

# AN "Overflow" OF FINE ARTS AT 7<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL Mad About the Arts

The highly anticipated fine arts event of the Valley, Mad About the Arts, is scheduled for Friday, February 28, 2003 from 8 to 10:30 pm at the McDonough Museum of Art on the Youngstown State University campus. It's an evening of listening to stellar jazz music, viewing thought provoking art, learning the fine art of wine tasting, and sampling extraordinary appetizers and desserts.

The art exhibit, "Overflow," features the work of four artists from Cleveland: George Fitzpatrick, Eric Neff, Dan Tranberg, and Douglas Max Utter. Selected to represent Wordsworth's statement that "poetry is the spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings," the work of these four artists reveals the complex and tightly woven relationship between art and poetry. The viewer will find works that embody passion, beauty, nature and metaphor.

You will have a chance to meet the four artists as they present their work that evening. Henry Adams, curator of American art at The Cleveland Museum of Art, will also attend this year's event. Adams has written an essay for the exhibit's catalog, which will be available for purchase during the evening.

Mad About the Arts is a collaborative fundraising event for WYSU-FM Classical 88.5 and the McDonough Museum of Art. Major underwriting for this year's event comes from the Wick Pollock Foundation, with additional support from Hanahan, Strollo & Associates. WYSU-FM members, McDonough Friends, and Fine and Performing Arts alumni may purchase tickets at the discounted rate of \$30; regular admission is \$40; Friends of the Arts level is \$50. Complimentary parking is available at the Wick deck next to the museum. Reservation deadline is Friday, February 21, 2003. 
## Sets Example For Other NPR Stations

# JUSTICE TALKING ON SUNDAY MORNINGS

Margot Adler, host of Justice Talking.

In late November, WYSU began airing the NPR program called **Justice Talking** at 7:00 am on Sunday mornings. The program bills itself as "smart talk about law, justice, and American values." Listener response has been very positive.

Leading correspondents provide the human story behind the legal drama in a brief report before each town hall segment. Host Margot Adler fields questions from the audience and manages the discussion between the distinguished guests. With over thirty years of experience as a correspondent and host on public radio, Adler hits just the right chord, mastering all the elements. Recent topics have been: "Physician-assisted Suicide," "Racketeering or Righteous Protest," "Gay Adoption," and "Age Discrimination."

Justice Talking is quickly becoming America's source for insight on the hot-button legal issues we all read about, think about, and talk about every day. The program is the flagship effort of a multimedia civics-education project at the Annenberg Public Policy Center at the University of Pennsylvania. In addition to the radio program, the project is producing an audio books series, a civics curriculum for high school students, the Justice Talking website, and Justice Learning, a partnership with the New York Times Learning Network that provides a comprehensive web-based resource for students, teachers, and parents on civics education and political argumentation.

Justice Talking is an award-winning project recognized by the New York Times and Legal Engine.com. The project received the Civic Mind Award for excellence in public education about the law and was a finalist for the Sidney Hillman Foundation Award in TV/Radio.

Ohio Bicentennial Minutes is a series of short programs produced by WMUB at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. The programs are modeled after the Bicentennial Minutes which were produced by CBS TV in 1975-76. The daily programs offer a glimpse into an aspect of Ohio history and culture. Topics range from social and economic history to notable Ohioans, with a good mix of the serious and the off-beat. WMUB worked with the Ohio Historical Society, the Encyclopedia of the Midwest, and other scholars, under the direction of Dr. Andrew Cayton, Distinguished Professor of History at Miami University and a member of the Ohio Bicentennial Commission.







