hospitals for joint replacement.

This month marks the first anniversary of UPMC Horizon's 1998 merger with UPMC (University of Pittsburgh Medical Center) Health System. J. A multimillion-dollar renovation of the Shenango Valley facility, scheduled for completion this fall, includes construction of a new state-of-the-art cardiac catheterization laboratory and general improvements focused on patient privacy.
