\$76K Challenge:

Team Efforts Write Next Chapter in WYSU Fundraising

asked morning announcer Barbara
Krauss. "I don't know," answered
WYSU-FM director, Gary Sexton.
"Well, Gary, if you have half a book and
I have half a book, we could write a
book on fundraising." And then came
the call to listener-supporters to make
their pledge. It was a call-to-action we
would hear throughout the week. It was
a call answered by many. But I'm
getting ahead of the story...

This year's fall pledge drive, with a theme of Priority on Programing: News with Substance, Music with Impact started Friday, October 18, 2002, with a dollar goal of \$76,000. The money is needed to pay for quality news programs such as Morning Edition, All Things Considered, the BBC World News Service. Fresh Air with Terry Gross; as well as popular programs such as Car Talk, Michael Feldman's Whad 'Ya Know? and The Metropolitan Opera; and operating expenses. The semi-annual fund drive takes a staff team effort beginning weeks in advance to put together, and a community team effort during the week

The drive kicked off with a first pledge of support of \$250 during Rick Popovich's Friday night Jazzscapes. Wow, I thought, this is going to be easy! Turns out it was a loyal Jazz listener who always starts the fundraising with his first call of \$250. But I wasn't discouraged. In fact, it is largely due to our loyal members who pledge their support, either during pledge week or by mail renewals, year after year, that we are able to continue providing news with substance and music with impact. Of course we need new members too, who we hope will continue to support public radio.

Coinciding with this year's fall pledge drive was the 33rd birthday of WYSU-FM. On Wednesday we asked callers, "Where were you on October 23, 1969?" It was a "local" day and our listeners responded. Professor Robert Levin in the School of Education threw down a challenge to pledge \$33 a month for the next year if we could get 33 callers to make a pledge by 1:00 pm. Volunteers had pens in hand as the phones began ringing. On more than one occasion there were four phones in use at one time. The daily drawing was for a beautiful, 20x30 original watercolor by YSU grad and Canfield resident Christopher Leeper. Two sets of

Cleveland Browns tickets were offered. Anyone who had pledged at anytime up to the drawing time, including those who pledged online, was eligible to win one of these prizes. And we did it! Pay up, Dr. Levin! I think it was at that moment that I knew we would make our goal of \$76,000, even though we were still a long way off.

On Friday morning, the last day of the drive, we still needed \$14,000 to meet the \$76K challenge. Never before have we brought in that amount of support in a single day. I was cautiously optimistic. The optimism was infectious. Staff and volunteers alike traded encouragement. By 4:30 pm, with just a half hour to go in the drive, we were \$76 short of our goal of \$76,000. The next caller pushed us past our goal.

Barbara and Gary may not have written their book on fundraising yet, but this fall's successful drive, which raised more money than any drive before, is certainly a chapter they'll want to include.

Thanks to Catherine Cala, who laid the groundwork for the drive - developing the premium list, soliciting the daily

prizes, contacting food vendors, and providing guidance to me whenever I seemed overwhelmed by the task in front of me. Thanks to the on-air crew: announcers Barbara Krauss, Mike Cervone and April Antell-Tarantine, director Gary Sexton, program director David Luscher, Jazzscapes host Rick Popovich and Folk Festival host Charles Darling, who spent hours talking with listeners during the week. Thanks to WYSU administrative assistant Carol Ruby and to all the students at WYSU. Thanks to the volunteers who answered the phones.

Thanks to the companies who provided prizes and food for volunteers. And a special thanks to our members, new and old, who support us.

This fall's drive is over but the need for fundraising is not. Upgrading the station's technology will cost money. Keeping quality programming and providing new programs costs money.

We'll write that chapter next time.
