Folk Concert is FRIDAY, November 5

WYSU's 30th-Anniversary celebration continues with a lively evening of folk music. Join us for the fifth annual FOLK FESTIVAL concert on Friday, November 5, 1999 at 7:30 pm at Peaberry's of YSU in Youngstown State University's Kilcawley Center. Featured performers are Armor & Sturtevant, One Way Rider, and Dennis Cheplick. Charles Darling, host of WYSU's Folk Festival, will host the event. Guests are encouraged to use the M-8 parking lot off University Plaza. There is a \$3.00 parking fee. The concert is free.

Armor & Sturtevant play a hybrid of East African traditional, Appalachian, and original music on a plethora of instruments, including fiddle, flute, guitar, accordion, mandolin, penny whistle, and kalimba. Performing nationwide at folk festivals, concerts, coffeehouses, and schools, this husband-wife duo comes by its unique sound honestly. Kelly Armor studied flute and composition at Yale before spending over two years in Kenya and Tanzania. David Sturtevant grew up listening to and accompanying the fiddle playing of his father.

Sturtevant's songs reflect his old-time roots and his lifetime of living along the Great Lakes. Their latest recording, You Dance Like You Drive, is currently enjoying air play and was featured on a broadcast of public radio's Car Talk.

Invited back for an encore performance is One Way Rider. This family bluegrass band has spent the past year touring the country and recording in Nashville. The Mayfield family of Diamond, Ohio, includes dad, David Lee; mom, Valerie Fay; son, David Ray; and daughters Amanda Lynn and Jessica Lea. One Way Rider's engaging delivery of beautiful harmonies and fast-paced instrumentals is sure to please.

Singer/songwriter/12-string
guitarist Dennis Cheplick discovered
songwriting at an early age — and
never stopped! A decade of live gigs
and jamming, including a stint in
Nashville, fueled his creativity and
honed his extraordinary guitar work.
His recordings have been broadcast
on radio and television, and Cheplick
continues to perform live. Now
residing in Mercer, Pennsylvania, he
has just been invited to record some
of his instrumental compositions for
radio, TV, and film.


