2. Enrollment - Fall 1947

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Colleges generally anticipated a slight downward turn from peak freshman enrollment this fall. This was not the case at Youngstown, where the freshman class numbers 1402 new enrollments, with 139 transfer students from other schools. It is apparent also that freshmen this year are more certain of their college objectives than new students have been in the last two years: there were, in the first four weeks of school only an approximate 100 withdrawals as compared with 250 at this time last year.

3. Faculty

The faculty for the fall term includes 80 full-time teachers and 118 part-time instructors. A number of new men are on the full-time faculty, as indicated below.

4. Library

The search for a qualified head librarian is continuing. In the meantime Mrs. Helene Catherman is acting librarian.

Mr. Wheeler met with the Library Committee October 10. at which time he agreed to outline various concrete proposals for consideration.

The Law Library has been moved to new quarters on the first floor of Annex 1. This is one of the steps being taken to prepare the Law School for an initial inspection by the American Bar Association, with a view toward accreditation by that organization.

5. F.W.H. Report on Allocation of Government Surplus Buildings

A report from the Federal Works Agency on provision of government surplus buildings to Ohio colleges indicates that Youngstown College ranks high in the amount of government aid obtained. Of the 31 institutions sharing in this program, Youngstown College is seventh highest, the first six schools being state or city-supported.

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#### 6. Utilization of Annex Buildings

The Washington F.W.H. office has expressed considerable satisfaction with the degree of use to which the four annex buildings have already been put. The class enrollment report indicates that classes totaling over 4700 students are scheduled for annex classrooms; this amounts to a total of 16019 student class hours a week. Assuming a tuition income of \$9.00 per credit hour or \$.50 per student hour per week, the annex buildings are producing an income of \$8,000 a week, or \$144,000 a semester.

All construction expense is included in the F.W.H. contract. However, the College has done special work amounting to \$6,328.00, and has installed additional equipment at a cost of \$4,964. A detailed statement of these expenditures is given on Page 5.

#### 7. Cafeteria Building

The fifth barracks building being constructed by the government engineers is scheduled for completion by the end of January. The building will house a student cafeteria and faculty dining room on the first floor, and a

music rehearsal hall and a music studio on the second floor. The rehearsal hall will be especially useful, as the band, orchestra, and choruses have had no suitable practice room since the College auditorium was converted into a library study room.

#### 8. Government Surplus Equipment

On Page 6 is listed in detail the equipment given by the government to Youngstown College. Members of the engineering faculty have listed their appraised value of the equipment, based on the cost of the material if the College had to purchase it commercially. The total value on this basis is \$211,200, although the valuation made by the government engineers from list prices was much higher.

#### 9. Quonset Hut for Engineering School

The F.W.H. agency in Washington has approved allocation of two Quonset huts (16 x 80 feet) for use as engineering school storage place, classrooms, and metallurgical laboratory. Permission has been secured from the Rayen School trustees for the erection of these buildings on the north side of the school.

### 10. Clark Property

At a recent meeting of the Executive Committee Nr. Maag was authorized to arrange for burchase of the Clark property at 415 Bryson Street, at a cost not to exceed \$12.000. Nr. Maag will report progress on this project.

#### 11. Business School

For a period of the last six years it has been virtually impossible to buy or replace any business school ecuipment. The normal life of such equipment, when used for teaching purposes, varies from three to four years. It seems advisable, therefore, to replace most of the present equipment now, with the exception of bookkeeping and calculating machines. This can be done at a cost of \$10,000., and it is recommended that such an expenditure be authorized at this time.

#### 12. Football

An increased public interest in Youngstown College football is evident this fall, and the number of advance season ticket sales is much greater than last year. Game attendance to date is indicated below:
