Mr. Bliss, Vice Chairman, presided in the absence of Mr. Wick.

The manutes of the meeting of the Board of Trustees held July 17, 1944, and of the Executive Committee held October 9, 1944, were read and duly approved.

Judge Bennett reported that the petition with reference to the proposed lease of the Rayen School property had been filed in Common Pleas Court; that the time for answer had just passed; that answers had been filed by the Attorney General of the State of Ohio and by the Board of Education of the City of Youngstown and that the matter would probably soon be heard by the Common Pleas Court.

Dr. Jones reported that Dr. Robert L. Blair, formerly an instructor at the University of Illinois, had been employed as a member of the full-time faculty in the Speech Department to replace Russell G. Bunn who had resigned because of illness; also that Dr. Louise Brungard, who teaches Human Physiology, and Mrs. P. K. Baker, who teaches Social Psychology, have been added to the part-fime faculty.

Upon motion by Mr. Cummins, seconded by Mr. Robinson, and duly carried, the action of the Executive Committee, authorizing the President to apply to the Chio State Department of Education for authority to grant the degree of Bachelor of Engineering was ratified and approved.

Dr. Jones reported that a hearing had been held before the Renegotiation Board on the matter of final settlement under our contract for training aviation cadets and that as a result of the hearing, the College will receive a final payment in the amount of \$3700.00 and will not be obligated to refund any payments received under the Aviation Contract.

Dr. Jones reported that there are now 34 Veterans attending Youngstown College, 24 of whom are full time day students and 10 of whom are part time evening students; that the Veterans Bureau advised the college that it intended to establish a counseling and placement center at Youngstown College; that the college had agreed to set up a counseling and testing program for veterans and that Dean George M. Wilcox will attend a special four weeks course to be given at the City College of New York in "Testing and Guidance of Veterans."

In furtherance of the policy previously established by the Board and upon motion by Mr. Barrett, seconded by Mr. Leventry, and duly carried, the Board approved the taking of graduate work during the year 1944-45 by two members of the college staff, to-wit, Miss Peggy Boyer, who is attending Western Reserve University on a part time basis and Mrs. Mary Smith, who will attend Ohio State University during the winter quarter.

Upon motion by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Maag, and duly carried, the increases in salary approved by the Executive Committee at its meeting held October 9, were approved by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Jones presented the following comparative statement of income and expense:

Dr. Jones reported that he was to speak at the annual meeting of the Trumbull County Manufacturing Association at Warren and would advise them of the work which the College is doing in its cooperative teaching program.

He also announced that an individual had recently donated electrical equipment worth \$10,000.00 to the College and that WKBN had donated a motor generator set worth approximately \$2,500.00.

There being no further business, the meeting was duly adjourned.
