WYSU-FM Announces Appointment of New Staff Development Officer

Michele Grant of Boardman has been appointed development officer for Youngstown State University's public radio station, WYSU-FM.

Grant, who was formerly the university's annual fund coordinator, began her new duties in April.

"This position is a natural fit for me," said Grant, who has a professional background in arts administration. "It's great to be back in an arts environment. In fact, I grew up with the arts. My father was a musician and an artist. Because of him, I developed a love for music, though my passion has always been in the visual arts."

"I am so pleased that Michele has joined the WYSU-FM team. She brings an enormous amount of talent and skills with her," said Gary Sexton, WYSU director. "Her strong background in arts development and arts management will be key as the WYSU staff works together to address the many challenges – and opportunities – facing a smaller – market public radio station."

As development officer, Grant's fundraising responsibilities will include coordinating WYSU's annual fall and spring fund drives, and serving on the planning team for the annual "Mad About the Arts," a popular fundraising event that benefits both the station and the McDonough Museum of Art.

Additionally, Grant is responsible for organizing WYSU-"members-only" events, such as special film screenings at Austintown Movies, and she'll also be managing the station's current underwriter accounts, along with cultivating new underwriters.

She is currently laying the groundwork for future gifts by spearheading an overall analysis of WYSU's development department, which includes preparing a strategic plan.

"This position gives me the ability to get out and talk with clients and meet community members," said Grant, who was executive director of the Philadelphia arts education program, "Print in Progress," for 10 years.

After completing a National Endowment for the Arts Internship focusing on membership programs throughout Philadelphia's art community, she held development positions in various arts organizations, including Marian Locks Gallery, the Philadelphia Theater Company, the International House of Philadelphia and the Friends of Independence National Historical Park.

Grant, a McDonald High School graduate, received her Bachelor of Arts degree in art history and studio art from Oberlin College in 1978, and a master's degree from Philadelphia's Drexel University in arts administration. She lived and worked in Philadelphia for more than 20 years before moving back to the Valley in 2002.

WYSU-FM Trip to the Blossom Festival

The program will begin with the exhilarating concert overture by the Czech composer Antonin Dvorák called *Carnival* and will end with the last of Johannes Brahms' symphonies, the poignant *Symphony No. 4 in E minor*. The program also includes Edward Elgar's *E minor Cello Concerto*, which brings to the stage an exciting new talent, 24-year-old Brazilian cellist Claudio Bohórquez.

Born and raised in Germany, Bohórquez already holds the titles for many international cello competitions, among them the Czech Radio's Concertino Praga (1991), the Youth Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, and the International Rostropovich

Competition in Paris (1994). In 1995, he won first prize at the International Cello Competition in Scheveningen, Holland, and at the Geneva International Music Competition. His appearance at Blossom marks his first with the Cleveland Orchestra.

RHYTHM SWEET AND HOT

A YOUNGSTOWN CONNECTION

Rhythm Sweet and Hot will premier on WYSU-FM, Classical 88.5, on Friday, July 2 at 11:00 pm. This entertaining musical variety show will feature a more melodic form of jazz and dance band music that was once available on radio, on juke boxes, and in record stores everywhere, but today is remembered by only a few.


Rhythm Sweet and Hot is hosted by Ken Crawford and Mike Plaskett, two record collectors who love all kinds of jazz. Mike has a special connection with Youngstown, as he is a 1962 graduate of Cardinal Mooney High School and attended Youngstown State University from 1962-1966. His first job after leaving Youngstown was with KDKA in Pittsburgh.

Ken Crawford is an internationally known vintage music expert and is one of a select group of record collectors who lends his discs back to the record companies for reissue projects. His mint-condition original records and transcriptions appear on hundreds of reissue albums on labels such as Columbia, BMG, Stash, and Hindsight.

The two hosts say that too many good recordings have been passed over. "No one will reissue these records. The market isn't big enough to make a Bert Block compact disc feasible," says Plaskett, referring to an obscure bandleader of the 1930s. "Hundreds of charming, big-selling records made in the 1930s by well-known leaders such as Russ Morgan have never come out again on LP or compact disc."

David Luscher, associate director of WYSU says, "We are very happy to be working with Mike and Ken. Their extensive knowledge of pre-war jazz will enhance our programming and delight our listeners with music that is fun to rediscover."

Rhythm Sweet and Hot is now heard on 33 radio stations from Puerto Rico to Australia and replaces Worldwide Jazz, which is no longer in production. Samples of the program are available on the WYSU web site, www.wysu.org.


